Something new and wonderful at Roi—roads without potholes

Long-awaited Roi road-paving project is completed

Roi-Namur has just lost one of its bragging rights. Until recently, it was a challenge to complete the obstacle course of potholes when riding a bike around the island. When it rained, one never knew whether the next step would be ankle deep or knee deep in water.

However, the roads no longer hold any surprises since the completion of road paving, June 11.

Preparations for the project began in January, when barrels of tar and mountains of aggregate were barged to Roi, and an ALmix mobile asphalt plant was installed, which can produce 60 tons of asphalt an hour.

Wes Manson, ALmix representative, was in charge of installation, calibrations, and set-up for production.

When the asphalt plant was ready to produce, James Chong-Gum, Raytheon KLS senior plant operator, took over. Elmer Camden, Roi Facilities field engineer, assisted with technical

problems.

With the plant operating 12 hours a day, Chong-Gum was ready when the six paving subcontractors from Hawaiian Rock Products, Guam, arrived April 26.

"We did compaction tests and patched the road in preparation for paving," said placement crew supervisor Ben Mamhot.

One front-end loader put different sizes of coral into cold bins for mixture at the asphalt plant. Another removed debris in areas being prepped for paving.

"We were able to screen and use a lot of local material such as coral and sand," said project manager Doug Vander Veen.

KLS employees provided batching of the hot mix asphalt, distribution to the spreader, prep work, and traffic control. Hawaiian Rock Products personnel laid down the asphalt. Bear Kapahu, FOM Heavy Equipment superintendent at Kwajalein, gave behind-the-scenes support by providing equipment, materials, and labor as necessary. Phillip Smith, supervisor, Roi Automotive, maintained the equipment and kept it running to complete the project.

Smith credited the cooperation of island residents and work centers for making it possible to complete paving ahead of schedule.

Vander Veen said the project had a valuable side benefit. "Subcontractors provided valuable training for KLS employees that will enable them to take on future paving projects," he said.

Paving was performed in two shifts between 4:30 a.m. and 8 p.m., to place an average of 320 tons of asphalt per day.


"We had great weather," said Vander Veen, "El Niño allowed us to pave every day."

Each function of the plant plays a part in the production of asphalt, Manson explained.

First, the tar goes into a storage

tank, where the temperature is kept at 300 degrees Fahrenheit, and the tar is liquified into asphalt oil.

Specified amounts of fine, intermediate, and coarse coral are fed onto a conveyor belt that unloads it into a dryer. As the dryer turns, the aggregate is dried and heated by a large diesel-fuel burner. Then it goes to a mixing drum, where asphalt oil is added before the final product is carried up another conveyor belt to the top of the silo.

A load-scale sensor on the conveyor belt weighs the aggregate and sends the information to a computer, which does complicated calculations to ensure that the desired mix is produced.

When a 40-ton truck pulls under the silo, enough hot asphalt-aggregate mixture is released to fill it, and the truck drives the product to a work site. There, a conveyor belt in the truck transfers the mix to a spreader, which distributes it uniformly for grade and slope to make a flat mat on the road.

Finally, rakers remove large ag-

gregate so a static roller can smooth the asphalt to a finish. The roller consists of a steel drum and a tank of water. The water keeps the drum lubricated so the asphalt doesn't stick to it.

Safety was a major concern during all aspects of the project. Employees and subcontractors were required to wear personal protective gear such as boots, dust masks, and safety glasses.

Special emphasis was placed on the safety of members of the public passing through the construction area, due to the danger inherent in hot asphalt being poured.

An extensive maintenance program to preserve Roi roads is in the works by Facilities Engineering. Already residents are enjoying the final product.

Cent Jokane, Roi Automotive bus

driver, described the paving as smooth and beautiful and said it will prevent accidents and help him take better care of his bus.

"Roi Automotive will reap big dividends in decrease in wear and tear on vehicles and equipment," said Smith. "To all those who worked so hard to make the paving a success, we say, 'job well done!'"

Kwaj residents can look forward to a similar project in FY00.

- 1/2 container poppy seeds

Mix ingredients until smooth. Bake in a greased 9 x 13-inch pan at 350 degrees for 45-50 minutes.

- 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- 4 medium onions, sliced

Place beef ribs in a shallow glass dish. Mix mustard, sugar, lemon juice, salt, pepper, and garlic; spread over the beef. Top with onions. Cover and refrigerate, turning beef occasionally, for 24 hours. Ribs are ready for barbecue, or cover and bake at 350 degrees in oven until beef is tender.

- 4 cups water
- 1 pound asparagus, cut diagonally
- 2 tablespoons soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons sesame seed oil
- 1/4 teaspoon sugar
- 1 clove garlic, chopped fine





Understanding the government of the Republic of the Marshall Islands

Editor's note: *The following explanation of how the government of the Republic of the Marshall Islands operates is excerpted from a speech made at Kwajalein nearly 20 years ago by Lawrence N. Edwards, when he was the representative of the chief secretary of the Marshall Islands to Kwajalein Atoll.*



Neijon and Larry Edwards

A native of Aur Atoll, Edwards has served the RMI government in many capacities, including vice speaker of the Nitijela

(legislature), 1967-75; government representative to Kwajalein Atoll, 1973-83; ambassador to Fiji, 1988-91; ambassador to the Peoples' Republic of China, 1992-94; and ambassador to the United Nations, 1994-98.

Now retired from government service, Edwards lives at Majuro with his wife, Neijon.

Part I

The government of the Marshall Islands is a parliamentary system, not much different from other governmental systems of that kind.

We have a president who is the highest official. He is the head of government, and his title is equivalent to prime minister.

We also have a speaker and vice speaker of the *Nitijela*, the legislative body of the government.

Constitution

The majority of voters in the Marshall Islands ratified the Marshall Islands Constitution in March 1979. The constitution was officially recognized as functioning on May 1, 1979, when the elected members of the *Nitijela* took their oaths of office.

The constitution is the supreme law of the Marshall Islands, and all judges and other public officials are bound by it. No decision of any court or other government agency made on or after the effective date of the constitution can have the force of

law in the Marshall Islands unless it has been made pursuant to the constitution.

The constitution of the Marshall Islands provides that every person has the right to freedom of thought, conscience, and belief; freedom of speech; the free exercise of religion; freedom of peaceful assembly and association; freedom to petition the government for redress of grievances, and so on.

Council of Iroij

Within the government of the Marshall Islands, there is a Council of *Iroij* (Chiefs), which consists of five eligible persons from the Ralik (Sunset or Western) chain and seven eligible persons from the Ratak (Sunrise or Eastern) chain of the Marshall Islands.

If, in any district or group, a person becomes recognized (pursuant to the customary law or to any traditional practice) as having rights and obligations analogous to those of *iroij*

laplap (high chief), that person or a member of that group, nominated by the group, shall be deemed eligible to be a member of the Council of *Iroij* as though he were an *iroij laplap*.

This council may consider any matter of concern to the Marshall Islands and express its opinion thereon to the Cabinet.

The council also can request the reconsideration of any bill affecting customary law, traditional practice, land tenure, or any related matter, which has been adopted on third reading by the *Nitijela*.

The Council of *Iroij* has a chairman and vice chairman. The council meets in regular session during any period when the *Nitijela* is meeting in regular or special session. The council can also meet in special session at any other time fixed by the chairman of the council, or by the clerk of the council acting at the request of not less than nine members.

Preamble to the Constitution of the Republic of the Marshall Islands

We, the people of the Marshall Islands, trusting in God, the giver of our life, liberty, identity, and our inherent rights, do hereby exercise these rights and establish for ourselves and generations to come this Constitution, setting forth the legitimate legal framework for the governance of the Marshall Islands.

We have reason to be proud of our forefathers, who boldly ventured across the unknown waters of the vast Pacific Ocean many centuries ago, ably responding to the constant challenges of maintaining a bare existence on these tiny islands, in their noble quest to build their own distinctive society.

This society has survived, and has withstood the test of time, the impact of other cultures, the devastation of war, and the high price paid for the purpose of international peace and security.

All we have and are today as a people, we have received as a sacred heritage, which we pledge ourselves to safeguard and maintain, valuing nothing more dearly than our rightful home on these islands.

With this Constitution, we affirm our desire and right to live in peace and harmony, subscribing to the principles of democracy, sharing the aspirations of all other peoples for a free and peaceful world, and striving to do all we can to assist in achieving this goal.

We extend to other peoples what we profoundly seek from them: peace, friendship, mutual understanding, and respect for our individual idealism and our common humanity.

Cal Lab measures up for fifth 'Outstanding'

The staff at the Calibration Lab continue to top Army expectations. The lab scored its fifth "Outstanding" in as many inspections over the past 10 years.

The lab is evaluated every two years by the Army's Test Measurement and Diagnostic Equipment organization, based in Huntsville, Ala. Inspectors judge on standards set by the U.S. Army's Quality Control Program.

Possible scores range from "Outstanding," which indicates no deficiencies, to "Unacceptable," meaning the lab has 90 days to fix its

problems.

"You've come a long way in the last 10 years," said Terry Brown, chief of KMR Instrumentation.

"And once you reach the 'Outstanding' level, you compete with yourself to improve," added Paul Hester, TMDE support coordinator.

The lab is responsible for the accuracy of measurement devices at USAKA/KMR, including everything from the scales at Surfway to fuel pumps and tools at Automotive to the analyzers used on high frequency radars at KREMS.
