APIC review targets community services

USAKA/KMR, RSE and MIT/LL officials examined residential services, from adult sports to retail, during a review of all the community services offered on Kwajalein and Roi-Namur,

Saturday.

"This is an overall baseline assessment," said Lt. Col. Steve Morris, USAKA/KMR Operations assistant chief of staff. "No one is going to lose their jobs or get into trouble over this data. This is to find out what is not

doing well and work together to fix it."

As a result, RSE will look into removing fees for the hobby shops on both Kwajalein and Roi along with eliminating golfing fees for Roi residents. Col. Curtis L. Wrenn, USAKA/

Swipe that card

Paper and plastic OK at post office

Post office customers now can pay with plastic for their postage.

Members of the Joint Military Postal Activity and United States Postal Service installed a new automated metering system at the Kwajalein Post Office this week, and the equipment began working yesterday.

Col. Curtis L. Wrenn Jr., USAKA/KMR commander, was first in line to use the new system.

"Can I borrow your card?" Wrenn jokingly asked Sgt. 1st Class Maurice Robinson, postmaster. Next, using his own card, the colonel bought a package of Christmas stamps.

"I'm impressed," he said of the new system.

The new Unisys III system uses a key pad on the counter, much the same as in stateside grocery stores. The customer swipes a credit or debit card in the device, and it will dial directly to the credit card clearing house for approval, according to Robinson. The post office will bill for

the amount of the purchase only.

The new meters are connected to data lines to electronically transmit reports to San Francisco at the end of each day.

In a related matter, the holidays are fast approaching, and Robinson

said residents should mail early to avoid disappointment.

Sending Christmas presents and don't want the family to read the gift off the customs form? Robinson said, contact the Post Office at 53424 for ways to get around it.

If you are expecting packages from the states, also be aware that the last AMC plane from Hono before Christmas will arrive here Dec. 22. In other words, mail must leave Hono Dec. 21, their time, to reach us before Christmas day. The next AMC plane after Dec. 22 is scheduled to arrive here Dec. 28.

The post office will keep regular hours of operation through the holidays, Robinson said.

Basic training was anything but basic for WACs

It was an adventure but my parents couldn't understand why I wanted to leave the haven of the Great Smoky Mountains in Tennessee to join something called the Women's Army Corps. In 1973 young ladies "just don't do such things." I gave them the best reason I had.

"Because I can."

It was an opportunity for new places and experiences for women.

I wanted physical therapy training but didn't want to wait for an opening in the school, so I agreed to Radio Traffic Analyst school, whatever that was.

But, I wouldn't compromise on my ponytail. If I had to cut my locks, forget it. My recruiter assured me the ponytail could stay, so I signed on the dotted line.

He gave me a lot of good advice before putting me on the plane to South Carolina.

"Basic training is all self-discipline," he said. "Just do what you're told, no matter how stupid it seems. Don't call your drill sergeants sir or ma'am. They hate that. Salute anything with shiny rank and black braid on the uniform."

He even warned me about the guys in the Army.



"These guys are trained to disassemble and reassemble a weapon in 20 seconds," he said. "Unfortunately, they want to meet, date, fall in love and marry a girl in the same amount of time."

As far as I know, my recruiter forgot to tell me only two things. I didn't know you're not supposed to have fun in basic training. I had the time of my life. I was in the first battalion of women to train at Fort Jackson, and we were trailblazers for a lot of changes.

None of those prissy blue and white uniforms the women down at Ft. McClellan were wearing for us. We wore fatigues ... accessorized by a lovely pair of combat boots.

My boots never looked better than anyone else's, but my drill sergeant thought they did, and I didn't argue with him.

Of the 42 women in my company,

only two of us were from the South. Drill Sergeant Jones called me Private Gomer.

Every morning during inspection, he said, "Lookin' good there Private Gomer. You gonna' be a drill sergeant when you grow up?"

"Yes drill sergeant," I lied.

He dogged my friend, Shelly, though. She was a California girl, future military police. She spent hours every night working on her boots. Every morning she caught the same grief.

"Private Green," Jones barked down at her, "you been polishing that fine pair of Army boots with a candy bar again?"

"Yes drill sergeant," she lied.

Apparently her recruiter had given her the same advice I got from mine ... the drill sergeant is always right.

Mind games and self-discipline are what basic training is all about. Keep your mouth shut and don't look at the ground when you march. Hurry up and wait. Eyes right. Double time. Salute. Together we could make it.

But you don't make it out of basic training until you pass Captain's inspection. My recruiter forgot to tell me that. He also forgot to tell me you



never pass Captain's inspection the first time.

You scrub for three days. Unauthorized dust multiplies. Soap film in the shower is the enemy. You never walk down the middle of the hall. The hangers in your wall locker must be placed exactly one inch apart.

She flunked us.

And, according to Jones, we had one weekend to get it right. But by then, we of Company B had truly become a team. We decided to maintain the cleaning we had done, look busy, look worried, and remain confident.

Of course we passed our re-inspection, graduated and moved on. Ex-

cept for the day my sons were born, wearing that uniform is the most delightful time of my life, but I parted ways with it (and my ponytail!) years ago.

When my sons were old enough to be curious about their mother as a person, they asked me why I joined the Army.

I told them about Amelia Earhart, and about a former Army pilot captain who asked her once if she would be willing to fly across the Atlantic Ocean.

"Who would refuse such a shining adventure?" she replied.

That day they understood the meaning of, and the need for adventure.

Quit smoking and check yourself for breast cancer

Great American Smokeout joins Mammogram month

Focusing on cutting health risks, the Kwajalein Hospital Health Awareness committee has designated November as National Smokeout Month and National Radiology Month with an emphasis on mammograms.

National Smokeout Month

Fifty percent of deaths are preventable, and of those, 20 percent result from smoking, according to U.S. Preventive Services Task Force report.

"If you stopped smoking today and still weren't smoking a year from now you would cut your risk of heart attack in half," said Dr. Eric Lindborg, Kwajalein Hospital chief medical officer. "Quitting smoking can prevent or lessen the chances of many diseases including heart attacks, strokes and [many different] cancers."

Three people, with a total of 36



years of smoking from two packs to 18 cigarettes a day, met at the Religious Education Building on Nov. 4. Although they had all failed in trying to quit before, they wanted to learn how to prepare themselves to quit on Nov. 16, National Smokeout Day.

"Last time I went cold turkey and it didn't work," said Heather Fleming, a nine-year smoker. "I think getting prepared and the support will help."

Lindborg explained the medical side of tobacco dependency including health risks, the actual dependency the body has on nicotine and what medications are available to help quit.

Nicotine patches and gum are available here, Lindborg said. A new product, Zyban, a pill which must be started a week before quitting smoking, is available by prescription.

"Zyban started out as an antidepressant," Lindborg said. "Found out by accident to decrease craving for nicotine."

Quitting is not easy, Lindborg warned.

"If 100 people stop smoking ... one year later a maximum of 25 to 40 percent will be successful. But people are more successful if aware of what may happen and work with it."

People are more likely to slip if they are around alcohol, other smokers and certain routines, or cues, Lindborg said. In addition to cues, there are excuses such as weight gain and bad moods.

"If a 10-pound weight [gain] is not acceptable, then you are not ready to set the date," Lindborg said, explaining that the weight should normalize within a year.

Dr. Theo Riley, Kwajalein Hospital psychologist, described how to use behavior to prepare to quit smoking.

"Become familiar with your habit, so you know when and why you

smoke," Riley said. "Break up your smoking cues by doing things differently and get together a support group. I tried to help Mike [her husband] quit by asking him if he wanted a chew."

"If you get it out of your mind, it's a good thing," said Mike Riley, who has been off tobacco for one year after chewing for 35 years. "When someone reminds you. It makes you want to go out a buy a can."

"What I told him was not supportive," Theo Riley said with a smile. "Find out what is supportive."

National Radiology Month

Cutting the risk of advanced breast cancer can be done by the use of two tools — self-examinations and mammograms, said Karen McDermott, Kwajalein Hospital radiology technologist.

"Women are not the only ones to get breast cancer," McDermott said. "I have seen three men with breast cancer, one here on Kwaj."

Although men can get the disease, one out of nine women will have breast cancer according to the National Cancer Society.

The first line of defense is breast self-examinations, or BSE, since more than 90 percent of all breast lumps are discovered by women themselves.

Mammograms are also used as a preventive and diagnostic tool, but in the past having a mammogram was painful due to the compression used.

"That changed about two years ago. It's supposed to be uncomfortable, but it's not supposed to hurt, according to the FDA," McDermott said.

Mammograms are recommended for those with a family history of breast cancer and every year after the age of 40.

You can schedule a mammogram by calling Kwajalein Medical Imaging or see your doctor for a breast exam.

"I've seen women who do not practice BSE, who came in for their first mammogram who had a huge thing going on," McDermott said. "It could have been caught way before."

Preparing to quit smoking

1. Pick a date to stop.
2. Determine if will use nicotine patch or gum or Zyban and have available.
3. Become familiar with your habit
 - when do you smoke?
 - do you really need a smoke then?
 - what is your mood at the time?
4. Break up smoking cues
 - don't smoke when you need to the most - wait a few minutes
 - don't smoke when you used to smoke, smoke at another time
5. Get good support system setup
 - support at work, at home, and a friend
 - you decide what type of support you want
6. List what situations will be the worst to handle in the next three months and plan options.
7. If using Zyban, start a week before quitting.
8. Quit on your quit date.
9. Drink lots of water.

Command drops some fees, examines theaters ...

KMR commander, directed that these be dropped since the charts indicated that the fees collected were not worth the administrative burden of collecting those fees.

Wrenn asked how and where Kwajalein residents not holding a pass or visitors pay for rounds of golf during a workday.

The player will sign a list and receive a bill later, said Todd Seitz, USAKA/KMR chief of Community Services. In addition, a course marshal will check that players sign in.

Originally funded by the recreational fund, Morris said that the Ivey Gym, Grace Sherwood Library and the theaters on both Roi and Kwaj are now being funded by base operations.

These activities were funded by base operations up until four years ago, said Lloyd Jordan, RSE residential services manager. The decision to move them back under base operations was made by Col. Gary K. McMillen, former USAKA/KMR commander, and became effective Oct. 1, Jordan added.

Officials used a balance scorecard to look at activities that generate money for the recreational funds,

such as Macy’s and Tape Escape, along with those that require recreation funds to run, such as the Youth Center.

This approach balances four different product and/or service type of measures: customer, internal business, financial and innovation and learning.

“Are we doing the right thing for the right activity?” Wrenn asked.

Due to very low attendance at the theaters on Roi and Kwaj, Wrenn questioned continuing the funding.

A contractor just arrived on island to fix the projectors, Jordan said. The repairs for the projectors have been needed since last spring.

The question about continuing to support the theaters was put on hold until the repaired projectors are used for a period of time.

RSE and USAKA/KMR survey results over the last quarter showed

customer satisfaction trends for the Small Boat Marina, provisioning and the child care center, to name a few.

The Small Boat Marina phone survey, which polled 205 people out of 564 boat-license holders, showed that people were generally happy with the marina, but did want equipment upgraded. They were not happy with the perceived increase in boat rental prices.

Analysis of the provisioning operations phone survey showed that people are satisfied with products, layout, cost, service and hours of Surfway, Ten Ten and Gimbel’s. On a scale of one to five, with one being very dissatisfied and five being very satisfied, the responses for each area were between three and four.

Except for the facility quality, the Kwajalein Child Development Center had a high rating, based on a hand-out returned by 25 out of 55 child-care center users.

RSE Quality Assurance is currently surveying customer service satisfaction on retail merchandising and will run a customer survey on Café Pacific and Café Roi in April. Human Resources will perform a customer survey on all of the other residential services in April 2001.

thousands of sensors that make it the “eyes” of the NMD system. For reservations, call Grace at 58237 or Sikes at 55175.

NMD continues to be one of the primary test projects at Kwajalein Missile Range, using range test assets as well as NMD elements, such as the launch facility at Meck Island and GBR-P. Already, program testers have conducted five integrated flight tests since 1997 and plan for continued testing.

The purpose of the program is to develop and potentially deploy an efficient, effective system that detects, tracks and destroys incoming ballistic missiles before they enter the atmosphere.
