ARMY RECOGNIZES NATIVE AMERICAN ACHIEVEMENTS

Native American First Lt. Alonzo Cushing is one of 27 Native Americans who have earned the Medal of Honor. On the third day of the Battle of Gettysburg, July 3, 1863, Cushing commanded 126 men and six cannons and faced down Confederate Maj. Gen. George Pickett, who intended to pierce the Union line. Within just a few hours, all of Cushing's officers had been killed, and all but two of his guns had been silenced. During the Confederate cannonade, he was wounded in the abdomen, as well as the right shoulder. Refusing to evacuate, despite his severe wounds, he directed the operation of his two remaining guns and fired in the face of the enemy. When the rebels were less than 100 yards from his position, Cushing was shot in the head and died instantly. His actions materially aided the Union Army's successful repulse of the Confederate assault. History shows that the Confederacy would be on the defensive from this point forward, and never again mount a major offensive.

MARSHALLESE HEAD TO POLLS

housands of Marshall Islands citizens came in droves Monday to the Island Community Center on Ebeve to cast their ballots in the Republic of the Marshall Islands' 2015 local and national elections. While many came to the polls from their homes on Ebeye, others travelled down the east reef causeway from Gugeegue, North Loi and so on to get to Ebeye. Others living on Enubuj (Carlson) Ennylabegan (Carlos) and Bigej came in via boats. All endured long lines that snaked throughout the entrance of the community center to registration tables and finally to voting booths where citizens marked in their choices on paper ballots before slipping them into secure boxes, each marked with the name of the voter's respective voting district.

The elections gave R.M.I. citizens in the islands, including those outside the country using mail-in ballots, the opportunity to reset their political representation nationally and locally. At each polling station, voters wrote in their choices for their local atoll government council members, their atoll mayor and their senators. The last opportunity they had to do so was during the election cycle in 2011, when voters' current leaders were voted in.

Ebeye's wasn't the only polling station open on Kwajalein Atoll Monday. In addition to Ebeye, there was one opened at Ennubirr, Majetto and Ebadon, the latter two of which are located at the northwest tip of the atoll. Citizens on the atoll, and elsewhere on other atolls and islands, either made their way to the closest polling station, or they mailed in their ballots from outside the country.

The most local level of democratic political governance for an atoll's residents is the local atoll government council, and on Kwajalein Atoll all nine Kwajalein Atoll

Local Government Council member positions were up for grabs this year. More than 50 candidates campaigned for the positions. Those who get voted in will work with and advise the incoming mayor, also to be elected, in drafting regulations governing all local aspects of life on the islands that make up Kwajalein Atoll. (The islands making up U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll are an exception).

At the top echelon of local democratic atoll governance is the atoll mayor, and eight candidates battled for the top spot. Following the passing of late KALGOV Mayor Johnny Lemari in March, the incoming mayor will take over from acting Mayor Card Subille and lead the local atoll government council. Because R.M.I. law forbids mail-in ballots from being opened and tallied until 10 days after the election, the results of both of these elections are still undecided at the time of this writing and will likely not be released until early December.

On the national level, 33 senators represent the R.M.I. citizenry in 24 districts, and all of those senators were up for re-election during the 2015 election cycle. Each district is allotted its number of senators based on the district's population size—similar to the number of representatives each U.S. state has in the House of Representatives. Majuro Atoll, for instance, is afforded five senators; Kwajalein Atoll, with a population of 12,000, is afforded three senators. Kwajalein Atoll Sens. Jeban Riklon, Tony deBrum (de-Brum is also the current R.M.I. foreign minister) and Iroij Michael Kabua were up for re-election this year.

They faced challenges by four atoll natives: Stephen Dribo, Ataji Balos, Alvin Jacklick and David Paul. Again, because of R.M.I. law, the results of these elections will not be released until early December.

Finally, it should be noted that, unlike the United States, the R.M.I's political framework does not allow for citizens to decide, via an electoral vote, the nation's president. The individual who becomes the president of the Marshall Islands is decided by the next crop of 33 senators placed into power by the voters. They make the selection via a vote at the start of the Nitijela's next session the following January after the election. The newly-elected president will then select 10 senators out of the remaining pool of 32 to fill the positions in his executive cabinet.

JAPANESE GUESTS REMEMBER WAR DEAD

embers of the Japanese Air Self Defense Force stopped briefly on Kwajalein Monday to refuel their aircraft on their way to Hawaii. Japanese Maj. Gen. Yasuhiko Suzuki, Col. Yuichi Tokushige and seven other officers in their party used the time to pay respects to more than 4,000 Japanese soldiers who were killed during the Battle of Kwajalein in 1944.

U.S. Army Garrison Kwajalein Atoll maintains a memorial site for the Japanese soldiers who fought and died here during World War II. Col. Michael Larsen, commander of USAG-KA, and Command Sgt. Maj. Angela Rawlings joined the visiting Japanese officers as they each took turns bowing and praying silently at the memorial site Monday.

"It was a great honor for me to participate in this solemn ceremony, honoring these warriors side by side with our Japanese allies," Larsen said. "It is a great privilege to live on an historic battlefield. Moreover I take great pride in honoring the U.S. and Japanese sacrifice that took place here."

Rawlings was previously stationed in Okinawa and spoke with the officers about her experiences in their home country.

The Japanese visitors ate breakfast at the Luis Zamperini Dining Facility and received a windshield tour of the island before their departure. For most of them, including the major general, it was their first time on Kwajalein.

"We greatly appreciate this opportunity to be here, and especially the "They were also from Okinawa, so we had a good commander and sergeant major taking time to participate with us," Suzuki said. "I enjoyed meeting them and seeing the beautiful Island of Kwajalein."

VETS HALL EVENT AIDS MIA PROJECT

All proceeds from the event went directly toward the operating costs of the M.I.A. Project, a local non-profit focused on finding aircraft and vessels destroyed in area waters during WWII operations. The project's volunteers will use the cash made during the event to go toward the purchase of a sonar device that will aid in the search of aviators and seamen who went down with their vehicles during and after Operation Flintlock in 1944. In all, more than \$13,000 in cash was raised for the group.

NATIONAL ARCHIVES RELEASE NEW 1972 KWAJ, ROI FOOTAGE

ational Archives and Records Administration's Motion Picture Preservation Lab staff recently got in touch with the Kwajalein Hourglass again last week. Heidi Holmstrom, the Marylandbased lab specialist who reached out to the publication in August (see the Aug. 29, 2015 Hourglass issue), relayed some news: Lab staff have just digitized two additional reels of film footage shot by Army Signal Corps personnel visiting the atoll in MayJuly 1972.

The footage, uploaded to YouTube, is a real treasure trove for those interested in the history of the garrison. In addition to many shots of garrison residents riding their bikes and using Community Services facilities like the pools, post office, chapel, there are some very interesting clips of aerial shots of Kwajalein, Ebeye—with a 1972 population of only about 6,000—Roi-Namur and the island's radars, Meck and the outer garrison islands. Positive Total Coliform in Drinking Water on Kwajalein Island Drinking water in the distribution systems is tested weekly for microbiological contaminants (coliform). Coliform are bacteria that are naturally present in the environment and are used as an indicator that other, potentiallyharmful, bacteria may be present. Coliforms were found in two samples collected on October 27, 2015 in the Kwajalein drinking water system. The drinking water system exceeded the monthly allowable level because coliforms were found in more than one sample. No harmful bacteria (fecal coliform/E. Coli) were found in test sites and the chlorine disinfectant levels were within drinking water standards. Repeat samples were collected at the two positive sample sites as well as up and down stream of the two sites. Total coliforms were not found in all repeat samples. Based on the repeat sample results, the Kwajalein water system is in compliance with the microbiological contaminant drinking water standard. Sampling will occur at an increased frequency of twice per week until negative results are observed for three consecutive weeks. This is not an emergency; no precautionary measures are necessary; and no health problems were reported. If you have any further questions, please contact Rachael Harris at 50506.
