ARMY LEADERS HONOR AND THANK VETERANS





his photo of a warty egg cowrie (Calpyrnus verrucosus; also known as the verruca cowrie) comes from Kwaj resident Stan Jazwinski. Photographed during a night dive on a coral head near Ebeye, the cowrie is shown grazing a path along the surface of a soft coral growth.

Found throughout the Indo-Pacific region, warty egg cowries—a type of marine gastropod mollusk—are known for the distinctive color patterns covering their shells and mantles: black dots on their mantles and yellow and white spots on their shells.

They live at depths up to a maximum of 150 feet, and they have few predators besides shell-hunting humans. Some venomous species of sea snails and octopuses can gobble these creatures up by first injecting them with venom and then sucking out the innards through their apertures.





The Ri'katak student program at Kwajalein Schools is an opportunity for our Marshallese neighbors to further their education. less than \$9,500, we've still got a long way to go to reach our goal of \$30,000. We need your

The program, which began in 1987, is powered in part by the Ri'katak Lunch Program—an ongoing initiative to provide Marshallese students lunch during the school day. Because the children do not have the opportunity to return home for lunch as the island resident students do, they fill their bellies with lunches provided through the Ri'katak Lunch Program.

Prepared by staff at the Captain Louis S. Zamperini Dining Facility, each boxed lunch includes a deli sandwich or baked chicken and rice, fruit, vegetables, water and cookies.

To fill all our bagged lunches with nutritious meals each school day, we need your help.

At a daily cost of \$3.40 per student and based on a 180-day school year, the total cost per student for the entire academic year is \$612. There are 48 Ri'katak students enrolled at Kwajalein Schools this year.

The Ri'katak Lunch Program requests donations each year from the community so that each student may have a healthy lunch to power them through the school day. Individuals, companies and different organizations may contribute to the program. They may contribute any amount they wish.

Positive Total Coliform in Drinking Water on Kwajalein Island

Drinking water in the distribution systems is tested weekly for microbiological contaminants (coliform). Coliform are bacteria that are naturally present in the environment and are used as an indicator that other, potentially-harmful, bacteria may be present. Coliforms were found in two samples collected on October 27, 2015 in the Kwajalein drinking water system. The drinking water system exceeded the monthly allowable level because coliforms were found in more than one sample. No harmful bacteria (fecal coliform/E. Coli) were found in test sites and the chlorine disinfectant levels were within drinking water standards. Repeat samples were collected at the two positive sample sites as well as up and down stream of the two sites. Total coliforms were not found in all repeat samples. Based on the repeat sample results, the Kwajalein water system is in compliance with the microbiological contaminant drinking water standard. Sampling will occur at an increased frequency of twice per week until negative results are observed for three consecutive weeks. This is not an emergency; no precautionary measures are necessary; and no health problems were reported.

THE SKY

It's Taurid meteor shower time, and Kwajalein Atoll is in a good location to allow residents to get some dazzling views of meteors burning up in the atmosphere.

Every year, the Earth passes through debris trailing behind Comet Encke, impacting the icy ball's remains at a speed of 65,000 mph. The planet enters the comet's trail from September-November, but it's in early November that the shower produces the best show.

The peak of the shower is expected to last until Nov. 12.

The Taurid shower isn't usually as brilliant as other, more prominent showers, such as the Leonids, which peak later in November. But because the moon is below the horizon at this time, it won't drown out all those faint meteors that usually go unseen. In fact, this year NASA and the American Meteor Society expect an increased number of fireballs-extremely bright meteors that often burn in the atmosphere longer than typical meteors. One such fireball was spotted by several atoll residents Monday evening. What some first thought might have been a Minuteman III or a large piece of spent space junk re-entering the atmosphere was actually a Taurid fireball. Hopefully a few more of those behemoths come our way in the coming days!

VIEWING TIPS

To best view the Taurid shower, look east during the hours between midnight and dawn; you may go out earlier than midnight, but less meteors may be visible at that time.

The meteors enter the atmosphere from the direction of the constellation Taurus the Bull-the namesake of the Taurid shower. An easy way to locate Taurus is to first locate Orion's "belt." Imagine that a line connects the three stars forming the belt. Extend that line outward from the belt (to the "right" of Orion) until you almost run into a bright star nearby. That star is Aldebaran; it is one of the brightest stars in the night sky, and it is part of Tauris. Extend that imaginary line further, and you run into the open star cluster the Pleiades (Messier 45). It is in the region near Aldebaran and the Pleiades that the meteors will hit the hardest.

SCAFFOLDING SAFETY

Scaffolding is a common tool in construction and, like every other tool, it must be in good condition or it can be a hazard. The result of an improperly built scaffold is usually a fall. This Simply Safety lists some important measures that need to be part of your safety

KRS has a Scaffold Tagging Program to let you know the status of a scaffold, whether it can be used, or how it can be used.

- GREEN TAG: The scaffold has been built to Occupa tional Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) standards and is safe to use.
- YELLOW TAG: The scaffold has not been built to OSHA standards, meaning that a proper guardrail system could not be installed. You must wear and use a harness on these scaffolds.
- RED TAG: This scaffold is not complete; it is either being built or dismantled. Do not use it for any reason!
- NO TAG: DO NOT USE until the party that built the scaffolding inspects and re-tags it.
- Do not use a scaffold until you have received training to do so from KRS ES&H Dept. Call 5-3532 to arrange training.
- Do not alter a scaffold. Ask the party that built it to make any changes you need. Do not remove guardrails, planks or any other parts. The next person to use that scaffold may not know you have made changes, and you may have changed it from "safe to use" status to "harness-required" status.
- If you need a platform to work from, do not just throw a couple of planks down and use them as a work surface. Planks that run from a beam to beam without having guardrails and being secured to the beam are unacceptable. Have a platform properly built under the supervision of a trained individual even if you need it for only five minutes. Remember: It takes only two seconds to fall 60 feet.
- All scaffolds are required to have a ladder. Climbing the framework is prohibited unless the framework is designed with a built-in ladder.
- Remember that when you are working on a scaffold, you are probably working over someone else. Tie your tools off if necessary. When cutting, burning or welding, use a fire blanket. Above all else, alert the people below that what you are doing may be a hazard to them.
