

KWAJALEIN SENIORS: MILESTONES, MEMORIES, AND MOVING ON (20F3)

HOURGLASS REPORT

How does living on a small, remote island in the Pacific Ocean prepare a high school senior for "real life"? Many aspects of daily life here are unique to Kwajalein, and the Kwajalein School System recognizes the importance of this in preparing students for the future.

"At Kwajalein Schools we work to provide the students with additional resources, information, and experiences to serve them as they leave Kwajalein," according to school counselor, Mindi Gerber. In

addition to college and career readiness, budgeting, and socio-emotional lessons, seniors are exposed to real-life situations with cooperation from experts in the Kwaj community including Community Bank, Automotive Department, Kwaj Police and Security personnel, and Kwaj Missile Range personnel, and most recently the Post Office.

In today's world, where most communication happens electronically, it's important to remember the value of the Post Office, especially since many seniors may not be familiar with all its practical uses. Advisors Ms. Bicanich and Mrs. King recently took a group of seniors to learn some valuable skills, such as how to properly address a letter, which can be useful when sending post-graduation mail. They also covered the differences between flat rate and priority rates, noting that flat rate is often the more cost-effective option for shipping. Additionally, they taught an essential tip for college freshmen-how to send money. It's crucial never to send cash, but a money order from the Post Office is a secure alternative.

One of the great benefits of living in a small, remote community is that everyone is deeply invested in the lives of the youth. Parents play a crucial role in helping seniors navigate the transition from high school on an island to their next adventure. As Gerber explains, "When seniors graduate from Kwajalein High School, they are fully prepared for the next steps in life-whether that's higher education, vocational programs, or joining a branch of the military."



Did you know that the Post Office can only hold your mail for a specified period? This is for a few reasons:

- <u>Storage Limitations</u> Post offices have limited space to store held mail, so they cannot accommodate indefinite storage.
- <u>Delivery Efficiency</u> Long-term holds can disrupt mail delivery schedules and increase the risk of lost or misdelivered items.
- <u>Security & Accountability</u> Extended holding increases the chances of misplacing or damaging mail.

As always, please remember to stop at the Post Office to see our friendly associates to complete the necessary paperwork to avoid having your mail returned!





THE MAGIC OF NATURE JOURNALING: MEET PAULA & FREDDY

HOURGLASS REPORT

"There are about 65 mature fronds radiating from the top of the trunk to make the circular shape from our perspective."

A big part of nature journaling is asking questions. Both Paula, a science teacher at the Kwajalein High School for 4 years, and her son Freddy ask questions about the nature they are observing. They write this observation next to their sketches. For example, Freddy says he will pick up a leaf under a tree to see what it feels like. Then he will look at the bark of the tree and notice the texture. On one page

of his sketchbook, Freddy has a sample of a leaf taped to his to a page next to his sketch. In his notebook he details the size of the leaves. Freddy says he's not the best at drawing, but he is getting better. If they are unsure what a plant is they will use the "Picture This" app to identify it.

They observe nature all around them. While sitting on a rock, Freddy was quick to point out a fossil.

While sketching on North Point recently, they saw a crane catch and eat a fish. They have also seen black tip sharks swimming in the water.

What do you sketch?

Paula: We have sketched all sorts of plants. Animals are more difficult since they don't stay still for long, although once a large hermit crab stayed in his shell long enough for me to get a good look at his shell and the claw he was hiding behind.

<u>Freddy</u>: Well, anything in nature: plants, birds, reptiles.

What material and techniques do you prefer, and why?


<u>Paula</u>: I use a spiral-bound mix media notebook with a

sturdy cover, so it stays open and flat on my lap out in the field. I use a regular #2 pencil to make an initial sketch and record observations. Then I fill in with colored pencils. They blend well enough for me, although I'd like to learn how to use oil pastels.

<u>Freddy</u>: Just a plain pencil. I outline it first and then fill it in, and I hope to improve.

How long have you been drawing?

Paula: Only since we started doing nature study in 2022. I hadn't taken any art classes since 7th grade, so it was intimidating to me. But



just like learning anything else, the more I practice, the better I get. It's exciting when someone looks at my sketch and says, "Hey! I've seen that plant before!"

Freddy: About two years. How do you approach a new project

Paula: We set up our camp chairs in front of something

we haven't studied before and try to stay quiet and just look at it. After making an overall sketch of the plant, sometimes I'll zoom in on a leaf or the inside of a flower to draw close-up details.

Freddy: Carefully, you do a quick (but nice) sketch and think, "I notice... I wonder... This reminds me of...."



What on Kwajalein inspires you?

Paula: It's easy to find something to study because we can walk or bike to different microclimates - you find plants on the leeward, lagoon side of the island that can't exist on the windy ocean side. Residents also grow unique potted plants that come from all over the world.

Freddy: Plants, animals, there's just too much to write about!

What is the best or most interesting drawing you have done? Why?

Paula: The drawing of a Portia tree is my favorite, because I suddenly realized that the nearly-dead bush at the corner of our house was the same plant as some tall trees down the street, from the look of its leaves.


Freddy: I do not have any favorite drawings, I'm not very good, but I hope to improve!

Please add any other thoughts you may have on your nature journals.

Paula: G.K. Chesterton said, "There are no uninteresting things, only uninterested people." Nature journaling has taught me to sit still and notice what's around me. Ordinary plants and trees have turned into a whole new world to explore.


There are two excellent resources that we use. John Muir Laws' "The Nature Connection" series on YouTube introduces the basics of nature study and helps us refine our technique. The "Picture This" app will identify a plant based on a photo and gives its name, look-alike plants, native country, and interesting facts. \(\frac{\text{Y}}{}\)



EARN YOUR TEAM KWAJ TAB

- 1. Attend Col. Morgan's TEAM KWAJ brief (either Teammate or Community version), read and adhere to the TEAM KWAJ Teammate Pact, presented at initial town halls, and periodically thereafter.
- 2. Attend the Island Newcomer's Briefing.
- 3. Attend at least one group greeting at air terminal for personnel arriving on island. Make them feel welcome and show them we are happy they are on Kwaj with us.
- 4. Attend at least two garrison after-hours team-building or social events (TEAM KWAJ Happy Hour, Commander's Call, Hail/Farewell).
- 5. Attend at least two TEAM KWAJ PT/Wellness sessions. Become a regular attender!
- 6. Visit Marshallese Cultural Center in last 3 months prior to tab award.
- 7. Visit Ebeye, Third island or Majuro in last 3 months prior to tab, use a Marshallese phrase or two and visit a store/restaurant.
- 8. Tell three co-workers how to earn the TEAM KWAJ tab.

- 9. Swim, snorkel, boat or paddle on the lagoon at least once with a teammate.
- 10. Complete the TEAM KWAJ Circle-island 6-mile ruck march/walk/bike and read all historic battlefield markers. This is an organized USAG-KA hosted event several times per year.
- 11. Mission Partner wild card event—discuss with your supervisor any additional organizational requirement. Could be knowledge-based, achievement-based, or physical challenge.
- 12. Final event, "Board of Review" -- meet with Col. Morgan face-to-face individually or in a small group with all requirements fulfilled. Schedule with garrison front office. Discussion items may include but are not limited to; TEAM KWAJ pact "Healthy Community of Excellence," Kwaj history, Marshallese culture, military/strategic missions and their significance, and future operational potential.






E-Wareness: Title: Dig Permits

ANY excavation more than 6 inches requires a Dig Permit. A signed dig permit must be on site for ALL excavations on USAG-KA. The permit holder is responsible for all stipulations of the permit, such as, marking known utilities and having a monitor on site during excavations. For more dig permit information call V2X Environmental at 480-0722.

Smoking Safety

Fires have occurred while e-cigarettes were being used, the battery was being charged, or the device was being transported. Battery failures have led to small explosions. Never leave charging e-cigarettes unattended. E-cigarettes should be used with caution.

Keep cigarettes, lighters, matches, and other smoking materials up high out of the reach of children, in a locked cabinet.

Before you throw away butts and ashes, make sure they are completely out.

Do not discard cigarettes in vegetation such as grass, bushes, potted plants, leaves, or other things that could ignite easily.

E-cigarettes are considered by the Army to be in the same category as tobacco products and may not be utilized in any government building.

Army Regulations provide guidance and enforcement as to where smoking is or is not permitted – No Smoking within 50 Feet of any buildings Entrance, Exit or Air Intake.

All unaccompanied personnel housing (UPH or BQ's) is designated as no smoking.



Kwajalein Atoll is a significant archeological location. If you find anything, take a photo, remember where it is and notify the Public Affairs officer at Sherman.hogue.civ@army.mil but do not pick up, or remove the object.

Kwajalein Reclaimed Water Standard Violation

The Reclaimed Water System Document of Environmental Protection (DEP) requires public notification when the standards for reclaimed water are not met. In January 2025, 92.2% of all reclaimed water samples were above 0.5 mg/L chlorine concentration which is less than the required 95% standard. Chlorine is added as a disinfectant at the Point of Entry into the Reclaimed Water System. On 22 & 24 January 2025, the 7-day rolling turbidity average in the reclaimed water distribution system measured above the 2.0 Nephelometric Turbidity Units (NTUs) standard. Turbidity is the cloudiness or haziness of a liquid caused by particles that are generally invisible to the naked eye. No health-based restrictions on the normal use (irrigation, vehicle washing, etc) of reclaimed water are necessary. There is no threat to public health or the environment resulting from this turbidity exceedance. Questions? Contact V2X Environmental at 480-0722.

Kirsten Eisele Clark is a Kwaj Kid who grew up exploring the island. Some of her pottery pieces are inspired by marine life in her fish tank. She has a Picassos trigger fish, eel and used to have an octopus. In addition to marine life, she is gets inspiration from Kwaj's tropical foliage. She finds leaves on island and uses them to design large serving platters.

What sort of art/craft do you make?

I work primarily in ceramics, using hand building techniques to make things with clay. I also do hand embroi-

dery, mainly mounted on 6" embroidery hoops.

I am so grateful to the amazing women who run the Kwaj Hobby Shop, especially Jenny, Barb, and Michelle, for their skill in teaching me how to play with clay and their patience in answering the hundreds of questions I've pestered them with.

My art is often influenced by my background as a birth worker; I have worked as a birth doula for almost a decade and am a student midwife. Female anatomy often pops up, from uteruses to pelvic bones.

What on Kwajalein inspires you?

I am so inspired by the natural beauty of Kwaj. I'm a Kwaj kid and grew up walking the reef catching ocean critters; getting to do that as an adult has been so fun. I began making a series of octopus-themed serving dishes in honor of a dwarf algae octopus named Hank who I found on the reef and brought home to be an aquarium buddy.

The beautiful greenery on this island has also been a centerpiece of my work. Inspired by other hobby shop artisans, I've made a series of serving platters using fronds from the traveler palm trees that are found in just two places on Kwaj (one set of these trees is out by the Vet Hall).

How long have you been making art/crafts?

I've always loved creating things and art has been a lifelong pursuit. Creativity brings me so much joy and the hobby shop has become my therapy!

Can you describe your creative process?

Between midwifery school, being a stay at home homeschool mom, and doing non-profit work, my creative work often happens in bursts and bits of stolen time. I'm grateful to my husband for helping prioritize my time at the hobby shop.





WEEKLY TROPICAL WEATHER THREAT OUTLOOK

RTS WEATHER STATION STAFF

Discussion:

Through yesterday, we have received 1.58 inches of rain for February, which is 1.48 inches below normal for the month. So far in 2025, we have only received 3.32 inches of precipitation, which is 3.75 inches below normal for the year. Typical dry season conditions will continue through the rest of the workweek with an increase in shower coverage for Kwajalein Atoll on Monday as a result of tradewind speed convergence. No thunderstorm days occurred over the past seven days. A thunderstorm day is defined as an "in situ" lightning strike within five miles of the weather station. The Intertropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) is currently across the southern part of eastern Micronesia, but it is expected to become disorganized, and transition to a zone of tradewind convergence over the coming days, affecting the central RMI some on Monday into Tuesday. The Madden/ Julian Oscillation (MJO) is transitioning into its negative phase for the western Pacific, which will work to temper shower coverage. The El Nino Southern Oscillation (ENSO) is in mild La Nina conditions, with the sea surface temperatures (SST) in the central Pacific (ocean to the east of the RMI) at about 0.4C below normal. Cooler temperatures in the Pacific to the east of the RMI work against shower activity, and are the main reason for the lower-than-normal precipitation so far this year, as almost all of our rain producers come from the east. These cooler temperatures are having a disproportionate effect on the central Pacific compared to their normal impacts on the eastern Pacific. Cooler surface ocean temperatures in the central Pacific also tend to work again tropical cyclone development to the east of the RMI, where it could pose a threat to our region. We are also out of the tropical cyclone season as a whole for the western Pacific with the northern winter now climatologically in place.

<u>Tropical Cyclones</u>:

No significant tropical cyclone activity expected to affect anywhere in Micronesia, the Mariana Islands, Wake Island or Hawai'i. We are in climatological winter for the northwest Pacific, which gen-

erally bring a considerable decline in tropical cyclone activity.

<u>Damaging West Winds /</u> <u>Westerly Swell</u>:

None expected. Micronesia is northeast trade wind dominant.

Swell / Tide Inundation for Kwajalein Atoll and Wake Island:

The New Moon will be tomorrow, and it will be a more of a Perigean spring tide with the Moon closer to Earth, bringing a tide situation with high tides of five feet or more from the today through the 1st of March. Winds will stay mostly in the 12 to 16 knot range until Monday and Tuesday, when a well-positioned subtropical high-pressure will steepen the pressure gradient and increase our winds to sustain in the upper teens with gusts routinely into the low 20s, higher on the open lagoon, and on the second half of Tuesday winds will most likely sustaining for periods in the low 20s, especially on the open lagoon and ocean. The issuance of a Small Craft Advisory (SCA) on Tuesday remains a good possibility, but a High Surf

Advisory (HSA) is not expected for the next seven days, though on Saturday there will be northerly swells, that we will be keeping our eyes on for Roi-Namur, especially considering the five feet high tides. At this time the swells are expected to stay below HSA levels.

Purpose: This weekly briefing is delivered Thursday mornings to island leadership. The intention of this briefing is to provide situational awareness of weather events that may interrupt operations and transportation around Kwajalein, to/ from Hawaii and Guam, and in the Wake vicinity. The main threat assessed in this brief is existing and potential development of tropical cyclone activity. This brief also provides an outlook of abnormal winds, sea state, and precipitation guidance for next 7 days around the Kwajalein Atoll. The distribution list will also receive updates on any developing tropical cyclone activity in the Kwajalein region that occur between the weekly outlook product.

Annual Hazardous Materials, Wastes, and Petroleum Product (HMWPP) Training (ENV-100), Spill Response Awareness Training (ENV-110), and PCB Management Training (ENV-190) on Roi-Namur Island



WEATHER DIS-CUSSION

Generally dry conditions and moderate breezes are expected across the Kwajalein Atoll for the end of the week and the first half of the weekend, with somewhat wetter weather possible on Monday. Given a lack of surface forcing mechanisms and the expected presence of dry air throughout the atmospheric column, no more than stray showers are expected on Saturday and Sunday. Sunday night into Monday, the Inter-Tropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) looks to shift northward somewhat and push a weak atmospheric wave through the RMI, leading to a modest increase in shower activity during

that time period. The lack of a well-organized subtropical high-pressure system to the north will lead to a loosened pressure gradient across the RMI, leading to wind speeds being somewhat lighter than usual for the dry season. Sustained wind speeds will generally be in the mid teens, with some higher gusts near showers. Wave heights are expected to increase rapidly during the day on Monday, but they are expected to remain below High Surf Advisory (HSA) criteria.

SATURDAY

Mostly sunny with stray showers. NE-E at 12-17 knots with higher gusts near showers.

SUNDAY

Partly sunny with

stray showers. NE-E at 11-16 knots with higher gusts near showers.

MONDAY

Partly sunny with isolated to widely scattered showers. NE-E at 13-18 knots with higher gusts near showers.

NEXT WEEK

Dry conditions look to resume for most of next week. The only shower chances will be generated by occasional areas of trade wind convergence passing through the Atoll throughout the week. Strengthening subtropical ridging to the north will tighten the pressure gradient across the RMI, resulting in wind speeds increasing to the upper teen and potentially as high as the low 20s at times next week. X
