Marine veterans look back on Roi and Namur invasion

Where are they now?

(Editor's Note: Part II of a two-part series marking the 56th anniversary of Operation Flintlock, the invasion of the Marshall Islands by U.S. forces in 1944.)

Lionel Salazar vividly remembers landing on Roi Feb. 1, 1944.

"We landed early in the morning," he said, via e-mail from Conroe, Texas. "Jap mortars and artillery [were] exploding all over and we [were] scared."

He wasn't alone.

"My Higgins boat got caught on a reef, and we had to wade in," wrote

Emmett Titshaw from Celebration, Fla. "It was shocking to see the first Marines killed."

Bill Rose, of Jeffersonville, Ind., had a bird's-eye view, flying as an air strike coordinator with the Marine Air Group 31.

"It did not take long to secure the island," Rose wrote.

Though living in various parts of the country today, the men share a common bond with the Corps and the small islands of Roi and Namur.

History texts say the Marines of the 4th Marine Division took Roi and Namur in 24 hours of fighting 56 years ago.

African American history, culture focus of events

The diversity of Americans will be celebrated all month long stateside and on Kwajalein as African American History Month gets underway.

In a Jan. 31 proclamation, President Bill Clinton said this year's theme is Heritage and Horizons: The African American Legacy and the Challenges of the 21st Century.

In part, the proclamation read, "[African American History Month] is a reminder that the new century on which we have just embarked offers us a unique opportunity to write our own chapter in the history of African Americans and of our nation ... We can teach our children that America's story has been written by men and women of every race and creed and ethnic background."

In recognition of this observance, African American music, dancing, food, and history will be spotlighted on Kwaj throughout February.

In line with Clinton's proclamation, the Special Emphasis Equal Opportunity Program (SEEOP) committee is hosting a program and luncheon at 11:30 a.m. Friday, Feb. 11, at the Yokwe Yuk Club. In addition, a group of African American residents will present an evening of food, dancing, and singing in the high school MP room at 7 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 20.

Both programs are designed to highlight African American history and customs to residents.

Sgt. Linda Wilson, USAKA/KMR personnel sergeant and member of the committee, said, "SEEOP focuses on ethnic and cultural observances and gives equal focus on each observance, such as Hispanic Heritage Month, Native American Month, Dr.

Gong xi fa cai to Kwajalein this *Qian Xi*

Asia marks new year with 'thousand happinesses'

WASHINGTON (American Forces Press Service) — The Chinese New Year's greeting is *gong xi fa cai*, which means "happy and prosperous New Year."

This particular Lunar New Year, which begins tomorrow, is special for the Chinese and other Asians because it's the millennium or *Qian Xi* — "Year of a Thousand Happinesses."

According to the Chinese lunar calendar, this new year is also "The Year of the Dragon."

Belkis Leong-Hong, former principal deputy director of the Defense Security Service, said that in her household, one of the must-have dishes is chicken, "any way we want to fix it, and a lot of fruit like oranges, tangerines, and apples. Other families must have fish."

The Chinese hold a family reunion dinner on New Year's Eve with more than enough food prepared to signify *nian nian yu*, or "more than enough good things in the New Year." Bad language and unpleasant topics are discouraged, said Leong-Hong, who was born in Kwangtung, China. She came to the United States with her family in 1960.

"After dinner, the family spends most of the night playing cards [or] board games or watching TV programs dedicated to the occasion," Leong-Hong said.

At midnight, fireworks light up the sky in many areas. A lantern festival marks the end of the New Year season, and afterward, daily life returns.

The Chinese lunar calendar is the longest chronological record in history, dating from 2637 B.C. with the introduction of the first cycle of the Chinese zodiac. One complete cycle takes 60 years and is made up of five arcs of 12 years each.

The 78th cycle started in February 1984 and will end in February 2044.

The Chinese calendar and its animals

There are many legends about the origins of the Chinese lunar calendar, in which an animal is assigned to each year in a 12-year cycle.

According to one legend, the Lord Buddha summoned all the animals of the world to come to him before he departed Earth. Only 12 came to bid him farewell. He named a year after each in the order of their arrival. First came the rat, then the ox, tiger, rabbit, dragon, snake, horse, sheep, monkey, rooster, dog, and boar.

A second legend tells that the 12 animals quarreled one day about which one was to head the cycle of years. The gods were asked to decide, and they held a contest: whoever reached the opposite bank of the river first would head the first cycle, and the rest of the animals would receive their years according to their finish.

The 12 animals gathered at the riverbank and jumped in. Unknown to the ox, the rat had jumped on his back. As the ox was about to climb ashore, the rat jumped off the ox's back and won the race. The boar, which was very lazy, ended up last. That is why the rat is the first year of the animal cycle, the ox is second, and the boar last.

The Chinese believe the animal ruling the year in which a person is born has a profound influence on personality. They say, "This is the animal that hides in your heart."

To determine your lunar animal, match your birth year with the animals below. Add or subtract 12 as needed:

- Rat: You are imaginative, charming, and very generous to those you love, though you do have a tendency to be quick-tempered and overly critical. You will be happy as a writer, critic, or publicist. (1936, 1948, 1960, 1972, 1984)
- Ox: You are a born leader and inspire confidence in those around you. Be careful about being too demanding. You are also methodical and good with your hands. You will make a good surgeon, general, or hairdresser. (1937, 1949, 1961, 1973, 1985)
- Tiger: You are sensitive, emotional, and capable of great love, but you tend to be stubborn about what you think is right. You will make an excellent boss, explorer, or race car driver. (1938, 1950, 1962, 1974, 1986)
- Rabbit: You are affectionate, cooperative, and always pleasant, and people like to be around you. You can, however, get too sentimental and seem superficial. You will make a successful business person, lawyer, diplomat, or actor. (1939, 1951, 1963, 1975, 1987)
- Dragon: You are full of life and enthusiasm and a very popular individual with a reputation for being fun-loving. You will make a good artist, priest, or politician. (1940, 1952, 1964, 1976, 1988)
- Snake: You are wise and charming. You are also romantic and a deep thinker, but you tend to procrastinate and be a bit stingy about money. You will make a good teacher, writer, or psychiatrist. (1941, 1953, 1965, 1977, 1989)
- Horse: You are an amazingly hard worker and very independent. Although you are intelligent and friendly, you can sometimes be a bit selfish. You will find success as an adventurer, scientist, or poet. (1942, 1954, 1966, 1978, 1990)
- Sheep: You are charming, elegant, and artistic, and you like material comforts, but you also have a tendency to complain about things and worry a bit too much. You will make a good actor, gardener, or beachcomber. (1943, 1955, 1967, 1979, 1991)
- Monkey: You are very intelligent, clever, and well-liked by everyone. You will have success in any field you try. (1944, 1956, 1968, 1980, 1992)
- Rooster: You are a hardworker and definite in your decisions. You are not afraid to speak your mind and are, therefore, sometimes boastful. You will make a good restaurant owner, publicist, or world traveler. (1933, 1945, 1957, 1969, 1981, 1993)
- Dog: You are honest and faithful to those you love, but you tend to worry too much and find fault with others. You will make an excellent business person, teacher, or secret agent. (1934, 1946, 1958, 1970, 1982, 1994)
- Boar: You are a good friend because you are sincere, tolerant, and honest, but you expect the same from others and may be terribly disappointed. You will thrive in the arts as an entertainer, or you may make a great lawyer. (1935, 1947, 1959, 1971, 1983, 1995)

The battle, along with the amphibious assaults on Kwajalein and other islands in the atoll, would make up Operation Flintlock. The successful attacks cut into the Japanese perimeter in the central Pacific, severed lines of communication, and set the stage for island hopping that would lead to the capture of Saipan, Iwo Jima and Okinawa.

The 4th Marine Division would be there through all of it.

"This was my first combat," said Titshaw. "We were the first (division) to ever go directly into battle from the mainland."

The landing followed a massive two-day bombardment. Batteries set on Enniburr (or Third Island) and other nearby islands, along with naval gun fire, laid thousands of rounds on the Japanese.

Consequently, Marine casualties numbered only 190 killed and 547 wounded. Japanese lost 3,472 killed and 264 captured.

Though U.S. casualties were relatively low, the fighting was extraordinarily vicious at times, with four Medals of Honor awarded.

"We lost our battalion commander, Lt. Col. Aquilla Dyess, to enemy machine gun fire," Salazar said, noting

one of the four medals awarded.

Dyess was leading an attack on one of the last Japanese holdout positions on Namur when he was killed. Salazar served under him as a Browning Automatic Rifle machine gunner with A Company, 1st Battalion, 24th Marine Regiment.

Pfc. John B. Anderson, 1st Lt. John V. Power and Pfc. Richard

Sorenson also earned the nation's highest award. Of the three, only Sorenson survived.

Meanwhile, Titshaw, a machine gunner, remembers, "the battle was short. We took Roi and then helped take Namur. There was a huge explosion on Namur — an ammunition dump."

In fact, it was an enemy blockhouse storing

aerial bombs and torpedo warheads that exploded, accounting for half the 2nd Battalion's casualties.

Above the action, "The line troops left and MAG 31 flew a lot of sorties," Rose said. "A lot of air and sea engagements took place."

Following the battle, all three men went on, as did the division, to see some of the fiercest action in World War II. From Roi and Namur, they

went to Saipan, Tinian, and Iwo Jima.

Salazar was wounded at Saipan by mortar fire and again at Tinian by small-arms fire.

"I thank God every day that I was not wounded," Rose said. "My brother Nelson (who also served in the 4th Marine Division) was. And I lost a lot of good friends over there."

Rose went on to fight at Okinawa. "Okinawa was the longest and most

strenuous operation for me," he said. "I rode ashore in a duck all the way up the hill to Yontan Airfield. Red Brokaw, Tom Brokaw's dad, went ashore at the same place and time."

All three men returned home, finding work, marrying, and starting families.

Salazar married Lucinda in 1947 and earned a bachelor's degree in business administration in 1951. He worked for United Gas Pipeline for 33 years, retiring in 1986.

"I am still enjoying retirement with my lovely wife, Lucinda," he said.

Now 74, he serves with EASTEX (East Texas) Detachment, Department of Texas, Marine Corps League.

The organization honored him as a life member this month, posting a short biography on the group's web page at www.raetex.com/marines.

"I am also active with the 4th Marine Division Association, Houston Chapter," he said.

He has a son, Freddie; three daughters, Sonia, Ana, and Teri; six grandchildren; and three great-grandchildren.

Titshaw returned to Jacksonville, Fla., after the war and worked with Wilbert Bruial Vault Company for 25 years.

There he "met and married a girl from Jacksonville, and we have been married 52½ years."

Together, they raised three children, including a son who is a brigadier

general in the Air National Guard and another who is a Delta Air Lines pilot.

He and a son attended the 50th anniversary on Iwo Jima.

Rose returned home May 6, 1946, after a year in Japan.

"I got real smart and married my childhood girlfriend, Doris Durham, June 28, 1946."

They have four children and nine grandchildren. His eldest son, Bill,

attended West Point, and recently retired from the Army as a colonel.

Rose was a partner in a dental laboratory for several years, retiring at 62. He celebrated his 75th birthday last year.

Now he and Doris travel often in their motor home.

Said Rose, "I am grateful to the USMC, all the friends I have made over the years and the young lady who is my wife and the mother of our family."

Moonshine beams in latest Commodore's Cup race



Scuba-Doo raises over \$15,000 for D.A.N.

Early numbers from Scuba-Doo have organizers saying "Yabba dabba do" over the amount of money raised on behalf of the Diver's Alert Network.

The annual event, held Sunday at Coral Sands, netted about \$15,000, according to preliminary estimates from Kwajalein Scuba Club event organizers. That's more than double last year's total of \$6,200.

"We're in awe," said Jude Allbrandt, one of the chief organizers of the event. "You always want to do better

than the year before."

The big-ticket item, a week-long trip to Bikini Atoll for diving, went for \$3,300. Steve Fuchs paid \$550 for the privilege of creaming Kwajalein Police Chief Terry Hardy with a pie. Dozens of items were on the auction block, from sailing lessons by Mike Herrington to dive gear to the gourmet services of executive chef Paul King.

The money, after expenses, will be donated to D.A.N., an international organization that promotes diver safety and health.
