OPM REACHES OUT TO USAG-KA RESIDENTS IMPACTED BY HACK

The U.S. Office of Personnel Management wrapped up an initial push last week to make contact with the U.S. citizens whose personal information was stolen by hackers in a massive December 2014 breach believed to have originated in China.

Thought to be the heftiest hack against the U.S. government in the nation's history, the incident resulted in the theft of reams of sensitive data on 21.5 million Americans obtained during background investigations and security clearance reviews. That stolen data included social security numbers, employment histories, prior address listings, birthdates and places of birth, the identification of family members and personal acquaintances—even fingerprints and more.

According to the OPM, 93 percent of the 21.5 million victims have now received letters, which both confirm the theft of the individuals' information and outline the office's efforts to safeguard those victims against identity theft and fraud. Hundreds of Kwajalein and Roi-Namur residents received letters, urging them to visit the OPM website. There, residents may verify the receipt of letters and sign up for the identity protection services the government has offered for a three-year period at no cost.

Should you do it? The answer is a resounding yes.

The sign-up process for OPM's services via Identity Theft Guard's myIDcare program took only 10 minutes—yep, my data was swindled, too—and, in within only a few clicks, I was signed up for free credit reports and credit monitoring from the three major credit bureaus. In addition to being able to keep tabs on your credit lines in real time, myIDcare will send you email alerts regarding a wide array of stuff impacting your credit and identity. If some sleazeball tries to take out a car loan against your name (or your children's), redirect your mail or sell your info at one of the thousands of online marketplaces for illegally-obtained personal information, you should get an alert from myIDcare. Moreover, if someone does manage to get past those defenses, you'll have identity theft insurance up to \$1 million (with a \$0 deductible) for all out-of-pocket expenses resulting from any fraudulent activity. And myIDcare's Total Identity Recovery system serves as a support team to help clear up the legal muck caused by an identity theft incident.

Of course, all this information is straight from the horse's mouth. Who's to say how well these services actually work? The vast majority of USAG-KA residents have never been in this situation before. It's uncharted ground, and it's a little unsettling. Personally, knowing very well that some basement-dwelling, pasty-skinned computer nerd is sitting on everything from my social security number to copies of my fingerprints makes me want to go into an apoplectic rage. Those are my fingerprints. I was using those!

Still, the deed is done, and there's nothing we can do to prevent the hack now. The best thing we can do is sign up for OPM's services and keep a watchful eye for anything out of the ordinary. The sign-up process, again, is a breeze, and, at face value, the wide array of protective features available does seem like a solid, good-faith effort on OPM's part to help make things right.

The customary symbolism of orange represents bravery, and white represents peace. The star represents the cross of Christianity, with each of the 24 points signifying a municipal district of the RMI. The four main points on the star represent the major centers of Majuro, Ebeye, Jaluit and Wotje.

THE MEN AND WOMEN BEHIND KWAJALEIN'S BIGGEST CONSTRUCTION BUILDS—PART 1

They're welders, carpenters, safety officers, construction managers, mechanics and administrative personnel. They're fishermen, fathers, mothers, scuba divers and snorkelers. They're the newest addition to the U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll family, and they're the people behind the most important construction projects on Kwajalein right now, from the Space Fence sensor facility to the massive Building 602 project. During an evening bike ride down to the Space Fence Living Quarters areas at Camp Hamilton and Coral Sands, here are just a few of the interesting folks you'll meet.

CHARLES WILLIAMSON is brand-new to U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll, having arrived three weeks ago. A concrete finisher for Nan, Inc., he and his team have been cranking up the intensity on their jobsite at the new annex power plant that will give the Space Fence facility all the juice it needs to fulfill its space debris, satellite and launch tracking missions. As for how he's taken to Kwaj? "It's a pretty place," Williamson says. "It's nice and warm, that's for sure. ... I like the company I work for. I have a great support network and a good foreman. Yeah, it's good."

JASON POPEVIS is another San Juan Construction employee fresh off the plane. Having arrived 1.5 months ago, he's the man in charge of his company's fleet of vehicles. "I run the vehicle maintenance shop for us," he says. "I'm in charge of the maintenance for them and the check out for them and just the overall ordering of parts and keeping track of all our equipment. We have everything. Excavators, front-end loaders, dump trucks, forklifts, man lifts, anything we need to build with. We have somewhere around 200-some-odd pieces of equipment." Living and working on Kwaj is a breath of fresh air, Popevis says. "It's beautiful. The weather. It's warm. Everybody's friendly. I don't know, it's just—I love it. If you've got to work, there's no better place in the world to work."

STEVE AND LANI HERGENREDER work for San Juan Construction and live at the camp across from Camp Hamilton Beach. A project superintendent for the Space Fence construction project, Steve has lived and worked on Kwajalein for 1.5 years. His wife Lani came out in early October to work as an administrative assistant for San Juan and, of course, be with Steve. They say that, in addition to a good group of people they work with on the job, the island offers a suite of perks that they enjoy, from snorkeling and boating, to fishing and lounging on the beach. "Yeah, we don't miss a weekend not going to the beach," Steve says.

DAVID SHASSETZ is a Kwaj retiree, having lived and worked on Kwajalein in the 1980s on several of the Army's radars that were active back then. Now a site safety and health officer, he returned in Feb. 2014 to work with San Juan Construction on the Space Fence build and the Building 602 project. He's glad to be back, he says, to once again contribute to his country's national security. The perks of life on a tropical island are good, too. "I do enjoy the breezes and the people. A lot of happy times out here for folks. I used to scuba dive out here. Saw every wreck we've got in the lagoon. I used to collect a lot of shells, but we're not allowed to do that anymore."

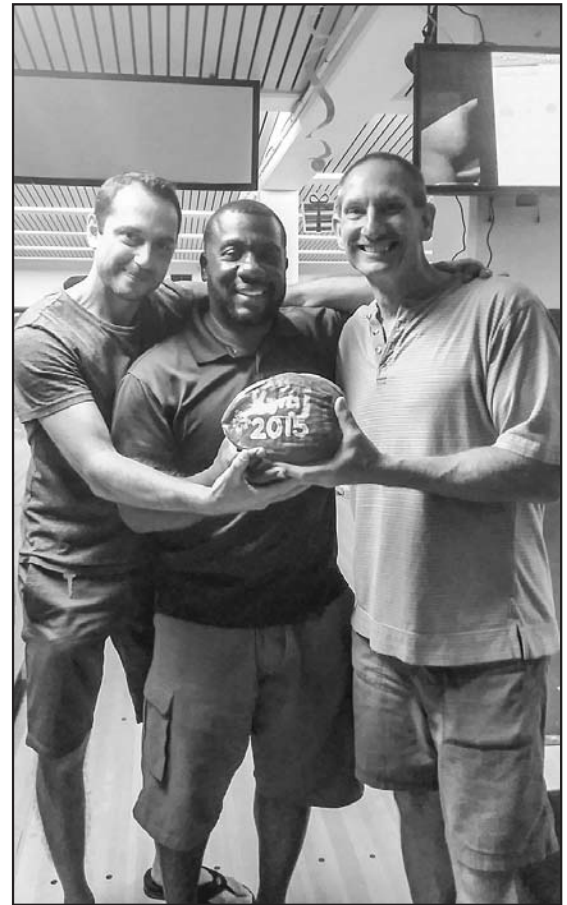
