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Veterans remembered, especially those who fought here on Kwajalein Atoll

Recognizable patriotic tunes played by the Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High School band filled the air as Kwajalein residents and guests took their seats at the flagpoles for the yearly celebration of Veteran's Day on Monday. A historical battle site of World War II, Kwajalein celebrations of this day often pay tribute not only to those brave men and women who have sacrificed their lives throughout our nation's history, but also those who did so right here on the island we now live and work on.

Maj. Luke Koerschner hosted the ceremony this year and welcomed Kwajalein's veterans and distinguished guests. He briefly spoke of how Veteran's Day was originally coined Armistice Day; it was changed in 1954 to honor veterans of all wars. The audience stood while the national anthems of the Republic of the Marshall Islands and the United States were played by the Kwajalein High School band under the direction of Dick Shields. The Invocation was read aloud by Father Victor Langhans.

U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll/Reagan Test Site Commander Col. Shannon Boehm took the podium to address the audience. "It is fitting that we gather here today on Kwajalein to take time out to honor those brave men and women, past and present, including U.S. and Marshallese, who served, fought and sacrificed so much in the defense of our great nation. This island, the greater Kwajalein Atoll and the Marshall Islands as a whole, were the site of significant and fierce fighting in the Allied Pacific Campaign of World War II. So much so that we live and work on hallowed ground where warriors struggled so fiercely, fought and died in their efforts for their countries."

Boehm then introduced the special guest speaker of the day, U.S. Ambassador to the Republic of the Marshall Islands, Thomas Armbruster, who was re-

cently appointed in August. "We are honored to have you here today to spend time celebrating this critical remembrance of our past and present men and women in service," Boehm said.

Armbruster took the podium and began by saying, "It's hard to picture on this lovely, peaceful day what it must have been like here on Kwajalein Atoll in January 1944." He recounted the terrible devastation of Operation Flintlock and reminded those now residing on this same island that the heavy bombardment decimated all vegetation, and debris and shell craters were the only cover afforded to infantrymen as they fought across the island, one pillbox and blockhouse at a time. "When the fighting ended, 500 U.S. troops and nearly 8,000 Japanese soldiers lost their lives," he said solemnly.

Ambassador Armbruster Visits USAKA

The United States Ambassador to the Republic of the Marshall Islands, Thomas Armbruster, visited USAKA this past week. He made his first visit to Ebeye and also was the keynote speaker at the Veteran's Day ceremony here on USAKA. This was the Ambassador's second visit to USAKA after assuming his ambassadorial duties in August 2012.

Ambassador Armbruster conducted a tour of Ebeye Nov. 10, and was accompanied on his visit by Col. Boehm, USAKA Commander, and Sgt. Maj. Prioleau, USAKA Senior Enlisted Advisor, Andrew Zvirzdin, Political and Economic Officer for the U.S. Embassy, and members of the USAKA Host Nation Office. During the Ambassador's visit to Ebeye, he was met by RMI Liaison to USAKA, Mr. Lanny Kabua, as well as by other GRMI and KALGOV officials. Part of his visit included a meeting with local officials, land owners, and other senior leaders of Ebeye. Topics discussed included topics of mutual interest such as education, health, excess property purchases, and the upcoming U.S. Navy Pacific Partnership visit in 2013. This was followed by a vehicle tour out on the causeway to Gugeegu.

The visit continued with Ambassador Armbruster attending the USAKA Veteran's Day ceremony on Monday and giving the keynote speech. The Ambassador spoke about the WWII battle on Kwajalein and the loss of soldiers and paid tribute to the struggle they had to endure.

KRS employees recognized for hard work, dedication in FY12

An award ceremony was held Nov. 10 at Emon Beach for Kwajalein Range Services employees to thank them for their hard work and dedication.

KRS President Cynthia Rivera took the stage and welcomed KRS employees. She first congratulated them all for an outstanding year and discussed key performance highlights they should all be proud of.

“FY12 started out as the most challenging year ever with the lowest budget and the fewest number of employees in the history of (Reagan Test Site),” Rivera said. “But that didn’t hold us back and things quickly improved for us. We worked together as a team to meet the significant challenges of FY12 and we did so very successfully. Today is about you—a celebration of the great work that we accomplished this past year.”

Rivera reviewed milestones achieved throughout the year, one of the most significant being that as of the end of October, KRS has worked over 8 million hours without a lost time accident. Throughout the year, KRS supported many successful RTS missions including the Advanced Hypersonic Weapons test, the GT-203, the Pegasus Nu-Star and most recently the largest, most complex test ever conducted in the history of missile defense program, FTI-01. Besides missions, KRS employees contributed to a late-night rescue of 101 people lost at sea in February. One of the most difficult hurdles this year was tackling DIACAP compliance. “The team has done an outstanding job working long hours over many months to get our networks to the point where we can pass the inspection. My thanks go out to all of the team members who have worked really hard to get us to this point.”

Looking forward to FY13, Rivera highlighted some challenges ahead, but said, “I think this year will be another great year for KRS because we have such a talented team that knows how to get the job done, safely, professionally, on schedule and within budget. You all make this possible.”

Rivera took the time to recognize individuals and key groups with awards.

First, Sean Reagan, firefighter, was given an Impact Award for rescuing a distressed child who fell out of a kayak 125 yards out into the lagoon on Oct. 15 at Camp Hamilton. Next, Trudy Butler was awarded for her outstanding job as the Security Supervisor, and Tom Lester was recognized for the positive difference he has made leading change in the Public Works department.

The next group to be recognized was the Quality and Six Sigma team consisting of Jeremy Gideon, Samantha Inok and Yulia Myers. Rivera commended them for successfully working across the KRS team to streamline processes and proactively institute solutions to save time.

The Project Controls group, consisting of Amy Moore, Michele Carlson, Lana Gideon, Sheryl Gottsman, Julie Jones, Lynn Leines, Joe Logan, Lianne Sykes and Stacey Warthen were recognized for their critical attention to detail and long hours spent on FY12 budget management and development of the FY13 budget.

Finally, the last Team of the Quarter for FY12 was announced and was made up of everyone who contributed to the success of FTI-01. “To put this in perspective, there are 660 KRS team employees who spent 8 hours or more on FTI-01 in the last 10 months. That’s an amazing team,” Rivera said.

Instead of calling up all 660 employees, she first called up the Kwajalein based critical leaders whose hard work enabled mission success. This group included: Mike Savage, John Breen, John Brown, Trudy Butler, Floyd Corder III, Fred Cunningham, Jenny Cunningham, Pat Dowell, Jen Dupuy, Dan Eggers, Pedro Ferrer, Kelly Furgeson, Donna Groth, Elaine Hahn, Ryan Krogh, John O’Brien, Norm Sablas, Ron Sylvester and Michael Turner. Rivera then called up 41 Kwajalein based employees who each spent over 500 hours supporting FTI-01.

Rivera closed by thanking everyone for their dedication and hard work. She will address the Roi-Namur workforce next week.

Roi lens well project to provide more clean drinking water for Roi residents

Wave action that resulted in flooding on Roi-Namur back in December 2008 began a four-year long project that is finally nearing its end. Waves washed ashore on Roi and contaminated all six lens wells located on the golf course along the edge of the runway that provided drinking water to island residents. Brackish water, a combination of fresh and salt water, can be pumped from these lens wells into a reverse osmosis system that removes the salt and makes the water suitable for consumption. Planning began to install new wells to prepare for potential wave action in the future.

The main purpose of the project was for the Chugach Water Distribution, Heavy Equipment, Construction and Electric shops to provide a total of five new lens wells. Three new lens wells were sited alongside the existing six wells and are required for the reverse osmosis machine, which needs more water than the existing six lens wells supply, said Stan Jazwinski, KRS Liquid Systems Manager.

The secondary purpose of the project was to spread out the location of the drinking water wells on Roi. This way, if another wave hits in the future, the chances of

all of the wells being contaminated are lessened. Two additional wells are being built on the opposite side of the runway, near the beach pavilion. At the end of the project, there will be 11 lens wells available for drinking water on Roi-Namur. Each of the new wells should provide at least 25,000 gallons of water per day.

As an added benefit to this project, sprinkler lines were installed to greens 6, 7 and 9, to allow those greens to be irrigated from a lens well that is no longer used for drinking water.

Work on the project was moving quickly and smoothly. A temporary duty archeologist was brought out to oversee the project due to the risk of uncovering

World War II remains. During the first six weeks of well installation, the only significant items found were a mortar round and an artillery shell. The Explosive Ordnance Disposal team was called out to take care of them. With four wells already installed, the team uncovered their first human remains two weeks ago: part of a human skull and bone fragments. The Republic of the Marshall Islands historic preservation office was notified and came to Roi for a site visit. They will determine whether the burial site will be excavated and work will continue, or to relocate the lens well site. As of right now, work is halted for up to four weeks while issue is dealt with.



"We observe Veterans Day on Nov. 11, the day World War I, the War to End All Wars, ended in 1918. Over 22 million veterans in the United States have served and are still serving to establish an enduring peace, 96 years [later]. The defense of our freedoms is still an ongoing enterprise."

He continued, saying, "For decades, Kwajalein has epitomized the unique and dynamic nature of the RMI-U.S. relationship as well as the remarkable capacity of the U.S. military. Where there was once only debris and craters, we now have a beautiful installation providing defense against foreign and rogue missiles, conducting valuable research on emerging technologies and promoting our understanding of space. Global stability depends on places like USAKA."

He ended by saying, "Service is something all of us are called to do. The families here, the contractors, Marshallese and American, this whole community is here to do good work, and I'm happy to add my voice to thank you for it."

Members of Kwajalein Boy Scout Troop 314 came forward to hand off the wreaths for the Laying of Wreaths ceremony. The ceremony honors fallen comrades—those who answered their nation's call and literally gave all. Boehm and Armbruster were joined by Michael Woundy, of American Legion Post 44, and Amy LaCost, representing American Legion Post 44 Women's Auxiliary. A wreath was placed at the base of the Operation Flintlock memorial, in front of the U.S. national colors, the colors of the Republic of the Marshall Islands and

in front of the 2nd Raider Battalion memorial.

Koerschner finished the ceremony by asking everyone to "humbly thank our veterans for answering the call to duty, especially those who fought and died here in the Marshall Islands. ... Let us never forget."

A moment of silence was offered, the American Legion Post 44 rifle squad fired a three-volley salute and "Taps" was played by high school junior Ann-Marie Hepler.
