

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Boat rescued off Carlson Island



In a joint effort by the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll and Republic of the Marshall Islands, a distressed boat was rescued late on Dec. 28. Kwajalein Security and Access Control, and Kwajalein Range Services Marine Department personnel teamed with an RMI vessel, *Li Jako*, to rescue the *Eanin Meto*.

At around 4:30 p.m., *Eanin Meto* called the RMI Liaison, Lanny Kabua, on Kwajalein to request assistance. A faulty fuel system had stalled their engines and they were drifting off Carlson Island with 120 passengers aboard. Kabua called the Host Nation Office, who notified the proper authorities. The Marine Department and KSAC sent two boats to assist. Jeff Booty and Yoshi Kemem captained the *Peacekeeper* while Charlie Murillo prepared one of the ferry boats to act as a tow vessel if necessary. *Li Jako* responded and offered to tow.

Eanin Meto was visually located by Booty approximately three miles east of Carlson in the lagoon. Many of the 120 passengers were suffering the ill effects from being aboard a boat bouncing around at the mercy of the elements. The stiff easterly breeze would dangerously push the *Eanin Meto* onto the west reef within hours.

Li Jako successfully towed the *Eanin Meto* to the Ebeye Pier. Booty and Murillo tailed the two vessels in the event of a mechanical or medical issue that would require further assistance. All vessels, including the crew and passengers aboard, were safely returned around 7:45 p.m.

SPOTLIGHT USAKA Host Nation Office

The USAKA Host Nation Office is located in building 730, just behind the Post Office. The office is staffed by three personnel: Maj. Alonzo Garcia, Host Nation Director; Michael Sakaio, Senior Island Liaison; and William P. White, Island Liaison. The function of the HNO is as a direct connection and liaison between USAKA and the local population and government in the Kwajalein Atoll area. The job entails dealing with a wide variety of daily and unique issues that occur between the Marshallese population, their local/national government, and the USAKA command and residents.

One of these issues covers the coordination of activities impacting the social and cultural welfare of the local inhabitants in accordance with the Compact of Free Association between the United States and the RMI. An example of this would include entry and exit from USAKA from the airport and the dock security checkpoint. Approximately 900 RMI citizens from Ebeye work on USAKA and they provide a continual flow of people at both the DSC and airport. The HNO ensures, along with the provost marshal and Kwajalein Security and Access Control, that entry and exit from the island by local nationals is done in an orderly and efficient manner. This includes on-post workers as well as invited guests who have cause to be on the island. Regular, daily commute list visitors are submitted by the RMI Liaison Office for RMI distinguished visitors and Ebeye business personnel to have access to USAKA for official business on the island. Other entry and exit business allows host nation personnel onto the island who

wish to travel to Roi and Enniburr using the Metro Liner (on a space available basis) or to see a family member off at the airport to travel on United Airlines or Air Marshall Islands; these issues are coordinated through the HNO along with the PMO and KSAC.

Another common issue coordinated by the HNO is the purchase of Exchange goods by authorized RMI military personnel visiting this area and their family members. The military personnel or family member must show proof of an authorized military or dependent ID card and then have HNO type up a letter allowing purchase at the Exchange only while in the area; this document will be recognized by both the Exchange and KSAC when the person wishes to transport purchased items off the island through the DSC.

The HNO assists when Ebeye residents pass away and there is no room at the morgue there; this is when the RMI will make an official request for use of USAKA morgue services on a space available basis. If authorization is allowed, this would include permission to store the deceased in the USAKA morgue as well as an exception to policy to purchase a small amount of items such as food and beverages from the Exchange to coordinate the wake service here; this is all coordinated by the HNO along with the PMO, DSC and hospital.

Other duties of the HNO include maintenance of liaison, and arrangement and participation in meetings with traditional leaders of both the Kwajalein Atoll Local Government and the national government in Majuro and their RMI representatives on matters pertaining to Marshallese personnel employed on USAKA. This includes meetings such as the Community

Relations Council (held quarterly on Kwaj or Ebeye) and the Joint Committee Meeting (held annually in Majuro or on occasion in Hawaii). The office also coordinates and monitors activities involving USAKA-affiliated contractors, private and voluntary organizations, and private individual interaction with the Marshallese to ensure that no activities harmful to RMI-USAKA relations are conducted and that no agreements are violated. This duty includes arrangements with NGOs that perform free medical services on Ebeye for the community. The HNO will arrange the visit to include on-island transportation, hospital coordination with USAKA and Ebeye, billeting here on island, and all other necessary services to facilitate the humanitarian mission. Organization by the HNO includes facilitating cultural events, such as the annual Marshallese Trade Fair and Manit Day, that allow RMI citizens to come to USAKA, showcase and sell their retail goods, as well as express their native habits to the residents here for better cultural understanding between the two nations. The office assists in monitoring the logistical contractor efforts in job training programs such as the MIT/LL annual summer internship program for two qualified Marshallese citizens.

The HNO also coordinates distinguished visitor visits by U.S. government and RMI officials to USAKA. This includes entry, lodging, transportation, tours, meetings and more.

The HNO is a place where many issues develop and affect both the island and host nation residents. They stand ready to assist and help both countries to move forward to ensure a better understanding and relationship between the U.S. and the RMI.




