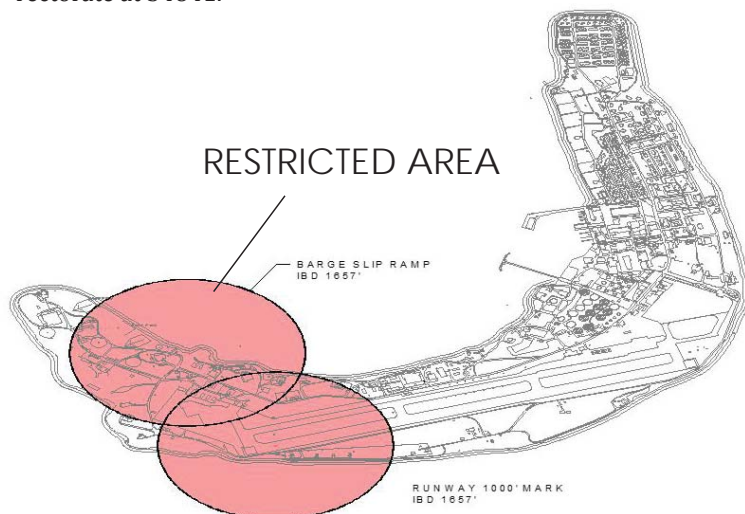

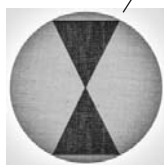

## NEW HOSPITAL MEDICAL BILLING PROCEDURE

*The Kwajalein Hospital business office* has implemented an improved billing service for our Kwajalein Atoll and Roi Namur customers. The hospital billing office now handles filing your claims directly with your insurance company and applies the insurance payment against your account at the hospital. Statements will be issued to customers quarterly, or upon request from the hospital business office. Customers will no longer be required to settle medical bills at the KRS Finance Office. As we transition over to this improved process, we have had customers receive checks from the insurance company that should have been sent to the hospital. If you have received an insurance check, please bring it in to the Hospital Business Office or mail it via MPS. Payments are also accepted via credit card. 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# KARC POST CARD RETURNED TO SENDER 38 LONG YEARS LATER

Kwajalein Post Office staff got a surprise in the mail last week. A Kwajalein Amateur Radio Club postcard, originally sent off to a currently-unknown ham radio operator in the U.S. in 1977, came back to the post office with a short message: "Return to sender. No such number. Unable to Forward."

The sender, a fella' with the first name of John (last name unknown) at the KARC KX6BU station on Kwaj, had sent this card all the way to a fellow ham operator working under operator ID WAZLWF in Syracuse, New York, more than 7,000 miles away as the bird flies. Apparently, the operators at KX6BU and WAZLWF had made radio contact (aka a QSO, in ham speak) and conversed May 27, 1977. And John, the pre-Internet era Kwaj resident that he was, sent this QSL ("confirmation") card—replete with \$0.09 stamp and all—through the post as a sort of receipt for logging that conversation. Think of it as something like a long distance (and very nerdy) high-five.

Today, these QSL confirmations almost always occur online, of course—not with postcards. But the allure is the same: collecting these babies is part of what drives amateur ham operators' enthusiasm for the hobby. Kwaj radio buff Rob Taylor wrote me via email Thursday.

"People log them," he wrote. "There are leagues for having a

certain amount of different countries 'verified' by QSL cards."

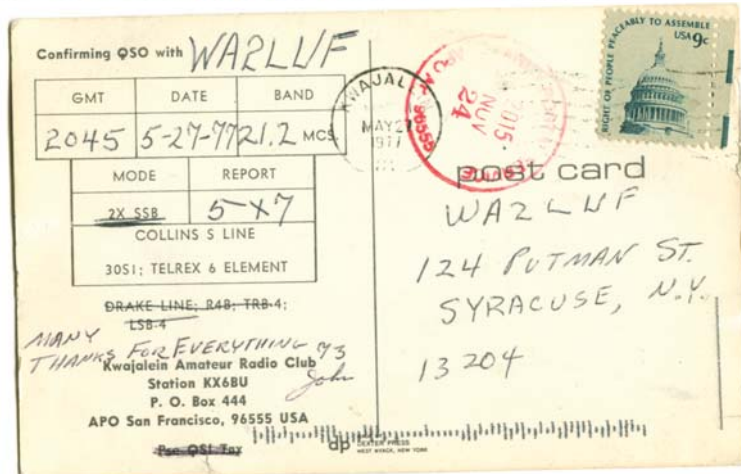
The farther away the QSO contact, the more the appeal. Taylor, for instance, at the KX6BU controls once conversed with an operator in the Canary Islands. The shortest, most direct route to the islands follows the curve of the Earth along a path north through Alaska, the barren lands of northern Canada, back south through Greenland and toward the mid latitudinal region west of Morocco. That's a journey of 10,000 miles, a rare treat. In perspective, the 7,000-mile trip (again, think straight line, following the curve of the Earth) to Syracuse isn't as mazing, but still quite respectable, Taylor clarified.

"It all depends on atmospheric conditions," he wrote. "We get into the east coast with voice pretty regularly on about 100 watts of power. It's cool, but it's not a once-in-a-blue-moon kind of thing."

The QSO'd conversation still merited a QSL receipt, though, Taylor agreed. Most definitely. So what happened to John's postcard? It certainly didn't make it to the WAZLWF operator in Syracuse. That part we know; everything else is a mystery.

Why the card was never actually delivered might have something to do with the likelihood that John misspelled "Putnam St.," addressing the postcard to "Putman St." instead. A once-over of Syracuse using Google Maps shows no "Putman St." in that area code. 124 Putnam Street, on the other hand, is located in a residential section a little over a mile from the closest post office in the area. Come on, John!

So maybe that's it: a simple, open-and-shut case of another misspelled address and another distant ham radio operator never getting his promised QSL card, his nerdy high-five getting left hanging in the air, unanswered.



But, really, if that actually is the answer, more troubling questions come to mind: If the card should have instead gone to Putnam Street, why didn't the post office staff there figure that out? The intended address is obvious. Putnam, after all, is a pretty common proper noun; "Putman," on the other hand, is indubitably not.

Even worse, if the post office staff didn't know where to deliver it, why did it take 38 long years for them to return the postcard to John on Kwaj? That's 38 years! John's QSL card sat through nearly six entire U.S. presidential administrations, tucked away in some dark cobweb-entombed corner in a Syracuse post office, and it only now found its way back to the sender.

Did a scrupulous postal service employee recently stumble across a dusty trove of undelivered mail that some mail man squirreled out of sight years ago? Maybe the postcard was simply flagged as having an invalid address, shelved for return at a later time and forgotten about. Maybe it simply fell into a small crevice in a sorting

machine way back then, only to be found a couple of weeks ago when technicians swapped out equipment. Maybe this is all just a devious practical joke meant to send Hourglass editors on wild goose chases. The questions abound. My mind is boggling, and the fact that no one picks up the phone at that post office closest to 124 Putnam Street isn't helping! Also who the heck is John?

Thursday, I decided to call some post office staff who I know. Kwajalein Postmaster Aaron Tucker said that, like me, he had no clue why the postcard sat in limbo for so long. But being a sensible, rational man, Tucker assured me that no strange, dark forces are at play here and that the card most likely was indeed shelved for later or lost in an old piece of machinery and then found and sent back to Kwaj. The USPS handles gazillions of letters and packages each year. Stuff like this happens every now and then. Besides, it's just a QSL card, not the Magna Carta. Oh well. I guess that's that.

But wait! What if ...

... ..

... No, no I'm kidding. I'm done. I'm going to go check my mail.
