This lemonpeel angelfish (centropyge flavissima) was photographed by Kwaj resident Brandi Mueller outside of the lagoon on the ocean side of the atoll.

Native to the central Pacific Ocean and the eastern Indian Ocean, lemonpeel angelfish is known for its striking yellow exterior and a solitary black spot that adorns each of its sides.

Fun facts: They occur mostly in harem groups, consisting of a single male and several females. They can also undergo male-to-female sex change, a process that takes between two and three months.

Despite the species' strong following in the aquarium trade, the International Union for the Conservation of Nature Red List of Threatened Species still classifies this angelfish as a species of least concern. Its numbers are plentiful, and there has been no substantial habitat loss for the species, the group reports.

Swimmers compete in Saipan Invitational

Three swimmers from Kwajalein were able to compete at the Saipan International Invitational March 13-15 and had some fantastic results. Bronwyn Galbraith, Kayla Hepler and Sean Hepler competed in the 11-12 age group for swimming.

Galbraith, new to swimming this year, swam in five events. It was her first time competing internationally and her first time competing in an Olympic-sized, fresh water venue. She earned three personal best times and met many new swimming friends from other teams, including several swim teams from Guam, Saipan and Palau.

Sean swam in seven events this year, including the 200M breast-stroke; this was the first time he was eligible to swim the event. He earned six personal bests and placed in three events, earning a total of 11 points for the team.

Kayla swam nine events—the maximum allowed—including the 200M individual medley. She placed in all nine events, earning 36 points for Kwajalein Swim Team. She placed sixth overall for

her age group.

The competition was fierce this year with about 90 swimmers participating throughout all age groups. Tropical Storm Bavi caused havoc with the March 15 morning Saipan open water lagoon swim competition, and ultimately, the event was cancelled. The storm hit later that af-

ternoon with winds clocking at over 60 knots. The swimmers were stuck in Saipan two extra days due to cancelled flights. The experience was a good one despite the weather setbacks, and during some down time the team was able to experience the local sites and historic monuments located throughout the island.



Tropical Storm hits closest to Kwaj in more than 10 years

ropical storm Bavi was the first tropical cyclone to come within 300 nautical miles of Kwajalein since Tropical Storm Talas in December 2004. Bavi produced a total of 10.65 inches of rain but did not set any records at Kwajalein; however it was unusual in a number of respects.

Tropical cyclones in the western Pacific are unusual in March, with Bavi being the sixth recorded system near Kwajalein in the month since 1944 (four tropical depressions and two tropical storms). Bavi was the first time in which tropical storm strength winds—sustained wind speeds of at

least 39 mph—were recorded at Kwajalein in March since 1944.

Bavi did not have a normal tropical storm wind profile at Kwajalein. Usually, winds start low and increase as the tropical storm approaches, reaching tropical storm strength for 30-45 minutes with a definitive peak, then decreasing rapidly as the system moves away. Bavi did not do this. Instead, long periods of strong tropical depression winds were measured at Kwajalein, with a few brief bursts to tropical storm levels.

While Bavi was not remarkable in its wind pattern at Kwajalein, it had an unusually low pressure. This is important, because the lower the pressure, the more intense the storm. Even though the center of the storm was 97 nautical miles away from Kwaj, the station pressure at the RTS

Weather Station dropped to 997.2 millibar shortly after 3 p.m., March 12. This was the third lowest atmospheric pressure recorded at Kwajalein, the lowest being Tropical Storm Zelda in 1991 and the next lowest being Tropical Storm Roy in 1988.

Bavi's Development

A broad, elongated low pressure circulation developed in the southern Marshall Islands on the weekend of March 7-8. This, in conjunction with anomalously high pressure over the central Pacific Ocean, created unusually strong trade winds over the central RMI. These trade winds created flow into the north side of the circulation that triggered a system of thunderstorms and caused heavy rains and a Small Craft Advisory at Kwajalein.

The Joint Typhoon Warning Center began monitoring the RMI circulation March 7 but did not officially discuss it. Meteorologists there placed changing position fixes for the center of circulation over a large geographic area. When JTWC began mentioning the system, they rated its development chances as "low." At 6 p.m. local time March 10, JTWC raised the chances for development of a tropical cyclone to "medium;" position fixes continued to jump greatly, however.

As the low pressure center intensified, Kwajalein's winds accelerated. A sustained wind of 39 mph, with a 45 mph gust, was recorded at 12:18 p.m., March 11, but it was only a single event. JTWC changed the position fix of the circulation from near Kwajalein to more than 150 nautical miles southeast of Majuro.

Bavi began to show spin in visible satellite images after 3 p.m., March 11. RTS Weather Station staff began detecting a rotation signature at extreme range on the station's Kwajalein Polarmetric radar just before 4 p.m. This rotation was detected more than an hour before JTWC issued a Tropical Cyclone Formation Alert for the storm.

Later that evening Bavi tracked westward to Ailinglaplap Atoll, between Jeh and Airok islands. On March 12, Bavi moved from Ailinglaplap Atoll to a point south of Ujae Atoll, with a closest point of approach about 97 nautical miles southwest of Kwajalein.

JTWC issued a Tropical Cyclone Formation Alert at 5 p.m. on March 11, but placed the system due south of Majuro, far from the rotation we were already seeing, 159 nautical miles southeast of Kwajalein. A Tropical Storm Warning was never issued for Kwajalein by the National Weather Service office in Guam.

A pass of the European METOP-A satellite captured winds at the ocean surface with its Advanced Scatterometer sensor when Bavi was 70 nautical miles southwest of Namu Atoll. Tropical storm-strength winds were observed in the northeast quadrant of the storm and to the south of the storm's center. It is quite unusual to get a satellite pass from this satellite, right where it is needed, when it is needed.

By 9 a.m., March 13, Bavi had moved to a location more than 300 nautical miles west of Kwajalein.





Notable women of Kwajalein



Beverly Stipe

Col. Beverly Stipe was the first, and thus far only, female to take command of U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll. Stipe was the commander at USAG-KA from July 2004 to July 2006.

Stipe was responsible for many memorable changes during her tenure at USAKA. She secured funding for the demolition of the old Pacific Bachelor Quarters, which took place July 7, 2006. In its place now stands the new USAG-KA Headquarters Building.

Stipe is probably remembered most for installing the public address system on the non-potable water tower that plays the bugle calls around island. This was Stipe's effort to push a mental change forward that Kwajalein is a military installation. Every year at the Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High School graduation, the seniors give the commander a gag gift in exchange for their diplomas; that year, the seniors each gave Stipe a miniature bugle pin as part of the traditional practical joke. The bugle calls are still played today at 6 a.m., noon, 5 p.m. and 10 p.m.

When asked what she most enjoyed about her tour at Kwajalein, she stated, "The missions are fantastic and the extra-curricular activities also provided plenty to do, even when all I wanted to do was nothing. In 26 years, I have never been associated with such a diverse and eclectic group of Soldiers, DA [Department of the Army] civilians and a contractor workforce."

Notable women of Kwajalein



Alice Buck

Alice Buck was born Dec. 24, 1932 in Knoxville, Tennesee. She gave a lifetime of service to the people of the central Pacific, first as missionary under the United Church of Christ mission board and later as Bible translator. She attended Phillips University in Oklahoma and graduated from Northwest Christian College in Eugene, Oregon.

She and her husband, Elden, had two daughters, Lisa and Lauren, and adopted a son, Kyle. They lived on Kosrae, Ebeye and Kwajalein, where Eldon served as the Protestant minister for 13 years.

Fluent in Marshallese and Kosraean languages, she was instrumental in completing new translations of the entire Bible into Marshallese and Kosraean, under the auspices of the United Bible Societies. She taught conversational Marshallese through the adult education program on Kwajalein, and created a series of 30 lessons, broadcast on the AFRTS radio station.

She passed away at the age of 71 on June 28, 2004 at her home in Claremont, California, after a brief struggle with cancer.

Davye Davis

Davye Davis was the only woman to live on Kwajalein and have the honor of a facility named for her. Davye Yvonne Thomas Davis was born in Columbia, Louisiana, in October 1936. She was the youngest daughter of Liniea and Samuel Thomas, both school teachers at a Louisiana college. Davye's father was also a Baptist minister. She attended college and became a physical education teacher. In 1958 she met Lem Davis. They married and had one son, Jerry, who also eventually lived and worked on Kwajalein as an engineer. Davye, Lem and Jerry came to Kwajalein in 1970 — Lem worked as an engineer and Davye as a teacher at George Seitz Elementary School. Davye taught for several years before the family returned to the States. In 1978, Davye and Lem returned to Kwajalein where she taught at GSES for several more years.

Davye loved Kwajalein, teaching and sewing. She once mysteriously collected measurements of all her fellow lady teachers and sewed each of them an outfit. She invited them to a luncheon, surprised them with their outfits and had them put on a fashion show. Though Davye was a small woman, standing 5 feet, 4 inches tall, she was strong. She was known for her spunky personality, never to be intimidated. She had been known to be quite a catcher for a local softball team and had won the nail-hammering competition at Oktoberfest more than once. Her woodworking skills were another of her surprising talents. She made some beautiful pieces of furniture that her family enjoyed. She passed away in Honolulu in November 1985. Her only granddaughter, Lindsay, whom she never met, graduated from Kwajalein High School in 2005 in the room named for her grandmother.
