Home sweet home

Boeing unveils plan for dome housing on island

A different kind of dream was realized on Martin Luther King Jr. Day this week as island officials gathered at the far end of Kwajalein to usher in a new kind of era.

Boeing officials, along with USAKA/KMR personnel, National Missile Defense (NMD) team members and a host of other dignitaries, broke ground Tuesday afternoon in a vacant field between Ocean Road and Perimeter Road at the northeast end of Kwajalein. That's the spot where 15 new homes will be constructed for Boeing LSI employees and their families. Boeing is the lead contractor on the NMD project on Kwaj.

"It is ironic we should be doing this on Martin Luther King Day," observed Gary K. McMillen, USAKA/KMR commander. "I also had a dream that someday we would replace the trailers on the island with quality, multi-family housing."

Maj. Gen. Willie Nance, NMD pro-

Armed for dinner

Scientists develop food patch

WASHINGTON (Army News Service) — Scientists in the Department of Defense Combat Feeding Program are working to ensure that the soldier of the future has plenty of nourishment within arm's length.

Although the product is still planted in the conceptual phase, scientists are working on a nutrition patch called the Transdermal Nutrient Delivery System, TDNDS, that would be used by warfighters under extreme circumstances.

The system would conceivably expand on the osmotic technology of the nicotine patch that is worn on the arm. However, instead of transmitting nicotine, this patch will transmit vitamins and nutrients needed by the human body. The patch would be used to keep the



NMD conducts intercept test

From the Department of Defense

The Ballistic Missile Defense Organization's National Missile Defense Joint Program Office announced it performed a test Wednesday involving a planned intercept of a ballistic missile target over the central Pacific Ocean. An intercept was not achieved. A modified Minuteman intercontinental ballistic missile, with a target vehicle, was launched from Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif., at 6:19 p.m. Pacific Standard Time, and a prototype interceptor was launched approximately 20 minutes later and about 4,300 miles away from Kwajalein Atoll in the Republic of the Marshall Islands.

This is a joint program involving the U.S. Army, U.S.

gram manager, said the housing project solidifies the commitment between NMD and its employees.

“This is another important day in our National Missile Defense program,” he said. “The people who live and work on Kwajalein are essential to the team.”

The new temporary living quarters will be of dome design. These modular houses, manufactured by Domes International Inc., will be three-bed-

room, two-bath units with about 1,400 square feet of living space. Each home will have a covered area that protects bicycles and other outdoor equipment.

The homes will also have a 10-foot by 10-foot patio surrounded by a privacy fence. Finally, they will be furnished with plumbing fixtures, a water heater, air conditioning, appliances and cabinets.

The homes are scheduled to be finished by Sept. 1. According to officials, a “turn key” project will be executed to have the homes ready for occupancy upon completion of construction.

“We’re trying to design it so it’s a friendly atmosphere,” explained Colin Pebbles with Dick Pacific Construction Co., which is in charge of the site preparation.

Some of the special features of the dome housing include being self-

supporting; extremely resistant to weather damage; energy efficient; and cost-effective. They are also easy to assemble and require little maintenance in the way of painting and roof repair. Additionally, the buildings are reportedly flame, flood and earthquake resistant, as well as easy to repair. They can also be relocated, if necessary.

The high-tech house has a double fiberglass shell that sandwiches a core of urethane foam insulation, much like a giant ice cooler. It is the product of nearly 20 years of research, according to the Domes International web site.

Dr. John Peller, program manager for Boeing LSI, reiterated the need to recognize those individuals and families who are often overshadowed by the NMD project media headlines. It’s a mission, he said, that “boggles the imagination.”

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Time to call it quits

Calhoun retires after nearly 32 years

A lot happened in 1968.

Sen. Robert F. Kennedy was assassinated. Author Tom Wolfe published his novel, *The Electric Kool-Aid Acid Test*. The movie "2001: A Space Odyssey" premiered. Kwajalein Harbor Master Roy Calhoun arrived at the atoll for a two-year stint.

Nearly 32 years later, Kwaj's man with the "best view in town" is hanging up his binoculars and retiring at the end of January.

"I came out here for two [years] and stayed for 31," Calhoun, 64, mused during a recent interview at Harbor Control. "This is the safest place in the world. We have no drug problems, no high-speed chases, nobody's shooting at you. Everybody is like family. That's the reason I've stayed here."

Eyes squinted as if permanently fixed on the horizon, Calhoun still has the air of seaman. After all, it's the profession that originally brought him to Kwajalein over three decades ago in January of 1968 on a supply ship. The following month — Feb. 29, 1968, a Leap Year, to be exact — Calhoun returned to Kwaj and began

to work his way up through the Marine Department.

From seaman, Calhoun navigated his way to operator of both small and large craft, worked on recovery boats and just about every other kind of vessel that has anchored at Kwaj. Calhoun was eventually called ashore in the 1980s as he began assuming various duties that evolved into the position of harbor master, who is responsible for the scheduling, coordination and safe daily operations of the fleet and personnel.

"Being up here I'm in a position to see everything that's going on," Calhoun said, gesturing to the blue-on-blue waters below the observation deck. Out there he has watched typhoons and manmade storms, such as the arrival of hundreds of illegal Chinese immigrants on the *Eastwood* several years ago, come to Kwajalein.

"I've seen a lot of people come and go," Calhoun said. "I could sit back here and write a whole book. Of course it would take me 20 years to write it."

Think about it this way: Calhoun has been on Kwaj during the tenures of seven U.S. presidents. Raytheon

is the fourth logistics contractor he has worked for. Such longevity breeds respect.

"As harbor master, Roy Calhoun has become an institution on Kwajalein's waterfront," said Bob Babcock, port captain. "Whether scheduling a run to an outer island or coordinating a rescue of a RMI vessel in distress, Roy has been a maritime bridge between the islands and communities of this atoll. He will

be missed by more than just his shipmates within the Marine Department."

While Calhoun said he would miss his many Kwaj friends and the tropical weather, he is looking forward to returning to his home state of Washington to visit family.

"I'm looking forward to going home and retiring," Calhoun said, adding he would still work part-time. "You have to keep busy."

Paul Jurek, formerly with base operations in the Aviation Department, is training to become the new harbor master. He said he knows replacing Calhoun will be no easy task.

"He's got [the knowledge] all locked up in here," Jurek said, pointing to his head.

And until Jan. 29, as Calhoun pointed out, "We've got the best views in town."

warfighter at optimum performance for a day or two, until he or she has access to a real meal and the time to eat it.

Gerald Darsch is the joint project director for the DoD Combat Feeding Program, which is part of the Natick Soldier Center at the U.S. Army Soldier Systems Center.

"TDNDS would be used during periods of high-intensity conflict," Darsch said. "It is not intended to ever replace a turkey dinner with all the fixings."

Darsch explained that the patch's ingredients could also include nutraceuticals. These chemicals could tell a hungry soldier's brain that his stomach is full or reduce combat-related stress, such as muscle fatigue and physical problems associated with prolonged cold weather exposure and high altitude.

In the future, the patch could possibly transmit nutrients in one of several ways.

According to Darsch, a microchip processor would interact with sen-

sors to determine a warfighter's metabolic requirements. The microchip processor would then activate a microelectrical mechanical system to transmit the micronutrients. Nutrients would be transported via skin pores that have been opened by electrical impulses, or through microdialysis, which would pump nutrients directly into blood capillaries. Another potential vehicle for transport could involve controlled release of encapsulated nutrients through the skin.

Dr. C. Patrick Dunne of the DoD Combat Feeding Program, said that the patch has civilian, as well as military, applications. In the future, the patch could be used by workers in a variety of stressful, hazardous work environments. For example, the patch could potentially be used by miners, oil rig workers, firefighters, chemical production or cleanup workers, as well as by astronauts involved in space walks or space station repair.

Darsch estimates that the system could be available to military personnel around the year 2025.

Justice available on Kwajalein

Recently, two USAKA/KMR contractor employees were prosecuted in United States Federal Magistrate's Court at Kwajalein. How is that possible?

Under the Compact of Free Association between the U.S. and the Republic of the Marshall Islands, the U.S. federal criminal statutes and the Hawaii criminal code apply to U.S. Defense sites, such as USAKA/KMR. Congress established the magistrate's court at USAKA/KMR to prosecute misdemeanors and petty offenses here.

A case is brought as follows.

The Special Assistant U.S. Attorney (SAUSA) for Kwajalein coordinates with the U.S. Attorney's office in Honolulu as to the proper charges and where the case should be handled. Felonies must be tried in Hawaii, but lesser crimes can be handled on Kwajalein.

The SAUSA then prepares a document called an "information" charging the various offenses. The information, along with a summons, notifies the defendant of the impending arraignment. At the arraignment hearing, the defendant appears before a U.S. federal magistrate (judge), who is authorized to handle the cases. In most instances, the cases are completed on Kwaj with the magistrate's decision of guilt or innocence, and an appropriate sentence. The magistrate is authorized to impose sentences, including fines and restitution.

The recent cases involved theft of a bicycle and damage to government property. The defendants plead guilty and the magistrate imposed sentences of restitution and a fine, along with special assessments to cover court costs.

This process is very effective and saves individuals, as well as the government, time and money.

Kwajalein Missile Range commander discusses organization and mission


Editor's Note: The following is the first in a series of monthly columns by Lt. Col. Ray Jones, Kwajalein Missile Range commander.

This will be an exciting year for the range. We will be busy with several missions, including support for the National Missile Defense program and a host of other critical missions in support of our country's national interests.

Over the next few months, by way of monthly articles, I would like to provide the Kwajalein workforce and your families a little more insight into the

mission of the range, its organization structure, and how we support the four strategic goals for the Space and Missile Defense Command. Each month I will present an article illustrating how the range executes its mission in support of the four SMDC strategic goals:

Space: Deliver world-class space support to the Warfighter and national space interests.

NMD: Provide the nation with a credible national missile defense system.

TMD: Provide the world's foremost integrated theater missile defense system to protect the Warfighter and other national interests.

organizational structure and the overall mission of the Kwajalein Missile Range.

KMR, a subordinate command under the United States Army Kwajalein Atoll (USAKA), is responsible for executing the range mission for SMDC. As the KMR commander, I report to the USAKA commander, Col. Gary K. McMillen, for all issues related to the range and its mission. Our mission statement is a subset of the USAKA mission, in that:

The Kwajalein Missile Range plans, executes, and reports on theater and strategic offensive and defensive ballistic missile testing and supports space operations and experiments from the Kwajalein Atoll, in the Republic of the Marshall Islands, using a wide array of highly sophisticated radar, telemetry and optical sensors to meet the needs of the Department of Defense in defending the nation and its interests.

KMR is comprised of three subordinate divisions.

The Program Support Division, located in Huntsville, Ala., is responsible for conducting all preliminary test program planning for the range, and facilitates the range customers' requirements determination prior to their actual arrival at Kwajalein.

The Range Test Division, located here at Kwajalein, receives the requirements from the Program Support Division, ensures proper integration of the customer onto the range, and coordinates between the customer, the Integrated Range Engineering (IRE) contractor, Raytheon, and MIT/Lincoln Laboratory (LL) to ensure proper mission execution.

Finally, our Instrumentation and Engineering Division (RI) provides mission support and technical ex-

pertise as it relates to all sensors and systems on the range.

To accomplish this mission, KMR has a combination of the most sophisticated radar and optical sensors — unmatched anywhere in the world. The range is staffed and operated by a world-class professional team consisting of U.S. Army military and government civilian personnel, Raytheon's IRE contractor, Aeromet, and MIT Lincoln Laboratory (KMR's scientific advisor). This team has proven itself by continuous, 100 percent successful mission accomplish-






