USAG-KA CELEBRATES 248TH BIRTHDAY OF U.S. MARINE CORPS

HOURLASS REPORT

Friends, Veterans and diners at the Capt. Louis S. Zamperini Warrior Restaurant on U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll celebrated the 248th birthday of the United States Marine Corps in a boisterous Nov. 10 ceremony during the island's lunch hour.

Presiding over a massive three-tier cake, Tonnie Williams, V2X, and Q Quiles, Chenega, the oldest and youngest Marines, respectively, performed the honors of the traditional cake cutting ceremony. In the dining facility, they were joined by fellow Marines, among them, Oscar Olivares and William Brooks of V2X. Olivares provided opening remarks to share highlights from the USMC legacy with dining patrons, and together, the cohort sang the USMC song.

"Traditionally, regardless of location, Marines pause to observe our birthday

by sharing a cake and usually, a holiday meal," shares the USMC in a written history of the ceremony.

"A sword is used to cut the cake as a reminder that we are a band of warriors, committed to carrying the sword, so that our nation may live in peace."

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PACIFIC PARTNERSHIP-24 SEES SAILORS HELPING EBEYE RESIDENTS

Pacific Partnership-24 is the largest annual multinational humanitarian assistance and disaster relief preparedness mission conducted in the Indo-Pacific. It enables participants to work together to enhance disaster response capabilities and foster new and enduring friendships.

"This is incredible," said U.S. Navy Cmdr. Mary Beth Linnell, an optometrist from the USNS Mercy docked in Majuro, Republic of the Marshall Islands. "This is the whole reason that I decided to stay in the Navy after my initial three-year obligation. This is what I always hoped to do."

Linnell and her team of Sailors flew to Kwajalein in early November to provide medical assistance and care for the residents of Ebeye recently, providing vision screenings and glasses dispensing to the Kwajalein Elementary School students, along with a dental team providing dental screenings and a cardiologist providing heart exams.

"I was able to deploy back in 2007 and 2009 and I waited until now to do it again," said Linnell. "This is the best thing I've ever done in my 16 years in the Navy – the planning for the mission and the mission itself."

Linnell explained that her team will go back to Majuro to perform vision screenings and glasses dispensing at the Lara Clinic as well as the Majuro Hospital. She said that the next stop on their Pacific tour will be the Solomon Islands where they will provide medical coverage for the Pacific Games. "I will be going to the outer islands to provide vision screenings again and glasses dispensing. It will be an adventure."

The largest contingent of Sailors provided dental screenings and dental education to more than 800 students over two days on Ebeye, led by Lt. Cdr. Amie Heim, pediatric dentist with the USNS Mercy.

"For the dental component, we screened and treated about 800 children in the local community. We did exams to find out what kind of dental problems they might have or cavities or infections. We painted fluoride vitamins to make their teeth really strong and then provided dental education to try to teach kids the right way to brush and how to take care of their teeth. Then we used all that information to give to the local dentist at the Ebeye Hospital dental clinic where he will continue to do some of the treatment. We had one of our own dentists over the two days helping with the treatments as well."

Heim said that this is her first Pacific Partnership mission but she deployed for the Continuing Promise mission last year on the sister hospital ship, the USNS Comfort.

"This is something I really enjoy doing," said Heim. "In dental school, I always signed up for all the mission trips possible. I always raised my hand. It's just an honor and a privilege to be able to do it on a much larger scale in the Navy. This time was even more exciting because I go to see it from the ground up in the role of a dental planner."

Heim was here earlier this summer to meet people in the local community to figure out what the needs are here to

come up with a plan together.

What was the response from the community like? "Oh my gosh, it was incredible," Heim said. "All the kids running in the street after we did some of the education with the big toothbrush. They were so happy and everywhere we went they were welcoming and giving us high fives and saluting us."

"Honestly, I was so very touched by the ceremony at the hospital we attended and all the folks at the hospital and elementary school who came to thank us. From a place that, they will tell you that they don't have a lot but they have big hearts, you could feel that today. It was just a real honor and a privilege to be able to be a part of that and give back to that community."

The third aspect of the USNS Mercy visit to Ebeye was having a cardiologist conducting exams on the populace.

U.S. Navy Cdr. Matt Russell, cardiologist with the USNS Mercy, said there was a backlog of about 150 patients who need both pediatric and adult echocardiography.

"The first two days we spent doing mostly adults, looking for patients with heart issues," Russell said. "In total we did 26 echocardiography studies and saw 26 patients and consultations over the two days. Today we saw 13 pediatric patients of varying conditions from congenital heart disease to rheumatic heart disease, ages 2-17."

Russell explained that this was his first Pacific Partnership. "Clinically, I get expo-

sure to a lot of conditions that I wouldn't normally see in the United States such as rheumatic heart disease or non-corrected congenital heart disease in kids. Personally these were just wonderful people that I've ever met and really terrific doctors. It was a privilege to work with them."

Russell further explained that "they have a major need for cardiovascular studies and it's unmet unfortunately. I think we made a dent in the number of echoes that they need and the number of consultations they need but I think they need more."

Russell's assistant, HM Ramoune Scarlett, a hospital corpsman from the USNS Mercy said that a lot of the patients aren't sick right now but could be as adults.

"I think this is crucial to get that information out to help the providers here so they can start treatment now so in the long run they aren't suffering," said Scarlett who has done this for six years.

"As a technologist, I am the hands-on guy. I take the images and the doctor does the interpretation."

Scarlett explained that this was the first time he has deployed in 12 years in the Navy. "I'm happy I came on this trip. You get to see why you are in healthcare. You get to see the why. Being here reminds me so much of being back home (in Jamaica) so it hits home for me being able to help people. Being able to go to poorer countries and identifying what they are going through. It just reinforced my why ... as to why I am in healthcare."

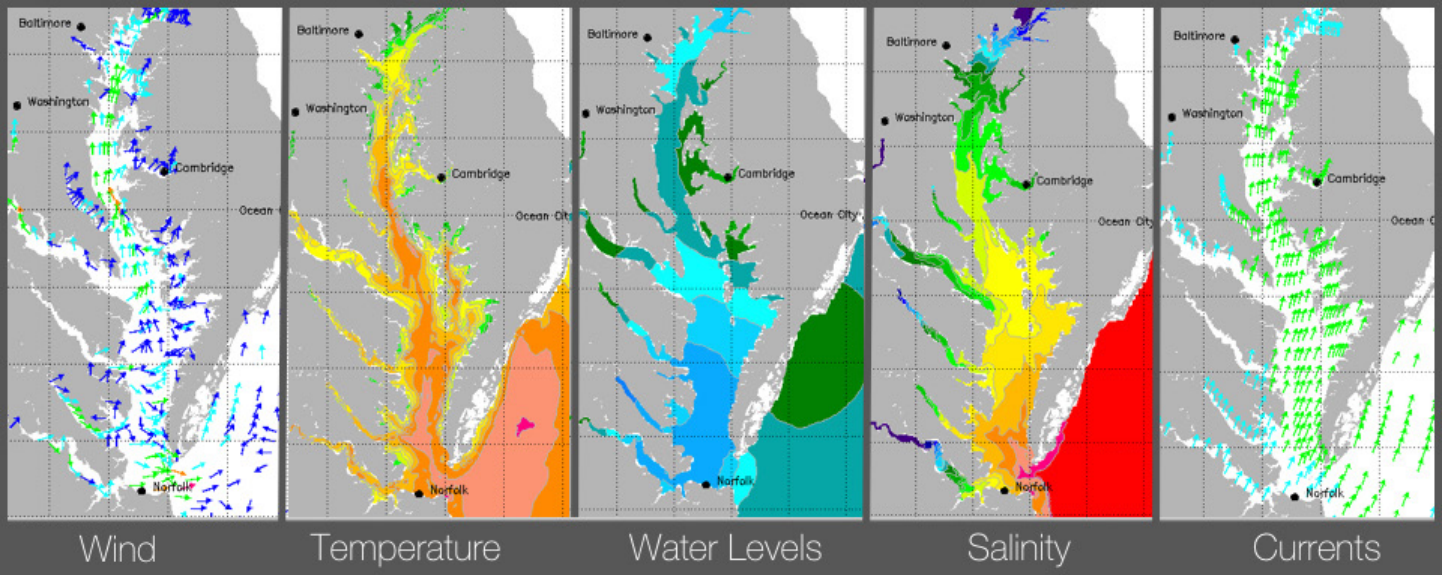

What is an Operational Forecast System?

EXTERNAL REPORT

An Operational Forecast System provides a nowcast and forecast of oceanographic conditions.

An Operational Forecast System (OFS) provides a nowcast and forecast (up to 120 hours) of water levels, currents, salinity, water temperatures, and winds for a given area.

These systems are located in coastal waters around the nation and the Great Lakes in critical ports, harbors, and estuaries.

Nowcasts and forecasts are scientific predictions about the present and fu-

ture states of oceanographic and meteorological parameters within coastal regions.

A nowcast covers the past 24 hours to the present and provides model output for locations where observational data are not available.

A forecast provides information from the present time up to 48 hours out and these are updated every six hours. Nowcasts and forecasts are generated from NOAA real-time and forecast conditions.

Activities in which winds, water levels, currents, water temperature, or salinity are important may benefit from the information provided by an operational

forecast system.

These versatile systems can be used for everything from search and rescue to recreational boating and fishing to storm effect tracking.

Operational Forecast System vs. NOAA Tide Tables

For decades, mariners in the U.S. have depended on NOAA’s Tide Tables for the best estimate of expected water levels and tidal currents.

These tables provide accurate predictions of the astronomical tide and tidal currents (i.e., the change in water level and current due to the gravitational effects of the moon and sun and rotation of the Earth).

However, they cannot predict localized water level changes and variations in currents due to wind, atmospheric pressure, and river flow, which are often significant.

As a result, OFS were established to provide water level, current, temperature, wind and salinity nowcasts and forecast guidance based on real-time observation data, meteorological forecasts, and astronomical predictions.

WORLD WAR VETERAN CARRIED NAVAL COMBAT CAMERA DURING PACIFIC THEATER

Photographer Edward Steichen was a pioneer in aerial intelligence during the first World War and served as the director of the Naval Aviation Photographic unit during World War II.

He is also widely credited as defining American fashion and portrait photography while working for Vogue and Vanity Fair in the years following World War I. With a reputation as one of the world’s great imagery artists, Steichen was an Academy Award-winning documentarian and director of the Department of Photography at New York’s world-renowned Museum of Modern Art.

Commissioned in the Army, he deployed with the American Expeditionary Force to France in 1917. Steichen eventually commanded a reconnaissance unit on the Western Front consisting of 55 officers and 1,111 Soldiers. Before America’s two years of war concluded, Steichen had implemented image gathering and overnight processing procedures that could daily place, on demand, as many as 4,000 black-and-white prints of the Western Front before the AEF leadership.

Aerial photographs not only revealed troop movements and enhanced cartographic services but also offered more reliable battle-damage assessments based upon images captured before and after bombardment from the air or by artillery. Steichen and his staff helped military leaders standardize many other techniques, including the use of multiple images to produce three-dimensional effects, enhancing detection further.

At the age of 61, Steichen served in World War II in the U.S. Navy, heading up the Naval Aviation Photographic Unit. His war documentary, “The Fighting Lady,” which chronicled the crew of the USS Yorktown aircraft carrier, won the 1944 Academy Award for Best Documentary. In 1963, he was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom by President John F. Kennedy—the highest civilian award in the United States.

DON'T TAKE CULTURAL ARTIFACTS. It is illegal to remove cultural resources from the atoll. This includes any protected species, unexploded ordnance, WWII-era artifacts and ancient Marshallese artifacts. These



resources are protected under U.S. federal and RMI law. Do not remove these pieces of atoll history from Kwajalein. Contact the Kwajalein Archaeology Office at 480-8867.

WARDROBE FOR VISITING EBEYE

When visiting Ebeye in the Marshall Islands, it is advisable to dress modestly and respectfully, considering the local cultural norms and the warm tropical climate. Here are

some general guidelines for both men and women by Yolanie Korab.

CLOTHING FOR MEN

Opt for lightweight, breathable fabrics such as cotton or linen to stay comfortable in the warm and humid weather. Wear collared shirts or T-shirts that cover the shoulders. Avoid sleeveless shirts or tank tops, as they may be seen as inappropriate.

SHORT OR TROUSERS: Choose knee-length shorts or trousers. Avoid wearing excessively short shorts or swimwear in public areas.

CLOTHING FOR WOMEN

DRESSES OR SKIRTS: Wear knee-length or longer dresses, skirts, or sarongs. Loose-fitting and lightweight fabrics are recommended.

TOPS: Select modest tops that cover the shoulders and avoid low necklines or revealing clothing.

HEAD COVERINGS: Hats or caps are useful for protecting yourself from the sun, especially during the hot daytime hours.

SUN PROTECTION: Apply sunscreen, wear sunglasses, and carry a light shawl or umbrella for extra sun protection.

FOOTWEAR FOR MEN AND WOMEN: Comfortable shoes or sandals are suitable. Bring a pair of sandals that are easy to slip on and off when visiting home or certain establishments.

WATER PLANT. Water Distribution personnel are continuing with annual flushing of the potable water fire hydrants and pipes on Kwajalein. Over the next three weeks, the wa-

ter coming out of faucets and showers on Kwajalein in the BQ's and the Housing area may turn reddish brown from rusty cast iron pipes in the water distribution system. If your water becomes discolored, let the tap run until the water clears up. WEATHER DISCUSSION

The low pressure circulation which covered Kwajalein atoll in rainfall over the past few days has decayed, allowing the northern subtropical ridge to begin settling into the atoll and initiating a relatively drier pattern.

By Saturday afternoon, predominately easterly winds will shift northeasterly as the typical trade wind pattern reestablishes over the region. The interaction between the subtropical ridge and a distant Monsoon Trough will keep the regional pressure gradient tight enough that surface wind speeds will remain in the low to mid-teens.

These conditions will generally persist over the weekend, and the ridge will provide sinking air to keep overall shower chances low.

SATURDAY

Mostly sunny with isolated showers in

the morning, decreasing to stray showers in the afternoon. Winds ENE-ESE at 11-16 knots with higher gusts near showers.

SUNDAY

Mostly sunny with stray showers. Winds NE-E at 10-15 knots with higher gusts near showers.

MONDAY

Mostly sunny with stray showers. Winds NE-E at 10-15 knots with higher gusts near showers.

NEXT WEEK

The dry pattern may persist through the first half of next week as the subtropical ridge remains over the atoll. However, by late Friday, another wave of showery weather may enter the region, and turbulent weather may return throughout the day on Saturday.
