

Kwajalein

a Diving Paradise

Sport Diver magazine rates Kwajalein Atoll number four in top wreck diving spots according to its September issue, but local divers say it is number one.

Sharon Hurst, National Association of Underwater Instructors member, said, “[Kwajalein is] a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. It is easier than any place in the world. [Kwajalein] is a premiere world-class dive site.”

“Diving is a great stress reliever,” said Maryellen Gibson, Professional Association of Diving Instructors member. “No boss, no telephone, no customers, no computer. Life is good. You can take a really bad day at work and turn it around with a nice relaxed dive.”

There are two dive-instructor organizations represented on Kwaj and Roi-Namur, the PADI and NAUI along with two dive clubs, the Kwajalein Scuba Club and The Roi-Namur Dolphins.

Hurst said they all teach basically the same way with a few minor differences. NAUI instructors give five dives before certification and PADI require four.

All dive instructors must be licensed yearly and carry

insurance.

Gibson said, “The diving on Kwajalein is some of the easiest diving you can find anywhere on the planet. It is great for novice divers, but the the variety of dives will keep the more advanced diver from getting bored.” She added, “We have shore, boat, shallow, deep, drift, wall, wreck, navigation, photography, videography, night, naturalist, shell collecting, aquarium collecting and spear fishing. Diving can encompass almost anything that your passion leads you to.”

Dive students start out in the classroom; from there they progress to the adult pool.

Hurst starts her students out in the three-foot end of the pool so they can become comfortable with the gear, buoyancy and different things that may come up in a dive.

As the student become more comfortable, she moves them to the eight-foot end of the pool so they can gain confidence and comfort.

Hurst said when the student is comfortable with all the elements she then takes them out for the open water dives.

“Getting certified is easy,” Gibson said. “For a community this size, we have an abundance of instructors and

nearly 20 percent of the total population currently dives or has been involved with diving at some time in their life. We have ten instructors [on Kwajalein] representing PADI and NAUI dive organizations. The certification class involves some bookwork, pool work and your open water dives.”

She said once a student has been certified they then must join the scuba club, Hurst said.

“It is a fun community,” Hurst said. “You make life-time buddies.”

Gibson said, “We have a great variety of corals, fishes and other sea life here on Kwajalein. Even after four years of diving here, I still find new things to marvel. I enjoy doing the same dives and revisiting my underwater friends year after year.”

The only thing Hurst requires her students to own is mask, fins, booties and snorkel. The rest of the equipment she will loan to her students for their lessons.

“During the class, your instructor will usually provide you with all necessary gear with the exception of mask and fins,” Gibson said

When a person is certified, they can then purchase their own gear through one of the KSC dive instructors.

Hurst said. “All the instructors are good. This is a very unique diving experience.”

Hurst advises with so many dive instructors on Kwaj or Roi that anyone interested in lessons should interview the potential instructor to see if their teaching techniques meet the needs of the student.

“Some instructors have organized classes where you join others as a group,” Gibson said. “Some provide private and semi-private instruction. Talk with the different instructors to find one that best matches your personality and comfort levels. Most of the instructors will do all that they can to get you certified, but we all work too and our jobs sometimes require rescheduling.”

Kwaj Scuba Shack or online at www.kwajaleinclub.com. The website also includes information about the different wrecks in the Kwajalein Atoll and how they can be found along with forms and information about joining the KSC club.

Bill Williamson is a PADI instructor and a Divers Alert Network Oxygen Provider living on Roi-Namur.

He earned his first Sea Card in 1975, and in 1990 while living on Roi, he earned his Advanced Open Water Divers card. He has logged over 700 dives.

Williamson said, "I love the water, on it or in it. Diving is like being part of a huge fish bowl. You get to join the fish in their natural habitat. If divers will slow down and watch the reef, you can learn so much. Many divers want to see how much of the reef they can see on a single dive. Doing this they swim past the details of life as a fish. After all isn't that why they learn to dive in the first place?"

Residents on Roi can become certified the same as divers on Kwaj. They can contact any of the Instructors on

island or either scuba club, according to Williamson.

Williamson said, "It is strongly recommended that anyone wishing to dive Roi contact a RND member to assure access to tanks. With only 35 members, there are many times that the tank house is not open."

He added Roi residents must belong to the RND and Kwaj residents must belong to the KSC.

Gibson added, "I'm asked often where my favorite dive location is and I always refuse to classify my diving that way. Each dive is a unique experience and no matter how disappointing a dive location might be from your expectations, you can still find something memorable about that dive."

Williamson said, "Diving Kwajalein is not only World Class, but near the top of that list. In my dive travels, Kwajalein Atoll is only matched by a couple and topped by none. My dream dive... to dive with either Humpback whales or whale sharks."

Flintlock veteran returns to Roi

As part of the large-scale NASA EQUIS II sounding rocket campaign, many Wallops employees came to Kwajalein Atoll, some for the first time, while others participated in the EQUIS campaign in 1990 from Kwajalein.

For one Computer Sciences Corporation employee, however, this trip rekindles memories from over 60 years ago.

Don Grant, a former United States Marine, returned to Roi-Namur after battling here in 1944.

On Feb. 1, 1944, Grant, an 18-year-old Solider with the 24th Marine Regiment unit, went ashore on Roi-Namur. The mission was to seize the Japanese-held group of islands in the Kwajalein Atoll, which included Roi-Namur. The Americans were successful in their attempt to gain control of the territory from Japanese forces. This battle was part of the World War II "march" from Guadalcanal to Okinawa.

Because of security requirements, Grant was not able to take pictures

or even keep a journal of his experiences on Roi-Namur. After 60 years, few memories remain.

One of the most vivid memories is of a prodigious explosion. A Japanese torpedo storage bunker exploded. Grant recalls the thunderous roar and sky that was blackened from smoke.

"It was said that nearly 24 men perished in that explosion," Grant said.

After the initial explosion, concrete and other debris began falling. Grant had to take shelter by crawling under palm trees.

Remnants of the bombed buildings stand on Roi-Namur today.


One is a memorial to Soldiers who lost their lives during these battles.

From Roi-Namur, American troops went on to various other islands in the South Pacific and ended their expedition on April 1, 1945.

Grant completed his wartime service in Aug. 1945, in Okinawa.

Grant has worked at NASA Wallops Flight Facility since November 1986. He is currently a safety analyst for CSC.

Grant returned to Roi-Namur on Aug. 6 and is providing ground safety support for EQUIS II.
