HOURGLASS REPORTS

This **orbicular batfish** (platax orbicularis) was photographed by Kwaj resident Jordan Vinson off Emon Beach last weekend. Spotted at a depth of only about 10 meters, this batfish was very friendly, allowing the photographer to come within only about three feet with a camera.

Orbicular batfish are not a rare sight in the waters in and around Kwajalein Atoll. Apart from the Pacific, they are also found in the Red Sea and the Indian Ocean; there have also been reported sightings in the west-central Atlantic near Florida. The hallmark trait of the orbicular batfish, much like other batfish and spadefish, is the species' particularly long fanshaped fins, coupled with a comparatively thin width.

According to writers at www.fishbase.org, they feed on small fish, algae and invertebrates.

The health of the species, in terms of population size, has not yet been evaluated by the International Union for the Conservation of Nature.

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IN MEMORIAM Michael Joseph Christopher Kraesig

 ichael Kraesig, a Kwajalein resident and Unix system administrator at the Reagan Test Site Mission Control Center, passed away at Queens Medical Center in Honolulu March 31 following an accident on Kwajalein.

He is survived by his father Dennis, mother Kathy, sister Sam and extended family. A memorial for Michael is currently being planned to take place in San Diego.

His father Dennis was at Mikey's side with other family members until the end. He kept his friends on Kwajalein updated on the process.

"I brought Mikey home to be where he started his life," Dennis wrote on Facebook. "He can be found all over Hawaii: at the cliffs of the Pali, in the Bayons of Queens lawn, on the shores of Haleiwa, and in the memories of men and women all over the world. I will never give up the search for his essence. Keep an eye out for him; he will make you smile through your tears and bring joy to your heart. Aloha 'Oe, my sweet boy. Thank you all for all your kind thoughts and shared stories of Mikey. He loved you all."

Back on Kwajalein, Kraesig's many friends gathered together before the start of his softball team's April 1 game to celebrate his life and mark his absence, both on the softball field and elsewhere on the island.

One of only a few garrison residents to involve himself in practically every organized sports league available on the island, Kraesig made good friends on the soccer field, basketball court and swimming pool. But it was baseball—or softball in this case for which he had the biggest passion, he often said.

Having taken the reigns as captain of the longstanding team, the Criminals, this year, his absence is particularly profound. Initially uncertain in their ability to continue the season without him, his teammates eventually came to the decision that Mikey



would indeed want the show to go on. They gathered with friends from throughout the community on the softball diamond where Kraesig excelled in the short stop position, making tough plays on balls ripping between second and third base and cracking singles and doubles like a pro. Taking a moment to say a few remarks before the start of the team's game April 1, the Criminals' acting manager in Mikey's absence, Kwaj resident Nick Yarnes, put into words what the entire island community had been feeling.

"Words cannot express the tremendous grief our island is experiencing over the tragedy of the past week," Yarnes told the crowd from near the pitcher's mound. "As a community, we are stunned. We mourn the tragic loss of Michael Kraesig, and our deepest sympathies go out his family and friends. We commend the actions of the rescue workers, hospital staff and friends who stood by to give Michael well wishes and prayers during his last hours with us. And, as we struggle to return to normalcy, we will not forget the person Michael was and how saddened we are that his life was cut short."

Mikey will be missed; he will never be forgotten.

AFN-Kwajalein staff make dish upgrade

merican Forces Radio and Television Service gear on Kwajalein got an important upgrade last week. Contractors who handle all duties relating to ensuring American Forces Network programming gets to your TV and radio every day finished a week-long project that tasked the team with replacing the garrison's older satellite dish antenna with a new five-meter c-band dish.

The project came about as a matter of necessity after AFN, headquarted in California, decided to contract with a new satellite broadcast company to provide programming via satellite to service members spread across the planet.

Because the new company hired to pump out programming, Luxembourg-based Intelsat, operates a communications satellite that uses a different method of sending out its signal, a whole new receiver dish on the ground was called for, said Dilip Saha, the garrison's Range Radio/ AFRTS broadcast technician, after the project.

"Because the new satellite, Intelsat's IS-19, uses circular polarization, while the older satellite uses linear polarization, we could not use the old satellite dish antenna to pick up the signal from the new satellite," Saha said.

All told, the migration took about a week of work, Saha said. The project included the physical installation of the new dish and antenna receiver, along with many hours of configuring the new equipment and tuning satellite receiver devices inside the local AFN station's master control room.

Luckily Saha and his immediate team members—Evelyn Smith, Kezin Lotte, David Elton and Tom Giedroc got plenty of help along the way.

"The process was pretty good; it wasn't too hard, complicated," Saha said. "We especially thank the Navy Seabees and Public Works, who helped us with some heavy lifting. We also have special thanks to Ron Gamble, Steve Banducci and Cynthia Rivera for stopping by regularly and checking in on the process."

Making dish upgrades on the ground is a job that military bases and other federal installations around the world have to complete by April 21—when AFN's old contract with SES S.A., using the NSS-9 satellite, comes to an end.

Measures to prevent drunk driving to increase

The Provost Marshal's Office would like to remind everyone that driving and boating while under the influence and public intoxication are against the law and Army regulations. These activities can also result in injury and death.

Driving under the influence occurs when an individual drives, operates or is in physical control of a vehicle while intoxicated by alcohol, drugs or other intoxicants. Vehicles include cars, trucks, golf carts, boats and other motorized transportation. An individual can be charged with driving under the influence even if he has not been in an accident. If an accident does result, an individual could be charged with additional offenses for recklessly endangering another person, or placing another person in danger of death or serious bodily injury when you drive drunk.

Public intoxication and driving while under the influence at USAG-KA can result in adverse action, up to and including a bar from the installation. If detained for these violations, an individual may also be required to stay in the detention cell to prevent the individual from harming himself or others. These crimes can also lead to charges under U.S. or RMI law, resulting in jail time and/or fines.

The Command will increase measures to ensure the safety of all residents through increased vehicle and boater sobriety checkpoints.

If someone you know is engaged in these activities, please do your part to interrupt or stop the illegal activity. Please help us keep our community safe. Prevent accidents from happening. Report violations of laws and regulations to the PMO at 54445.
