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Couple visits Kwajalein: birthplace of their love

Kwajalein has been the birthplace of many love stories, and for Carolyn and Kenneth Smith, this island was where their love started and where they decided to celebrate their 25th year of blissful marriage. The Smiths are both former Kwajalein residents. Carolyn (maiden name Cato, and known as “CC”) lived on Kwajalein from July 1985 until July of 1987. She lived here with her son, Casey. She was enlisted at the time and worked as the sergeant at the Post Office. Kenneth arrived in August 1986 and left December of 1987, and worked under Global Associates as a captain at the fire station. Kenneth surprised Carolyn with a trip to Kwajalein to celebrate their Silver wedding anniversary. They arrived Aug. 27 and departed Aug. 29.

The Smiths have discussed coming back to Kwajalein ever since they left, but they knew they needed a sponsor in order to gain access to the island. While Kenneth has met just a few people over the years that have lived on Kwajalein, one of them happens to work for him now in Georgia. Kevin Young was a firefighter on Kwajalein a few years ago. When he found out Kenneth was interested in visiting, Young contacted a friend who still lives on Kwajalein, Nick Yarnes, to sponsor the Smiths. Everything fell exactly into place. Kenneth told Carolyn they were going on vacation to Hawaii; when they arrived he surprised her by telling her the next morning they would board the ATI and fly to Kwajalein for two days.

While their trip was short, they spent their time touring the island in a golf cart, visiting their old stomping grounds. After seeing the island again after 26 years, they noticed some big changes. The biggest change they noticed right away was the large decrease in the number of

residents on island. Kenneth also noticed an increase in Marshallese workers, especially in supervisory positions. “The fire station is still the same,” he said, “except for some renovations.” Carolyn also visited her old workplace and found out we now only get mail twice per week; when she lived here, mail arrived every day. They noticed the trailers are gone, and the dome homes have been installed. The stores are different too; no longer called “Macy’s,” AAFES now stands in its place and the food court has a few chain restaurants. The other big change they noticed is that they were unable to visit the first place they had met: the Yokwe Yuk Club, which is now closed.

On Kenneth’s first night on island in 1987, he went to the Yuk Club with his fellow firefighters. He had already heard of “CC” (Carolyn). That night, Carolyn actually approached Kenneth and said, “Hey, Ken Smith,” and then walked away. It left him baffled that she had already heard about him. He saw her again at the gym playing basketball. She had jammed her finger while playing and, “being the firefighter that I am, I went to her rescue,” Kenneth recalled. He said it was a good excuse to hold her hand. They became friends and eventually began dating. They found out that they were both from Georgia, and from that point, their relationship flourished. “If it weren’t for her,

my one year tour would have been pretty rough,” Kenneth said.

Soon, Carolyn’s contract was up and she was heading back to the States in July of 1987. Kenneth went on vacation in August of that year and they decided to meet up and visit. He met her family on that trip and the following year in August, they were married.

When Carolyn left Kwajalein, she was still enlisted and was stationed in Fort Stuart, Georgia. While stationed there, Carolyn’s young son, Casey, was killed. The Army gave her a compassionate reassignment and she was moved to Fort McPherson, near Atlanta, where Kenneth was living and working. They were already married at this time. Kwajalein was the last place Casey lived with his mother, so it holds a special place in her heart. The couple bought a home in Georgia and that’s where they have lived the 25 years of their married life.

Coming back to visit Kwajalein meant a lot to both Kenneth and Carolyn. Kenneth said he was aware some changes had been made to the island, but it doesn’t change how he feels about it. The memories that really matter to him are the ones he and Carolyn shared when they were here together. “We appreciate the commander for allowing us to do this,” he said, and also expressed thanks to Yarnes for sponsoring them and allowing them to fulfill a 26-year-old dream.

Golfers raise \$3,000 at tournament to benefit wounded U.S. Soldiers, families

It was a brutally hot day for golf, with very little wind or cloud cover for relief. But that didn't keep 68 golfers from participating in the Patriot Golf Day tournament held Tuesday at Holmberg Fairways. Participation in Patriot Golf Day runs nationally across the U.S. during Labor Day weekend. All proceeds benefit the Folds of Honor Foundation, which provides educational and other assistance to the spouses and children of servicemembers who are wounded or killed while in service to the U.S. The Kwajalein Golf Association and Community Activities hosted the event on Kwajalein, which raised around \$3,000 for the organization.

The nine-hole tournament consisted of four-person teams using the Best Ball format (all players shoot, and you choose the best shot to play from next). Mulligans (do overs) were available for purchase and went toward the overall donation to Folds of Honor. Handicaps were used, and even generously given out to players who don't usually golf in order to even the odds. Out of 68 players, there were a total of 69 birdies, which combined with handicaps led to some very low scores.

The first place team, who won prize money and KGA dues for 2014, was Jeremy and Sheila Gideon, and Adam and Lindsey Vail, with a net 24. Second place, with a net 25, went to Russell Benamina, John Brown, Virgilio Cruz and Andy Estacion. There was a five-way tie for third place, with a net 26. After the tie breaker, Jim Cossey, Rob Medrano, Kim Parker and Linda Schuett were declared winners. Fourth place, with seven birdies, went to Jeff Beckley, Rudy Gil, Sean Johnson and Shannon Roberts. Teams that placed second through fourth were given prize money and various donated items from Bill's Bike and Dive Shop. All teams donated their prize money back to the Folds of Honor Foundation, and several other teams chipped in even more. The final team recognized had the highest score, which went to Dave and Dawn Gray, Tony Jones and Cindy Mathieson. They were given vouchers for complimentary mulligans in the next KGA fun tournament.

After winners were announced, various items were auctioned off; money collected was donated to Folds of Honor. Bill's Bike and Dive donated some T-shirts and a bike seat, and KGA dues for next year also brought in some extra money for the donation.



Some have the impression that the Third Island Store is located “on” Third Island, otherwise known as Enniburr. That’s when you can see a certain amount of confusion on faces. Third Island Store is actually located on Roi, adjacent and connected to the marina and the Dock Security Checkpoint. The store

prides itself in servicing all the Enniburr community as well as the Roi community, and Kwajalein and TDY visitors.

Third Island Store is an extension of Surfway food store, which is located on Kwajalein. Third Island Store is small in nature, so the amount of products offered is limited. Lemmie is happy to announce that Third Island Store has added an additional day of operation to its hours. The store is now open from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., and 2-5 p.m. on Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, effective immediately.

“So, if you are in the neighborhood, stop on by even if it’s just to look around. We’re not Surfway, but we carry the basic needs and a little extra with a smile,” said Lemmie.
