Wallace returns to head Raytheon on Kwaj

Maybe it's a case of *deja vu*, or John Wallace really has been here on Kwajalein before.

Actually, he's been here three times before, and now he returns as Raytheon RSE site manager for both IRE and KLS contracts.

"They (Raytheon) wanted someone with island experience who would understand the issues with residents and also have technical experience with the range," Wallace said.

Wallace comes to Kwajalein from Eastern Range at Patrick Air Force Base, where he worked as deputy engineering manager.

Prior to that, Wallace lived on Kwajalein for 13 nonconsecutive years.

His first tour came in 1974-75 when he arrived on Kwaj as an engineer with a young family — wife, Barbara, and children, David and Kate. The Wallace family returned in 1976 and stayed to 1982, with John working as a group leader at Tradex and Alcor sensors. In 1990, he and Barbara returned with John working as a sensor leader at Tradex and as Roi-Namur technical manager. The couple left in 1996.

"I never thought I'd be running (Raytheon on Kwaj)," he said.

"He always enjoyed his work here," Barbara added.

"Technically, it was the greatest work I've done, and the fact it was such a great place to live and raise a family was an added benefit," John

said.

This tour, the Wallaces arrived with returning Kwaj cat, Kitty, who adopted the Wallaces during their last tour.

"She's glad to be back," Barbara joked.

"She's got a lot of frequent-flyer miles," added John with a chuckle. "She's been from here to Boston to Florida, and now back."

David and Kate, who are now grown and living in Boston and Ft. Collins, Colo., respectively, have also expressed a desire to return and visit their folks.

Having come back, however, Kwajalein doesn't seem the same, the Wallaces said.

"Every time is different," Barbara said. "You come out here at a different stage in your life with a different perspective on community life."

"Kwajalein is never the same as when you left it," John added. "It's dynamic. There are different resi-

Comeau leads TRADEX sensor on cutting edge

Denise Comeau almost skated away from a career in engineering.

Facing a decision between realizing her girlhood dream of being a competitive figure skater or working in a field where she could develop her math and science skills, Comeau found herself at a crossroads early in life.

"I actually had to make a very [important] decision during school when I was offered a contract with a professional ice skating show," explained the 35-year-old electrical engineer. "I was always strong in math and science, so I knew I wanted to head in that direction.

"I think I made the right decision," she added. "I miss skating, especially out here."

That pragmatic decision long ago has paid off. After five years of working her way up the hierarchy at the TRADEX sensor on Roi-Namur, Comeau was named sensor leader this summer. She is the first woman to hold that position, a fact Comeau is quick to wave off.

"I think it's a shame that it took so long before a woman was appointed sensor leader, but it's no big deal," she said, noting there are few female engineers here.

Born and raised in the Boston, Mass. area, Comeau attended Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute (RPI) and received her B.S. in computer systems engineering. She began working for Raytheon straight out of school, and said she was eager to take a position out here when the contract became available.

dents with different interests.”

Different “crazes,” or different hobbies, have swept the island over their tours, they said.

“The challenge is to get involved in something that is started, or start something yourself,” Barbara said.

Over the years the Wallaces have scuba dived, sailed, and played tennis and racquetball. Their latest interest, which they picked up in Florida, is ballroom dancing, and they’ve already contacted the Kwajalein

Dance Association about setting up a class.

The Wallaces described the “hardship tours” of the early ’70s when residents were allowed one off-island phone call a month, and fresh fruit and dairy products were unavailable. Television didn’t exist on the island then, either.

Like island life, the work at Kwajalein Missile Range has changed some and offers Wallace a professional challenge.

“My job is to secure our position for the recompetition for the contract in 2002,” Wallace said. “I also want to apply some of my experience from Eastern Range (Patrick Air Force Base).

“I want to improve the relationships between different organizations,” he added.

His challenge comes at a busy time with the potential growth of the National Missile Defense and Theater High Altitude Area Defense programs at the range.

“I see the range growing,” Wallace said. “The political climate is such that any single incident could drastically change the emphasis, which usually means more money and growth.”

NOAA ship *Ronald H. Brown* weathers the storms off Kwajalein

Not many ships welcome rainy, stormy weather, but the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration vessel *Ronald H. Brown* left Kwajalein Tuesday in search of just that.

The ship has spent the past month in nearby waters in support of the Tropical Rainforest Measurements Mission (TRMM), currently underway on-island and around the atoll.

The ship will sail about 30 miles off the coast of Kwajalein and stay there for about three more weeks, according to Colleen Leary, chief scientist for the shipboard part of the mission. There, the ship will take part in a number of key experiments designed to validate data from the TRMM weather satellite now orbiting the Earth.

"This is a great platform for that kind of work because of its weather radars," Leary said.

In fact, the *Brown* carries a doppler radar, which will take readings of storms in and around Kwajalein. That data, compared with the data from radars on Kwajalein, will give the scientists valuable information.

The ship will also be the launch pad for weather balloons every three hours, and will perform experiments using radio waves bounced off the ocean's surface to measure the weather's effects on the water.

Like the experiments it performs, the ship itself is unique. One of four of its class, and the only one in the NOAA fleet, the *Brown* was commissioned in 1997. Since then, the ship has spent 11 months of the past year at sea on an around-the-world voyage.

"The taxpayers are getting their money's worth," said Capt. Robert Parsons, commanding officer of the *Brown*.

The *Brown*, with its 25 crew members, can support a mis-

sion of 34 onboard scientists. It replaced a ship of similar size with a crew of 70, which was able to support only 20 scientists.

"We had to downsize to compete with private contractors," Parsons said.

How'd they do that?

"Technology played a big part of it," Parsons said, noting 32 computers are tied in to the onboard network. The ship uses standard PCs because they perform as well as more expensive mainframes previously designed for ships, and they are cheaper to maintain and repair, Parsons said.

Furthermore, the ship doesn't have separate mess halls for officers, nor for licensed and unlicensed crew. The officer complement dropped from 12 to four — the captain, executive officer, operations officer, and navigator.

When they've completed their portion of the TRMM KWAJEX project, the ship will next sail to Honolulu for its next and seventh scientific mission this year, a mission to measure the exchange rate of carbon dioxide with the ocean. From there, the *Brown* will sail to San Diego and Seattle, where she will dock over Christmas, before setting out on another 11-month deployment in the spring.

"It was actually a very hot job to come out here," Comeau recalled. "I was married, adventurous, young—that kind of thing—we decided that sounded like fun."

Comeau came to Kwajalein Atoll with her husband John, who now works for the IRE Logistics Group on Kwaj. The couple only planned to stay a year, but quickly fell in love with the island lifestyle. Since moving here, the family has grown to include Amy, 3 1/2, and Christopher, 3 months — both Kwaj kids.

"It's a great environment for them," Comeau noted. "It's very safe."

The environment here is apparently also good for Comeau, who now oversees the operation and maintenance of TRADEX (Target Resolution And Discrimination Experiment), capable of tracking up to 64 targets, among other high-tech wonders.

"The work is just phenomenal. I've been on several real neat upgrade projects at TRADEX, so I've had exciting work since I've been here," said Comeau, who progressed from a line engineer to digital section leader to sensor leader during her stint here.

"My background is definitely in the development and design side," she continued. "Out here it's been nice because you're working on design and development, but you're also operating the radar, too. So, it was nice to fill in the blanks in the overall radar picture."

As sensor leader, Comeau is responsible for a crew of 31, ranging from technicians to engineers. And

the team has been busy of late: After finishing a 10-day SIP (Surveillance Improvement Program) mission last week, Comeau and her crew worked a KMR mission only two days later lasting into the wee hours of the night.

"It was really tough to force that on a small crew. We did it. We succeeded. It went very well," Comeau said. "The TRADEX team is the best group of people I've ever worked with. They're self-motivated, hard-working people. They really make my job a lot easier."

While intimately familiar with TRADEX and its operations, Comeau's new position now calls upon her to learn about something unfamiliar to someone used to getting up to her elbows in real-time problems — management. For instance, during last week's range mission, Comeau had to fight the desire to wade into the technical maelstrom to help fix a problem and let someone else do the job.

"I truly enjoy the technical parts of my job. Due to the nature of this

job, I have to let go of the detail-technical aspects, but I don't think I'll ever fully let it go. I just enjoy it too much," she explained. "At this point I'm learning. It's exciting and different."

Now that she has, in essence, reached the pinnacle of her TRADEX career, Comeau knows she will need to seek new challenges sometime down the road. For now, however, she enjoys skating on the thin ice of the high-tech world, where slippery patches of problems are not uncommon.

"Every day you come in here there is an unknown," she said. "Dealing with problems that come up with the radar is the most challenging, but it is the most fun."

Plant donations beautify landscaping of new Enniburr church

ENNIBURR — A coalition of Kwajalein and Roi-Namur residents made a recent visit to Third Island to donate and plant a variety of flora for the new church landscaping project.

Some 33 people from Kwaj flew to

Roi on Aug. 18 and met with residents already working on the landscaping project.

The plants that had been collected on Kwaj, meanwhile, were barged to Roi and transported to Enniburr, where they were watered and cared

for until the arrival of members and friends of Christian Women's Fellowship (CWF).

"The Santo Praise Assembly of God church members on Enniburr saw a need for beautification for their new church building," explained June Foltz, president of CWF. "They asked Christian Women's Fellowship on Kwaj and Roi if they would bring some plants and their horticultural expertise to assist them in this project."

Eighty live plants, plus several bouquets of silk flowers and a hanging basket, were donated.

Pots of red ixora, croton bushes, bougainvillea vines and plumeria trees were set on the ground to mark the spots where they would be planted: A line of flowering bushes would edge the path to the

church, and a row of trees would provide shade between the church wall and the ocean.

The task before the volunteers required sturdy tools and strong backs.

A rake was used to clear the ground, and both a pickax and shovel were needed for digging holes among the coral rock.

George Wise, a power plant operator on Roi, carefully pulled the plants out of their temporary pots and inserted them into the ground. Joellen Binder and Bonnie Hogan spread compost around the plants, while Janet Corbin raked dirt around the fledgling trees. The Rev. John Dorr, Protestant chaplain on Kwaj, tramped the dirt with his feet to compact the soil as added support.

Also among the volunteers was Mark Corbin, president of the Protestant Chapel Board on Kwajalein.

"This planting is being done in preparation for the dedication of the church by officers in August of next year," noted Johnsay Kobeney, senior deacon of the church at Enniburr. "After the flowers have grown, we can donate cuttings to the school and other buildings so that our island will look more beautiful."

During a small ceremony after the planting, Foltz presented a basket of silk flowers, symbolic of the real plants, to Carol Kobeney, secretary of CWF on Enniburr.

"Not only will the plants provide shade, but they will also be used to make wuts and leis," Foltz said. "It is culturally critical for the island residents to have the ability to provide these decorations."

Marshallese man listed in stable condition following shark attack

A Marshallese man who was reportedly attacked by a shark over the Kwajalein weekend is listed in stable condition in the hospital on Ebeye.

Jeffery Joel, 23, told Kwajalein Hospital officials he was bitten by a 7-foot-long shark while fishing on Monday morning. According to Joel's story, he was carrying fish with him,

which may have attracted the shark. He did not say what kind of shark attacked him.

Dr. Jill Horner, along with a nurse, Glen Ogeltree, and USAKA Fire Department paramedic Jeremy Weible, flew up to Majetto Island Monday afternoon on the medevac mission.

Horner said the victim was originally taken to the Majetto dispensary, where a health assistant man-

aged to stop most of the bleeding. The injuries were mostly confined to the man's left leg.

"His main lacerations were sewn shut without anesthesia because the clinic had run out of Lidocaine," Horner said. "On our arrival at Majetto, he was still actively bleeding but we managed to apply compression dressings to stop the bleed

ing and give him pain medication before the helicopter flight."

According to Joe Johnston, rotary wing chief pilot, Capt. Roy Howard and co-pilot Charlie Hinson flew out to Majetto, about 75 miles away, on the medevac around 1 p.m.

"We flew up there, got him and brought him back," Johnston said. The crew also returned with the victim's wife.

"We usually bring one family member with the injured party," he explained.

Lt. Col. Steve Beal said the actions by Aviation Dept. and the Kwajalein Hospital are an example of the




