Underwater Photos of the Week



HOURLASS REPORTS

This photograph by Brandi Mueller captures a small school of **crescent-tail bigeyes** (*Priacanthus hamrur*; other common names: moontail bullseye, goggle eye, lipauw, etc.) cutting through the water at Troy's Coral Head, a large coral head located in the lagoon between Kwajalein and Enubuj (Carlson Island).

Crescent-tail bigeyes are known for their bright pumpkin-orange or ruddy exterior and big, bulbous eyes. They're found throughout tropical waters of the Pacific Ocean and Indian Ocean, as far west as eastern Africa and, reportedly, as far east as Easter Island. The fish grow to a maximum length of about 45 centimeters, habitate waters up to a depth of 250 meters and feed on crustaceans, small fish and other invertebrates.

As illustrated in Mueller's photo, crescent-tail bigeyes are often found near deep lagoon pinnacles, such as Troy's Coral Head, and outer reef slopes. And they like the safety of numbers; so if you see one, you're bound to see many more coming along behind.

YYWC awards \$54k in grants to area schools

The Yokwe Yuk Women's Club recently delivered more than \$54,000 in grants to schools in the Marshall Islands and elsewhere in Micronesia. The cash will be used by the schools—seven of which are located on Ebeye—to buy everything from projectors, printers and music instruments to computers, art supplies, building materials and much more.

The money is raised exclusively by the YYWC and its subgroup, the Education Assistance Committee, said Kwaj resident and Committee Chair Becky Harris.

"We raise this money through sales at the Micronesian Handicraft Shop, Bargain Bazaar and our Basket Auction," she said. "We're always so happy to see it going to such a good cause."

Harris and seven other club members took the opportunity to deliver, by hand, checks written out to schools on Ebeye recently. The chance to personally meet the teachers, administrators and school children who are benefited by the grants is a good way to see the impact the club is making in Micronesia, Harris said.

"It really ties it all together," she said. "It's great."

White House hosts historic summit on Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders

A nod to Asian-Pacific Islander American Heritage Month, the White House Initiative on Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders launched a historic, first-ever summit last week in the country's capital. The purpose was to stoke a national discussion on key issues impacting the Asian American and Pacific Islander communities inside and outside the continental U.S.

Issues from financial mobility, access to higher education and health-care, to civil rights and immigration were on the agenda. More than 2,000 Asian American and Pacific Islander business leaders, activists, artists and community leaders from across the country convened at George Washington University to meet with government leaders from a wide array of federal agencies.

U.S. Department of the Interior Secretary Sally Jewel, head of the agency that administers the Compact of Free Association with the Marshall Islands, joined several agency heads to outline what the nation needs to do to continue to support and empower both the Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders living within the continental U.S. and those living in overseas U.S. territories like Guam, American Samoa and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands.

A small sample of other government agencies that gathered to focus on the Asian American and Pacific Islander communities were: the Department of Labor, Department of Homeland Security and Department of Education, US. Small Business Association, Department of Health and Human Services and the office of the U.S. surgeon general.

Building on goals achieved during the past five years by the White House Initiative on Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders, the summit gave these government leaders and Asian American and Pacific Islander representatives the opportunity to outline efforts to continue to support the distinct communities in the com-

ing years and decades to come.

Focused in part on the native Hawaiian community and Pacific Islander communities located outside the continental U.S., the summit updated participants on initiatives like the Department of Health and Human Services' project to train and support health professionals in the Pacific region, in particular in the Federated States of Micronesia, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, Palau, Guam and American Samoa.

The Office of Rural Health, part of the Department of Veterans Affairs, recently funded four projects home monitoring technology to provide services for about 1,800 veterans in the Pacific Islands who currently suffer from mental health issues, as well as geriatric ailments and post-traumatic stress disorder. The office also chipped in another \$5 million to the Veterans Affairs Pacific Islands Health Care System to sponsor veterans traveling between Oahu, Hawaii and elsewhere throughout the Pacific for first-rate medical care.

Additionally, summit leaders discussed the viability of certain legal measures called land trusts, which are designed to protect native Hawaiians' right to built homes and own land for which they have traditional rights.

The reason behind the Obama administration's emphasis on issues impacting Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders is clear: Today, Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders are the fastest growing racial group in the country, growing more than four times as rapidly as the total U.S. population.

According to federal census figures, more than 19 million Asian residents lived in the country in 2013, and 1.4 million native Hawaiians and other Pacific Islander also lived in the nation. Their combined numbers are

expected to more than double to about 47 million by 2060.

To President Obama, who re-established the White House Initiative on Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders soon after entering office, these communities are a significant priority for his administration.

"I was proud to re-establish the White House Initiative on AAPIs soon after I took office, to foster opportunities for increased access to and involvement in Federal programs," the president wrote in a statement this month. "As part of that effort, my administration is expanding its regional network of federal leaders and

hosting community meetings across the country to better understand the needs of the diverse [Asian American and Pacific Islander] community."

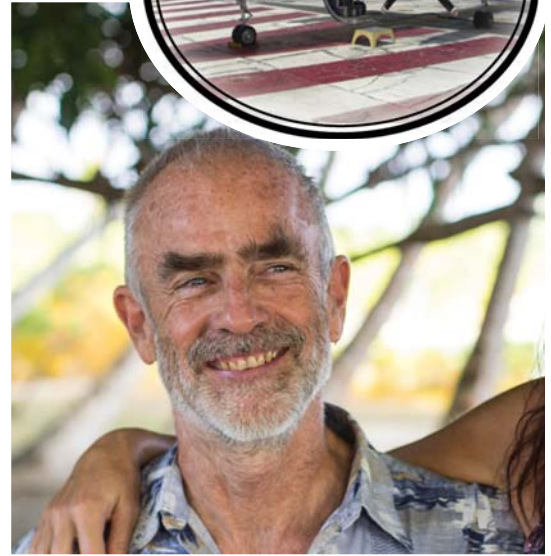
Looking forward to what the initiative, and the nation as a whole, can do to continue to bolster the well-being of this particular community, Obama encouraged all Americans to lend their support and honor Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders.

"As we commemorate Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month, we pay tribute to all those in the AAPI community who have striven for a brighter future for the next generation," Obama wrote. "Together, let us recommit to embracing the diversity that enriches our Nation and to ensuring all our people have an equal chance to succeed in the country we love."

The sparrows are an invasive species to Kwajalein. They build their nests in exhaust fans, in the ventilation holes of the electrical vaults and in the aircraft hangars.
