# Alcoholism leaves scars on everyone it touches

I am a wife, a mother, a grandmother and an independent thinking and acting woman, but first of all and always I am the daughter of an alcoholic.

I don't remember a time from my childhood when my mother did not have a glass of something in her hand.

When I was very young I thought it was water and that she must be very thirsty. Once I was older and could comprehend the reality of her addiction I knew she was a drunk.


What does it mean to be the child of an alcoholic?

As with all learned lessons of family, living with alcoholism affects each child differently.

I was very cooperative as a child and continued to be into young adulthood.

I tried to calm the waters, be a very good girl and fix all of the world's hurts. I grew up thinking that I must take care of others, I must put myself last, and I must make "it" all right.

My sister, a couple of years older than me, has married several times



and had many relationships almost always with alcoholics and men who show her no respect. She rationalizes her choice in men, but on some level always thinks she can make their lives better.

We didn't know from one day to the next how Mom would react; some days she was loving and fun, others angry and incomprehensible.

My mother was a beautiful woman with a spirit of kindness and love. She was talented and creative, could draw with a natural gift and her gardens grew strong and healthy.

It is too bad that she didn't have the same knack as a parent. With the bourbon, her drink of choice, flowing in her veins she was frightening, not from violence, but instead because her children never felt secure.

Each of us carries the scars in different ways, but one thing is certain: if you are the child of a drunk you are scarred.

In my early 20s I attended meetings for others like me, I learned that alcoholism is a disease; I learned that it didn't single out my family. But I didn't learn how to erase the lessons I was taught in my parents' home. A

mother has an awfully big influence on her children.

I'm big, I'm brave and I'm tough. But when it comes to booze, I'm a wimp. The stuff scares me to death. I know it's just a liquid and does not hold mystical powers, but in our family it controlled destiny.

During my experimental stage, when Annie Green Springs and Boone Farms were considered fine beverages, I drank a bit.

I was always an easy drunk, a sip or two past one glass and I was a babbling idiot. If I would go out with friends and drink more than once a month I would become paranoid, thinking I was following in my mother's footsteps.

Once, in my 30s, I drank enough to make myself so sick that I thought I'd invented it. No one could have ever been as sick as I was that night, or could ever top the heaves, shakes and headaches that followed. Since then if I get close enough to smell alcohol, my mind conveniently takes me back to a parking lot in Maryland and the flashbacks of hunching over my car bumper emptying my stomach of its contents induces me to step away from the bottle.

Between the fear and illness, alcohol will never be a contender for my time. Thankfully some part of my makeup has allowed me to break the cycle of drinking, but not the cycle of alcoholism.

I learned my parenting skills from this woman, and have passed them on to my children. I have tried to educate myself and help my children outgrow what they learned from my mother via her daughter.

Hopefully my grandchildren will be free of the disease, both physically and emotionally when they are ready to become parents.

My mother died drunk more than 15 years ago, she wasn't quite 60 and stopped living when her heart one day quit pumping.

She was bone thin; because she didn't eat she just drank.

She was a small, pathetic woman appearing years beyond her age, who couldn't see beyond her next bottle. Her skin was scarred from falling down drunk; her life was empty, her children and grandchildren had turned their backs on her.

She was all of that, but first and always, she was the daughter of an alcoholic.

# A Marshallese Day

*In order to describe what an Ebeye RMI worker experiences I was graciously allowed to follow Thompson and Caritas Tarwoj around for the day. I woke at 3 a.m. to catch the LCM to Ebeye. I walked to the DSC in a drizzling rain and during the lonely ride to Ebeye lightening flashed in the distance. Thompson met me at the docks and we took a taxi from the docks to his home where the Tarwojs went about their normal schedule of preparing for work on Kwaj.*



**5 a.m.** – I arrived at the DSC and went through the processing and metal detector. The waiting area was empty and the DSC Snack Bar was closed.

**5:20 a.m.** – I boarded the LCM for Ebeye. There was only one other person on the boat.

**5:45 a.m.** – I arrived at Ebeye and was met by Thompson. We caught a taxi to the Tarwoj's home. The streets of Ebeye were already teeming with people heading to the docks. Taxis cost 50 cents a ride.

# A walk in another man's shoes

*The following is a diary of the Tarwoj's routine preparation for work on Kwajalein.*

**6:20 a.m.** – Caritas brushed her teeth and washed up.

**6:30 a.m.** – Caritas prepared items that they take with them to Kwaj and they left for the docks.

**6:45 a.m.** – The line of RMI workers reached to the front of the Ebeye Fish Market. It was about 200 people, waiting with laundry and empty water containers.

**6:46 a.m.** – The LCM arrived on Ebeye with about five people on board. They disembarked and then the LCM started loading.

**7:15 a.m.** – The LCM arrived on Kwaj and the passengers disembarked and headed for the DSC metal detector.

**7:27 a.m.** – Thompson cleared the metal detector, but as he keyed in his number at the Access area he was denied. He had a schedule change that was not in the system. Caritas was already through the DSC checkpoint and on her way to work.

**7:30 a.m.** – Thompson was due at work and is waiting for his supervisor to fax his new schedule to the DSC; his daughters are getting up and ready for school on Ebeye where they go

to the Queen of Peace. Caritas left the girls money to buy breakfast at the school.

**8 a.m.** – Thompson's 15 and 11 year old daughters started school.

**8:15 a.m.** – Thompson finally cleared the DSC and headed for work.

**3:30 p.m.** School ends for Thompson's daughters. They headed home to work on homework.

**5 p.m.** – Thompson and Caritas boarded the loaded LCM. Heads again begin to nod as people catch a few minutes of sleep.

**5:25 p.m.** – The LCM arrived at Ebeye. Thompson and Caritas headed home to rest and wash up before evening mass.

**7 p.m.** – Catholic families headed for evening mass.

**8 p.m.** – Mass ended and the families headed back to their homes.

**8:10 p.m.** – Caritas joined other family members and prepared dinner while the children finished their homework.

**10 p.m.** – Bedtime for the Tarwoj family.




**6:10 a.m.** – Above, shower room behind Thompson's house where he brushed his teeth and washed up. There was no time for breakfast.

**6:55 a.m. – The LCM left for Kwajalein. The passengers' heads started to nod as some fell asleep while others talked, laughed and shared coffee with those who weren't able to get their morning coffee.**

# Clarifications offered to new access procedures

The USAKA Access Changes flyer that was distributed as an insert in Friday's *Hourglass* has resulted in rumors running rampant on this small island.

Maj. David Coffey, USAKA Host Nation chief, feels that most of the confusion is based on misunderstandings.

Going through the document he explained the reality of the program, which will take effect in two phases. Phase One items will change at midnight, Oct. 4 and Phase Two items are set for after the new year.

**Phase One Escorted Access list.** According to Coffey this only affects non-Marshallese citizens who live on Ebeye. "Kwajalein is still more accessible than any other DoD

[Department of Defense] installation in the world," he said.

**Overnight Visitors 480 Program.** Visitors sponsored on the 480 program cannot purchase alcohol or tobacco. This does not only pertain to Marshallese, but to anyone who is a sponsored visitor – such as a friend or family member from the States. The sponsor with the housing status is ultimately responsible for the 480 guests. Coffey said this doesn't mean that only the family member who has signed for the house (i.e., the military member or contract worker who is eligible for housing) can sponsor a 480 guest; other family members such as a spouse can sponsor a 480 guest. But, the family member who is eligible for the housing is ultimately responsible for the 480 guest. For example: if you invite your Uncle Fred over for a visit and he is ill while he is here and has to be medically evacuated from the island you are responsible for the costs, which could run in the 10s of thousands

of dollars. And finally, as this is a military installation the designated security force, in this case KPD, is authorized to verify where the guest is residing – meaning they can knock on your door and make sure Uncle Fred is staying at your house.

**C-Badge Work hours.** Coffey said, in the summer of 2001 the hours for C-Badge workers was one hour before and one hour after the work shift begins. Access was increased to three hours prior and three hours after work, but that change has had unanticipated consequences. Three hours prior to work and one hour

drinking," he added. He said, "The average worker [from Ebeye] supports 10 people." Alcohol abuse can lead to being barred from the installation and result in employment loss, which could have a catastrophic effect on the employee's family.

**DSC.** In the past it was hard to define which retail items met the limit for passage through the dock security checkpoint. The change will eliminate this confusion by not allowing any retail items, such as sodas, candy bars, unprepared foods, through the DSC. However, anything purchased beyond the DSC, such as

at the snack bar past the check point, can be taken back to Ebeye. Bakery items have been added to the prepared list category and will be allowed through the checkpoint.

**Sports program.** The changes to sports program sponsorship allow

joint sponsorship of teams between a K-Badge holder and C-Badge holder and will allow either sponsor to sign teams on or off island.

## **Phase Two**

**Overnight Lodging.** According to Coffey the decision to relax requirements for temporary billeting on Kwajalein two years ago had the unintended consequence of forcing a hotel on Ebeye into bankruptcy. To bring USAKA into compliance with anti-competition guidelines and enhanced security requirements, USAKA will soon provide overnight lodging only to temporary duty visitors with official business with USAKA or one of its tenant organizations. Visitors from Majuro who do not have official business on Kwajalein will have to stay on Ebeye or be sponsored by an island resident. This will not go into effect until 2005 so that hotels on Ebeye have the opportunity to prepare for the influx of customers. For more information on this program, call the Host Nation Office at 55033.

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after work should still provide an employee time to do laundry while eliminating the undesirable consequences. Coffey said he has heard concerns about the ferry schedule being inadequate to support these hours. "The ferry system was designed when the rule was one hour prior and one hour after work, and should be adequate still, but USAKA will monitor the situation and make ferry adjustments as needed," he said.

**Alcohol Sales.** Only K-Badged residents are authorized to purchase packaged alcohol and a K-Badge holder must accompany C-Badge holders while in drinking establishments. For example: if you have a C-Badge holder in your place of work, you may take him or her to a drinking establishment for an after work social drink but, you must stay with them while they are in the establishment. "Alcohol abuse is out of control," Coffey said. "We are trying to enable responsible social

# **Kwaj Iron Chef fought with ‘battle of eggs’**

**J**im Hart became the third Kwajalein Iron Chef, Monday, in an “Egg Battle” against last minute stand-in, Jim Muhich.

Contestants were directed to show up at 10 a.m. in front of Surfway to receive the secret ingredient and cooking would start at 11:30 a.m. at the Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High School. One of the scheduled contestants was a no-show, so Muhich stepped in even though he was originally slated to be Hart’s sous chef.

Hart and Muhich were given an additional hour to shop for food and prepare recipes for the battle.

Muhich arrived at “Kitchen Stadium” with sous chef Sarah Muhich and Hart obtained the sous chef services of Erik Garrett, who had been the sous chef to a previous Kwaj Iron Chef contestant Josh Brazeal.

Carl Overman instructed the contestants in the rules and then spun a knife to determine who would serve first. Hart won the spin and chose to serve second.

At 12:30 p.m., Overman sounded the gong, banging two cookie sheets together, and the cooking began.

Muhich immediately started his rice cooker while Sarah began crushing graham crackers.

Hart laid out an array of fresh herbs and directed Garrett to separate eggs.

Muhich said, “I should have brought my own oven,” as he tried to set the temperature to preheat the oven.

Aromas of lemon zest, fresh herbs and sautéing mushrooms filled “Kitchen Stadium” as the judges closely watched all stages of preparation and cooking.

Judging the competition were Anthony Moore, Kwaj Iron Chef Hapa, and Ryan Krogh along with guest judges, Ann Elise Peterson, consumer resource management, cooking teacher, and Jan Waddell,

Hourglass reporter.

Celeste Gainey, Kwaj Iron Chef American, the first Kwaj Iron Chef, observed cooking techniques of both contestants.

At the end of the hour, both contestants were asked if they wanted a 15-minute extension. They agreed to the additional time.

Both contestants began to plate an array of foods such as fried rice, polenta, lemon meringue pie, Tuscan style salad and sautéed spinach when they again agreed to an additional 15 minutes of cooking time. At 2 p.m., Overman banged the gong to end the cooking.

Muhich started with classic deviled eggs then served

mushroom and egg drop soup followed by “Jim’s crazy steak and shrimp fried rice.” He concluded his menu with lemon meringue pie with his specialty graham cracker crust.

Hart started his menu off with a Tuscan style salad of fresh greens topped with an egg and balsamic vinaigrette dressing. His main course consisted of mushroom and Italian sausage polenta with a boiled egg baked into the center and sautéed spinach and pine nuts.

He concluded his meal with “Debag Leona,” which is sliced pears with an egg and marsala wine style custard poured on

top. The judges scored the contestant on presentation, overall taste and flavor and originality.

Hart won the competition with a score of 67.76.

Hart said he wanted to be known as Kwaj Iron Chef Mediterranean.

The next Kwaj Iron Chef competition will determine the fourth and final Kwaj Iron Chef. Then members of the Kwajalein and Roi communities will be able to challenge one of the four Kwaj Iron Chefs to a cooking battle.





According to Maxfield, one task assigned to the crew from NASA's Wallops Flight Facility was to begin site preparations in the Speedball Compound, which required disassembly of the USAKA/RTS 20K AML launcher. Stated Maxfield, "Their valuable advice and expert operation of the lifting equipment was invaluable during this disassembly. Their outstanding support allowed us to complete a more thorough servicing of the launcher than we had anticipated."






