## Scrapbook brings Kwaj history to life

When Al Gregoire met Bill Perry a year ago, the first thing Perry said to him was, "I've been waiting 55 years to meet you."

"He took me in the dining room, pulled out a wooden box and showed me an album," Gregoire recalled. The album, filled with photographs and clippings, was Perry's record of the year he spent at Kwajalein from 1945 to '46. He had been waiting to meet someone who lived at Kwajalein to show it to.

Perry was just 18 when he was first stationed at Kwajalein as a Seabee. Part of a replacement group in the 141st Battalion, he arrived four months before the Japanese surrender.

He recorded that year on the island, 55 years ago, in a photograph album-scrapbook he has donated to Kwajalein to be part of its historical records.

Gregoire's sister brought together the two men with the Kwaj connection. She had met Perry earlier in the Hampton, New Hampshire beach resort where Gregoire, his sister and Perry all had beach cottages.

She told him he "definitely had to talk to me," Gregoire said. When Gregoire saw the album, he asked Perry if he could borrow it to share with the Kwajalein community.

Several months later, it arrived by mail. With it was a note

# The Rec Fund and smoking vs. non-smoking bars on island

In a recent article regarding "Smoking vs. Non-Smoking," an island resident was quoted, if in fact a smoking restriction was implemented, "All that would happen is that Sodexho Marriott would lose a lot of money (from smoking patrons)." I must note that the losses when sales in the retail operations are down do not impact Sodexho USA (our new name, by the way) but impact you, me and everyone else as part of this community, because any and all profits from retail operations go into our Rec Fund. Sodexho certainly does not profit in any way if we have ten or one hundred patrons in our clubs or facilities. We manage the business of providing our residents and guests with the best service possible under the scrutiny of various opinions and challenges, and any and all profits, after covering costs for food, labor and miscellaneous expenses, result in a bottom line profit or loss to our Rec Fund. Our goal of course is to generate as much profit as possible in the food retail operations, which requires maximum patronage. Facilities contributing to the Rec Fund include the Yokwe Yuk fine dining, Gilligan's, Oceanview, Country Club, DSC, Three Palms and the Outrigger bar and snack

bar. Any and all profits generated from these facilities go directly into this Rec Fund and provide resources to help improve our golf courses, small boat marina, skateboard park, pools and the community, and in no way enhance profits to anyone other than to us, "the community."

On to another subject, same article, over the never-ending debate of "to smoke or not to smoke." I, being a reformed smoker, feel that I have the choice not to enter a facility knowingly and the potential is there to possibly endanger my health. But it is my choice. So the question, is it fair to have a venue for smokers who drink and to also have the same venue for drinkers (another good vice) who don't smoke, or an individual that chooses a bar venue that does not drink or smoke as their choice of an entertainment outlet? I can't answer that. Both smoking and drinking carry significant health concerns. So bottom line, it's a command decision, at least at this point, and I feel a compromise may be the solution. For all DoD-sponsored events and any and all live performances at the clubs, let them be non-smoking, and to maximize the unknown profitability factor, at least for now, let the rest of us decide.



"There is no power out here so it couldn't be used at night," Kalister said, explaining that the new subdued lighting will allow a planned evening luau, complete with hula dancers, early this fall along with other private or public events.

"This would be perfect for a wedding ... or a renewal of vows ... the possibilities are endless," she said.

The volunteer-built Japanese Gardens, which includes a fishpond and flower-be-decked trellises, is almost complete and will be a beautiful backdrop to any evening event, Kalister said.

Formerly a catering and convention director in the hotel business whose hobby was gardening, Kalister said she "had a million ideas" and goals for the gardens when they hired her in May.

"It was kind of a forgotten place," she said. "My goal is to get everything out of pots," Kalister said, pointing to a fern garden planted near the entrance and around the picnic table.

"We go down [to the gardens] and have a meal every couple of weeks," volunteer Anne Maley said. Children from the schools are also encouraged to visit, she added.

In addition to providing residents a place to enjoy a picnic, unwind or teach children about plants and nature, Kalister clarified the gardens' main roles. "To provide landscape planting for businesses or facilities only, and ... provide plants to Self-Help for residents."

Residents should not go to the gardens to get plants, Kalister said. "That is a problem we're having. I am also in the process of maintaining large potted plants ... for ceremonies or special events. Some large plants have disappeared.

"I think there are a lot of new residents on the island who don't realize this is not a free-for-all," she said, adding that 20 large pots stacked in the back of the gardens' shed also disappeared overnight.

Kalister said that she hoped people would return the plants and pots and promised there would be no questions asked.

Since the gardens grow mostly by volunteer efforts, Kalister said, there is an on-going need for both gardeners and carpenters. Soon, a white board at the front of the shed will list what needs to be done when volunteers do show up.

"It's lovely, just puttering around," Maley said. "Beryl McMaster [a former volunteer] used to do all the propagating; we desperately need someone to do [that]."

With Maley weeding and McMaster propagating the plants, they were "able to keep up with the number of plants needed at Self-Help," Maley added.

Plants are appearing at facilities on islands such as the Sunrise Bakery and the Solid Waste Management Landfill courtesy of the Public Gardens and donations from residents PCSing or just tired of their plants.

"We'll pick them up and find a home for them," Kalister said. "We just picked up a large ficus and gave it to the landfill since they are doing beautification of the landfill."

"Just because it is a landfill, it doesn't need to look like a dump," said Ed Snider, Solid Waste Management supervisor.

that Perry wanted to donate the album to Kwajalein.

Some of the black and white photographs are faded, but the picture of that time is vivid in the labeled photos, Life Magazine and newspaper articles, and even a few vintage 1945 *Hourglasses* — then called the *Hour Glass*.

“What’s great about it is that everything’s documented,” Gregoire said.

On an audiotape accompanying the album, Perry describes the photos and his life during that time. It’s evident that the year is still vivid in his memory, as well.

“When I arrived there ... I was a replacement. I was assigned to a platoon, a battalion, a company, a tent and a bunk. Would you believe that I replaced a man from my own hometown? That’s really strange, but it did happen. We were both from Arlington, Mass.”

The photos show a young man and his buddies, the barren island with Japanese

guns and equipment, many of the planes that used the airstrip — B-24s, B-17s, B-29s and others — the myriad of construction projects going on at the time on island and many of the buildings, including the chapel and Richardson Theater, looking amazingly similar to today. One picture, labeled, “Kwaj Forest,” shows five palm trees.

“Those were the original ... five trees that were on the island,” he said. “That was down by the lagoon.”

Perry worked on several projects during

that year. He worked nights at the refrigeration plant that supplied ice for the mess hall.

“Flyers used to come in from Hawaii and would come down to the refrigeration plant and say, ‘could we have a bucket of ice?’” Perry said.

“We asked them what they wanted it for and they said they wanted to ice down whiskey.

“We’d say, we’ll swap a bucket of ice for a fifth of whiskey,” Perry said, adding, “The only thing you could spend money for on the island was a pack of cigarettes, for 50 cents, and stamps.”

He also worked on construction projects, such as resurfacing the runway and another project he describes on the tape.

“I worked on this project. As you can see it looks like a foundation and it says ‘atomic

bomb ramp.’ That’s what we were told. It was for the ramp for the bomb to go into the plane.

“When the bomb parts were coming onto the island, everything came to a standstill, everything, till the parts were put into place, wherever they were storing them.”

From other sources, Perry also collected pictures of the surrender signing on the USS *Missouri*, Japanese coming to Kwajalein for war trials after the war, people on Bikini Island and soldiers going home on a troop ship.

Included is a Life Magazine article by John Dos Passos describing a trip he took through post-war Marshall Islands.

“I was in the Navy reserves,” Perry said. “That meant we didn’t have to be in any experimental tests. ... We had to volunteer to stay on

the island [after our time was up]. Most of us wanted to get back to our civilian life. I wanted to get back to school. I didn't finish high school at the time. I left to go into the Navy when I was 17 years old... We left about three days before they dropped the bomb [at Bikini]."

When he left for home, Perry said in a telephone interview, "My greatest ambition was to graduate from high school and learn to drive a car."

He explained that he didn't have a license when he came out to Kwaj, and learned to drive a truck between the asphalt plant and runway while working on the runway resurfacing. He still hadn't driven a car though, until he went home.

Perry said he did graduate from high school when he returned. He planned to go to college but was offered a job on the *Boston Globe* newspaper, where he stayed for 48 years,


ultimately working as a journeyman pressman. He retired in 1994.

Perry married a hometown girl and they have four children and nine grandchildren.

Gregoire passed the album on to long-time resident Scarlett Scholte, who is on the board of the Marshallese Cultural Center. Scholte said the plan is to archive the album and scan and reproduce the pictures for a display that the community can enjoy.

## Tilley recalls days in Nam at Black Horse service

WASHINGTON — Sgt. Maj. of the Army Jack Tilley spoke to attendees of the 11th Armored Cavalry's memorial service Aug. 4, at Fort Myer, Va.

Tilley told the crowd of over 1,200 veterans and their families in Conmy Hall of how when he visits the Vietnam Memorial, the "wall" is special because of them.

"The 11th Cav has never failed our country, but the price paid was a high one," Tilley said. "From the Philippines, where the 11th earned their first battle streamer, to Vietnam. Like you, I have my own memories. I lost half my platoon in Vietnam."

Tilley was overcome with emotion at this point. He fought back tears as he said, "Sometimes, the memories come from the face of a stranger in an airport.... someone who looks like a fallen friend and comrade. I would tell you that moments like those are entirely proper and appropriate, for it is our duty to never forget those men."

Tilley spoke afterward about his release of emotion at the memorial service.

"Those are tough memories," Tilley said. "It probably wasn't the best place to get emotional. After 30 years it's funny what you seem to remember. The ones that came up and talked to me understood. A lot of them went through

the same stuff."

Tilley had just turned 18 and finished jump training with the 173rd Airborne when he was sent to the 1st Infantry as a replacement. "We got ambushed and they swept through us," Tilley said. "We were on perimeter guard and lost half the platoon. We got about 24. It's hard to say it happened so quick."

Retired Gen. Donn Starry, a former commander of the Black Horse Regiment, talked about the regiment's founding at Fort Myer 100 years ago and the reasons for such a celebration.

The storied Black Horse went from its first battle campaign, against insurgents in the Philippines, to chase Pancho Villa in Mexico in 1916 as a part of Gen. John J. Pershing's punitive expedition. There the 2nd squadron of the 11th participated in the last mounted cavalry charge in U.S. history. The regiment served in Europe during World War II.

The Black Horse earned 14 battle streamers in Vietnam and three troopers were awarded the Medal of Honor. It was also where Col. George S. Patton III gave the regiment an order that became its battle cry, "Find the bastards and then pile on."

The 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment today serves as the Army's opposing force at the National Training Center, Fort Irwin, Calif.

Retired Lt. Col. James C. Crowley, spoke

about Tilley's speech after the service.

"It was very meaningful," Crowley said. "The thing you recall is the comradeship and what you shared with one another. It's about people. It's not about things or events. It's about people."

Eric Newton, who served with the 11th in Vietnam, before going on to a career as a builder of luxury homes in Texas, still has fond memories of his comrades.

"You could depend on them," Newton said. "If you got in trouble, they were going to come and get you and you'd do the same for them. We did a lot of operations around Saigon and up to the Cambodian border. We were doing battle with regular NVA (North Vietnamese Army). I saw a lot of destruction and I wanted to go in the other direction."

Marcia Skinner sang a stirring rendition of "The Battle Hymn of the Republic" during the ceremony and the old and young soldiers alike joined during the chorus and moved the old rafters of Conmy Hall and brought moisture to many of the old soldiers' eyes.

Chaplain Larry Haworth read the honor roll of those who passed on in the last year, or as he put it, "join those who made the wild ride in Vietnam."






