Knocking the Rust Off

Contestants off and running early for grueling triathlon event in May

They run the gamut from young and merely athletic to hard-nosed athletes who love to compete and sweat. Until May 1, they will all share similar experiences — countless laps in the pool and lagoon, aching and sore muscles, and much wear and tear on bicycle tires and components.

The Rustman cometh, and the men and women who will test themselves in Kwajalein's famed triathlon are already in training.

"I think it's one of the best events on island ... The whole island gets

into it," said Simone Smead, a two-time Rustman winner in the individual women's category in 1990 and 1997.

"I just started training," said Smead, describing herself as a casual competitor who enjoys participating in the event. Her training usually consists of two activities a day, such as three or four loops around the four-mile airport runway on her racing bike, along with cardiovascular exercises, such as rollerblading.

"As the race comes nearer, I gear up more," Smead said, adding that

she tapers off the week before the triathlon so as not to wear herself out.

Now in its 21st year, the Rustman is a swim-run-bike endurance test for individual competitors, as well as teams. The race begins with a one-kilometer swim from Echo Pier to Emon Beach, followed by a 42-kilometer bike ride around the airport runway, and culminating in a 10-kilometer run around the downtown and housing areas.

Last year, Sharon Greenbaum posted the second-best time ever for

WWII history comes alive with island stories

Jillo Rangier remembers the 1944 American invasion of Kwajalein. She endured the battle inside a bunker on Carlson, or Ennibuoj, with 20 or more other islanders and no food or water.

"I came out of the bunker because I was thirsty," she said, with the help of translator Moss Phillip. "I was scared, but I remembered what my father said. When I'm scared, I can't act scared or I will not survive, or something bad will happen."

Rangier, an *alap*, or landowner, on Kwajalein, Carlson, and Carlos islands, and six other Marshallese elders shared their stories of the war years with the Kwajalein community at the Religious Education Building last week. Phillip and Alter Langrine served as translators for the group.

The event was sponsored by the Marshallese Cultural Society. Dr.

Marshallese elders share tales of WWII battle ...

Eric Lindborg, president, and Cris Lindborg, director of exhibits at the Marshallese Cultural Center, organized the unique program.

More than 50 people filled the room to hear the tales. Pictures from Operation Flintlock, the invasions of Kwajalein, Roi, and Namur islands, lined the back wall. Long-time resident Pat Cataldo gave an overview of the Japanese era in the Marshall Islands, 1914-1944.

At the front of the room, however, sat living history — a panel of seven Marshallese who lived through the war years on different islands and under different circumstances.

Rangier, for example, left her bunker to find war dead strewn along the beach. She sat and drank from a canteen she took from a dead soldier. Shortly afterward, American soldiers approached her, rifles pointed at the ready.

Frightened, she couldn't speak Marshallese or English. Instead, her words came out in Kosraean. Fortunately, American soldiers took her to a field station, where she was given food and water.

Nearby Korok, an *alap* of Erro, in

the mid-atoll corridor, survived in a bunker on Kwajalein during the bombardment.

Having come to the island in September 1943 for medical treatment, the then 11-year-old girl lived with siblings. One sister's husband worked on Kwajalein for the Japanese. Then bombs began to fall.

"There was no place to hide but the bunker where they stored weapons and stuff," she said. "Everywhere, there was fire and smoke, across the sea and along the islands. There were many deaths. Marshallese asked to leave, but the Japanese commander was very bad, so he just kept us here. A meeting was held, and finally only women and children were taken home."

Korok left on a boat with other women and children. On her way off the island, her boat passed another filled with Japanese soldiers she claimed "were on their way to beheading Marshallese, but the Americans came and started firing on them. I went home, but the battle went on."

Akira Kobney, an *alap* of Roi-Namur, drove a similar boat. Kobney said shortly before U.S. Marines stormed beaches on Roi and Namur, Japanese told him to take Marshallese women and children on a 25-foot boat from Third Island to Ajkan, an island near Roi and Namur. There, he and the others sat out the battle.

Meanwhile, Wanjor Balos, an *alap* from Kwajalein, was on Jaluit, where

he worked as principal of a school. The Japanese had started the school for 400 Marshallese students, and Balos said, "Japanese were very nice. Before the invasion, during that time, they were very strict."

Piton Subilee, an *alap* from Carlson, who worked for Japanese on Kwaj, Gugegue, and Namur, agreed that the Japanese were not all bad.

"I tell you, even though it will be hard for you, working with the Japanese was OK," Subilee said. "Once you do something wrong, that's when you got beaten up and that's when they punished you. They were nice, just like you."

Nalon Langio, wife of *alap* Ato Langio, of Kwajalein, was only 8 years old in 1944 and lived on Carlos. She doesn't remember the battle as much as the results.

"When I was a little girl, I heard all the stories I wanted to of it. Those people were scared, naked ... All I could hear was crying, mourning," she said. "Thank you Americans for saving us."

Daisey Levai, an *alap* of Ebadon, who was also young and off-island at the time of the attack, echoed Langio's words.

As the stories concluded, members of the crowd crowded around the Marshallese to ask questions. Others gathered in small groups over cake and punch and spoke of what they had heard.

"This puts a human dimension behind the stories, behind the pictures," Dr. Lindborg said.

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Recycling program comes to housing

Nearly 50,000 pounds of waste are generated on Kwajalein every day. A new residential recycling program that begins next week is designed to funnel some of that trash out of the landfill and incinerator.

On Monday, Solid Waste Management Department employees will distribute a plastic curbside recycling bin, along with a "Residential Recycling Guide" and information sheet, to all family housing units on Kwajalein.

"We have a baseline of residential recycling activity now, with ACRY (Aluminum Can Recycling for Youth) collecting aluminum cans and RSE

collecting glass bottles on Mondays, but we need to expand," said Joe Loer, Solid Waste Management manager.

According to Loer, the program emphasizes "material and energy recovery" over disposal options, like incineration, because recycling is more cost-effective than incineration at USAKA/KMR.

For example, compost produced this year from recycling scrap wood, palm fronds, and yard and food waste is estimated to have a market value of about \$100,000. But a bigger profit in recycling comes from living in a healthier environment. Last year's Christmas trees, for instance, were turned into mulch and will be used in the downtown landscaping project.

"Reduced environmental and operational impacts make material recovery even more attractive," Loer

said. "But the program won't work without residents' participation. We don't have additional resources for these recycling efforts, so segregation of the recyclable materials at the household level is very important."

The information packet will describe which materials to recycle, how to prepare them, and when to set them out. The packet also contains answers to frequently asked questions, a recycling quiz, and some facts about the program.

"I'm looking forward to everyone taking the recycling quiz, because a poor score assigns you to the landfill cleanup crew, and we'd like a nice turnout for that effort," Loer said.

That's a joke, but the impact recycling has on Kwaj is not a laughing matter. With the current recycling program — mostly industrial wastes like metal and wood — nearly 35 percent of the island trash, or 20,000 pounds daily, was kept out of the incinerator or landfill in 1999. The Department of Defense has established a goal of 40 percent solid waste recycling by 2005.

The recycled material is shipped to a DoD recycling center at Pearl Harbor, where it's processed and sold. The center retains about 30 percent of the sale proceeds to cover costs, while the remainder is

returned to USAKA/KMR.

Loer said a BQ recycling program is still under development, but a program to recycle paper within offices has begun on a pilot scale and will expand over the next few months.

Meanwhile, curbside recycling will begin Tuesday. Containers will be available in two sizes.

"If you see the trucks distributing the bins, you can choose one of two sizes," Loer said. "If you miss them, extra bins of both sizes, as well as covers for the bins, will be available at the Self Help store. Please feel free to exchange."

Recycling bags and twine for tying branches and cardboard will also be available at Self Help. To allow crews to distribute the new bins, there will be no glass collection on Monday; ACRY will still collect aluminum cans on Monday.

"The Solid Waste Management Department is trying to make the program as simple and convenient as possible, and residents' input will help the program evolve, as well as help shape program improvements for the Kwajalein BQs and Roi-Namur," Loer said.


The games began after opening ceremonies in which the Kosrae Tennis Club presented T-shirts to the Kwaj players.

A highlight of the trip was a barbecue with the Rev. Elden Buck and his wife, Alice. The Bucks were on Kwaj for 13 years (1968-81), while Elden was Protestant chaplain. Alice is well-known for her translation projects, including Marshallese and Kosraean translations of the Bible.

Team members called the trip a success they would like to repeat. The Kosraeans are considering coming to Kwajalein in the future.

Coconut Cup race ready to sail April 1

Majuro's third annual sailing regatta, the Millennium Coconut Cup, is all set to make a splash on April 1 in the water area between Rita and Delap.

This year's regatta promises to be a brilliant battle of the boats, with a record number of overseas yachts visiting the Republic of the Marshall Islands. Heightened interest in preserving the traditional Marshall Islands outrigger has also contributed to the event's increasing popularity.

In the 1999 Coconut Cup, king of the waves was windsurfer Gerry Smith, who whizzed around the triangular course on his board, *Rudy Booby Twobie*, in 22 minutes and 45 seconds. Just 15 minutes behind

him was Morton Jikit, who skillfully sailed his outrigger, *Wut Kio*, to a class win, taking home \$750 cash and two round-trip tickets to Kwajalein for his efforts. In the cruising class, *Blue Moon* skipper Jim Petron—known to islanders as the captain of Robert Reimer's boat *Lona*—was the first over the finish line in 40 minutes and 50 seconds.

The Millennium Coconut Cup's organizing committee is now sending the call out far and wide for competitors and sponsors for the 2000 Cup.

Rustman training under way as athletes seek edge ...

a woman athlete, with a finish of about two hours and 23 minutes. She's been training for this year's event for over three weeks now, and many of her competitors say she's the favorite to win this year.

"I just do it because it's there, it's accessible," Greenbaum explained. "It's a lot of fun because you can find people to train with."

One training partner is Gail Sikes, who said she began to increase her normal exercise routine about three weeks ago. That routine, she said, includes swimming three times a week, long-distance biking, and running about three to four times each week.

"I just hope to cover the distance without getting injured," Sikes said.

Six-year triathlete Greg Hogan said his goals are also modest for this year's Rustman, because like most competitors, he sees himself as somewhere between a casual participant and a hard-core athlete.

"I'm not setting the world on fire," Hogan said. He runs three or four times a week, bikes several times during the week and weekend, and takes laps in the pool to train for that

dreaded one-kilometer swim.

One group of Rustman hopefuls recently began meeting weekly for swims in the lagoon and runs around the island. Every Wednesday, the group meets at Emon Beach at about 5:15 p.m. and then heads to Echo Pier to simulate the Rustman swim back to Emon, according to Larry Krone.

On Thursdays at around the same time at Emon Beach, he said, at least a half-dozen runners gather to train. And on any given weekend morning — and even some weekdays — several cyclists can be seen racing around the airport runway.

"It's a sort of group effort thing," Krone said.

Bob Sholar, who helps organize the annual event, noted the Rustman is particularly attractive to both novices and seasoned competitors because they have the time and opportunity to train without all the distractions found stateside.

Greg Laprade, planning to compete in his fourth straight Rustman, agrees.

"I enjoy the exercise ... It's easy to compete in," Laprade said. "It's one of the reasons I like living here."

Laprade's workout regime is a little more mild than some competitors, as he takes a laid-back approach to the sport. He said he is now up to a "solid" six miles a week jogging.

"This year I just aim to finish," he said.

That's also the goal for Tom Krasuski, a Rustman novice.

"I haven't seriously committed, but I'm going to do it," he said. "I've never done [a triathlon] before, so I thought now would be a good time."

Besides weekly biking, jogging, and pool laps, Krasuski joins the Wednesday lagoon swims — and does two laps rather than one.

"I like to do a little bit longer in length and build up some endurance," he said.

Other Rustman athletes, however, are even more serious; they log their training workout on a daily basis, and invest hundreds, if not thousands of dollars, in a race bike.

"A handful of people get the bug and go at it year to year," said Sholar, himself a three-time Rustman champion and owner of the overall record, with a miserly time of 2:06:21.

While the individual competitors are often spotlighted, many Rustman participants have chosen to join teams of two to three members since that option was implemented in 1990. Raul Lopez, who competed individually in three previous years, will ride only the bike course in 2000. Lopez said he stays in shape all year long, though he started serious Rustman training about two weeks ago.

"It's hard to get motivated," Lopez admitted, adding he does about 26 miles each workout three times per week.







GSK earns award for milestone

Does GSK stock commander's coins? No, but the Supply and Transportation Division's Warehousing branch received a certificate and a pair of coins Saturday from Col. Gary K. McMillen, USAKA/KMR commander.

Debbie Schoene, warehouse operations manager, and Clotho Lalimo, representing the Marshallese staff, received coins.

GSK was recognized for meeting goals outlined in the 1997 Milestone Plan, which was designed to correct warehouse deficiencies. The 24-member team replaced heavy shelv-

ing racks, built two offices, and painted the interior. Obsolete items were excessed and new items brought in. Meanwhile, the staff continued to serve an average of 100 customers every day and deliver as many as 3,000 line items monthly.

"All of these initiatives were accomplished while continuing to provide uninterrupted and outstanding service to the command and community," the citation stated.

"We really have a great team," Schoene said. "These guys went out and accomplished something they weren't originally trained to do, without a safety incident."
