


RANGE OPERATION NOTICE-KWAJALEIN RESTRICTED AREAS



NEW HOSPITAL MEDICAL BILLING PROCEDURE

The Kwajalein Hospital business office has implemented an improved billing service for our Kwajalein Atoll and Roi Namur customers. The hospital billing office now handles filing your claims directly with your insurance company and applies the insurance payment against your account at the hospital. Statements will be issued to customers quarterly, or upon request from the hospital business office. Customers will no longer be required to settle medical bills at the KRS Finance Office. As we transition over to this improved process, we have had customers receive checks from the insurance company that should have been sent to the hospital. If you have received an insurance check, please bring it in to the Hospital Business Office or mail it via MPS. Payments are also accepted via credit card. We will apply payments directly to your account in the hospital system. There have been no changes to the Pharmacy Medication payment process. Thank you for allowing us to serve you!





TRENCH SAFETY

Never access an excavation deeper than 4 feet (1.2 meters) that has not been sloped, and/or shored and a dig permit completed.

ever enter an excavation or trench, or direct others to enter without a dig permit and a prior, documented, daily inspection by a Competent Person.

Never enter an excavation greater than 4 feet unless it has been sloped and/or shored in accordance with the dig permit.

Never operate equipment to remove soil and/or dig without a valid dig permit and a Competent Person present.

Adequate ingress/egress such as stairs and ladders are required within 25 feet (7.6 meters) of each worker in all trenches greater than 4 feet (1.2 meters) in depth.



FATIGUE

Fatigue is one of the leading causes of injury at the workplace and at home. Operating mobile equipment while fatigued can be fatal to you and others and is as dangerous as operating while impaired due to drugs and alcohol. When we

become increasingly fatigued, our ability to plan ahead also diminishes. As our fatigue increases:

- Our risk for injury increases
- Our decision making process and reaction time slow down
- Our ability to process information and handle multiple tasks decrease

Recognizing Fatigue

It is important to be able to recognize the early signs of fatigue in ourselves as well as others so that we can take appropriate steps to mitigate the

- Head nodding and muscles relaxing
- Irrational decisions
- Aggression or anger

Tips for staying Alert

Listed below are tips to help get you through challenging times

due to fatigue both on and off the job

- Periodically rotate jobs, keep it fresh. When possible, set up a job rotation schedule if the work is mundane and not stimulating.
- Time the use of coffee and caffeinated drinks for when you need it. This might be midway through a typical night shift.
- Prioritize sleep, especially on work days. You should target a minimum of 7 hours and use naps to fill in the gaps when your sleep is reduce.
