## Dash-7 grounded

### Official: One plane expected to be back in service by today

A question concerning the "engine life cycle" forced officials to ground the three Dash-7 airplanes this week, causing significantly longer commute times for workers traveling between Kwajalein and Roi-Namur. The situation, however, appears to be resolved.

Steve Wallace, aviation services manager, explained, "We had a question about the engines and the life cycles of some components. Until we could verify the data on the engines, we didn't feel we have engines that are flyable."

However, after two days of research, Wallace said he expected one plane to be back in service today.

"We didn't find any problems on the first plane checked," he said.

Wallace said he ex-


pected to have another Dash-7 available by the weekend, based on the calculus that it took about two days to re-search data on four engines for one plane.

Originally, the 1970s-era planes had been grounded "until further notice" on Wednesday, as commuters were notified of the situation Tuesday night on the television roller and later through business e-mail.

Plans had been developed to accommodate the atoll's transient workforce using catamarans and helicopters in the event the planes were grounded for an extended period of time.

As late as Thursday, officials had planned to use two catamarans to ferry personnel between the two islands via Meck. Helicopters would also

## Minuteman III subject of mission

The final range mission of the calendar year, intended to extend the life of the Minuteman III missile, went by the book, according to an USAKA/KMR official.

"The KMR supported with the normal array of sensors," said Lt. Col Robert James, chief of the range test division. Sensors and support in-

cluded telemetry, optics, weather and impact scoring.

"Every objective was met," James said.

The propulsion replacement program, he explained, is intended to extend the life of the Minute Man III missile into the year 2020. James added the program is also intended

be used to transport some workers. Roi commuters would catch the catamaran at 6 a.m. from Kwajalein and depart at 3:30 p.m. from Roi. Travel time between Kwaj and Roi is about 2½ hours with a brief stop over in Meck to load and unload workers there.

The morning catamaran would then leave Roi and return to Meck, where it would eventually return those employees back to Kwaj. Meanwhile, a second catamaran would depart Kwaj for Roi in the afternoon, with a scheduled pickup of 3:30 p.m. After a brief stop at Meck to retrieve any late-working personnel, the catamaran would return before 6 p.m.

Officials estimate there are about 120 Roi/Kwaj commuters and upwards of 80 personnel traveling to Meck daily. The catamaran can hold up to 200 people, according to Tom Dillon, manager of marine services.

"We're combining the Meck morning run with a run that will go up to Roi," he confirmed Wednesday, the first day the plan was initiated. Dillon said 144 people left Kwaj on the cata-

maran that day.

"[Wednesday] was a low day," he noted.

Not everyone would have to make the long boat ride to and from Roi if the planes were grounded for an extended period of time.

Up to 40 beds could be used on Roi to accommodate workers wishing to stay overnight, according to Andrea Dixon, RSE housing administrator and organizational housing representative.

Not all the beds necessarily mean private rooms, Dixon said.

"Some of them we will be putting into [workers'] offices to use," she explained. Other beds that were to be requisitioned are normally for TDY personnel.

Von Christiansen, outer islands logistics manager, noted of the proposed housing shuffle, "We do have some flexibility."

Christiansen said transportation from the marina to the workplace would be provided to employees as it would be from the island's airport terminal, which is located near most of the job sites on the jungle side of Roi.

"We normally have one bus at the terminal," Christiansen said.

For any changes in helicopter, catamaran or Dash-7 schedules, stay tuned to the roller.

to eliminate any environmental fallout, as well.

The first of several such missions expected to be conducted by the range, another "propulsion replacement program" is scheduled for February.

It was also the last re-entry mission of the calendar year. The range will be down from Nov. 21 to Jan. 1 of next year. That will allow for Marshallese residents to visit homes within the mid-atoll corridor, which is normally off limits during much of the year.

The final re-entry mission of the year also enjoyed a spot of good weather for a change.

"We had a break in the weather, as if someone drew a circle around us and said, 'It won't rain here,'" James said.

# Despite storm, *Opus* had a great cruise

A rumor floated around Kwaj that the *S/V Opus* and her crew were lost or in trouble during their overseas trip earlier this month.

Contrary to the rumor, the *S/V Opus* sailed into Kwaj Harbor on Nov. 6 as expected without any problems, with Capt. Hal Dunn and crew, Karen Dunn, Geoffrey Tyre and Eileen Conaty, aboard. They survived the trip, but the U.S. flag and one of their radios didn't.

The *Opus*, a Gulfstar 39, departed Kwaj heading for Lae Atoll, 92 nautical miles away. They had just sailed through South Pass when the storm hit.

Dave Merrifield, Harbor Control shift dispatcher, said, "I warned them when they called about 5 p.m. that they were about to get hit. After the storm I talked to them, but their radio was bad. It must have gotten wet. That's the last time we talked to them."

Hal Dunn said, "Major kudos to Dave [Merrifield]. His warning of the approaching storm gave us an extra 10 minutes to prepare. In fact, the forecast from Aeromet for the entire week [we were gone] was correct."

"The only damage we had from the storm is I lost my brand new U.S. flag that I had just mounted," Dunn went on to explain. "We also got a 12-inch rip in the main [sail] along one of the grommets. It wasn't damaged in the storm. It was damaged when we tried to put the sail back up afterwards."

"Duct tape [on the sail] works great," Conaty added.

Dunn indicated that the high-frequency radio, which they had planned to use, had a problem unrelated to the storm. They were also carrying an emergency radio which they used to contact the Roi Small Boat Marina and Kwajalein Harbor Control when they were close enough to transmit.

The *Opus* traveled 100 miles the first day of its journey.

"We actually traveled for four hours before we had to hoist the sails. The winds helped us ... even the storm did. The trip to Lae Atoll was made in just under 23 hours," Dunn exclaimed.


"It's an entirely different world when you go to places like that. It's part of the reason we go there ... to experience the culture," he continued. "We definitely want to thank Iroj Michael Kabua, Mayor of Lae, for allowing us to travel to Lae."

"Lamna Thomas [who works at the Kwajalein Small Boat Marina] is from there. We looked up his sisters and mother. It's one of the reasons we were treated so well. We were treated like royalty," Dunn added.

Conaty said, "We gave away candy and toothbrushes. There was an English-speaking woman there and we explained how to use the brushes. They were very open ... I even tried my awful Marshallese."

On Wednesday, Nov. 3, *Opus* and crew left Lae Atoll.

"We were making big-time speed. Twenty hours later we were at anchor at Nell. The winds shifted to the south and we were really moving," Dunn said, "Great place to

sail. Probably not too many places in the world better than this."

The ship followed its fastidiously written float plan except for arrival times because of the unbelievable sailing winds. They sailed into the small boat marina almost two hours earlier than planned.

Despite the rumor the *Opus* had a problem, Merrifield said he wasn't worried.

"This is a very seasoned crew," he said. "They call a lot and check in all the time. They know what they are doing."

Dunn, who has been sailing for just 2½ years, enthusiastically shared his plans, "This is our second long ocean passage. The first one was to Namu about 40 [nautical] miles away. We plan to go to Likiep Atoll within the next year."

When they retire, the Dunns are planning to travel the world in *Opus*, and Hal Dunn explained they are using these smaller trips as a means to check out *Opus'* reliability and their readiness to make longer ocean voyages.

Those residents interested in sailing or who want to learn how to sail are encouraged to attend the skippers' meeting held the first Sunday of each month, 12:30 p.m. at the marina. Volunteers can participate in the afternoon's beer can race.

"There's always extra room on a boat," added Conaty, Kwajalein Yacht Club commodore.

# Roi Marines celebrate Corps' 224th birthday

The "few" and the "proud" found reason to celebrate last week on Roi-Namur.

Former Marines and patrons of the Outrigger Club joined together on Nov. 10 to celebrate the 224th birthday of the U.S. Marine Corps.

Among those in attendance were former Marines and Roi-Namur police department personnel Sgt. Robert Menke, Sgt. Melinda Heikkinen, and officers Rudy Cade and Mike Welch. Menke and Heikkinen organized the celebration.

"I wanted to continue the tradition on Roi because Marines fought 55 years ago on this island," Menke said.

Heikkinen added, "I've worked at a lot of embassies, and Marines always come together at this time of the year in mutual camaraderie."

On Nov. 10, 1775, Congress passed a resolution to raise two battalions of Marines to serve as landing forces with the Continental fleet. This day is celebrated annually around the world wherever present and former Marines are located.

Aileen Shiigi, food service manager for Sodexo Marriott Services, helped set up the tables with the traditional presentation.

One table represented the prisoners of war (POWs) and soldiers missing in action (MIAs). A black napkin matched the black color of the POW flag flown in honor of all missing service members, and a pair of boots marked those not present.

Since the Marine Corps often celebrates its birthday with a ball, another table was set with a pair of gloves and a hat from the dress blue uniform. Such a table is always set at the ball. A wine glass is placed upside down in memory of all fallen Marines, because it will never be filled.

"Next year, on the 225th birthday, we're planning to bring our dress blues for the occasion," Welch said.

Anthony D'Amico, executive chef manager at Cafe Roi, arranged for a cake to be baked and delivered for the ceremony. The Marine Corps flag was draped above the cake table.

Cade read the invocation. He noted Kwajalein Atoll was a fitting place to

celebrate because Marines fought here 55 years ago.

"Some of these Marines gave the ultimate sacrifice, and others came home," Cade said.

As the oldest in the group, Cade spent 23 years in the Marine Corps.

"My father was a Marine, and my mother had three sons who were Marines," he said. "Being a former Marine is probably the greatest value of my life. It means more to me than anything but God."

Many days of glory in the Marine Corps history were recounted, but the group particularly recalled the 4th Marine division that fought on Roi-Namur on Feb. 1-2, 1944. They were the first to capture Japanese territory in the Pacific.

Four of those Marines earned the Medal of Honor. Only one survived, however. Pfc. Richard B. Sorenson returned to Roi on Feb. 2 of this year. He visited his battle marker at the site where he was wounded in combat that day 55 years ago.

"It was an honor to meet him," Cade said. "He's a true hero."

Later, Welch offered a toast of thanks to those Marines who gave their lives so that Americans could enjoy their freedoms today.

"[Marines] will shrug and dismiss the praise because it's what warriors do," Welch said. "Then they'll slowly fade back into the night, back into Marine Corps history."

During the ceremony, Menke read the Marine Corps commandant's birthday message — the final one for the 20th century.

"Marines restored and maintained order, aided people in distress, provided protection for the weak and upheld the values that have come to define our country on the world stage," wrote Gen. J.L. Jones, USMC commander. "The Americans who accomplished these noble deeds came from our society as ordinary men and women. They became extraordinary by earning the title, 'United States Marine.'"

## Blair Witch movie is only a scam — or is it for real?

*“In October of 1994, three student filmmakers disappeared in the woods near Burkitsville, Md., while shooting a documentary. A year later, their footage was found.”*

So goes the legend of the *Blair Witch Project*, this summer's scariest sensation, which was made with a mere \$35,000 budget and ended up grossing \$140 million.

*The Blair Witch Project* is a scam, a devilish story appearing to be true, yet remaining a fictitious documentary. It began as an ingenious idea created by best friends Eduardo Sanchez and Daniel Myrick — the directors and the editors of the movie, as well. They slowly began advertising the film on the Internet and presented it at various independent film festivals to much critical appeal.

Curious viewers, having seen the web site and hearing the hype, were horrified by the realistic feel of the film.

Shot with hand-held cameras by the actors themselves, *The Blair Witch Project* is a tale of three desperate people lost in the woods researching the legend of the Blair Witch that surrounded the town of Burkitsville.

Using limited resources, Sanchez and Myrick have made a film in which the actors aren't acting — they are truly frightened.

*The Blair Witch Project* is a film that isn't really a film, a documentary that isn't really a documentary. It is a nightmare come true.




