## North Carolina National Guard unit works project on Enniburr

Members of the 505th Engineer Battalion of the North Carolina Army National Guard have adopted the school and clinic on Enniburr (Third Island) as their annual training project. Renovation and repair work on the two buildings started recently and is expected to be completed by the end of July.

"The entire battalion has had lots of experience in engineer construction projects throughout the world in such countries as Italy, Honduras, Ecuador, and Panama," said 1st Lt. Christopher M. Hill, who handled logistical support furnished by USAKA/KMR.

1st Sgt. George Crosswhite and 1st Lt. Joseph Hough have been assigned to Roi-Namur for the summer, coordinating billeting and supplies for the construction units. Steve Johnson, RSE project manager, is in charge of quality assurance, ensuring that all standards are maintained.

Food, water, fuel for generators,

and needed materials are being transported daily from Roi-Namur to Enniburr by an LCM ferry. A forklift, fuel, and troop transportation to the marina are being provided by the Automotive Department.

"In my 15 years of service, this has been the most pleasurable annual training I've participated in," said 1st Lt. James L. Knuutila. "We have received full support."

Knuutila commanded the first of three platoons and a small detachment to arrive on Enniburr, beginning work on the island June 12. A new platoon, with around 30 members each, has rotated in every two weeks.

Knuutila's platoon, with members from North Wilkesboro and Taylors-

ville, N.C., replaced damaged parts in the ceilings of the school and clinic and installed new doors in both buildings. After rebuilding a classroom divider at the school, they focused on the clinic, where they refurbished the concrete masonry structure and put in electrical wiring for future use. The unit chose plywood for interior walls because it holds up better than sheet rock, which tends to buckle under moisture. The platoon also installed some new windows in the clinic.

The second rotation arrived June



## Former legal officer returns as USAKA/KMR command judge advocate

Maj. William McQuade has returned to the USAKA/KMR Legal Office as the command judge advocate three years to the month after he completed a 1993-96 tour as USAKA/KMR legal officer.

In the years he was away, he earned a master's degree in aerospace engineering from the University of Alabama at Huntsville; was stationed at Ft. Leavenworth, Kan.; and then deployed to Bosnia for 10 months as the claims officer to the NATO Stabilization Force.

The Legal Office at USAKA/KMR has gone through many changes recently. Two command judge advocates and three legal officers have come and gone since McQuade last served here. It has been common at USAKA/KMR for both Army attorneys in the Legal Office to arrive within a few weeks of each other and move to other assignments at about the same time.

This has been a disadvantage to the command, which deals with complex, long-term legal issues.

### Civilian attorney as legal officer

To mitigate this problem, it has been decided that the USAKA/KMR legal officer will be a civilian attorney. The hope is that he or she will remain for several years, providing a source of institutional memory and gaining a growing knowledge of the ongoing issues and major players.

The first person to fill this spot has been selected. He is Kent Duncan, who will arrive at the end of the month. In addition to Duncan, the Legal Office staff includes paralegal Nelda Reynolds, secretary Pat Lockridge, and summer hire Sue Mayo.

### Serving the community at no charge

McQuade is enthusiastic as he discusses the ways in which the Legal Office serves the community, all at no charge to the client.

For active duty military, military retirees, reservists on active duty, government civilians, and family members of all these, the Legal Office provides full legal assistance. Among other services, this includes providing legal counsel, notary services, tax assistance, and help getting passports; drawing up wills and powers of attor-

ney; and writing letters to creditors.

For contractors and their family members, the local command obtained an exception to the Army regulation that prohibits assistance for civilians with no ties to the military. Here, the Legal Office can provide legal advice, offer notary and power of attorney services, and forward applications for passports and social security.

Because the Legal Office cannot offer tax assistance to contractors, McQuade brought the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program to Kwaj on his earlier tour. He is pleased to find that VITA is still going strong. Coordinated by the Legal Office, the VITA program provides training for local volunteers to help taxpayers at Kwajalein and Roi-Namur.

### U.S. magistrate court

Finally, the Legal Office works with the U.S. magistrate court at Kwajalein, the only such court outside the United States and its territories. The Legal Office is also involved with adverse administrative actions, administrative bars, and the Juvenile Review Board.

### Legal advisor to the command

In addition to overseeing these programs for the community, the command judge advocate advises the command on a full range of issues, including, for example, contract law, administrative law, environmental law, and international law.

McQuade arrived at Kwajalein June 24 with his younger daughter, Emily, 8. His wife, Caroline, will arrive Aug. 23, after she gets older daughter, Virginia, settled at the University of South Alabama at Mobile. Virginia will visit at Christmas.

Happy to be back at one of his favorite duty stations, McQuade obviously relishes the Kwaj life style. With his master's degree added to a list that includes a bachelor of arts degree in

**Endangered species**

Continental Airlines planes with the "Continental Micronesia" logo are rare birds these days, and soon they will be extinct. After more than 30 years of bearing the "Continental Air Micronesia" and "Continental Micronesia" logos, the fleet will now be emblazoned "Continental" or "Continental Airlines." The company hopes for a less parochial, more international, flavor, as business booms in Japan and other parts of Asia, according to a recent editorial in its corporate newsletter, *Visions*. There are no plans to discontinue service to Micronesia.

In 1968, Continental Air Micronesia, which became known affectionately as Air Mike, brought the first commercial passenger service to Micronesia. Kwajand Roi residents could fly to see the wonders they had read about: the rock islands of Palau, the stone money of Yap, and the high islands of Truk (now Chuuk) Lagoon, with Guam and Saipan thrown in. There was no airstrip at Ponape (now Pohnpei), but passengers could get there by flying on to Truk and taking a small seaplane back to Ponape. A ticket to Ponape was called the biggest travel bargain in the Pacific.

**Bike parts maker penalized for alleged violation of safety act**

Owners of Shimano bicycle parts should check their bicycle cranks.

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) announced recently that Shimano American Corp., of Irvine, Calif., has agreed to pay a civil penalty of \$150,000 to settle allegations that it violated the Consumer Product Safety Act by failing to report in a timely manner a defect with its FC-CT90, FC-M290, and FC-MC12 bicycle cranks.

CPSC alleges that Shimano failed to report that these three models of

bike cranks, which are incorporated into 49 brands of bicycles, could break suddenly. The crank connects the pedal to the bike frame. If the crank breaks, the rider's leg can be injured by contact with the broken crank, or the rider can lose control, fall, and be injured.

CPSC alleges that Shimano knew of cranks breaking, resulting in 22 injuries, before it reported to CPSC. In agreeing to settle the matter, Shimano denies the bike cranks were defective. Shimano also denies it violated reporting requirements.
