
Mid-Atoll Corridor will be closed and restricted from 4:01 p.m., today, through mission completion. The caution area extends from the surface to unlimited altitude.





USAKA Draft Document of Environmental Protection for Remediation

The U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Environmental Standards require that proposed remedial activities be described in a Document of Environmental Protection. The Standards also provide regulatory agencies and the public opportunities to review and comment on a Draft DEP.

The Draft DEP, January 2013, provides detailed information related to the proposed remedial actions at these sites. The DEP includes Remediation Plans for the USAKA Compliance Cleanup Program's next steps to cleanup soil and groundwater contamination from fuel releases at the Kwajalein Tank Farm and the Roi-Namur Petroleum, Oil, and Lubricant sites.

The public is invited to review and comment on this Draft DEP. Copies of the Draft DEP and the USAKA Environmental Standards are available for review at the RMI EPA Offices on Majuro and Ebeye, the Grace Sherwood Library on Kwajalein and the Roi-Namur Library. 

Easter eggs fill Emon Beach lagoon

Kwajalein Scuba Club sponsors hunt, gives away prizes

The lagoon at Emon Beach was loaded down with around 500 sand-filled plastic eggs for divers and snorkelers to discover for the Kwajalein Scuba Club Easter Egg Hunt held Monday. Two pairs of scuba divers hid eggs 15-50 feet down in the scuba area, and one snorkeler hid eggs in the swimming area for snorkelers; some were in shallow depths for the younger, non-swimmers. A safety and informational briefing was given by John Pennington and Chris Ziemba before the hunt began.

The water was a little cloudy on Monday, but actually benefited the egg hunt. "It obscured the eggs hidden and made looking for them more challenging and fun," said Pennington. "The eggs hidden

in 15-50 feet of water were also a challenge since some were hidden in crevices instead of laying in open sand."

While most eggs made it back, it might be common to find an egg or two in the days after the hunt. After the kids finished looking in the swim area, Tommy Ryon went over and found several orphaned eggs to include some winning eggs that he redeemed for prizes.

Some eggs had numbers painted on them which indicated it was a prize egg. A grand prize was given for the most eggs found by an adult and by a child.

The prizes varied. For the kids, there were regular Easter baskets as well as large ones. There were frisbees, goggles, sunglasses, water balls, bike horns, a bike bell and lots of little trinkets so everyone could take something home. For

adults, there were gift certificates for T-shirts and towels, flip flops, rash guards, bike horns, coozies and an underwater camera.

There were a lot of volunteer and donation efforts from a lot of people. AAFES donated a gift card to purchase some of the Easter baskets. Other donations came from Bill Williamson, John Pennington and Matt Ziemba.

"It was great having the help that we did and it was even better seeing everyone run into the water," said Chris. "It seems like everyone had a great time, which is what really mattered in the end."

Volunteers included Matt and Chris Ziemba plus three of their kids, Chris' visiting parents, Geoff and Melina Lake, Doug Hepler, Maddy Greene, Jon Mitchell, Jeremy Owens, Edward Jednacz and Pennington.
