One small step

Camp makes dreams of space real

A future astronaut could come from Kwajalein as a new scholarship to send local kids to Space Camp took off this week.

The program, offered by the Space and Missile Defense Association, offers two full-ride scholarships for the week-long summer camp, including air travel to and from the camp and spending money for each student and an escort for each student.

"It's a wonderful opportunity for the children," said Dr. Linda Gentle, who serves on the association's 25-member board of directors.

Space Camp, based at the U.S. Space and Rocket Center in Huntsville, Ala., offers students the chance to participate in age-appropriate programs that focus on teamwork and confidence building, using the

vehicle space science and astronaut-style training such as simulated Space Shuttle missions and other training simulators, model rocketry and scientific experiments, according to the organization's Web site.

"We take them from the minute they walk into the red towers [at Space Camp] and embrace them with that feeling that 'We know we're going to see something in you that

All day celebration marks KMAR completion

From dawn to dusk on Wednesday, residents celebrated the completion of the Kwajalein Modernization and Remoting project.

High spirits accompanied all the day's events including an early morning Fun Run; the official cutting of a red, white and blue ribbon stretched between two mobile telemetry disks in front of Building 1010; an afternoon of horseshoes, biking and golf; and an evening family-atmosphere picnic with all the fixings provided at Emon Beach.

The day not only marked a milestone for the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll and the Reagan Test Site, but the KMAR project has far-reaching applications, said Lt. Col. Clarence Johnson, RTS commander.

"I believe the blueprint we used here can be used throughout DoD," Johnson said. "The next phase of our modernization program will be the Kwajalein Mission Control Center, the basis for command and control throughout the Pan-Pacific range."

In an effort to modernize the range and respond to a changing world, in the mid-1990s a

SeeSOR brings out the evaluator in all of us

Evaluation, or grading, is something we all live with from the day we're born.

You're four years old and your mother says, "That's a nice interpretation of the Taj Mahal, sweetie, but why aren't the Lego blocks color-coordinated? That would be better, wouldn't it?"

Then we attend school at an early age and receive grades right away. I always had a difficult time with this, and maybe I demonstrated my frustration. In fact, from grades K-4, I retired a teacher every year. In fifth grade, my teacher got married over Christmas, hooked on pills at some point and entered rehab the following summer.

Now we're all here working on a cost-plus contract where the company's financial award is based on, you got it, evaluations, but we have a new program called SeeSOR that will make it palatable for all.

Upper management attended training two weeks ago, and I enjoyed two days of the training this week along with other flunkies who didn't qualify for the upper management session.

Actor Gerald McRaney taught the class. You might remember him from such '80s classics as "Simon and Simon" and "Major Dad" and, more recently, a program called "Promised Land." He is coming



back in a couple of months, and I made him promise to go to the bar with me. So meet us there with your autograph pad, and I'll hook you up.

SeeSOR is essentially an evaluation program that uses software to monitor a series of checklists written against contract requirements. The beauty is, it's designed for the evaluator and evaluatee to get together and agree on the requirements to be evaluated.

Now my boss is Lloyd Jordan, and he's a smart man. And I'm not sucking up here. That's not to say I don't, but this is not one such case. Anyway, in order to improve our negotiating skills for writing the contract requirements checklists, Jordan has signed up his direct reports for hypnosis training. Thus, our government counterparts will be more receptive.

Here is a draft of a portion of the *Hourglass* evaluation checklist:

1. Did the *Hourglass* staff show up at the office sometimes and play on their computers? If yes, score 10.

2. If they weren't present at the office score the following:

At golf course "working on a story" – 9 (Score extra point if editor reduces his handicap during evaluation period.)

• At Emon Beach "researching the effects of sun exposure" – 8 (Deduct a point if staff member sent to hospital for third degree burns.)

• At home "examining the importance of reducing stress through sleep therapy." – 8 (Add point if staff member does not

snore.)

• Went TDY to cover major league baseball – 10. Comments: going above and beyond to "get the story."

You'll notice here the system is objective rather than subjective.

Granted, in our business, there's a certain amount of subjectivity inherent to the operation. That's the reason I can say such things as "rewrite that headline."

"But why Jim?"

"Because the word 'business' reminds me of my fifth-grade teacher. I misspelled it on a spelling test and she made me retake the test, dang it."

In any case, the new system reduces much of that subjectivity because the scores are based on mostly numerical data contrived from specific examples.

My wife, the teacher, calls such things a rubrik and she uses them to grade essays. I read one rubrik and it said:

1. Paragraphs contain topic sentences.
2. Student brought teacher apple.
3. Student remarked on teacher's "pretty" appearance.
4. Paragraph featured supporting data and conclusion statement.

In the newspaper business, we're professionals so we don't mess with that mundane stuff like grammar and spelling. Our rubriks include statements like, "1. Staff member contributed to keg fund for staff party."

Also, the new contract bases the evaluations on the outcome rather than the process. This is particularly important in our case, since our "outcome" is printed twice a week.

And that's where the hypnosis comes in again.

You're getting sleepy. Now repeat after me, "This is the best paper I've ever read. It is much better than the *New York Times* and I'm going to read it again and again."

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

Pilot lunch program targets guest students

A new program will provide Ebeye students in Kwajalein schools with lunches, compliments of KRS, according to Karen Ammann, school superintendent, who made the announcement during the School Advisory Council Wednesday night in front of a packed house in the Elementary School Music Room.

"This is one of the most exciting things that I've been able to share," Ammann said.

Previously, these students were essentially on their own for lunch. According to Ammann, many of them often forgot or were unable to bring food. The elementary school teachers and PTO frequently chipped in to provide these children with provisions, but now, they won't have to.

Beginning in May, KRS will implement a pilot program to provide all commuting Ebeye students with a daily lunch from Food Services. Specific details of the program are still in development, but if it works, the program will continue next school year.

Also still in development is a plan from KRS to offer scholarships to some KHS students from Ebeye and Kwajalein, Ammann said.

Besides lunch and scholarships, curriculum, staffing, and surveys were just a few of the items on the minds of the council and interested parents.

After copious meetings with staff, parents and advisors, a new language arts curriculum has been designed for seventh grade through senior year. The curriculum committee will present the new proposed curriculum for public review April 25, 7 p.m. in the high

member will teach primarily English, said Stephen Howell, high school principal. He said the English department is currently the most understaffed.

Ammann discussed the postponement of a scheduled visit from the accrediting body of colleges and schools, the North Central Association until after Christmas. The delay in the on-site evaluation will allow the school to use information obtained from an NCA-required parent survey that will be sent out before the end of this school year, she said.

A few parents voiced concerns about the time between the survey results and implemented changes that are deemed necessary. The council, heeding the worries, agreed to look at "Kwaj specific" comments before sending the surveys off-island for evaluation. All comments are reviewed by the SAC, but in the past have been assessed when survey results were graded off-island.

"It takes a lot of concerted effort on everyone's part," said Ammann.

A little effort on everyone's part will go a long way toward establishing a high school PTO, said Wendy Peacock, PTO elementary school president,

Ammann relieved some apprehension about the curriculum when she announced that the school would add a new Junior/Senior High School staff member this fall. The additional staff

team consisting of government, contractor and MIT and Lincoln Lab personnel came up with the "largest improvement project ever to be attempted at USAKA," said Dr. Mohamed Abouzahra, MIT site manager, to the audience at the ribbon-cutting. The range had to change the way they did business to meet customers' demands for more data that was better and returned faster, the ability to conduct experiments during missions "they wanted all of this for less money," he said.

The team's strategic vision and plan included building a consolidated space surveillance center; modernizing and remoting the KEAMS radars, telemetry assets and optical site operation and diagnostics; and automating optical sites using open system architecture, according to Dr. Linda Gentle, SMDC Test and Evaluation Center acting director. Once the strategic vision and plan was in place, funding was the next step.

"They did such a good job at presenting this vision, this KMAR potential," she said. "They said we can save \$17 million a year. The Army said, 'Hey, that's great.' And they took that \$17 million a year, up front."

When the modernization and remoting of TRADEX was completed this February, "that really marked the

completion of the KMAR update," said Tommy Atchley, RTS instrumentation engineer. "All the systems are pretty much the same so we can swap out boards when we need it."

As a user, KEAMS Radar manager Jeff Delong said KMAR met all his expectations when he applied three

tests. The first is being happy with the new equipment; secondly, after running it for a year and learning the features, being happy with the results; and third, being able to replace equipment with state-of-the-art equipment.

"KMAR has certainly passed all three tests, I'm as happy as I can be," he said.

RTS is not done yet. "So are we done?" Abouzahra said. "Not really, now we have a new challenge."

In addition to mastering KMAR's new capabilities, RTS needs to be aware of customers needs and "be proactive and be prepared to develop new and innovative ways [to support] the customers

and new programs," he said.

What we have in place has been proven, said Col. Jerry Brown, USAKA commander.

"Think about the test bed that we have established here," he said. "Our customers can bring their algorithms to RTS and test them under live fire without [disrupting] what we do here.

"In the gulf today, the Navy, the Air Force [and] Army, they are all using technology first demonstrated and tested at Reagan Test Site," he said. "KMAR will continue to make a difference."

KMAR's system engineering and open system architecture eliminates obsolescence which is something the Army has been trying to do for many years, Johnson said.

"This is the first time I have seen it work," he said, "I hope it affects the Missile Defense Agency, in particular the Army as a whole."

Atchley added, "We not just doing our own little thing. This has a ripple effect across the whole system."

Gentle summed up the speakers' thanks to the community.

"The impressive success of KMAR could not have been achieved without the dedication and the hard work from all of you here — government, contractors and scientific advisors," she said. "You put meaning to Strategic Vision," she added.

you've never seen in yourself this week," said Julie Ferris, director of education for the U.S. Space and Rocket Center, in a promotional video.

Established in 1982, the camp has served more than 300,000 students over the years and even inspired a 1987 movie by the same name.

Besides the basic Space Camp for nine- to 11-year-olds, the U.S. Space and Rocket Center hosts a variety of other programs including a Space Academy and Advanced Space Academy for kids ages 12-14 and 15-18, respectively. For adults, the center holds corporate and special group events along with adult level space camp-style weekend and week-long programs. One special program even allows parents and children, ages 7-11, to attend and participate in a simulated mission together.

A companion program, Aviation Challenge, focuses on military aircraft and offers similar sessions for a variety of age groups.

Any student who will be 11 years old on July 1 may compete for the Space Camp scholarships by entering the essay contest hosted by George Seitz Elementary

School.

"They all immediately enter our place on the same learning level because none of them know the space language," said Ferris, as if addressing the multi-lingual concerns. "It doesn't matter if they're English speaking, Spanish speaking or have a dialect or not good at speaking at all."

Students will research and write the essay during school next week, and school officials will forward them all through the command to the association. An SMDA committee will select the winners.

The SMDA is a private organization made up of government and civilian members of the space and missile defense community, Gentle said.

The selected students will attend Space Camp in Huntsville the week of June 29-July 5, along with at least eight other students sponsored by SMDA from other locations in the U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command including Ft. Greely, Alaska, Washington D.C. and Colorado Springs, to name a few.

Handicrafts start with labor-intensive

Before a Marshallese artist can craft intricate necklaces, flowers, baskets and wall hangings, *kimej* has to be made.

Kimej, pronounced "kim ach," is the laborious process of making thin, white, dried strands of fiber from the *kinik* or the inner

shoot of a palm frond. At the Marshallese Cultural Center on Monday, four Aunties and Alter Langerine, assistant at the center, demonstrated the process.

In the palm frond-covered hut in front of the museum, Wanda Joram, Ellen Jibbwa, and Henrietta Jibbwa sat on the ground surrounded by *kinik* and three containers of water.

Using a large knife, each woman made thin pieces of *kaal* or not yet boiled strips, by stripping or *kejej* which were placed in the first container of water.

"The water is to take the brown out," Langerine said. "When the water turns brown [you] have to put in the second water, then the third and then boil."

Outside the hut, Missico Langerine built a fire under a large metal pot.

Ellen Jibbwa picked a bundle of almost white *kaal* and carefully placed them in the boiling water.

"Once it is boiled for 15 minutes, then you have to separate it," Alter Langerine said, sitting down to start separating the now very white strands, now called *mat*, with Henrietta Jibbwa.

Langerine and Jibbwa tied bundles of *mat* together and hung the bundles from a tree to dry into *kimej*.

Once dry, the *kimej* is then separated again and after two or three days it can be used for weaving, he said.




