Last but not least sir, once again thank you very much on behalf of Kwajalein Atoll leadership and the communities of Kwajalein Atoll. How kind of you.

KWAJ FIRE DEPARTMENT KICKS OFF FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

HOURGLASS REPORTS

U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll's Kwajalein Fire Department kicked off National Fire Prevention Week Monday.

KFD staff invited the island's kids and parents out to the local food court to meet "Sparky" and "Fire Pup," the National Fire Prevention Association's famous canine mascots. The Kwaj kids got some hot, new temporary tattoos, fire prevention-themed toys, discounted ice cream and more. Parents, in turn, got some classic photos of their kids with the canines friends and got up to speed on NFPA's message for 2015: "Hear the Beep Where You Sleep."

"The intent is to bring attention to the importance of having working smoke detectors throughout the house, including bedrooms," said KFD Chief John Finley. For most residences, that means having at least two—and perhaps several—alarms in key positions throughout the house. One in each bedroom, one outside

each separate sleeping area—and having them on every level of the home—is key.

Why is this year's message so important? According to the NFPA, roughly half of all home fire deaths result from fires reported between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m., when most people are asleep. A faulty smoke alarm, or a unit with dead batteries, won't wake you as fire smoke spreads throughout the home. And, of course, if you don't wake up, you might not make it out alive.

The beginning of October each year is a time for Ameri-

ca's firefighting and fire prevention communities to come together and educate citizens on the perennial importance of fire prevention strategies.

"Fire departments across the US and abroad focus on the same theme and deliver the message to their respective areas," Finley said. "Since Kwajalein is such a small community

we are able to reach out to the residents and the schools relatively easily."

In addition to the event at the food court, KFD sponsored several more events this week, such as special visits to school classrooms, an open house at the fire station and more. Check next week's Hourglass for highlights.

Underwater Photos of the Week



HOURLASS REPORTS

This *granulated sea star* (*Choriaster granulatus*) was recently photographed by Kwajalein resident Lynda Reynolds. These tropical starfish are found throughout much of the Indian Ocean, especially along Africa's eastern coast, and the western Pacific, from Japan in the north to New Caledonia in the south. The granulated sea star is one of nearly 1,500 species of starfish that live in the planet's oceans.

Choriaster granulatus is known for its ruddy, pink hue and its five stubby little conical arms, a feature for which the species is often called the doughboy star. Like other sea stars, the species feeds on small invertebrates, dead marine animals and coral polyps. It lives at depths of up to 40 meters, typically among coral reefs and rubble where there is ample food to graze on, and can reproduce both sexually and asexually.

KWAJALEIN RECLAIMED WATER STANDARD VIOLATION

The Reclaimed Water Document of Environmental Protection (DEP) requires public notification when reclaimed water standards are violated. The reclaimed water system exceeded the Biochemical Oxygen Demand (BOD) limitation of 10 milligrams per liter (mg/L). Per sampling requirements, the weekly sample was collected at the reclaimed water system's point of entry on 11 September, 2015 and had a measured concentration of 10.3 mg/L. The following weekly sample, collected on 18 September, had a measured concentration of 5.1 mg/L, indicating compliance. BOD levels are used as an indicator of bacteria levels. However, regular bacteriological sampling within the reclaimed water system showed no increase during this time. No health-based restrictions on the normal use (irrigation, vehicle washing, etc) of reclaimed (non-potable) water are necessary. Additionally, there was no threat to public health or the environment as a result of this BOD exceedance. If you have any questions, please call the environmental department 51134.

Compressed gas cylinder storage

Compressed gas cylinders are hazardous, due to their high pressure and the gas properties they may contain. This Simply Safety explains how gas cylinders should be stored.

1. Full and empty cylinders must be segregated according to their contents. Flammables and other gases must also be a minimum of 20 feet away from each other or segregated by a one-hour fire wall. They must also be 20 feet away and uphill from flammable liquids. All cylinders must be stored in a well-ventilated area.



2. Empty and full cylinders of the same contents can be stored together in a well-ventilated space as long as they are separated by rows or lines that are visible.



3. All cylinders must be stored in an upright position; some exceptions, determined by ES&H may apply. They must be secured by a chain or strap two-thirds of the way up the cylinder.



4. The contents of all cylinders must be labeled on the cylinder's exterior.

5. Compressed gas cylinders must not be stored near electrical circuits, breaker panels of extension cords.



6. If storing cylinders outside, all requirements listed above must be met. Additionally, the cylinders must be protected from sunrays and salt spray. Lastly, they must not be stored on the ground; a platform keeping the cylinders off the ground is required.
