## Ferry schedule causes concern for RMI workers

The current ferry schedule for Marshallese badged workers just doesn't float.

That's the message about 100 USAKA employees sent to Col. Curtis L. Wrenn Jr., USAKA commander, Monday night during a town hall meeting on Ebeye at the MonLaMike Club. Wrenn called the meeting to discuss several issues pertinent to the Marshallese workforce, and then opened the floor for discussion.

On the commander's agenda: Treatment of the Marshallese by their fellow American workers, allowing Marshallese badged workers to use Ten-Ten and the way security measures have impacted the Ebeye community.

The first issue, Wrenn said, stemmed from different reports about how American workers were treating Marshallese employees. In one incident, a manager berated an employee for enforcing the rules — against him. In another instance, physical contact was made by an American employee against a Marshallese worker. Wrenn said that type of behavior won't be tolerated.

"I want to make sure that never happens again," he said. "We have one standard for all of our workforce." He directed those employees who experience such a situation to call him

at the Commander's Hotline, 51098, or to call Noda Lojkar, USAKA ombudsman, at 52634.

The second issue, the result of a Joint Committee Meeting between American and Marshallese government officials earlier this month, involved sales at the Ten-Ten store. Wrenn reminded employees that beginning tomorrow, badged workers will be allowed to purchase consumable goods at the store on a trial basis. There will be a limit of \$10 per person,

according to Wrenn. Hours will be limited from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., including weekends, but could be expanded at a later date, depending on how the program goes, he said.

"The intent is so you can buy something for lunch for less [money]," the colonel explained.

Finally, Wrenn discussed security at USAKA since the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks at the World Trade Center and the Pentagon. Specifically,

## Range op slips to Sunday

Today's test of the Ground-based Midcourse Defense system, formerly known as National Missile Defense, slipped to Sunday.

For the latest caution times and maps, see page 8.

The test will be a near "mirror image" of the July flight test, according to a report in "Aerospace Daily" that was released by the Ballistic Missile Defense Organization, the agency that oversees the GMD system.

One difference will be that the seventh test will use a sub-orbital launch

system developed by Orbital for the test target, instead of Lockheed Martin's Multi Service Launch System, which was used in previous flight tests, Lt. Col. Rick Lehner, spokesman for BMDO, told Aerospace. Lehner said using a sub-orbital booster isn't a major difference for the test program because the target will follow the same flight profile used in previous tests.

The new operation time will not affect this weekend's Christmas activities, according to Steve Snider, Com-

## New mid-atoll visitation rules begin in December

Beginning next month, the mid-atoll corridor will be open almost all year long.

Thanks to an agreement forged earlier this month at the Joint Committee Meeting between American and RMI government officials, visitation to the mid-atoll corridor will only be restricted on range operation days and a brief period before and after every mission. The agreement is effective Dec. 1, but because of today's IFT-7 operation slip, the mid-atoll should open sometime after Sunday, the new launch date.

Under the new plan, visitors can travel to the region for more than 265 days each year, according to Maj. David Coffey, Host Nation chief. Visitation will be closed off

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## Missile defense finds more favor among women

**Editor's Note:** This article was culled from the nation's newspapers by the Ballistic Missile Defense Organization and is reprinted with their permission.

(*Washington Times*, [Opinion] by Tod Lindberg, Nov. 27) In the aftermath of Sept. 11, it struck me that the devastating attack on the twin towers and the Pentagon would buttress the case for a missile defense system.

Here, after all, was an example of a determined enemy out to inflict as much damage on the territory of the United States as possible. If such an enemy had a missile capable of reaching us, there is no reason to think he wouldn't fire it.

Meanwhile, it quickly became apparent in the Washington salons of national security and foreign policy that people who had never been in favor of missile defense took the meaning of the Sept. 11 attack to be just the opposite with regard to the issue.

Thanks to a survey conducted by the

Council on Foreign Relations and the Pew Research Center for the People and the Press, we now have some data to help us.

Support for missile defense has, in fact, increased significantly over levels found in an early September pre-attack survey.

Sixty-four percent of Americans now say they favor a missile defense system, up from 56 percent. But this is not so much where the question gets settled as where it gets interesting.

Support among men for missile defense hasn't changed from early September levels. All the movement in the survey is attributable to women, who have long lagged men in support for such a system but have now eliminated the gender gap in its entirety, increasing their level of support from 52 percent in early September to 64 percent now.

In short, women feel more threatened than they did before and than men do now. This is the point at which supporters of missile defense should take note.

Kwajalein Dance Association also will perform.

The block party will have a beverage tent, a food tent and a fun tent. Hot dogs, Italian sausage and peppers, chili and cornbread and nachos will be among the fare.

## **Visit with Santa and buffet, Dec. 3**

Children will have a chance to talk to Santa in person, sit on his lap and pose for the traditional holiday picture keepsake from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m., Monday, Dec. 3. Volunteers from the Youth Council will be there to help kids decorate and cut out cards with their pictures. Santa and the Mrs. will be on Gilligan's

# *Pathology team miraculously identifies most of Pentagon victims*

WASHINGTON — What some experts have called "the most comprehensive forensic investigation in U.S. history" ended Nov. 16 with the identification of 184 of the 189 who died in the terrorist attack on the Pentagon.

A multidisciplinary team of more than 50 forensic specialists, scientists and support personnel from the Armed Forces Institute of Pathology played a major role in Operation Noble Eagle investiga-

tions, officials said.

Many of the casualties were badly burned and difficult to identify, an official said. Of the 189 killed, 125 worked at the Pentagon and 64 were passengers on American Airlines Flight 77. Only one of those who died made it to the hospital. The rest were killed on site, and for some, only pieces of tissue could be found.

AFIP's team of forensic pathologists, odontologists, a forensic anthropologist, DNA experts, investigators and support personnel

worked for over two weeks in the mortuary at Dover Air Force Base, Del., and for weeks at the DNA lab in Rockville, Md., to identify the victims of the attack.

"Our staff represented every branch of the service," said AFIP Director Navy Capt. Glenn N. Wagner. "We also received tremendous support from the doctors, nurses, and technicians stationed at Dover who participated in the investigation."

AFIP used a well-defined and tested system for conducting the

identifications of the Pentagon victims. When remains arrived at the morgue, a scanning device searched for the presence of unexploded ordnance or metallic foreign bodies. A computerized tracking system then assigned numbers to each victim for efficient tracking.

DoD released the positive identification of Pentagon victims. All but four of those who worked in the Pentagon were identified. AFIP identified all but one of the passengers on Flight 77.

he talked about the push to open a laundry on Ebeye. He said the initiative has nothing to do with trying to limit access to the installation. Instead, a laundry on Ebeye, while easing the bottleneck at Dock Security Checkpoint, would also be an economic boon to the Ebeye economy.

Wrenn noted that the laundry services, which are back in effect along with all other visitation programs, rakes in about \$130,000 per year at USAKA.

"That's money that could be going to Ebeye," he said. "It's not a matter of trying to deny access."

## Rocking the boat

Access was a key issue all evening, but mostly in regard to the latest ferry schedule. Badged workers wasted little time in venting their frustration with crowded boats and a schedule that forces some of them to be on island hours before they have to report to work.

One employee, speaking through a translator, complained that he had to get up no later than 5:30 a.m. to catch the LCM to work because the boats that arrive closest to 7:30 a.m. (the 6:55 a.m. and 7:15 a.m. Kwaj arrivals) are packed to capacity. The same employee noted that badged workers aren't allowed through the checkpoint until one hour before they're scheduled to work, meaning many have to wait at the DSC.

Lojkar, who translated between the colonel and the audience, said the workers are in a Catch-22 situation—if they get to work too early, they are cited, if they get to work too late, they are cited.

Wrenn said the schedule is driven by economics. He explained that all departments are trimming operations to save money. For example, the Aviation Department has cut personnel from 174 to 117, he said, and will cut back its flight schedule again beginning Tuesday.

"I'm looking at ways I can optimize the fleet of boats I have now," he said.

Other employees also noted that school children are not riding the correct ferries over to Kwaj, contributing to the cramped conditions on work boats. School children have priority on the 7:20 a.m. ferry from Kwaj, which arrives Ebeye at 7:45 a.m., as well as the 4 p.m. run that arrives at Ebeye at 4:25 p.m.

"We have to enforce who can come and at what particular time," Wrenn said.

Each LCM carries a maximum of 170 passengers; after 7 p.m., the load limit is 150 people.

Wrenn said he would discuss the matter of the ferry schedule with various island managers and bring an answer back to the Marshallese community by next week.

## Equal pay for equal work

Salaries and benefits were also on the table, as employees questioned why some employees were paid less than grandfathered Marshallese and American workers. The gap in hospital services between non-grandfathered and grandfathered Marshallese was also questioned.

Wrenn said salaries are based on supply and demand. With a large workforce to draw upon, coupled with a federal RMI minimum wage of \$2 per hour, Marshallese hired since the Compact of Free Association went into effect in 1986 are generally paid less money. The Compact guaranteed those RMI citizens who were already employed by USAKA before 1986 would receive wages commensurate, or equal, to their American counterparts.

The Raytheon Human Resources Office declined to discuss Marshallese wages, citing company confidentiality.

While Wrenn did not say wages would necessarily improve any time soon, he noted that the USAKA workforce is made up of more Marshallese than ever.

"The intent is to grow the Marshallese workers we have," he explained. "We're trying to phase-out the American workers." There are reportedly about 1,400 Marshallese employees at USAKA.

Health care is also split at the 1986 mark. Wrenn said to help ensure non-grandfathered Marshallese workers receive good medical care, USAKA has been pushing to get the new hospital on Ebeye open.

In fact, the Ebeye medical staff is expected to begin the transition between hospitals by Dec. 15, with a grand opening scheduled for January, according to Stephan Notarianni, of the Host Nation office.

## A place to stay

At the meeting, Wrenn announced that Marshallese are now allowed to stay at the Kwaj Lodge on a space-available basis. The colonel said the change was based on a request from the RMI government.

Wrenn also praised the improvements at the Kwaj Lodge, saying that customer satisfaction is greatly improved.

But not all was good news at the Kwaj Lodge, as one employee complained that supervisors are cutting hours for local employees and taking overtime for themselves.

Sharon Kay, Housing Records coordinator, who has been acting supervisor for the lodge, said, "There is never an intention to reduce staff to give supervisors more hours."

The Kwaj Lodge did cut its midnight shift back in October, Kay said, adding that hours are being strictly enforced, meaning employees who arrive an hour or two late for work are not being allowed to make that time up.

## Parking pandemonium

A question regarding safety and aesthetics at the parking area next to the Dock Security Checkpoint capped the 1½ hour meeting. A female employee asked if more bike racks could be added and the area cleaned up.

The colonel agreed the area is an eyesore and safety hazard, with the jumble of bikes.

"That's the best question I've heard all night," he said.

George Luther, an employee at USAKA since 1966, said Wrenn is the first commander to bring this sort of forum to the workers. "We enjoyed it," he said after the meeting.

Botlang Loek, RMI liaison to USAKA, said he believed the workers benefited from the meeting, and believed they would like another one in the future.

# Spartans I Men upset undefeated Kober, 3-1

only during operations, for an average of five days each mission, he said earlier this month, adding that in a worst-case scenario of 20 operations per year, that means the mid-atoll would be closed 100 days. In reality, the range sees about a dozen operations each year.

Under the old system, visitation was allowed for 126 days of the year, during three separate 42-day periods. The agreement ensures that visitation will, at minimum, meet the current 126-day period and allows either side to cancel the deal at any time, according to Coffey.

All of the islands in the mid-atoll corridor, with the exception of Meck, Illeginni, Gagan and Legan, are open for visitation. Coffey emphasized habitation of the islands is still off-limits. He noted that officials have found evidence

of some permanent habitation on the mid-atoll islands. That is not allowed, he said.

"It's a safety issue," he explained, adding that the new arrangement also allows the range flexibility in scheduling operations.

The new policy is on a trial basis, Coffey emphasized. Americans wishing to visit the mid-atoll islands still need permission from the RMI Liaison Office, and will need to fill out the same form that's used to visit Bigej.

Botlang Loeak, RMI liaison to USAKA, confirmed that the visitation policy to the mid-atoll islands will be the same as for Bigej.

"Things are moving along all right," Loeak said of implementing the new policy with the landowners of the mid-atoll islands. He said the Marshallese will use the additional time to clean the islands and fish.

## **Hotel shuttle in Hono discontinued**

Effective this week, the courtesy shuttle service from the Honolulu Airport Hotel and the Plaza Hotel to Hickam Air Force Base that usually operates in the morning on Monday, Wednesday and Friday has been discontinued until further notice, due to Force Protection measures.


