

VISITING THE MILLERS IN A TROPICAL PARADISE

HOURGLASS REPORT

The most incredible vacation my spouse and I have ever taken together, fortuitously, was to a place tourists aren't generally permitted to

Three years ago I, like many folks, had never heard of a place called Kwajalein. Although I like to think I'm geographically savvy and was raised beside the Pacific Ocean in Hawai'i and California, I had nothing but questions when my dear friend and neighbor Cat, a fellow military spouse stationed with us at Schofield Barracks in Hawai'i, told me her husband Ernest had received his next assignment – to serve as the command sergeant major for U.S. Army Garrison Kwajalein Atoll.

"Where in the world is that?!" I had asked her, as if it were in some faraway galaxy. "The Marshall Islands," she said, her statement sounding more like a question of its own than an answer. I had, in fact, learned about the Pacific region of Micronesia in school - but that was decades ago, and my brain had sadly long set that information out to sea. All I really recalled was that the islands there were very small - 'micro', you might say.

Thank goodness, however, for modern tech! For what would be the first of countless times, I thumbed "Kwajalein" into Google Maps. Zooming into the tiny hook-shaped island, I noted an airfield, some military facilities, and what appeared to be a neighborhood, all existing beside the most breathtaking, teal-tinted shoreline one could possibly imagine. I then zoomed out - and the sheer isolation of this narrow ring of reef surrounded by the dark blue expanse of the Pacific Ocean was utterly staggering. Thousands of miles from any major landmass, positioned halfway between Australia and Hawai'i, the Millers may have well indeed been moving to a distant nook of the universe.

In the meantime, our fam-

ily was also grappling with our own big move, but of a different sort. My husband, Doug, had just retired from the Army after 26 years of service. After being fortunate to both commence and conclude his infantry career at Schofield Barracks - after being stationed and/or deployed nearly everywhere else in between - we chose to settle in his hometown of Mansfield, Ohio. Located halfway between Cleveland and Columbus, it's a place we can afford both a mortgage AND groceries in these exorbitant times, and where we are able to finish raising our two teenagers in a good community amongst a large concentration of friends and family. On the list of pros and

cons, Ohio checked the right boxes for us when choosing our 'forever' home – all except for one. It is too tragically distant from the Pacific Ocean that we both love with a fervent passion.

Despite feeling a bit like a fish out of water amidst the scenic rolling corn fields, I have no space to gripe as I am, without a doubt, genutidepools, and the harbor where Cat described viewing the always-present sharks on her bike ride to work every day. Satellite proof that the ocean did still indeed exist seemed to somehow help get me through the longest of the Midwest's punishing winter months.

The Millers, like us, were also adjusting to their new



inely blessed. The seasons here in Ohio keep things exciting, we are surrounded by all the conveniences one could ever want, and friends and family are within hollering distance. Most significantly, after 26 years of Uncle Sam holding the reins to our life in his hands, we will never, ever again have to endure Doug leaving for combat. To be truthful, I'd be content existing forever in the frigid gutter cracks of Siberia, with Doug safe in my arms, on that mercy alone.

But, as Moana serenades, "... the sea, it calls me." Despite the miles that separate us from the Pacific here in Ohio, the ocean is never far from my heart – or my mind. I dream about it and its creatures every single night. I started freely feeding my fixation by routinely looking up Kwajalein Atoll on Google Maps as I would fall asleep each night, gazing upon its aquamarine beaches, giant

existence in an unfamiliar place - and I was fascinated by Cat's depiction of life on their unique island. No cars, a single small supermarket, zero cell service, a consistent high and low of close to 80 degrees, and sharks spotted daily on an island that I learned is part of the world's largest shark sanctuary, as well as one of the biggest coral atolls to exist. It was hard for me to conceptualize all this amidst my own backdrop of interstate freeways, Walmart Supercenters, snowplows, Starbucks, boots with the fur, and the Olive Garden. We have no coral here in Ohio - but we've got Golden Corral! But we missed our friends Cat and Ernest, and Doug and I made up our minds one frosty day that we were going to make it out to Kwajalein to visit them, come hell or high water, thanks to the Millers' special invitation to their island home - one of the only ways leisure travelers can visit the island-turnedU.S. military facility.

In the time it took for us to summon the elusive combination of time, money, and opportunity, over two years passed. We finally booked airline tickets, shifted our schedules, and blew the dust off our snorkel gear and beach bags - and then, the hell and high water showed up. Our garage ceiling suddenly collapsed due to old leaking pipes, and I was simultaneously hit with appendicitis and had to undergo emergency surgery just days before our flight. There was no way, however, that we were going to let our dreams of seeing our friends in Kwajalein be up-anchored and cast off. With one less organ, my abdomen stitched back together, and leaving a construction zone behind us at home - as well as our two teenagers who had school to attend - off we went. Sometimes, there is just no perfect time, and you have to simply grab life by the tail fluke and jump in feet first.

My pastime of gazing upon Kwajalein's cerulean aerial images on Google Maps from a world away was replaced, once and for all, with seeing it in real life out of the airplane window - a vision I will never forget. We touched down and stepped onto the tarmac, and I ran through the humid wind to Cat, who was waiting to greet us on the other side of a chain link security fence. We clasped hands through the metal bars as if I were a prisoner who had been held hostage from my friend and her island for far too dramatically long. We had to wait a couple more days to see Ernest, who was off island taking care of business. After real reunification hugs with Cat that felt surreal and receiving special visitor identification cards, we loaded up in a rented golf cart as Cat introduced us to the island that, in a way, I felt as if I somehow already knew.

With no traffic to contend with on this tiny sliver of land





other than the occasional bicycle, within just a couple minutes we pulled up to our first stop – Emon Beach. The brilliance of the water in this crescent-shaped lagoon was nearly blinding, and the immediate urge to immerse myself in its warm caress was overpowering. There was no fighting that impulse for Doug, who plunged straight in with clothes on, which he continued to do at every beach Cat stopped to show us on our orientation tour via golf cart. Next, we stopped at the harbor and, just as advertised, several large nurse sharks and a handful of smaller blacktip reef sharks were simply hanging out, patiently waiting for scraps of freshcaught fish - or, if anyone was feeling particularly generous, a treat of frozen hot dogs. I immediately fell in love with these permanent residents of the harbor's waters, who around the clock ensure no morsel goes un-snacked!

Our initiation continued as the three of us soon found ourselves suited up and in the warm water with reef sharks, snorkeling above a sunken ship from World War II. I had been in the water with sharks a handful of times over the years in Hawai'i, which was

always totally unnerving, but Cat didn't seem the least bit concerned, so I didn't worry, either. It was just like the magic of my recurring dreams of the ocean – but this was so very real! I wondered what I would dream about that night?

There wasn't much dreaming to be done, as we were too busy living out our dreams over the next six days of our visit. A small, isolated place with scant amenities isn't evervone's idea of a perfect vacation - but when it involves empty white sand beaches, luminous warm water, and the most vibrant underwater life we have ever seen, that is the description of our personal paradise. Snorkeling together has always been one of my and Doug's very favorite things to do, and we cherished the ability to reconnect to the ocean in the most beautiful underwater spots we likely will ever be fortunate enough to see outside of Disney animated movies or the Discovery Channel. Coral formations and fish of all colors, sea turtles and sharks. and even the funky-looking black knobby sea cucumbers were just so cool to see and exist amongst, for moments that will always be too brief but forever treasured. (Snorkeling may not have been the brightest choice for me just days after having my appendix removed, but I slapped some waterproof bandages over my incisions, threw fate to the tides, and regret absolutely nothing!)

Back on land, we were at last able to reunite with our good buddy Ernest who had returned to the island, and he spent some time showing us some of the sites where the Battle of Kwajalein took place during World War II. I was surprised to see the still very visible physical remnants all over the island of this fourday battle that took place in 1944 and killed nearly 400 Americans and several thousand Japanese soldiers atollwide. Various concrete bunkers remain standing, scraps and sections of wrecks can be seen on the beaches, multiple burial sites exist, and it is not uncommon for human remains and unexploded ordnances to still be found to this day. Amongst such intense natural beauty, the contrasting scars of war still exist, and as I absorbed the island's idyllic atmosphere, I also silently honored the immense suffering and sacrifice of so many humans that took place in this very spot, which 81 years ago was not the beach





paradise it is now, but a violent battlefield. The few black and white photos I have seen from the battle show an apocalyptic scene of dark billowing smoke, shredded coconut trees, and tangled, chaotic images of war – a gratefully stark contrast to today, although the unmistakable traces are still present.

On most days, we had the island's beaches largely to ourselves. Kwajalein may look the part of being an island paradise, but not everyone there is on vacation – in truth, we were very much the only ones. I learned the island is populated by military members and their dependents, civilian contractors and their families, and local nationals who work there - essentially, everyone there has a direct purpose for being on the island, and it was evident that a lot of hard and crucial work takes place there.

I also witnessed, however,

that Kwajalein is far from all work and no play. During an exceptionally low tide on a Sunday morning, Cat, Ernest, Doug, and I joined many in the community swimming in the exposed tide pools on the ocean side of the atoll. It was so much fun to experience this with our friends, and to be amongst others whose enthusiasm and appetite for exploring the ocean was right up there alongside ours! Everyone we met was genuinely embracing of these sun-scorched imposters from Ohio who tracked sand on their feet and legs everywhere and smelled perpetually of Malibu and SPF 100.

Doug and I did what we could to return the generosity shown to us by the Kwajalein community. While cheering on Ernest pitching in a baseball game one night, Doug was hit with the sudden desire to reciprocate. He quickly biked home to where we were staying, threw open the

fridge, and was inspired by one of the only items we had handy - a pack of hot dogs. After grilling them up on the stovetop sous-chef style and stuffing them into plastic containers, he pedaled back to the ball field and proudly announced to all in the stands that he had home-cooked hot dogs to distribute. Cynically expecting a cool reception of side-eyes, I was surprised and relieved when enthusiasm arose from the bleachers, and folks we'd never met looked overjoyed to accept an anonymous hot dog out of a questionable container served up by my husband's bare hands! It was an unexpectedly tender moment, followed by Ernest's team winning the game, and we all went home that night with full hearts - and full bellies.

As all good things must come to an end, so did our visit to Kwajalein. The top treasure was getting to reconnect with our friends who are forever 'Ohana. The Millers are true battle buddies most can only dream of, and we will forever be so deeply grateful to Cat, Ernest, Ethen, and Hannah for sharing their island world with us. Every footprint I generated in the sand was produced with deep

humility and gratitude for all the moments and actions that ever had to transpire to make my entirely improbable – yet now certifiably real – visit to Kwajalein occur.

American author Robert Fulghum said, "The grass is not, in fact, always greener on the other side of the fence. No, not at all. Fences have nothing to do with it. The grass is greenest where it is watered. When crossing over fences, carry water with you and tend the grass wherever you may be." When I read this recently, it spoke straight to me - as it should to any good Ohioan, where lawn care in particular is both a cultural pastime as well as an extreme sport. As I laid eyes on Kwajalein Atoll for the last time through the plane window as we departed and said farewell to the piece of my soul that will always reside there, I turned my focus toward getting back to Ohio, where I needed to be. I missed my kids with a crushing ferocity there was Panda Express to be eaten the aisles of Aldi were calling my name and most importantly, there was springtime grass that needed tending to, because the grass is always greenest, most assuredly, where you water it.



E-wareness: Marshall Islands Shark Sanctuary

The RMI established a shark sanctuary in 2011, officially ending commercial fishing of sharks in 768,547 square miles of its waters.

The Marshall Islands' law includes:

- No commercial fishing of sharks or sale of any sharks or shark products.
- Any shark caught accidently by fishing vessels must be set free.
- •Fines up to \$200,000 for anyone found fishing for sharks or possessing shark fins.
- No use of long-line fishing gear, which is among the most lethal to sharks.

Please, do everything possible to avoid catching sharks while fishing. If sharks are caught accidentally, attempt should be made to release them as safely as possible. Sharks should not be brought to the small boat marina. If you have any questions, please call V2X Environmental Services at 480-0722.

What kind of events does your association organize, and how often do they happen?

Big Event is the Kwaj Open which is yearly with Door Prizes, Nice Golf Shirt, Food, etc. We shoot for NOVEM-BER to do the big tourney but we have had to move it due to mission or other events but NOV is the goal. We also arrange "Fun Tournaments" usually on Mondays and we play 9 holes in fun different formats. Typically the goal is to have one about every 2-3 months but the last couple years it seems more like one every 5 months...

Do you need to be a member to participate?

Obviously, being a member allows you to play golf with others so it is nice to meet people that have a common love of golf. Also allows you to compete against others in a one-on-one situation versus team sports.



EARN YOUR TEAM KWAJ TAB

- 1. Attend Col. Morgan's TEAM KWAJ brief (either Teammate or Community version), read and adhere to the TEAM KWAJ Teammate Pact, presented at initial town halls, and periodically thereafter.
- 2. Attend the Island Newcomer's Briefing.
- 3. Attend at least one group greeting at air terminal for personnel arriving on island. Make them feel welcome and show them we are happy they are on Kwaj with us.
- 4. Attend at least two garrison after-hours team-building or social events (TEAM KWAJ Happy Hour, Commander's Call, Hail/Farewell).
- 5. Attend at least two TEAM KWAJ PT/Wellness sessions. Become a regular attender!
- 6. Visit Marshallese Cultural Center in last 3 months prior to tab award.
- 7. Visit Ebeye, Third island or Majuro in last 3 months prior to tab, use a Marshallese phrase or two and visit a store/restaurant.
- 8. Tell three co-workers how to earn the TEAM KWAJ tab

- 9. Swim, snorkel, boat or paddle on the lagoon at least once with a teammate.
- 10. Complete the TEAM KWAJ Circle-island 6-mile ruck march/walk/bike and read all historic battlefield markers. This is an organized USAG-KA hosted event several times per year.
- 11. Mission Partner wild card event—discuss with your supervisor any additional organizational requirement. Could be knowledge-based, achievement-based, or physical challenge.
- 12. Final event, "Board of Review" -- meet with Col. Morgan face-to-face individually or in a small group with all requirements fulfilled. Schedule with garrison front office. Discussion items may include but are not limited to; TEAM KWAJ pact "Healthy Community of Excellence," Kwaj history, Marshallese culture, military/strategic missions and their significance, and future operational potential.

The U.S. Department of the Navy (Navy) prepared a Final Environmental Assessment / Overseas Environmental Assessment (EA/OEA) to evaluate the potential environmental impacts of conducting missile flight tests in both Atlantic and Pacific Ocean regions. Testing would involve flight tests from sea-based launch locations, vehicle flight over the ocean, splashdown of boosters in the ocean, and payload impact either in broad ocean areas or on land at a U.S. Army test site at Kwajalein Atoll in the Republic of the Marshall Islands. Based on the analysis presented in the EA/OEA, the Navy has concluded that implementation of the Proposed Action will not significantly impact the quality of the human and natural environment and will not significantly harm the environment of the global commons (high seas). Accordingly, there is no requirement to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement or Overseas Environmental Impact Statement, and the Navy has completed a Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) / Finding of No Significant Harm (FONSH) for Navy Conventional Prompt Strike Weapon System Flight Tests.



HOURGLASS REPORT

"I know I'm funny. I <u>know</u> it. You don't see what I know."

CW₃ Silvestre Arroyo said this to himself with an aire of determined defiance after his very first open mic stand-up comedy performance didn't go as well as he had hoped. Under less than optimal conditions during Austin, Texas' struggles with business attendance at the height of COVID-19 forced regulations, CW₃ Arroyo found himself doing his set at 1am-the tail end of a long night with an audience consisting of six regular comedians who were all scrolling on their phones, and a single bona fide original audience member left. This one would mildly chuckle every now and again, and one of the comedians would occasionally provide a bark of assurance without ever looking up from his phone.

A disapointed CW₃ Arroyo was ready to throw in the towel, naively believing that the audience was there purposely to provide their laughter, not for the comic to earn it. "I'm done, guys. No one's even listening."

"What? No, you're fine," piped up a few of the comedians, looking up from their devices for the first time. "Keep

going. Everyone bombs; it's okay. You still have time left."

CW₃ Arroyo has come a long way since then, performing in almost a dozen cities across the USA, his act now a carefully crafted workof-art. This last reflecting the secret to his success, as he takes the uncommon approach of not being afraid to try new material, bumping back jokes that were honed to near perfection over several months as he returned to towns where he'd already told them. This bravery combined with a solid work ethic makes up the core traits that serves under all of his roles, incud-



ing his primary job of US-AG-KA Installation Sr. Food Service Advisor. "I like standup comedy, but the hobby cannot intefere with my job," he said with a slight pang in his voice." I wish I could balance it more with work." He explained how different life was when he first made the plunge, a lucky combination of having his weekends free while stationed near Austin, and having the extra free time that came with the pandemic. "It was worse back when I was in Colorado. There was this one time I had to take a work call while I was on stage in the middle of my set. The audience could tell that I wasn't really present."

Growing up, CW₃ Arroyo was always told he was a funny guy. "Whenever any incident happened, I was always the one my friends and family chose to tell the story: 'You tell it good!'" It was this life-long support that gave him the confidence to want to try out for that fateful open mic, and also gavehim the conviction to not only try

again after the perceived fail, but to eventually succeed. A huge part of that success is the work CW3 Arroyo has been willing to put in. "What you want to do is put in a lot of stage work so you build a really tight-10 [minutes], or a tight-15, so you have something good. Evaluate audience responses and tweak a word choice here, change an inflection there." He was told by one of his mentors to illicit an emotion-some kind of emotion—every 10-12 seconds, just to keep the audience engaged; to keep their attention.

"I'm very good at talking mess," said CW3 Arroyo with a smerk in reponse to how he deals with hecklers. "I'm good at throwing back barbs. I love hecklers. They don't bother me. The thing is, growing up I couldn't fight. My approach to conflict was basically, if I could make the person next to you laugh, then if you hit me, it makes you the bad guy!" He mentioned how one friend of his made the observation that it's not so much




the content of what CW₃ Arroyo is actually saying that's funny, but it's his timing and how he says it that really gets the reactions.

"I'm funny. I really am. Sometimes I don't even realize I'm doing it. Like, I'll be in a class, commenting under my breath to whatever the teacher or officer is saying, and the person next to me will respond."

CW₃ Arroyo's interest includes more than just the art performance itself, but ex-

tends out to his appreciation of his fellow comics community and cultivating relationships. "Every comic has their own '-ism," he explained. "The idiosyncratic thing they do that's uniquely their own. Mine is that I like to stick around, not leave the venue immediately after my set, so that I can support the other comics. At the end of the night, we all gather on stage for the big group shot, and it's not cool when there's only a few people left at the end of the night." ▼

WEEKLY TROPICAL WEATHER THREAT OUTLOOK

RTS WEATHER STATION STAFF

Discussion:

At the mid-point in the month of May, we have recorded 3.72 inches of rain, which is 0.76 inches below normal for the month. So far in 2025, we have only received 12.23 inches of precipitation, 9.33 inches below normal for the year. The drought situation for the RMI is sort of a mixed bag now. Conditions have become worse in the Ratak Chain, but improved for Kwajalein Atoll, improving from Severe Drought D2 to Moderate Drought Di on a scale of D1-D4 for Kwajalein Atoll. The overall trend for our part of the Pacific is improving, especially by the end of the month. Showers coverage will be somewhat elevated for the next seven days with a good bump on Saturday and a significant increase in shower coverage with the arrival of an atmospheric wave on the second half of the 28th into the 20th. The thunderstorm risk will also be augmented with the arrival of this wave. No thunderstorm days occurred over the past seven days. A thunderstorm day is defined as an "in situ" lightning strike within five miles of the weather station. The Madden/Julian Os-

cillation (MIO) remains incoherent with rather lack-luster eastward progression, but is currently in a mild positive phase, which gives an advantage to increased shower coverage for the RMI through the rest of May. The El Nino Southern Oscillation (ENSO) has now transitioned to EN-SO-neutral conditions. With the end of La Nina, the transition to ENSO-neutral favors increased shower coverage, as we also move into the rainy season. Sea surface temperatures (SST) in the central Pacific between the RMI and the Date Line are now at about normal. Besides increased rainfall, these warming near normal SSTs tend to favor tropical cyclone development, but the RMI is not currently in its climatological tropical cyclone season, thus little threat is expected for the rest of May.

Tropical Cyclones:

No significant tropical cyclone activity expected to affect anywhere in Micronesia, the Mariana Islands, Wake Island or Hawai'i. We are now in climatological spring for the northwest Pacific, but still rest outside a favorable environment for tropical cyclone activity, as sea surface temperatures in the west-

ern Pacific are still in their seasonal cooler state, and south to north shear in the mid-levels of the atmosphere remains unfavorable for TC development.

<u>Damaging West Winds /</u> <u>Westerly Swell</u>:

None expected. Micronesia is northeast trade wind dominant.


Swell / Tide Inundation for Kwajalein Atoll and Wake Island:

We are moving toward a new-moon on the on the 27th. We will have high tides over four feet from the 24th to the 30th with high tides of five feet on the 27th and the 28th. We tend to watch wave heights more with these higher tides, but not seeing any concerns at this time. Winds are currently in the middle to upper single digits out of a nearly due east direction, but will generally be on a slow road to building back to the middle teens as we move deeper into the next seven days, becoming more northeast with a peak in winds on the second half of the 27th and 28th in the upper teens. Wide area winds will come down some on the evening of the 28th and 29th and become more east-southeast

with the arrival of the rather significant atmospheric wave about that time. Gusty outflow winds will be possible at this time near heavy showers or thunderstorms, leading to a possible short lived Small Craft Advisory (SCA) on the open lagoon or ocean. High Surf Advisory (HSA) conditions are not expected for the next seven days.

Purpose: This weekly briefing is delivered Thursday mornings to island leadership. The intention of this briefing is to provide situational awareness of weather events that may interrupt operations and transportation around Kwajalein, to/ from Hawaii and Guam, and in the Wake vicinity. The main threat assessed in this brief is existing and potential development of tropical cyclone activity. This brief also provides an outlook of abnormal winds, sea state, and precipitation guidance for next 7 days around the Kwajalein Atoll. The distribution list will also receive updates on any developing tropical cyclone activity in the Kwajalein region that occur between the weekly outlook product.

Expect mostly dry and calm weather around Kwajalein Atoll Friday, with just a few stray showers here and there. Later Friday afternoon into early evening, a passing weather disturbance could bring a few more isolated showers, and a slight chance of a thunderstorm aided by cooler air in the upper-levels. Any showers that form may bring moderate rainfall due to elevated mid-level moisture. Looking ahead to the holiday weekend, things should stay mostly dry and pleasant. There might be a few brief showers early Saturday morning, but the sun should return by the afternoon. Winds will stay light to moderate Friday and Saturday, picking up a bit on Sunday and Monday as the trade winds return and help keep things dry. All in all, it's shaping up to be a pretty nice weekend.
