Plaques to honor Marine Raiders, Kwajalein liberation CILHI team coming in March



Jack Miller knows the truth is out there, buried under a couple feet of dirt and nearly six decades of history.

The whereabouts and identity of the nine Marines who were reportedly beheaded on Kwajalein in 1942 have nagged at him like an unfinished novel whose author is dead and gone. But Miller believes the final chapter may soon be written.

"We think we're really close to identifying them," said Miller, team leader in Visual Information for SMDC. Miller, working closely with men from the U.S. Marine Raiders Association, has been lobbying for a forgotten footnote in

A thousand words ...

WWII Marine pilot revisits Kwajalein

John Galbraith remembers Kwajalein as a place with no trees, pyramidal tents and a chapel a quarter the size of Island Memorial Chapel, with a thatch roof to boot. The runway might be longer today, but he wouldn't have needed it, flying his C-47 — R4D in the Navy vernacular.

But that was 55 years ago, during World War II when he was a young Marine pilot.

Galbraith, now 79, returned to Kwajalein as a passenger this week on board a 737. It was his first time to see the island since he left it in the spring of 1945, to continue the island-hopping campaign that led to the Japanese surrender



Range operation scheduled for Wednesday

A range operation is scheduled for Wednesday, Feb. 7. Caution times are 7:01 p.m. Wednesday to 4:01 a.m. Thursday.

In conjunction with this operation, a caution area will exist within Kwajalein Atoll, defined by the area bounded on the north by Boked Island on the east reef and Yabbernohr Island on the west reef, and bounded on the south by a line drawn north of Bigej Island on the east reef to a point at latitude 08 54.2N, longitude 167 45.8E, then to a point at latitude 08 52.8N, longitude 167 45.8E, and then to a point north of the high tide mark on Ninni Island on the west reef.

Bigej Island, including the inner reef, is specifically excluded and is not a part of the mid-atoll corridor. All mid-atoll corridor islands are designated as sheltered islands. Additional caution areas are specified in the map below.

In order to ensure clearance of non-mission support personnel from the mid-atoll corridor by the window


opening time, Kwajalein police island clearance procedures will begin at approximately 7:30 a.m. on Sunday, Feb. 4, and continue until evacuation has been accomplished. Egress of all air and seacraft will be required when requested by authorized clearance personnel. Subsequent to lagoon clearance, the hazard area will be in effect until mission completion.

In the event of a mission slip, the caution times and areas will be in effect for the following days:


- 7:01 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 8, through 4:01 a.m. Friday, Feb. 9.

- 7:01 p.m. Friday, Feb. 9, through 4:01 a.m. Saturday, Feb. 10.

Questions regarding the above safety requirements for this mission should be directed to the Command Safety Office, range safety officer, 51910.

Hospital sets aside hours for Roi residents to make appointments

Appointments will be set aside for Roi residents from 1 to 1:30 p.m. on Wednesdays starting Feb. 7, while other appointment guidelines remain the same.

For physician appointments, call 52223 or 52224. Appointments are available Tuesday through Saturday from 1 to 3:45 p.m. When requested or authorized by a physician, patients may receive an appointment for 10:30 a.m. on weekdays. A sched-

uled appointment should be made when someone has a chronic problem, or when the patient believes that an extended amount of time may be needed with the physician.

Sick call is held Tuesday through Saturday from 8 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. for urgent, emergency or acute problems that cannot wait for an appointment and generally require 10 to 15 minutes of a physician's time. A patient reporting for sick call with a problem requiring more time may be

requested to return for a prioritized scheduled appointment.

After sick call, from 10:30 a.m. until 4:30 p.m., there is an additional walk-in service fee. From 4:30 p.m. until 7:30 a.m. there will be a minimum flat-rate emergency room fee.

Routine shots and immunizations are given from 1:30 to 4 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday.

Anyone under age 18 must have a written consent from a legal guardian to receive care at the hospital.

history to be acknowledged and brought to a conclusion.

That effort picked up steam more than a year ago, in 1999, as the Central Identification Laboratory in Hawaii recovered 19 bodies from tiny Butaritari Island, formerly Makin Island, in Makin Atoll. The soldiers had been killed during a 1942 raid by Carlson's Raiders, the first unit to penetrate deep into Japanese territory. This past December, CILHI positively identified all 19 men and began the process of returning their remains to their families. Among the remains recovered were those of Sgt. Clyde Thomason, the first enlisted Marine awarded the Medal of Honor during World War II.

But 11 Marines from that battle are still missing. It is believed nine of them ended up on Kwajalein and were beheaded a couple of months after the Makin raid. The mathematics make it impossible to positively identify the nine Marines without physical evidence.


But neither the graves nor the bodies have been found. A team from CILHI is expected here in March on an investigative mission, according to Johnie Webb, CILHI deputy commander. Their task is a difficult one, considering the many alterations the island has undergone in the last 60 years.

"We're looking forward to it. We just hope to have some success," Webb said. The team will consist of between three and five members, with an anthropologist. A recovery team will stand ready to assist them if the investigative team is successful, Webb said.


The most popular theory places the gravesite at or near the Japanese Cemetery at the end of the runway.

Webb said researchers have been studying archives in the Washington, D.C., area and at Stanford University in preparation for the team's trip here.

In the meantime, SMDC has authorized two plaques for Kwajalein, one memorializing the Marine Raiders and the other in recognition of 332 American service

members who died in Operation Flintlock, the battle that liberated Kwajalein Atoll from Japanese hands 57 years ago this week. Miller designed both plaques and has a personal stake in seeing the dedication take place as soon as possible.

"It's been quite a ride," he said, explaining that his interest in the Makin Marines on Kwajalein began in the early 1990s. "I'm interested in it for two reasons. I grew up with a Marine ... And I'm upset that a piece of our history has been forgotten."

For several years after his interest was piqued by the mystery, nothing happened. Then, about two years ago, thanks to the persistence of the Marine Raiders Association, the project suddenly appeared at Miller's desk, he said. Since then, he's interviewed many of the Marines, some of whom participated in that remarkable raid in what is now known as the Republic of Kirabati.

"It's been a remarkable thing, getting together with these Marines," Miller said. "It's like they each had a piece of the puzzle."

Miller said the story the Marines tell of the battle is far from the typical Hollywood tale of guts and glory. He said one veteran is writing an account of the raid. "It's not going to be a pretty story."

The two bronze plaques are about 24 inches by 36 inches, each weighing about 70 pounds. They are expected to be shipped this month. However, the bases have not been made, and there hasn't been a decision where to locate either one.

"No one has determined where we're going to put them," said LuAnne Fantasia of USAKA Public Affairs. "The vets are going to take the lead on them."

Craig Seiler, American Legion Post 44 commander, said his organization has not been contacted by anyone stateside, but added the veterans would certainly get involved if asked to.

"We would be willing to participate," he said. "I think it's a good idea."

Miller suggested the Makin plaque can be placed at

in World War II.

"There just wasn't much here," he said.

He found the island different Tuesday, during his overnight visit and tour. Galbraith came to Kwajalein during a world cruise aboard the ship *Odyssey*, which made a port call in Pohnpei. With a little pre-arrangement through USAKA Public Affairs, Galbraith took the opportunity to hop a plane and see his old base.

The men and women of American Legion Post 44 were happy to host the World War II veteran at a pot-luck supper and a night of stories.

"We always enjoy it," said Craig Seiler, post president. "We owe them so much. If there's something we can do, we'll do it."

Galbraith was part of VMR 353, a Marine air transport squadron that shuttled everything from bandages to bullets to personnel throughout the Pacific islands. Many of his flights took him from Kwajalein to Eniwetok, Guam, Saipan, Okinawa and, eventually, over to Japan itself. The longest flights were from Guam to Kwaj.

"We'd get up early in the morning, and you'd be flying into a wind. We weren't going that fast to begin with," he said. "We'd get in at dusk and you wouldn't see a damn thing in between."

Galbraith's journey to the Pacific started in Missouri. Growing up in Kansas City, he remembers reading a newspaper article while in the fourth grade. The article called Randolph Airfield in San Antonio "the West Point of aviation."

"I guess I always thought about flying after that," he said.

In 1938, while attending the University of Missouri, Galbraith participated in Civilian Pilot Training, a government-sponsored program that partnered universities across the country with the federal government to expand pilot training to students. The program would pay off when war started three years later.

He graduated from MU in early 1941 and began work as a certified public accountant, but like many of his generation, Galbraith's life changed on Dec. 7, 1941.

He had returned to a fraternity get-together at Mizzou that weekend, held in honor of a former roommate who had left the university to become a Marine Corps pilot. On that fateful day, the young men were gathered at the fraternity house when the center from the football team came running across the campus with the news.

"He hopped the hedge and came into our room to tell us. Of course none of us knew where Pearl Harbor was, but he had tears running down his face, this big man with tears running down his face," Galbraith said.

The next day, back in Kansas City, Galbraith stood in his boss' office to listen to the radio as President Franklin D. Roosevelt announced the declaration of war.

With one roommate and another close friend having become Marine Corps pilots, and since he already had pilot training, Galbraith's future seemed predestined.

He began ground school at St. Mary's College, Calif., in April 1942, and went on to advanced training in Corpus Christi, Texas. He flew a

number of aircraft in a variety of assignments before joining VMR 353 in 1945. He reported to Kwajalein in January 1945.

But his unit didn't stay long — only three months. Then it was on to the next island base, Saipan where they picked up new aircraft, the faster, larger C-46.

Galbraith flew a C-46 over bombed cities Nagasaki and Tokyo, shortly after the surrender.

"It's hilly country [around Nagasaki], but even up the hill-sides you could see the destruction. It was just all rubble," he said. "Then we flew over Yokohama [near Tokyo] and it was 90 percent destruction. There's not much difference between 90 and 100 percent."

Thinking back on his wartime experience, Galbraith noted, "Everything's strange, and you're always a little apprehensive."

After the war, he worked again as a CPA. He joined Mid-Continent Airlines as a pilot for six years, before returning to accounting, and while at the airline he met his wife, Rosemary. His CPA career took the family to Bermuda, Toronto and finally, St. Petersburg, Fla., where he and Rosemary now reside in retirement. They have two daughters and four grandchildren.

Rosemary didn't join John on his overnight trip to Kwajalein, opting instead to stay aboard the cruise ship. He'll go on to Saipan, reminiscing more, before catching up with his cruise ship in Guam.

"It's amazing how the years go by," he said. "The days seem long, but they add up, and you look back and it's years later."

the Japanese Cemetery because it does not specify a location of burial. It reads, "In memory of nine United States Marine Corps Raiders beheaded by the Japanese forces near this spot on 16 October 1942 ..." He said the Operation Flintlock memorial plaque could be located in the flagpole area outside the airport terminal.

If CILHI is able to recover and identify the Marine Raiders, Miller said, "We can add a plaque to the front of [the base] with the names."

A date has not been set for the dedication ceremony. Miller said he hopes it will be as soon as possible, with a contingent of Marine Raiders invited to participate.

"Understandably, these guys are anxious," he said. "They'll tell you they're dying at a rate of 5,000 per week."

Marine Raider and former Kwaj resident Francis Hepburn said he would love to be among those invited to the ceremony. He has been very active in trying to see his comrades repatriated.

"I sure would like to get that behind us," he said.

KSC merging with Hickam club

Blowing bubbles in Hawaii is going to get a whole lot easier — and cheaper.

Ray Jones, vice president of the Kwajalein Scuba Club, sealed a deal last month that will offer reciprocal privileges between KSC members and members of the Sea Lancers Diving Club at Hickam Air Force Base.

"It's pretty exciting. It expands our opportunity to dive," Jones said. "Our goal is to allow Kwaj divers to essentially dive free."

Free is certainly enormously cheaper than the prices offered by most dive operations around Oahu, where a two-tank dive can cost upwards of \$100. That doesn't include any equipment rental charges, which can add \$20 or more to the final price tag.

Jones said the Hickam club sponsors two dive boats each month. Plus, individual members have private boats that go out on the weekends, as well. Equipment can be rented for a nominal fee.

Mike Spengel, Sea Lancers vice president, normally dives every Saturday and sails each Sunday, according to Jones, and he is willing to accommodate Kwajers.

"Every weekend he's out there with his boat," Jones said.

To dive with the Sea Lancers Club, KSC members should contact Spengel at spengelm001@hawaii.rr.com. Jones said the contact list will grow as the merger between the clubs so-

lidifies. The Hickam club's website can be found at www.aloha.net/~sealncr/. The site includes a schedule of upcoming dive boats, a link to the club's newsletter and a list of officers, e-mail addresses and phone numbers.

KSC members should soon receive temporary membership cards, which will eventually be replaced by hard plastic cards. Jones said all you need to do is flash your card in Hawaii and you'll be on a dive site.

KSC is expected to vote Feb. 14 on whether or not to, in essence, merge the clubs. Diving privileges will also be extended to the Roi-Namur Dolphins. Jones said he would visit with Dolphins President Roger Carr in the near future.

"Roi will have the same opportunities," Jones said.

Divers from Hickam are getting ready to take advantage of this new partnership in March, according to Jones. Several Hickam members are planning to dive on the March 18 dive boat, which will be a two-tank afternoon and evening boat up the reef. Price has yet to be determined.

Jones is looking for residents to sponsor the Hickam divers on island in March. If interested, contact him at 51415W or 50225H. Among the visitors will be Tim Bailes, a dive consultant to Hollywood who served as chief dive supervisor for the movie "Titanic."

Jones said Bailes will be asked to speak at the club's regular meeting in March.



Power outage scheduled for Tuesday

Starting at 8 a.m. Tuesday, some accompanied and unaccompanied housing, along with several trailers, will be without electricity for approximately 10 hours.

The outage is required so San Juan Construction can replace the transformer behind the Reef BQ.

"A larger capacity transformer is needed to provide the Reef's electrical needs," said Greg Mann, San Juan Construction Quality Control manager. Once the new transformer is in place, the Reef's air conditioning system can be installed.

The Utility Department will take advantage of the power outage to replace about 200 feet of old lead-insulated lines with rubber-insulated lines, said Kevin Ehart, RSE Utilities

manager.

"[The new lines] should help us down the road, since they are less likely to fail," Ehart said.

In addition to some accompanied and unaccompanied housing, medical trailers 617 and 625, street lights down Ocean Road and communications hut number 3 will be without power.

Even though they use the same feeder line, the hospital will maintain power on another feeder line, and the elementary school and Kwajalein Child Development Center will use generators, Mann said.

If the replacement is completed in less than the allotted 10 hours, power will be restored, and notices will be run on the crawler.

"I doubt if the outage will take nearly that long," Ehart said.
