## Postmaster: Kwaj votes were counted in election

In the recent presidential election, voters may have learned that every vote counts, but some Kwajalein voters wondered if their vote was actually counted this year.

Recent news reports stated that some overseas absentee ballots for the presidential election were rejected in Florida because the ballots had no postal date stamp.

"As voting officials, we were also concerned that some Kwajalein absentee ballots (federal overseas ballots) could

have been rejected," said Kent Duncan, USAKA/KMR legal officer.

Kwajalein residents who voted by absentee ballot have no cause for concern, however.

"Every piece of mail, whether no postage is required or if it's stamped, is stamped and dated in Kwajalein," said Sgt. 1st Class Maurice Robinson, postmaster.

Actually, all mail that leaves island and goes overseas needs a postage stamp and thus is required to be post-marked because it

# Dumping traditions: The world won't come to an end

My ghosts of holidays past are tied up in the making of fruitcakes and thousands of cookies, the inviting of once-a-year relatives and friends to festive dinners, attending the local singing of the Hallelujah Chorus and the reading of "The Night Before Christmas."

Since I have moved 31 times in my life, traditions are what made the holidays familiar and comfortable. If we didn't do everything we always did, my siblings and I believed the world would come to an end.

Some people hang onto traditions way past the time they are a comfortable fit, such as continuing to invite the argumentative neighbors to Christmas dinner. Other people modify old traditions — my daughter put out cookies and bourbon rather than milk for Santa during her teen years. Some traditions still resonate, and given the opportunity, are repeated.

"In downtown St. Louis there is a park where they put up Christmas scenes," Dan said reminiscing. "My family would go down there every year, get some hot chocolate and walk around the park. I would still do it now, if it was safe."

Other traditions have been modi-



fied to fit.

"We always were a Christmas Eve family until my folks split," Jim said, explaining that he then celebrated Christmas Eve with one family and Christmas morning with the other.

A bad fit was the making of fruitcakes. In the tradition of my mother and grandmother, I made up to 15 small fruitcakes every year for 20 years. The cakes were started in September with a shot of Jack Daniels administered to each twice a month until the cake, now three times heavier, was wrapped and given to the grateful recipient. That tradition came to a screeching halt when I found a cache of harder-than-brick

cakes in a friend's closet. Maybe she was planning to build a spare room when she acquired enough.

The next year I was hit with a sense of relief when I realized how much time, energy and Jack Daniels I had invested into a tradition I didn't even like anymore. And, except for a couple of requests to make the cakes again, the recipients seemed to appreciate the change.

Over the years, my daughter, husband and I celebrated Christmas in far-flung places. Getting rid of old, invalid traditions, we added new ones that worked better where we lived — fishing on Christmas day worked in Florida, but not in Fairbanks, Alaska.

So when I arrived on Kwaj over a year ago, I knew that without a kitchen, snow, family or any of my long-cherished decorations, Christmas would be vastly different.

It turned out to be my best Christmas in years. This year I may add scuba diving, followed by a call to my snowbound family in the states.

doesn't stay solely in military hands, but goes through the U.S. Postal Service, according to Robinson. Here, MPS mail is used only on Kwaj and between Kwaj and Roi.

Duncan said it is difficult to determine the number of Kwajalein residents who actually voted in the election, let alone the number that may have voted in Florida.

"I know that we gave out hundreds of registration forms," he said. "In my practice here, I see many Florida residents, maybe as many as the militarywide average of 15 percent."

This year, because the race is so close in Florida, postmarks have become an issue, because those ballots are not dated and so can't be proven to have been sent before the Nov. 8 deadline.

Meanwhile, Defense Secretary William S. Cohen has asked the DoD inspector general to look into problems concerning military absentee balloting, according to the American Forces Press Service.

Cohen ordered the inquiry following reports that many absentee ballots from service members were not counted because they lacked postmarks.

"The secretary's goal and his instruction to the IG is to make sure we have a system that makes every vote count," Pentagon spokesman Ken

Bacon said during a news conference Nov. 28. He said Cohen asked the IG to examine the process and recommend any changes to make it "more efficient, more fair, more inclusive and to make it easier."

In his instructions, Cohen asked the IG to examine current procedures for handling military ballots, standard cancellation and postmarking, and how those procedures are actually implemented.

One problem that disqualified military absentee ballots [had] in Florida, for instance, was that they arrived without a postmark. Postmarks indicate where and when a piece of mail was sent. DoD postal regulations require all mail be postmarked, including postage-free mail such as absentee ballots.

Military Postal Service Agency officials said the IG will obviously look into why so many ballots arrived without postmarks.

"Your review will serve as a basis for any changes that can and should be implemented by DoD in order to ensure that the voting rights of all U.S. military personnel are respected and that everything possible will be done to make sure that every vote counts," Cohen wrote to the IG.

There is no timetable for the IG to deliver a report.

## Changes in store for NMD program in coming years ...

Sands Missile Range in the 1960s.

"I thought the tour was really good," Hogan said of the NMD Open House at Meck Island Monday.

Scores of residents took the opportunity to understand NMD's mission and place in history Monday during a guided tour of the island's facilities, including missile silos on launch hill and the control center. Tours consisted of a boat ride to Meck aboard the catamaran, a bus ride of the island, a presentation at the control center and a stop at Café Meck for refreshments and additional discussions.

The unclassified presentations not only talked about the past accomplishments of the program, but also offered residents a preview of what's to come from NMD.

Barry King, Boeing/LSI site manager, said the program will use a new booster on the ground-based interceptor next year that will boast additional capabilities.

"It goes faster," he said, adding that the booster, which carries the exoatmospheric kill vehicle, will be speedy enough to protect all 50 states against missiles launched from what the federal government calls "nations of concern." Currently, the GBI uses the second and third stages of the Minuteman II booster for operation.

Using a series of charts in Café

Meck, Jim O'Connor, EKV site lead, explained the various elements of the program — from the X-Band radar (GBR-P) to space-based sensors — and its evolution as additional tests come online.

"Everything is changing a little bit as we go along," he said.

For instance, all pre-mission booster and EKV integration will now be done in Huntsville, so that by the time the GBI booster rocket arrives on Meck for an Integrated Flight Test, it will be put directly in the silo with minimum preparation. Additionally, by IFT-12, engineers say there will be marked changes in the system, including different software and more difficult scenarios that will include additional decoys and unknown variables.

It's been a busy year for NMD, which completed its first test involving a planned intercept of an intercontinental ballistic missile on Oct. 2,

1999. IFT-3 was followed by two more tests, which failed to make a hit but proved other elements in the system, according to NMD officials. Two new silos, each 75 feet deep, were completed earlier this year to the tune of \$6.2 million.

Proponents of a missile shield, including U.S. Secretary of Defense William Cohen, say a system is needed to protect the nation from the growing threat of a limited ballistic missile attack. President Bill Clinton has passed on the decision to his successor of whether or not to deploy NMD.

If a decision is made to deploy, a NMD system could be operational in 2005, according to NMD officials.

The premise behind NMD is to "hit a bullet with a bullet." The EKV, designed by Raytheon, does not carry a warhead. Instead, it relies on the impact with the ICBM to knock out the threat.

## Mic Shop puts rare golden cowry up for auction

One of the more rare treasures of the Marshall Islands is up for bid at the Micronesian Handicraft Shop through Wednesday, Dec. 13.

A golden cowry, a primarily Indo-Pacific shell that's more orange than gold, is on display at the Mic Shop. The auction format will allow everyone to have a chance to admire — and possibly own — one of these shells, according to Ronalee MacQueen, Mic Shop chairwoman.

"This is one of the rarer shells in the world," MacQueen said. "We get so very few of them. I was very excited about this one."

MacQueen said the Mic Shop came to possess the shell thanks to a fortuitous meeting at a weaving class on Ebeye. The owner of the shell, from Majuro, sold it to a Mic shop rep, who brought it back to Kwaj.

"It's got a little history," MacQueen said.

In atolls, goldens live deep within dark holes at depths of about 30 feet or more on the steep leeward, oceanside dropoff, according to one book on shells. Another shell book values goldens at an average of \$150 to \$175, though the shells can sell for much more.

The bidding for the shell opened up at \$150. The current high bid, as of Wednesday night, is \$160. Complete auction rules are available at the Mic Shop.

ments, hosted by RSE GBR-P site manager Dr. Steven Cummings, greeted each visitor arriving by bus at the GBR-P facility for a briefing, a tour of the operations control center and a visit to the radar dome. Over 100 people visited the site throughout the day.

Cummings' unclassified briefing covered the history of the NMD X-Band radar program and the role that the prototype radar plays as a stepping stone in the development of the operational radar system, XBR, that will work in conjunction with the deployed NMD system.

"Our main part in the NMD system is as a discrimination radar," Cummings said. "We sort out the objects and report which one is the threat.

"Kill assessment ... is unique to GBR-P," Cummings said, explaining that GBR-P is the only element in the entire NMD system that takes a snapshot of the data before, during and after an intercept occurs. "To sort of get a before-and-after picture of what the target ... looks like. What that allows us to do is to make a decision whether the threat has been hit, damaged or missed."

The GBR-P differs primarily in size from the proposed XBR that will be installed in Shemya, Alaska, in the 2005 timeframe, according to Cummings. It will be twice as tall, twice as wide, with four times the antenna aperture.

"The weight of our mechanical mount at GBR-P, including the antenna structure, is 845,000 pounds. This array will be over 5 million pounds," he added.

GBR-P test director Ray DeMaio ushered the visitors into the operations control room, explaining what each workstation accomplishes during the missions and simulations.

A typical day starts at 5:30 a.m.

with two operators walking down the seven stories of the radar structure checking all the electronics, DeMaio said, as the visitors focused on a screen displaying a live picture of the radar elements in the dome. Then diagnostics are run on each element, one at a time. The rest of each day is filled with testing radar software upgrades, simulation runs, and periodic radar calibration.

"XBR is being designed in Bedford [Mass.]," DeMaio said in response to a question from Hogan. "We often collect data for [XBR], but we

don't design hardware ... The ideal situation would be for some of the XBR hardware to come through here in the next few years."

Escorted by GBR-P assistant test director John Lantagne, the visitors entered the air-supported radome, swallowing to pop their

ears since the pressure is a little higher than the outside air.

"The dome material weighs 6000 pounds and is fiberglass cloth impregnated with Teflon," Lantagne explained as the safety-helmeted group climbed the steps to the floor at the base of the dome. "When the wind blows hard, the air pressurization system increases the pressure in the dome."

Lantagne pointed out a rectangular patch in the dome, explaining the material was cut out for analysis and then patched without collapsing the dome.

The last group of the day waited

to enter the airlock as Hogan left the dome with his group.

"Learning about how GBR-P discriminates is the piece of the puzzle that was missing," Hogan said, referring to his NMD Open House experience. "[GBR-P] separates the wheat from the chaff."

restaurant will be open for dinner only Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights, from 5:30 to 10 p.m. Lunch will be served only on Saturdays, from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m.

"We have to reduce hours to stem the losses immediately, but we're not going to cut back on ambiance and we're going to try to improve the quality of the food and service," Wrenn said.

Meanwhile, Gilligan's bar, which records profits, will remain open Wednesday through Sunday at its regular hours, and offer bar menu items, such as burgers, nachos, buffalo wings and quesadillas, from 5:30 to 10 p.m.

The Oceanview will extend its hours Monday and Tuesday nights, the nights Gilligan's bar is closed.

The new hours focus on recorded high-turnout days.

"I would have thought Sunday and Monday would have a high turnout, but those were the worst nights," Wrenn said. "Why not? People on their days off want to be grilling out on the beach. If I have to compete with that, it only makes sense, I'm going to say, 'let's close it.'"

The changes come on the heels of reported losses at the restaurant. Lt. Col. Steve Morris, assistant chief of

Operations, reported the restaurant lost \$379,000 last year, money that came out of the recreation fund. The change of hours will allow the club to reduce staff by 15 to 20 people, and projected savings range up to \$220,000, according to the colonel and Paul King, general manager for Sodexo Marriott.

"If we can stop the drain of our retail food services, we can take off

the fees at some of the other recreational facilities," Wrenn added.

The club underwent a facelift this past summer, closing the fine dining side of the house and opening, instead, a more relaxed restaurant modeled after the TGIFriday's- and Bennigan's-type restaurants popular in the states.

"People want the option of a fine dining experience. OK," Wrenn said.

"We're going back to fine dining," King said, adding the restaurant will reopen the dining room and include table linens and wait staff service.

The new dinner menu should be ready before Christmas, he added. Suggest-

tions for the fine dining menu may be made to Sodexo Marriott by dropping a line to management.

### Breaking the law

Wrenn listed four instances of illegal drug use at USAKA/KMR in the past 60 days.

Two people were caught through random drug testing by RSE and one man tried to bring marijuana through the Dock Security Checkpoint

Most recently, police discovered a crack pipe and marijuana smoking device in a man's BQ room, Nov. 22.

According to police, the man, whose name was not released because of company privacy, was processed and terminated.

"Kwajalein is a reflection of society," Wrenn said, adding police would be stepping up measures to address the problem.

In an unrelated crime issue, the colonel also focused on juvenile drinking and the boat houses.

According to Wrenn, recent drinking incidents have forced the command to take a closer look at the root causes, finding that much of the activity begins at the boat houses.

Consequently, boat lot owners must fix their boats by a reasonable amount of time or turn in a plan to fix them. If not, they may lose their boat lot privilege.

"The boat lots are not meant to be recreational areas," Wrenn said. "It's not that I have a vendetta, it just has become a location for minors drinking."

Wrenn added he suspects adults may be buying for minors, and those found buying for minors will be held

responsible.

Resident Sue Keyser pointed out that theft continues to be a problem, and Wrenn agreed, saying the command is looking at it.

"There's alcohol abuse, drug abuse, and there's no reason to think there isn't theft," he said.

## **Sale, sale, sold**

Get your plastic ready. Credit cards are already accepted at the Kwaj Lodge, Post Office, University of Maryland and RSE Finance and will soon be accepted at retail outlets such as Macy's and Macy's West.

While the credit card companies charge a 2.4 percent surcharge to process transac-

tions, Wrenn said USAKA would, for now, absorb the cost, with the thinking that credit cards will increase sales, offsetting the surcharge.

Other options are to hike prices 1 percent across board or pass the 2.4 percent surcharge on to the credit card customer at the register.

In a related matter, USAKA continues to work on a Kwaj link to a shopping network. The network will give the USAKA recreation fund 3 to 5 percent back on all purchases made through that particular website. Given the amount of Internet shopping at Kwajalein, Wrenn said the network represents a good deal for the command.

"That's money I'm not making at my retail place," Wrenn said. "But if you buy it on the shopping network, I'm getting 3 to 5 percent back with no overhead."

The network should kick off in December.

"I don't know about in time for Christmas, but in December," Wrenn said.

## **Island Intranet**

Want to send a neighbor a recipe or party invitation? Soon, you'll be able to use the island Intranet, not to be confused with the Internet.

"Right now if Betty wants to send Sue a recipe, it goes halfway around the world before coming back to Kwaj," Wrenn said. "I can call (RSE site manager) John Wallace on the phone and say I've just sent you an e-mail. You should get it in a couple minutes."

An Intranet would connect local residences and business addresses only, thus the data would travel far less distance. That would reduce Internet traffic, as well. On the other hand, Internet access

has jumped in the past 60 days from where 12 people could access the public line simultaneously to 69 people at any given time, Wrenn added.

## **Movies**

Wrenn backed off on a suggestion he made last month that he might close movie theaters sometime down the road if patronage doesn't increase.

"The theater won't close anytime soon," he said.

The theater's 16mm projectors recently underwent an overhaul by a technician brought from off-island. The overhaul extended the life of the projectors indefinitely.

Improving the sound will be the next priority, said Steve Snider, superintendent of Entertainment Services.

Movies are released first in 35mm and 70mm film formats, and later in the 16mm format, thus accounting for when Kwaj receives new release films, Snider said.

## **CDC keeps old digs**

Don't count on sending your new-

born to the Child Development Center anytime soon. The CDC only takes children two years old or older who are potty-trained. That policy won't change, Wrenn said, because staff would have to receive specialized training, and more staff would have to be hired, for what constitutes little demand.

The center also recently lost a \$3 million appropriation for renovations. Congress killed the plan, noting the priority is for troop housing and troop's children.

"They say, 'We're not building things for contractors,'" Wrenn said, adding residents should call their home state congressional leaders.

## **Round up**

In other news, Wrenn said the battle to reduce airfares continues, but added he was not optimistic.

"It's been an uphill battle thus far, but we'll continue the fight," he said.

The price of beef might have gone up for awhile, according to one resident, but those prices are coming back down after Supply contracted with a new vendor for beef, Jordan reported. Officials reiterated that consumers do not pay for transportation of food items, but if emergency shipments must be flown in from Honolulu, the additional costs of the higher priced items from Hawaii are passed on to the consumer.

Furthermore, USAKA literally eats the loss if AMC should cause the spoilage of food because of a malfunctioning aircraft that sits on the tarmac. The Air Force carrier currently holds a 65 percent reliability rating. On the other hand, private contractors such as ATI or Matson and other transporters reimburse USAKA for any items lost in transit.






