


NASA Sporadic E Electro Dynamics (SEED)

Around the 13 June – 4 July timeframe NASA will be conducting a launch of NASA Sporadic E Electro Dynamics (SEED) and will consist of two individually launched sounding rockets with several days in between. Planned impact is north of Kwajalein Atoll in the Broad Ocean Area (BOA).

The Mid-Atoll Corridor WILL be open during this timeframe.

If traveling in the area during this time frame, avoid the indicated areas during the testing window.



In the event of a missile failure there is an unlikely probability that debris may fall on populated and unpopulated land masses in the Republic of the Marshall Islands. As an immediate precautionary measure, local population should stay 150 feet away from any mission debris and report the location of the debris to the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll.





May was a whirlwind of activity for the Kwajalein Senior High Class of 2025 and their families. From making final decisions about life after graduation to welcoming loved ones to the island they call home, the month was filled with meaningful milestones. As their time on Kwajalein comes to a close, students embraced a series of end-of-year experiences that marked the culmination of their high school journey.

The graduation festivities began with the Baccalaureate ceremony at the Kwajalein Chapel. This reflective event honors the personal and academic journeys of the graduating seniors.

As each student walked down the chapel aisle, a video montage played, featuring childhood photos and recorded messages from the graduates, each offering heartfelt thanks to the family, friends, and mentors who supported them along the way.

Following the processional, local national Lobo Arelong-who has worked with Child and Youth Services for the past seven years and supported this year's Marshallese Culture class—took the stage to share insights and traditions from Marshallese culture, further strengthening the bonds he built with students throughout the school year.

Next, the senior class honored their mothers with a small, meaningful gift in recognition of their love and support. Kwajalein High School teacher Mallory King then addressed the students with a message of encouragement and reflection.

The ceremony concluded with a final blessing from Chaplain Mike Klein. As the service came to a close, a touching processional montage set to You'll Be in My Heart played, featuring voiceovers from parents offering messages of love, pride, and congratulations to their graduates.

The Class of 2025 is one of the largest groups of graduating seniors Kwajalein has seen in recent years, with 23

students receiving diplomas. Some members of the class have called Kwajalein home since kindergarten, while others joined the community more recently-but regardless of how long they've been here, each student was celebrated.

As part of the ceremony, the class performed a traditional Marshallese dance before remarks were delivered by Kwajalein High School Principal Dr. Matt Gerber. The ceremony concluded with each graduate receiving their diploma from U.S. Army Garrison Commander Col. Andrew Morgan, accompanied by Command Sergeant Major Ernest Miller.

A fun tradition for many is following the ceremony when

the class goes to the courtyard where family and friends present leis to graduates after the ceremony, often layering several leis around their necks. Leis are a symbol to celebrate achievement, honor the graduate's hard work, and show love, pride, and support.

Graduation wasn't the final celebration for the Class of 2025. The festivities continued with the annual Kwajalein Graduation Party, held the Sunday after commencement at Emon Beach. Hosted by the senior parents, the event is considered one of the biggest parties of the year on Kwajalein.

Guests enjoyed festive decorations, a live band, a fully stocked bar, and a gift table where friends and family could share notes and tokens of congratulations with the graduates. Despite delays in the arrival of some pre-ordered decorations due to mail issues, senior parents improvised beautifully—getting creative with locally sourced palm fronds to set the scene.

The potluck-style meal featured a generous island spread, including two roasted pigs, an local favorites: pancit, lumpia, rice, chicken, and sushi lovingly prepared by families and friends. The celebration carried on well into the night, marking a joyful end to the graduates' high school journey.

Now, the seniors are spending their final weeks on Kwajalein soaking in the moments and places they'll miss as they prepare to return to the mainland for the next chapter of their lives.

We wish the Class of 2025 the best of luck as they embark on this new journey. Whether they've called Kwajalein home for years or just a short time, we hope they carry fond memories of our island community wherever their paths may lead. Y





The U.S. Department of the Navy (Navy) prepared a Final Environmental Assessment / Overseas Environmental Assessment (EA/OEA) to evaluate the potential environmental impacts of conducting missile flight tests in both Atlantic and Pacific Ocean regions. Testing would involve flight tests from sea-based launch locations, vehicle flight over the ocean, splashdown of boosters in the ocean, and payload impact either in broad ocean areas or on land at a U.S. Army test site at Kwajalein Atoll in the Republic of the Marshall Islands. Based on the analysis presented in the EA/OEA, the Navy has concluded that implementation of the Proposed Action will not significantly impact the quality of the human and natural environment and will not significantly harm the environment of the global commons (high seas). Accordingly, there is no requirement to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement or Overseas Environmental Impact Statement, and the Navy has completed a Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) / Finding of No Significant Harm (FONSH) for Navy Conventional Prompt Strike Weapon System Flight Tests.



- 2. Attend the Island Newcomer's Briefing.
- 3. Attend at least one group greeting at air terminal for personnel arriving on island. Make them feel welcome and show them we are happy they are on Kwaj with us.
- 4. Attend at least two garrison after-hours team-building or social events (TEAM KWAJ Happy Hour, Commander's Call, Hail/Farewell).
- 5. Attend at least two TEAM KWAJ PT/Wellness sessions. Become a regular attender!
- 6. Visit Marshallese Cultural Center in last 3 months prior to tab award.
- 7. Visit Ebeye, Third island or Majuro in last 3 months prior to tab, use a Marshallese phrase or two and visit a store/restaurant.
- 8. Tell three co-workers how to earn the TEAM KWAJ tab.

- 9. Swim, snorkel, boat or paddle on the lagoon at least once with a teammate.
- 10. Complete the TEAM KWAJ Circle-island 6-mile ruck march/walk/bike and read all historic battlefield markers. This is an organized USAG-KA hosted event several times per year.
- 11. Mission Partner wild card event—discuss with your supervisor any additional organizational requirement. Could be knowledge-based, achievement-based, or physical challenge.
- 12. Final event, "Board of Review" -- meet with Col. Morgan face-to-face individually or in a small group with all requirements fulfilled. Schedule with garrison front office. Discussion items may include but are not limited to; TEAM KWAJ pact "Healthy Community of Excellence," Kwaj history, Marshallese culture, military/strategic missions and their significance, and future operational potential.



TRASH & RECYCLING PICKUP SCHEDULE

The Green Residential TRASH receptacles are collected every Tuesday and Friday.

The blue RECYCLE bins are also collected every Tuesday and Friday.

The large black General Solid Waste Community Containers are emptied on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Saturday.

Safety First! Please keep any curious children away from the Compactor Truck as it feeds contents into the truck.

Recyclable materials are also collected by both solid waste and horizontal maintenance personnel, in conjunction with general trash collection. Currently the island only recycles glass, aluminum, metal, and bulk organic materials. Cardboard and plastics are not recycled materials on Kwajalein. These items should be placed into the general trash stream for disposal/incineration.

COMMUNITY MAN OF MANY HATS | CW3 ARROYO

HOURGLASS REPORT

Despite CW₃ Arroyo's impressive stand-up comedy hobby, what many on the island know him for is his homemade salsa. "I was stationed in Germany back in 2015," he said, with a thoughtful raise of his brow as he looked back into the past. "A buddy of mine made some salsa for a customer, and he showed me how to make it, too."

The USAG-KA Food Service Advisor on Kwajalein, CW₃ Arroyo went on to describe his years of careful tweaks on the original recipe, until he made it his own. It's this personality trait that can

be considered the lynch-pin connecting the salsa to standup comedy, as CW3 Arroyo also tweaks his jokes regularly to get them perfected. Warming to his subject, he would let a bit of excitement escape from behind his eyes as he described details of his process in making the salsa.

"...and a pinch of salt near the end to cut the acid from the tomato. You have to balance the ingredients to enable maximum enjoyment of the opposite flavor." No longer satisfied to merely talk about it, CW₃ Arroyo called his wife, who kindly brought over a sample of the salsa and a bag of chips, so this interviewer could enjoy the full experience. I was suitably impressed with the combination of loving-care, skillin-techniques and careful blend of mutlilayered spices. Admittedly, I would end up regretting this last later on, as I've found my now middle-aged tummy is no longer as adventurous as it once was, but the famous salsa sure was delicious. I vocalized as much, and CW3 Arroya beamed with a quiet pride.

"I'm the youngest of six on my mom's side of the family. My sister and cousins learned that if they complimented



me, I would enthusiastically make them whatever they wanted. 'Silv, you make the BEST ramen!' 'Chivo, you make the BEST Kool-Aid!" Without any kind of formal cooking training, the young CW3 Arroyo would use his experimentation-based tricks to put his own spin on his household's favorites. This would carry over into his military career, as any cooking he would do would often draw a crowd of the lower enlisted. "They would come watch me and at first I would get annoved as an NCO because, 'You are not working!' But they would say, 'No, no! I finished what I was doing, I just had to come watch."

With several salsa variants he's actually known for at his command, CW3 Arroyo was kind enough to share one with our Hourglass readers. "This was my first time writing down this recipe. I usually make it off vibes."

Roasted Salsa Ingredients

- 4 roma tomatoes
- 2 jalapeno peppers
- 3 serrano peppers
- 1 poblano pepper ½ yellow onion
- 2 T granulated chicken

bouillon
Salt to taste
Pinch of sugar

Equipment Stockpot or Saucepot Grill or air fryer Blender

Char tomatoes and peppers over hot coals. Wrap onion in aluminum foil drizzle lightly with oil and salt. Put onion directly on the coals and let it roast for 15-20 minutes. Loosely wrap garlic in aluminum foil drizzle with oil and salt. Keep a finger width opening on top of foil to help regulate heat in the foil pouch.

If you don't have a grill, you can char the veg in an air fryer or under a broiler. It won't be

as flavorful.

Peel the skin off the poblano pepper. Allow the poblano peppers to cool in a covered bowl or Ziploc bag. This will make the poblanos sweat as they cool making it easier to peel the skin. Poblano peppers have tough waxy skin leaving it on can give the salsa a gritty texture.

Once everything is nicely charred and the poblanos are peeled, add it to a stock pot and roughly smash the veggies. Add enough water to almost cover the veggies and add granulated chicken bouillon. Simmer on low for 20 minutes to soften veggies and flavors to come together.


Throw everything into a blender and blend on high until smooth. Be careful not to over-fill the blender and keep lid center cap slightly open to allow the build up of steam to escape. If not, the lid could pop off and spicy juice will go everywhere. lol

Add a pinch sugar, this will help balance the acidity from the tomatoes and pepper which will contribute to a more flavorful salsa. Taste and add salt as needed. \(\)

WEEKLY TROPICAL WEATHER THREAT OUTLOOK

RTS WEATHER STATION STAFF

Discussion:

At this point in May, we have recorded 4.08 inches of rain, which is 1.89 inches below normal for the month. So far in 2025, we have only received 12.59 inches of precipitation, 10.46 inches below normal for the year. The drought situation for the RMI remains a mixed bag now. Conditions are worse in the Ratak Chain, but improved for Kwajalein Atoll for now from Severe Drought D2 to Moderate Drought D1 on a scale of D1-D4 for Kwajalein Atoll. The overall rainfall deficit trend for our part of the Pacific is improving, as we enter June. Showers coverage will be elevated for the next seven days for the atoll. We are looking at a bump on Friday night into Saturday morning along with the risk of a thunderstorm with a more significant increase on the 2nd and 3rd along with the lightning risk. No thunderstorm days occurred over the past seven days. A thunderstorm day is defined as an "in situ" lightning strike within five miles of the weath-

er station. The Madden/ Julian Oscillation (MJO) remains incoherent with rather lack-luster eastward progression, but is currently in a mild positive phase, which gives an advantage to increased shower coverage for the RMI through the rest of May. The El Nino Southern Oscillation (ENSO) has now transitioned to ENSO-neutral conditions. With the end of La Nina, the transition to ENSO-neutral favors increased shower coverage, as we also move into the rainy season. Sea surface temperatures (SST) in the central Pacific between the RMI and the Date Line are now at about normal. Besides increased rainfall, these warming near normal SSTs tend to favor tropical cyclone development, but the RMI is not currently in its climatological tropical cyclone season, thus little threat is expected for the rest of May.

Tropical Cyclones:

No significant tropical cyclone activity expected to affect anywhere in Micronesia, the Mariana Islands, Wake Island or Hawai'i. We are almost in climatological spring

for the northwest Pacific. As we move deeper into the summer season for our hemisphere, we will see the risk of tropical cyclone activity increase.

<u>Damaging West Winds /</u> <u>Westerly Swell</u>:

None expected. Micronesia is northeast trade wind dominant.


Swell / Tide Inundation for Kwajalein Atoll and Wake Island:

The waxing half-moon will occur on the 3rd. With that, comes neap high tides under four feet until the 9th. Winds will remain out of the ENE in the middle to upper teens for the rest of tomorrow and today, settling into the lower to middle teens on Saturday and Sunday with a minimum in the upper single digits to low teens on Monday. Gusty outflow winds will be possible Friday night into Saturday morning and again on the 2nd and 3rd at this time near heavy showers or a thunderstorm, leading to a possible short lived Small Craft Advisory (SCA) on the open lagoon. High Surf Advisory (HSA) conditions are not expected for the next seven days.

This weekly Purpose: briefing is delivered Thursday mornings to island leadership. The intention of this briefing is to provide situational awareness of weather events that may interrupt operations and transportation around Kwajalein, to/ from Hawaii and Guam, and in the Wake vicinity. The main threat assessed in this brief is existing and potential development of tropical cyclone activity. This brief also provides an outlook of abnormal winds, sea state, and precipitation guidance for next 7 days around the Kwajalein Atoll. The distribution list will also receive updates on any developing tropical cyclone activity in the Kwajalein region that occur between the weekly outlook product.

WEATHER DIS-CUSSION

Somewhat active weather can be expected across Kwajalein Atoll as we head into the weekend. A weak trade wind trough will spark showery weather Saturday night into Sunday, clearing the area by Sunday afternoon. The Inter-Tropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) will send an atmospheric wave through the south-central RMI Monday into Tuesday, causing an increase in showers and thunderstorm risk as well. The bulk of precipitation associated with these disturbances will likely be confined to the overnight and morning time frames through the weekend. A change in the relatively wet pattern can be expected by the start of the workweek later on Tuesday as the ITCZ breaks down and recedes east of the date line, leading to drier weather through at least the middle part of the workweek. Winds will consistently be in the low-mid teens through midweek, generally out of a northeast to easterly direction as high pressure becomes the dominant weather feature over the RMI.

SATURDAY

Partly to mostly cloudy with isolated showers and a possible stray thunderstorm early, decreasing to stray showers by noon. Winds NE-E at 10-15 knots with higher gusts near showers.

SUNDAY

Partly sunny with stray showers. Winds will be NE-E at 10-15 knots with higher gusts near showers.

MONDAY

Mostly cloudy with isolated to widely scattered showers and stray thunderstorms. Winds NE-E at 10-15 knots with higher gusts near heavier showers.

NEXT WEEK

Relatively dry conditions with only stray shower chances through mid-week. Shower activity expected to pick back up late-week as the ITCZ makes its return to the RMI. Winds are expected to remain in the low to mid-teens out of the east-northeast. \(\mathbb{Y} \)
