## Fourth of July celebration to explode with events for everyone

The Fourth of July fireworks spectacular will open Sunday night with 17 aerial shells exploding simultaneously to choreographed music.

But by the time the first shells are fired, the events marking the holiday will have long since begun. The show, combined with a day-long celebration at Emon Beach, promises something for everyone.

The annual bike parade will begin the fun, with more than 50 children, from very little ones to sixth graders, expected to participate on bicycles decorated with crepe paper, signs, flags, and any other patriotic regalia they can find. Community Activities will have some decorations available for kids who check in early.

Children should gather at the CRC by 1:30 p.m. to form the parade lines. The children will then bike from the CRC down Vandenberg Road alongside the youth soccer fields to the basketball court behind the Namu Wetu Youth Center.

At 2 p.m., Col. Gary K. McMillen, USAKA/KMR commander, will open the festivities during a short kick-off ceremony. Tony Correa will perform "The Star Spangled Banner."

With that, the crowds will gather at the beach pavilion and the numerous vendor booths for an afternoon of fun in a carnival atmosphere.

Equipment used here at Kwaj, including the Condor 150-foot aerial lift, a stacker, firetruck, submarine, and helicopter, will be displayed on the high school field.

Sodexo Marriott will offer burgers, hot dogs, barbecue, and other traditional food and beverages.

Other clubs and groups will serve specialty foods and offer other goods such as T-shirts, cookbooks, hats, and jewelry, to name a few.

In an all-new event, kids 8 and older and adults can sign up for a ride on the Big Banana. The inflatable water toy, pulled by the ski boat, gives up to five people a wild ride. Sign-ups will be at the rocks across

from the ski dock. Groups will then swim out to the ski dock in a designated swim lane for their ride.

Also new for the little ones, ages 2 to 6 years, a Kiddie Carnival will offer fun, games, and some arts and crafts from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m.

For the adults, a four-person beach volleyball tournament will be held, along with free-throw and Hot Shots contests at the basketball court throughout the afternoon.

Volleyball teams should register with Community Activities before July 1.

In the Hot Shots contest, participants are given a set amount of time to make as many basketball shots as possible from various locations. Points are awarded depending on the zone from which the ball is shot. For example, one might receive one point for shooting directly beneath the basket and three points from farther away. Check the program insert in the July 2 edition of the *Hourglass* for

the exact times of the basketball events.

Kids in kindergarten through third grades, fourth through sixth grades, and seventh through 12th grades will have a free-throw contest of their own. The older kids in grades seven-12 will also have a Hot Shot contest.

The Family Fun Frenzy will include a watermelon-eating contest, egg toss, three-legged race, soccer kick, burlap sack race, and obstacle course.

The big finale will come after dark

around 8 p.m., when the fireworks show begins. Hawaiian Explosives and Pyrotechnics Inc. will shoot the fireworks from a barge moored in the lagoon. The same group put on the show last year.

Central Pacific Network will broadcast on 101.1 FM and 1224 AM patriotic tunes to which the fireworks will be choreographed. The show, lasting 15 minutes, will be visible from all over the island, but organizers suggest the best viewing spot will be Emon Beach and along the lagoon on the north end of the island.

## Managing your stress for better health

Some types of stress are a fact of daily life for most people. While some stress is actually good in that it challenges us to reach goals, other forms of stress have more negative effects.

Stress can cause muscle tension, sleep or eating difficulties, and increased blood pressure. It may also create a greater susceptibility to illnesses such as colds or the flu. Studies show that people who have high levels of stress are at greater risk for developing heart disease, ulcers, and some forms of cancer.

Stress stems from an imbalance between the demands of life and the ability to meet them. Stress factors, or stressors, may include family problems, work loads, money difficulties, and poor health.

Some stress can be avoided, but some can't, and there are coping skills that can be developed to handle

stress in a positive way.

Physical activity, such as daily walks either alone or with friends, offers a time for introspection. Making a list of priorities and realistic goals may help reduce stress. Developing a balanced lifestyle by establishing daily and weekly routines for household chores and special time with family members may help, along with learning to set limits on one's schedule.

When tension does occur, take a few minutes to stretch, perform some simple aerobic activities, or take a short break from work.

Most important, and probably most difficult of all, is learning to accept that some things are beyond one's control.

When stress becomes overwhelming, there is help available locally. Kwajalein Hospital is open 24 hours a day for emergency visits. In addition, the Protestant and Catholic chaplains are available 24 hours a day and may be contacted by calling one of the numbers listed under "Chaplains" in the pink pages.

## **Kwaj is a great place to throw a party—there's lots of help at hand**

It's hard to imagine a better place for an outdoor party than Kwajalein. Balmy weather, the chance of a beautiful sunset, and spectacular views of the stars at night all make the setting almost perfect.

Arranging a party at Kwaj takes just a few phone calls.

The first step is to decide on a location. A variety of areas can be reserved in advance through the Community Activities office at 53331. The staff enjoys helping with party ideas and plans.

Among the most popular places to hold parties are the pavilions at Coral Sands Beach, Camp Hamilton, and Emon Beach. Usually one to two weeks' notice is enough to reserve a spot, except during extra-busy times such as graduation. The A-frame structures at Emon Beach are used on a first-come, first-served basis.

If you plan to have a bonfire (at Coral Sands or Camp Hamilton only), a burn permit is required. You can get one by taking a copy of your facility reservation to the fire department.

Other Community Activities facilities can be reserved, including the Namo Weto Youth Center, the family pool, the Kwajalein Bowling Center, the adult pool, Corlett Recreation Center (CRC), and Community Activities Center (CAC).

The youth center and Family Pool can be reserved for use only outside the facilities' normal hours of operation. Patrons are charged an hourly usage fee for the employee needed to staff the facility.

For a party at the bowling center, call 53320 to reserve lanes. Shoe rental and lane fees are at regular prices. Patrons are charged for an employee to staff the center if the party is outside the hours of operation.

The pavilion at the adult pool can be reserved for parties with attendees over 18 years of age. The pool remains open to the public.

The CRC gym and CRC/CAC rooms can be reserved by calling the CRC office at 52491. If you think it's going to rain, these are a great places

to take your party inside.

On sunny days, the softball and soccer fields are good places for a party, also reserved through Community Activities. You can check out all the equipment you will need at the Gear Locker, which has a whole stash of party favorites: 10-gallon coolers, croquet sets, horseshoes, frisbees, footballs, softball equipment, and more.

To reserve the Country Club, call Sodexho Marriott, at 53513, for the bar, and call Community Activities for the adjacent room with dance floor. The Country Club bar is available weekends after 5 p.m. and during the week and requires a week's notice.

The Yokwe Yuk Club Kabua Room, bar area, and dining room can be reserved by calling Sodexho Marriott at 53513 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 4:30 to 9 p.m., or you can leave a message and they will return your call.

Some residents hire local bands or disc jockeys to add to the atmosphere. A sound system as well as tables and chairs can be reserved from the CRC.

Community Activities has cano-

pies—20 feet by 20 feet and 20 feet by 40 feet—to reserve for use in fields or yards. You must pick them up and return them, as well as raise and take them down yourself. Community Activities also has a large grill available for check out.

Macy's takes orders for balloons a day in advance.

The Automotive Department rents stepvans on weekends to help you transport heavy items to your party location.

You can order palm fronds from Buildings and Grounds at 54990, and they'll drop them off at your site on the day of your party. The palm fronds can be tied to wooden and metal supports. Stack them after the party and Buildings and Grounds will pick them up.

You can order meat and cheese platters and fruit and vegetable trays from Surfway by calling 53607. A 48-hour notice is required, but it's better to order as far in advance as possible, says Ray Denham, manager of Retail Provisioning Services. You can also order special cuts of meat by calling 53607. The butchers will work with

## Understanding the government of the Republic of the Marshall Islands

*This information is excerpted from a speech made at Kwajalein nearly 20 years ago by Lawrence N. Edwards, when he was the representative of the chief secretary of the Marshall Islands to Kwajalein Atoll.*

### Part II

#### The Legislature

The legislative power of the Marshall Islands is vested in the *Nitijela* (Legislature), which can only exercise the power by act.

This power includes: to repeal, revoke, or amend any law in force in the Marshall Islands; to confer, by act, the authority to promulgate rules, regulations, orders, or other subordinate instructions; and to make all other laws which it considers necessary and proper for carrying into execution any of its other powers or any power vested by the Constitution in any other government agency or any public office.

The Marshall Islands *Nitijela* consists of 33 elected members from the electoral districts. During the first meeting of the *Nitijela* after each general election, the elected members elect a member of the body to the office of speaker and another as vice speaker, before taking up any other business.

The *Nitijela* meets in regular session on the first Monday in January of each year and remains in session for 50 sitting days. It is provided that the president may, in writing, appoint a later date for the termination of any regular session.

All members of the *Nitijela* are full-time members and are entitled to full-time compensation.

#### The President

The *Nitijela* nominates candidates for president from among its members. A nominee is elected by a simple majority vote of the *Nitijela* for a term of four years. There is no limit to how many terms a president may serve.

#### The Cabinet

The executive authority of the Marshall Islands is vested in the

Cabinet, whose members are collectively responsible to the *Nitijela*.

The Cabinet may exercise elements of its executive authority directly or through individual members and through other officers responsible to the Cabinet.

The authority vested in the Cabinet includes, but is not limited to, the following:

□ General direction and control of the government of the Marshall Islands

□ Recommending to the *Nitijela* such legislative proposals as it con-

institutions and services to achieve an adequate standard of living to enable the people of the Marshall Islands to enjoy their economic, social, and cultural welfare

□ Making contracts and other national and international agreements

The Cabinet consists of the president and not fewer than six nor more than 10 ministers, who are all members of the *Nitijela*, including the president.

The ministers are: minister of finance, minister of communication and transportation, minister of resources and development, minister of social welfare, minister of public works, minister of internal security, minister of education, and minister of foreign affairs.

No business can be transacted at any meeting of the Cabinet unless at least four members are present.

#### Public Service

Public Service is the branch of government responsible for the daily maintenance and operation of the Marshall Islands government. The Public Service combines all employees necessary to assist the Cabinet in exercising the executive authority of the Marshalls and to perform such other duties as may be required.

Only employees of the Public Service can receive compensation from public funds, including the regular grant from the U.S. Congress, U.S. federal grants, and the *Nitijela* grant funds.

The head of Public Service is the chief secretary, who is recognized as the chief administrative and advising officer of the government. Among other functions and powers conferred on him by law, the chief secretary is responsible to the Cabinet for the general direction of the work of all departments and offices of government. The heads of these departments and offices account to the chief secretary for the work of their departments, as well as

**The blue represents the ocean surrounding the Marshall Islands. The orange signifies richness and bravery, while the white signifies purity. The rays represent the equator and extend upward to signify the increase in growth and vitality of life in the Marshalls.**

**The star stands for the 24 municipalities in the Marshalls. The four longer points represent Majuro, Ebeye, Wotje, and Jaluit. These points also represent a cross, signifying Christianity in the Marshall Islands.**

customers and make suggestions. Surfway will deliver platters to your residence during normal hours of operation.

You can order food from the Three Palms Bakery and Snack Bar and the Yokwe Yuk Club. Call the club at 53513 to get a catering guide describing their services.

The bakery, at 53666, requires 48-hour notice for cakes.

If you need large quantities of paper goods, they can be ordered through the GSK catalog at Macy's West. GSK will deliver them to your home.

You can order bags of ice from the Ice Plant at 53408. Because the ice machine makes only eight to 10 bags an hour, it is important to give the ice

plant 48 hours' notice if you order more than two bags. Also, you need to make arrangements to pick up the ice at the plant.

For areas where alcohol is generally not allowed, a special exception can be applied for through the provost marshal's office.

When the party's over, it's cleanup time. You are responsible for cleaning up your area. Self-Help has cleaning equipment to borrow and extra trash bags. Trash bags need to be secured by tape and left by a dumpster to be picked up. If a facility is left uncleaned, the users may be billed for cleanup costs.

Amy Hansen, recreation activities superintendent says, "If you approach us with a reasonable idea for a party, we will work with you."
