## USAKA/RTS tops SMDC quality competition

USAKA/RTS received the U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command's Chief of Staff Quality Award, Thursday, netting the command recognition for its quality programs, a \$50,000 check to go into the command's funds and important feedback for future growth.

The command beat out seven entrants, other organizations within SMDC, as judges worked April 21-May 2 to review, score and write feedback.

No first place Commanding General's Quality Award was given.

USAKA/RTS tied with SMDC Technical Center for the second place Chief of Staff award at 381 points. SMDC Battle Lab took the Merit Award for Quality and Office of Technical Integration and Interoperability received the Most-Improved Organization award.

"With regards to Army Performance Improvement Criteria, Malcolm Baldrige criteria and even SRS, the foundation is about people," said Lt. Gen. Joseph Cosumano,

SMDC commanding general. "It's about putting together an organization that motivates people, rewards people ... It all ends up with customers and the mission — customers satisfied, mission accomplished.

"We are transforming as an Army while at war, and this is not an easy thing to do," Cosumano added.

As the Army on a larger scale underwent change this past year, so has USAKA/RTS.

"This was a huge year," said Lt. Col. Brett Barraclough, director, Directorate of Plans, Training and Security, who led the team that put together the award entry. "This year, change was part of daily life at USAKA/RTS."

The command went from Vision 2015, through the change of command, to a revised USAKA/RTS vision. The new vision focused on, rather than downsizing, increasing the prominence of the range within the pan-Pacific test bed.

Meanwhile, the command changed primary contractors, underwent the protest period then entered the transition phase.

Six local quilters stitched 15 baby- and child-sized quilts — some with bright colors and two with Peter Rabbit hopping across the fabric — for tiny recipients, at risk babies and children under six who are in Hawaiian hospitals or foster care agencies.

"The ABC quilts are for children at-risk up to the age of six," said Becky Duncan as she pulled some of the quilts out of the box to show Tessie Geronimo at the Post Office before they were sent to Hawaii.

At-risk children include abandoned children or those born HIV-positive or with side-effects from their mother's alcohol or drug addiction during pregnancy.

ABC or At-risk Babies Crib Quilts is a non-profit organization founded by Ellen Ahlgren in 1988, according to April 28, 2000 *Hourglass* article. Ahlgren, with nine grandchildren who all loved the quilts she made for them, was concerned about children born with HIV/AIDs and either abandoned or orphaned and destined to live their short lives in foster care or a hospital. She organized groups of volunteer quilters across the country to make baby quilts

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# April showers bring May wind and showers, too

The old saying, "April showers bring May flowers" may be true on the mainland, but just doesn't apply in the tropics. On Kwajalein, April showers normally precede even more May showers.

The 12.14 inches of precipitation recorded in April was hard to top, as May's rainfall total ended up only slightly above normal. By the time the last few drops of rain were wrung out of a passing cloud on May 29, the island had reached 10.57 inches of precipitation, surpassing the climatological norm for May of 9.98 inches. Although it was not quite the dousing received during the month of April, it was beneficial considering Kwajalein received only 59 percent of the normal rainfall during the first three months of this year.

Interestingly, almost a third of the total rainfall received in May occurred

in a single 24-hour period, between the hours of 6 a.m. on the May 11 and 6 a.m. on the May 12. A series of squalls moved through the atoll producing the heavy rain and high winds. During one of these squalls, on the evening of the May 11, the anemometer recorded a wind gust of 51 mph, which set a new record for the month of May.

The higher than normal amount of rainfall received this May comes nowhere close to the maximum rainfall of 26.86 inches recorded back in May 1980. It is also fortunate for Kwajalein residents, that this May was nothing like the paltry 0.53 inches received in May 1984.

As far as temperatures are concerned, the island was slightly above normal. The average high temperature for the month was 86.7°F, which actually matches the normal high temperature for the month.

The average low for the month was a little balmy at 79.3°F. Kwajalein's av-

erage low temperature for May is 78.0°F, putting us slightly above normal for the month, as a whole.

On the warmest days, and there were actually five of them, the mercury topped out at 88°F. The coolest days were the May 11 and May 21, when the mercury dipped to 76°F.

The record high for the month is 91°F which occurred in 1963, and the record low is 71°F, from 1968.

This month, expect generally the same temperatures and precipitation amounts. The Pacific Climate Center, which monitors El Nino events and predicts rainfall for the Pacific Basin, states that the latest El Nino event has ended.

They forecast slightly drier than normal conditions for Kwajalein for the three-month period from April to June.

April and May's rains put Kwajalein about a half an inch above normal for the year, and so hopefully we will break their forecast of drier conditions.

## Southern Cross graces summer skies

Residents can check out the Southern Cross and other stars Saturday from dusk to 9 p.m. at Emon Beach when resident astronomer Bob Carson sets his telescope out for a public viewing.

Carson said the Southern Cross is visible due south at about 8 p.m., at about 20 degrees above the horizon. Stargazers can use a fist held at arm's length to estimate 10 degrees.

"The Southern Cross is smaller than most people expect, and has no central 'crosspiece' star, as does the Northern Cross, a.k.a. Cygnus, the Swan," Carson said. "In fact, the Southern Cross looks more like a kite than a cross, with the right most star being dimmer than the others."

Alpha and Beta Centaurii, lie to the

east, or left of the Souther Cross and point to the top star in the constellation.

The brighter, and the leftmost of the two, is Alpha Centaurii and is the closest star to the Sun.

Made up of three stars in orbit about a common center, the complex lies about 4.3 light years, or 26 trillion miles away.

"That means you are seeing Alpha Centaurii not as it is "now" but as it was in February of 1999," Carson said. "The area abounds in natural wonders visible in a small telescope or pair of binoculars - both loose clusters and giant spherical clusters of stars, dark dust clouds, and bright gas clouds."

"I know it was extremely difficult," said Col. Jerry Brown, USAKA commander. "With all the stuff going on, you were able to take on something of this magnitude."

Brown cited the pressure on the team, "to make this happen. And they rose to the occasion."

What they made was a 50-page book detailing the command's leadership structure and strategic planning, customer, human resources and marketing initiatives. The report outlined how the command measured specific performance areas and managed the process itself. And finally, the document reported business results.

"The processes allow us to turn good ideas into action plans to make the community better, and not just the community, but the way we do the mission," Barraclough said, citing specifically, "value creation."

Barraclough defined the term by describing the effort over the past year to make USAKA/RTS a more viable alternative to customers wishing to test at a range. The effort includes spotlighting the already world class sensors and making the range the center rather

## One soldier killed, five wounded in Fallujah attack

WASHINGTON — One soldier was killed and five wounded in an attack in the Baath party stronghold of Fallujah early today local time, U.S. Central Command officials said.

The soldiers were with the 3rd Armored Cavalry Regiment, 101st Airborne Division.

Officials said an unknown assailant fired a rocket-propelled grenade at the men. Names are being withheld pending notification of next of kin.

The attack occurred despite the buildup of American forces in the area. DoD officials said there are many sympathizers of Saddam Hussein's regime in the city.

On May 27, two soldiers were killed and nine wounded in another attack on an American unit in Fallujah. Soldiers killed two enemy and captured six others in that engagement.

and found homes for the quilts.

Since ABC Quilts' founding until Sept. 4, 2002, the group has delivered 466,225 quilts to the at-risk children, according to the organization's Web site: [www.abcquilts.org](http://www.abcquilts.org). In addition to the quilts, the organization is focusing on an AIDS and substance abuse prevention program designed for elementary, middle and high school students, along with information on how to make an ABC Quilt.

The quilts are for the children to keep and sometimes the children are wrapped in them for their funeral or the parents keep as a memento, Duncan said.

Making quilts for the ABC Quilt project has been a popular cause for Kwajalein quilters for many years, said Jean Culberson who made the two Peter Rabbit quilts this year.

"I've made two every year except the first year [1996] I was here," Culberson said. "When I got here the quilters group had been doing it for many years. One year they had 30 quilts."

That year was 2000 when 12 Kwajalein Kwilters made 30 quilts to send to ABC Quilts. Although the club itself is not active, individual quilters on Kwajalein still are. This year five women — Duncan, Culberson, Rita Lemmie, Gail Choquette, Christina Szczepanski and Janet Paget — made the 15 quilts.

The children's names and circumstances are confidential and each state has coordinators who deliver the quilts, Duncan said. If someone wanted to

send a quilt to a particular state they just need to get in touch with a coordinator in that state.

Sometimes a call goes out for additional quilts to meet other outreach projects, she said.

In the past quilts have been sent to orphanages in Bosnia and Rumania and last December, according to the Web site, 450 were given out at Madison Square Garden in New York to surviving children of 9/11 victims.

Duncan said the group plans next to send more quilts in May 2004 unless they receive enough to send in December this year. Anyone is welcome to help.

"Any skill level is ok," Duncan said showing the quilts to resident Wendi Gray. Children in first grade who have never sewn before to skilled quilters of all ages make the quilts. "If you get bored out here and you don't have any fabric, we have some fabric."

Gray, who happened to walk in the Post Office as Duncan packed the box of quilts, said she was interested in the project although she has never quilted before.

Anyone interested can contact Duncan, 53140, for the quilt specifications including fabric type, size of finished quilt and construction methods which are also listed on the Web site.

More quilts, each with the stamp on the back saying "ABC Quilt: Love and Comfort to You," are needed each year, Duncan said.

"In the U.S. there are a lot of children at risk," she said.

On board Krasuski's *Spare Time*, Holbach, Brown and her daughter Autumn sat next to pieces of a large plastic playhouse and below deck was a box full of office supplies donated to the Head Start program by KAISFC.

On Ebeye's pier, 11 five-year-olds waited patiently as the boxes were unloaded, but when a box filled with books was opened, the children almost dove into the box.

Many of the books had sound effects and in a few moments, the air was filled with cows mooing and ducks quacking as three of the children sat down on the pier to look at each page of their book.

"We hope to do more projects like this in the future," Brown said.

After his wife and children disembarked on Kwajalein, Maj. David Coffey said he had a reason for asking KAISFC to help out rather than taking the Host Nation's boat.

"We want the Marshallese to know that it's the individuals not just the U.S. government that is coming over and doing things," he said. "I want them to see the private individuals taking their own private boats and their own time."





The U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll (USAKA) Environmental Standards require that the operating parameters of USAKA activities, with the potential to affect the public health and environment, must be defined in a Document of Environmental Protection (DEP). The Standards further pro-
