Kwajalein honors fallen heroes at Memorial Day service

Despite morning-long downpours, a crowd of Kwajalein residents packed Island Memorial Chapel Monday to pay their respects to and honor those who gave their lives in the service of America.

"Because of their selfless devotion to duty, we enjoy both freedom and democracy that are the envy of the rest of the world, and we prosper in a homeland untouched by war's devastation," said Lt. Col. Richard Donahue, USAKA/KMR acting commander, who led off the speakers for the occasion.

Capt. Dave Scott opened the ser-

vice as master of ceremonies, and the Kwajalein Junior/Senior High School band played the Republic of the Marshall Islands national anthem, "My Country," and "The Star-Spangled Banner."

Father William Sullivan, SJ, Catholic chaplain, gave the invocation.

Donahue spoke next, followed by Jonathan Jackson, an Air Force veteran who spoke on behalf of veterans' organizations.

"Memorial Day is a reaffirmation of faith: faith in a Creator who intended all people to be free and faith that those who fight for freedom will prevail over those who fight for tyranny," Jackson said.

Following the remarks, dignitaries performed the traditional wreath-laying ceremony. Donahue represented USAKA/KMR; Jim Peek represented the American Legion; and Marlene Roberts acted on behalf of the American Legion Auxiliary.

High school band member Adam Banducci sounded "Taps," and "God Bless the USA," by Lee Greenwood, was played over the sound system.



Electronic badging system goes on line at DSC

After years of planning and months of preparation, the electronic badging system was implemented June 2 at the dock security checkpoint. Within the month, the system will also be used at Entry/Exit in the main terminal and at the Atoll Terminal. Eventually, electronic badges will replace the ration control cards.

The system at the DSC consists of a badge reader, a bio-metric hand-reader, and a sophisticated software system that records and displays who (by name and badge number) attempted what action (entry or exit), on what day, at what time (to the second), and whether the attempt was successful. A monitor in the area displays the data.

Clicking on a person's name pulls up an image of both sides of that person's badge, with photo, and lists areas the badge-carrier has access to. The data will be stored on disks for a permanent record.

To gain permission to pass through the system, a worker first holds his or her badge near the card reader and then quickly slides a hand into the bio-metric reader.

"We're getting very positive reac-

tions from the workers," said Capt. Tony Gibson, Kwajalein Police Department EBS administrator. He has been on the scene at the DSC most of the time since the system went on line.

"The new system is speeding up the process of entry/exit—and as we all improve, it will be even faster," he said.

The hand-reader doesn't record prints of finger tips or palms. Instead, through a system of mirrors, the machine measures length, width, and height of a hand. A person must be "introduced" to the system before attempting to gain permission to enter or exit. It takes only a few minutes and does not require an appointment or advance arrangements.

The former system of exchanging badges is still being used at the DSC as a back-up in case of equipment failure. Gibson estimates that will continue for about a week. The system vendor, Pinkerton, is on-island, working with CIS and the Information Management Division to complete EBS implementation.

Electronic badging was part of the 1990 "fix-it" plan mandated by Congress for specific security and intelligence vulnerabilities at USAKA/KMR.

Workers commuting to Kwajalein from Ebeye learned something new June 2: how to use the electronic badging system now implemented at the DSC. The system requires a person entering or exiting to hold a badge near the card reader and then quickly slide his or her right hand into the bio-metric hand reader.

It's not as easy as it sounds, but by the second day, many workers were breezing through.

Within the month, card-readers will be in use at the Atoll Terminal as well as the main terminal.



Cornell retires from Army, remains at Kwaj

In a ceremony last week, Lt. Col. Jerry L. Cornell retired from the Army after 26 years of service.
