

Kwajalein Golf Association will host a Patriot Golf Day tournament at 9 a.m., Monday, at Holmberg Fairways. During this event, donations made will go to the Folds of Honor Foundation, which provides post-secondary educational scholarships to children and spouses of military service men and women killed or disabled while serving our nation. In the last four years, the Professional Golfers Association has been instrumental in raising more than \$8.6 million by hosting Patriot Golf Day events at their facilities, allowing the organization to distribute more than 2,000 scholarships internationally, in all 50 states and 41 PGA sections. The total number of post-secondary educational scholar-



ship recipients surpassed the 2,400 mark in 2011. Patriot Golf Day is jointly supported by The PGA of America and the United States Golf Association.

SUNRISE BAKERY

Bring the bakery home with special requests, to-go orders

Sunrise Bakery offers more than meets the eye. Established in 1953, the bakery serves what you would normally expect: coffee drinks, pastries and breads. However, Darren Moore, bakery manager, has big dreams for our small island bakery. Some are in the works already, while some are still hopeful future ventures.

So what can you get from the bakery right now? Sunrise Bakery is open from 6 a.m. to 1:30 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday. They produce 3,100 pastries, 200 dozen bread products and 75 cakes and pies per week. While most of their business is here on Kwajalein, they also service Roi-Namur, Meck Island and the *Island Voyager*. They even cater requests from Majuro. "It is my understanding that we are one of three bakeries within the Marshall Islands," said Moore.

The bakery not only satisfies your hunger, but also your thirst. You can swing by in the morning and order coffee, lattes, cappuccinos, espressos and coffee coolers.

Probably one of the little known facts about the bakery is your option to special order items. Having a dinner party? You can special order pretty much any kind of bread and pick it up during business hours. This includes Italian, whole wheat, seven grain, garlic French and Jewish rye. Throwing a birthday party or baby shower? You can special order a decorated cake. Catering a lunch for your coworkers? You can special order items not on the menu; talk to Moore or Telina Jacklick about your options, one of which is strombolis.

Jacklick is the senior cashier, but Moore unofficially calls her the assistant manager because of all she does at the bakery. She is not only a cashier, but she cooks and works production lists. She has worked at the bakery for 6.5 years. Her favorite part of her job is

experimenting with new recipes and making creations like strombolis. Besides Moore and Jacklick, there are only six other staff members at the bakery. They begin their work "day" at 9 p.m., finishing up around 4 a.m. All bakery products are handmade fresh by the bakery staff and contain no preservatives.

Sunrise Bakery is small, but mighty. The fact that they have such a small staff and still are able to offer such an assortment of products is a testament to how hard each employee works. This small staff is part of the reason why the bakery is only open during the workweek. When Moore first came on board three years ago, the bakery was open seven days a week. With budget cuts, trends had to be identified for when the bakery did most of its business. In the end, weekend hours were cut because they were the least busy days. But that doesn't mean you have to do without on the weekends. You can special order to-go items and pick them up on Saturdays.

If a small staff wasn't challenging enough, they have another obstacle to tackle. Back in 2010, a renovation project began with the bakery as phase one. The new and improved bakery was reopened for business in July 2011. Since that time, phase two of the renovation has begun – Café Pacific. The renovation at Café Pacific means the bakery has to share their kitchen. Since Café Pacific serves three hot meals a day to Kwajalein residents, the bakery does not have the opportunity to cook during the daytime. Moore hopes that once the renovation is complete and he has his kitchen back, he can start offering even more items to residents.

Heidle chosen for prestigious seminar at West Point

Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High School senior Hayden Heidle got a taste of post high school life by applying for the Summer Leaders Seminar at the United States Military Academy at West Point. He submitted an application which outlined his grades, extracurricular activities and accomplishments. He was lucky enough to be able to interview face-to-face with Lt. Col. Kenneth McDonald, engineering management program director at West Point. Heidle met with McDonald at Emon Beach and had two comprehensive interviews. They went well and Heidle was selected among thousands of applicants.

Heidle reported to the West Point campus in early June for a one-week seminar; there were a total of 500 students accepted for the

week. The students toured the campus, talked to cadets and attended classes. The purpose of the seminar was to give students a glimpse of what life would be like if they were accepted into the academy. They rose at a very early hour for physical training, lived in the barracks and learned basic military tactics. They even got to carry military-grade guns. Heidle said he felt like he was truly in the Army.

Heidle quickly became known as the "Kwaj Kid," being one of few students attending from overseas. He heard this especially among his squad and from his sergeant. Meeting that group was the best part, said Heidle. "In less than a week ... we became like a family," he said.

Heidle will continue to research colleges this year before he makes a decision about where he wants to attend. As of right now, while he highly recommends the SLS pro-



gram and taking advantage of what West Point has to offer, he may be looking into a more artistic college as his choice.





Jayme Loy



Water tank gets protective coatings


The water tank replacement project is nearly complete on Roi-Namur, with San Juan Construction painter K.C. Kibin applying a few coats on the outside of the tank. The work, being performed by contractor San Juan Construction, falls under the indefinite-delivery/indefinite-quantity contract issued by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Work for the task order included the design, construction and installation of a new 500,000 gallon potable water storage tank with roof and structure to replace the existing 750,000 gallon water tank. Demolition of the existing water tank was completed in late May. The tank structure contract included a foundation for the new tank, roof and structure over the new tank and all accessories required of the new tank to function fully equal to the operation of the previous tank.



Roi-Namur Wastewater Treatment Plant Outfall Repair

The U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command/Army Forces Strategic Command has completed an Environmental Assessment, prepared in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 and the Council on Environmental Quality regulations implementing NEPA. The Roi-Namur Wastewater Treatment Plant Outfall Repair EA analyzes the potential environmental consequences that could result from the implementation of the sewer outfall repair activities. Given the current significant deterioration and/or lack of sewer outfall piping that is remaining, there is essentially no portion of the existing system beyond the point where it leaves the shoreline that can be reused. Consequently, an entirely new sewer outfall line, oriented essentially along the present alignment, will need to be designed and installed to adequately address the characteristics and demands along the terrain of the pipeline route.
