INDONESIAN KRI DIPONEGORO CREW TAKE LEAVE ON KWAJ

HOURLASS REPORT

Indonesian Naval Vessel KRI Diponegoro and crew pulled into Echo Pier at Kwajalein June 17 for a brief reprieve from a long trans-Pacific journey from Indonesia to Hawaii. After refueling and getting a few days of rest and relaxation on the island, the crew pulled out June 22 and headed on its way.

En route to the 2016 RIMPAC naval wargames, an extensive international exercise hosted by the U.S. Navy's Pacific Fleet at Hawaii every other year, the Indonesian crew got the opportunity to stretch their legs in what was for many their first visit to Kwajalein and the greater Marshall Islands.

Inviting the U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll community

aboard their Dutch-built Sigma-class corvette for public tours June 20, the ship's crew shared a bit of what it's like serving in Indonesia's Navy and what their ship has to offer. The 300-foot-long, 1,700-ton vessel sleeps 80 and packs capabilities that make it ideal for search-and-rescue missions, sea patrols and anti-submarine warfare. It was commissioned in 2007.

In Hawaii, the crew will coordinate with dozens of ships and thousands of crewmembers from more than a dozen nations (the vast majority being Pacific nations), all of whom have been invited by the U.S. Navy's Pacific Fleet to join forces and work together in naval exercises. Those exercises will range from simulated battle scenarios and weapons testing to natural disaster relief operations and cultural exchange performances.

The Kwaj teammates got shellacked, but they had a good time, they said. They shared the bleachers with the Indonesians for a huge group photo after the game and wished them luck and safe journeys during their voyage to Hawaii.

THIS WEEK IN KWAJALEIN HOURLASS HISTORY



FRANK C. HEALY

COL. FRANK C. HEALY ARRIVES ON KWAJALEIN

COL FRANK C. HEALY ARRIVED TODAY ON THE NIKE-X CHAPTER FLIGHT, AND WILL ASSUME COMMAND OF THE KWAJALEIN TEST SITE ON JULY 2 CONCURRENT WITH THE DEPARTURE OF COL MELVIN D. CLARK, WHO HAS BEEN ASSIGNED TO THE STAFF AND FACULTY OF THE ARMY WAR COLLEGE AT CARLISLE BARRACKS IN PENNSYLVANIA, HAVING COMMANDED THE KTS SINCE JANUARY 21 OF LAST YEAR.

COL HEALY, WHO COMES TO KWAJALEIN FROM A POSITION WITH THE OFFICE OF PRODUCTION AND SAFETY OF THE ATOM C ENERGY COMMISSION'S DIVISION OF MILITARY APPLICATION IN WASHINGTON, ENTERED THE ARMY IN JULY, 1939. HE SERVED INITIALLY WITH THE 4TH CAVALRY AT FT MEADE, S D, AND LATER AS AN INSTRUCTOR AT THE CAVALRY SCHOOL AT FT RILEY, KAN. IN 1943 HE REJOINED THE 4TH AT THE DESERT TRAINING CENTER IN CALIFORNIA AND MOVED WITH IT TO CAMP MAXCY, TEX. LATER THAT YEAR HE WAS ASSIGNED TO ENGLAND AND SUBSEQUENTLY TOOK PART IN THE INVASION OF FRANCE. AFTER THE WAR, HE ATTENDED THE COMMAND AND GENERAL STAFF COLLEGE AND THEN THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS UNDER THE REGULAR ARMY CIVIL SCHOOLING PROGRAM. HE RECEIVED AN M.S. DEGREE IN ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING FROM ILLINOIS IN 1948 AND WAS ASSIGNED TO THE ARMORED SCHOOL AT FT KNOX SHORTLY THEREAFTER AS A COMMUNICATIONS INSTRUCTOR.

IN EARLY 1950, COL HEALY TRANSFERRED TO THE ORDNANCE CORPS AND SERVED ON THE ORDNANCE BOARD AT ABERDEEN PROVING GROUND UNTIL THE FALL OF 1951 WHEN HE WAS GIVEN COMMAND OF THE ARMY'S FIRST SPECIAL WEAPONS UNIT AT SANDIA BASE. SUBSEQUENTLY, HE COMMANDED THE 14TH ORDNANCE BATTALION AT SANDIA AND WHITE SANDS.

HE WAS NAMED CHIEF OF THE UNIT TRAINING DIVISION, FIELD COMMAND, AFSWP, AT SANDIA IN MARCH, 1956, AND IN JANUARY OF 1958 WAS ASSIGNED TO THE ARMED FORCES STAFF COLLEGE. HE WAS MADE CHIEF OF THE SPECIAL WEAPONS SECTION AT ORDNANCE HEADQUARTERS IN JUNE OF THAT YEAR AND IN AUGUST OF 1961 WENT TO LETTERKENNY ARMY DEPOT AS DIRECTOR FOR SUPPLY OPERATIONS. HE WAS GIVEN HIS AEC ASSIGNMENT IN JULY OF 1963.

COL HEALY WAS BORN IN BUCKLAND, CONN., IN 1917. HE ATTENDED MASSACHUSETTS STATE AND WAS GRADUATED IN 1939 WITH A B.S. IN CHEMISTRY. HE IS A MEMBER OF SIGMA PHI EPSILON AND THE KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS.

COL HEALY AND HIS WIFE, THE FORMER MARY R. MOYNIHAN OF HOLYOKE, MASS., HAVE THREE CHILDREN. JAMES, 21, KEVIN, 16, AND KATHLEEN ANN, 9.

MEET GLOBAL'S BOB OLDS, NEW MANAGER OF YOKWE YUK

PRIOR TO THAT TIME BOB WAS A MEMBER OF THE NAVY FOOD SERVICES TEAM OPERATING OUT OF NEWPORT, R.I. IN THAT POSITION WHICH HE HELD FROM 1957 TO 1960, HE PARTICIPATED IN THE PLANNING AND EXECUTION OF MANY OFFICIAL FOOD FUNCTIONS, INCLUDING A BEACH PARTY PLANNED FOR THEN-PRESIDENT AND MRS. EISENHOWER. DURING THIS TIME, BOB GAINED CONSIDERABLE EXPERIENCE IN THE PREPARATION AND SERVING OF SEAFOOD DISHES.

STRATCOM DETECTS, TRACKS NORTH KOREAN MISSILE LAUNCHES

OFFUTT AIR FORCE BASE, Nebraska — U.S. Strategic Command systems detected and tracked what we assess were two North Korean missile launches at 3:56 p.m. CDT and 6:03 p.m. CDT, June 21, 2016. The launch of two presumed Musudan intermediate range ballistic missiles occurred at Wonsan.

The missiles were tracked over the Sea of Japan, where initial indications are they fell.

The North American Aerospace Defense Command (NORAD) determined the missile launches from North Korea did not pose a threat to North America.

The men and women of USSTRATCOM, NORAD and U.S. Northern Command, and U.S. Pacific Command remain vigilant in the face of North Korean provocations and are fully committed to working closely with our Republic of Korea and Japanese allies to maintain security.

USSTRATCOM's mission is to conduct global operations in synchronization with other combatant commands and appro-



appropriate U.S. government agencies to detect, deter and prevent strategic attacks against the U.S., its allies, and partners, and to be prepared to deliver warfighting capability to defend the nation.

ARMY WALLOPS MARINES IN WARRIOR GAMES WHEELCHAIR BASKETBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

WEST POINT, New York, June 22, 2016 — The Army trounced the Marine Corps 62-23 in the wheelchair gold medal competition yesterday on the final day of the 2016 Department of Defense Warrior Games at the U.S. Military Academy here.

Though Team Marine Corps trailed by only 4 points going into halftime, Team Army found its stride in the second half to emerge as unstoppable victors.

Novice players made up a fair share of both contending teams, making their medals all the more hard-fought and impressive, Army and Marine Corps coaches said. Still, the Army demonstrated a series of swift passes and deft ball-handling to maintain a solid lead before running down the clock at the end of the final period.

Army Reserve Spc. Sydney Davis, a combat medic from Denver, earned a double-double in the gold-medal contest, in addition to demonstrating notable skill in shot put, discus, archery and rifle shooting during the games.

A Sense of Purpose

"Adaptive sports changed my life," she said. "I started doing one sport, and the feeling was so addicting -- the feeling of support from the fans and competing again makes me feel like I have a purpose. You lose sight of that. You start to think that there's not much more you can offer or that you're wounded past fixing."

Davis emphasized that adaptive sports competition gives many athletes the ability to recognize their repair and healing

remains attainable, which saves lives.

The DoD Warrior Games showcase the resilience and warrior spirit of service members, veterans, their families and caregivers, competition officials said. Adaptive sports and athletic reconditioning activities play a fundamental role in the effective recovery and reintegration of service members and veterans, they added.

About 250 athletes from across the services, U.S. Special Operations Command and the United Kingdom armed forces competed in the 2016 Warrior Games.

Caution: there has been a reported case of Hand, Foot, and Mouth Disease on-island. This virus is highly contagious, especially for those under 5. Please practice good hand washing techniques to prevent infection. If you suspect your child is infected, please keep them out of school.

Safely Speaking: Hand protection is not simply putting some gloves on; it is finding ways to eliminate the task that may put our hands at risk; or using tools rather than hands to complete the job. If a glove is the last option for safely completing the task; ensure you are using the right glove for the job.

E-talk: All USAG-KA residents, soldiers, civilians, contractors, and organizations are required to leave artifacts, archaeological features, and historic sites on land or in the water as they are found. Artifacts or objects associated with historic buildings, buried trash deposits, shipwrecks, airplanes, etc. are not to be disturbed, removed, or disfigured in any way. Only with written permission from USAG-KA and the RMI Historic Preservation Office (HPO) should artifacts be handled or removed from locations where they are found. 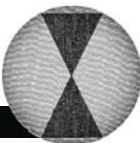

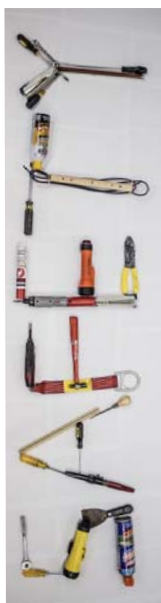
HOURLASS REPORT

MEET THE FATAL FOUR



FALLS // 36.9%

COMMON FACTORS: Unprotected sides, wall openings, floor holes. Improper scaffold construction. Unguarded, protruding steel bars. Misuse of portable ladders.



STRUCK BY OBJECT // 10.3%

COMMON FACTORS: Vehicles. Falling/flying objects. Masonry walls.



ELECTROCUTIONS // 8.9%

COMMON FACTORS: Contact with power lines. Lack of ground-fault. Path to ground missing or discontinuous. Improper use of equipment & cords.



CAUGHT BETWEEN OBJECTS // 2.6%

COMMON FACTORS: Unsafe access/egress. Unsafe spoil-pile placement. Failure to inspect trench and protective systems. No protective system.
