NATIONAL AMERICAN INDIAN HERITAGE MONTH

What started at the turn of the century as an effort to gain a day of recognition for the significant contributions the first Americans made to the establishment and growth of the U.S., has resulted in a whole month being designated for that purpose.


One of the very proponents of an American Indian Day was Dr. Arthur C. Parker, a Seneca Indian, who was the director of the Museum of Arts and Science in Rochester, N.Y. He persuaded the Boy Scouts of America to set aside a day for the 'First Americans' and for three years they adopted such a day. In 1913, the annual Congress of the American Indian Association meeting in Lawrence, Kans. formally approved a plan concerning American Indian Day. It directed its president, Rev. Sherman Coolidge, an Arapahoe, to call upon the country to observe such a day. Coolidge issued a proclamation on Sept. 28, 1915, which declared the second Saturday of each May as an American Indian Day and contained the first formal appeal for recognition of Indians as citizens.

The year before this proclamation was issued, Red Fox James, a Blackfoot Indian, rode horseback from state to state seeking approval for a day to honor Indians. On December 14, 1915, he presented the endorsements of 24 state governments at the White House. There is no record, however, of such a national day being proclaimed.

The first American Indian Day in a state was declared on the second Saturday in May 1916 by the governor of New York. Several states celebrate the fourth Friday in September. In Illinois, for example, legislators enacted such a day in 1919. Presently, several states have designated Columbus Day as Native American Day, but it continues to be a day we observe without any recognition as a national legal holiday.

In 1990 President George H. W. Bush approved a joint resolution designating November 1990 'National American Indian Heritage Month.' Similar proclamations, under variants on the name including 'Native American Heritage Month' and 'National American Indian and Alaska Native Heritage Month' have been issued each year since 1994.

The North American Indian by Edward S. Curtis is one of the most significant and controversial representations of traditional American Indian culture ever produced. Issued in a limited edition from 1907-1930, the publication continues to exert a major influence on the image of Indians in popular culture. Curtis said he wanted to document 'the old time Indian, his dress, his ceremonies, his life and manners.' In over 2000 photogravure plates and narrative, Curtis portrayed the traditional customs and lifestyles of eighty Indian tribes. The twenty volumes, each with an accompanying portfolio, are organized by tribes and culture areas encompassing the Great Plains, Great Basin, Plateau Region, Southwest, California, Pacific Northwest, and Alaska. 
Mid atoll corridor will be closed from 4:01 p.m., on Nov. 10 through mission completion.

Hourglass reports

Ric Fullerton, the government teacher at the school, wanted students to feel a significant impact from presidential elections. Fullerton has organized an activity focusing on current political issue topics. This year, from Oct. 18-31, the school encouraged students to seek out information regarding the candidates.

There were a variety of committees for students to join. Students posted signs in the hallways and in teacher's offices. A mock election rally, and the distribution committee dispersed information.

A priority for the voting student had to be independent. A decision could be made. Information was provided to students as well as an Election 2012 Information Corner. Many Kwajalein school teachers willing to do so to provide credible and reliable information on the candidates in the rooms. Fullerton had one main guideline: it was to be a non-partisan facilitator in the students search for information.

The activity culminated in a political rally on the school's Multipurpose room for the rally, and listened to speeches on numerous issues. Students acted as the candidates in the familiar inflections of their characters. President Barack Obama, while junior John Sholar acted as Republican Mitt Romney. Simpson performed as emcee for the rally, in a role. She enjoyed the assignment, noting, "I liked it."

the Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High school, wants his students to have a simulated presidential election. For the past three elections, Fullerton has been the upcoming Presidential election and several members of the JSHS Election 2012 Committee encouraged all students to get involved with the presidential candidates and issues.

Students were encouraged to get involved, including advertising, which included setting up the room for the candidates, hats, noisemakers and flags.

Independent information gathering, so an informed decision could be made through intercom announcements, posters, and a campaign center set up in the library. Fullerton encouraged students to provide opportunities for students to seek out information on the candidates and issues within their respective classes. It was essential that the teachers stick to the role of a facilitator and to become more politically aware and informed.

On Nov. 1. Students gathered in the Davye Davis gymnasium for speeches, indicating the candidates stand for the contenders, and delivered their speeches with music. President Barack Obama was played by junior Scott Fullerton and Republican nominee Mitt Romney. Senior Jamie Fullerton introduced each of the candidates to much fanfare. Each candidate speaking in front of people." Each candidate

spoke about their stances on various issues so each student could make an even more informed decision when it came time to cast their vote.

Both Swanby and Sholar went through rehearsal time to not only get the mannerisms correct, but also the candidates stance on a variety of issues. "I enjoyed getting the mannerisms and the speech patterns down," said Swanby. Fullerton wrote their rally speeches, compiling the actual candidates own words from their acceptance speeches from the National Conventions. Both teens watched the candidates debates as well. "I liked wearing the suit, and it was nice being involved, and portraying Mitt Romney for the school. I felt like a celebrity," said Sholar.

Another hurdle to overcome for students was registering to vote. There was a window of only three days, they could only register with their own English teacher and it had to be either before or after school. After they registered, they received a campaign button, made by the advertising committee.

Registered students had the opportunity to cast a vote for the presidential candidate of their choice and vote on several issue questions during their fifth period class after the rally. Some of the issues included education, economy, health care and the environment. These votes were registered, along with those cast by millions of other students across the U.S. and living on overseas U.S. bases, by the National Student/Parent Mock Election organization.

Many people, particularly teachers, helped with the events, and Fullerton was quick to thank them all. He noted that the kids did much of the work, and he credited Neil Dye with not only providing music for this rally, but for every mock election, and for most events at the school that require music.

According to Fullerton, the main goal of the activity is to provide every student with a simulated voting experience in the hopes of sparking their interest in becoming informed and reasoned participants in the democratic process at age 18 and beyond.

Gabriel Clarose Ellamar




