**“Yokwe” Team Kwajalein.** It’s been a busy spring for our garrison community. In April we officially dedicated the running track near Kwajalein Junior/Senior High School. Demeo Field was named in honor of 1st Lt. Paul Michel DeMeo, who passed away from natural causes in May 2013 while serving in the U.S. Army. DeMeo was a Kwaj kid who graduated from the U.S. Military Academy at West Point. His father Paul still lives and works here serving his country. It was a privilege to have Paul and Lucienne DeMeo in attendance for their son’s ceremony. The photos and article from the event are in the May 6 issue of the Hourglass.

Last week we dedicated “Lippwe Lane” in honor of Sgt. 1st Class (Ret.) Akino Lippwe, who passed away here in May 2016 of natural causes. Akino retired from the Military Police Corps after 22 years of service, and he served our Kwaj community for 15 years. He greeted every passenger arriving at Bucholz Army Airfield, ensuring the safety of our community for visitors and residents. His smiling face was one of the most well-known on this garrison, and he is missed. You can read more about Akino and Lippwe Lane in this issue of the Hourglass.

Our Memorial Day observance ceremony will take place Monday, May 29, at 10 a.m. at the USAG-KA flagpoles near Kwaj Lodge. The inclement weather location is Island Memorial Chapel across the street. 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# KWAJ WELCOMES LIPPWE LANE

**The prominent path** worn in the earth between Bucholz Army Airfield and the Zamperini Dining Facility could be Kwajalein's Route 66. It's our go-to shortcut: a main thoroughfare that never had a name. On May 20, as the Kwajalein High School band played the national anthems of the United States and RMI, the community gathered near Island Memorial Chapel to dedicate the path to a departed friend, Sgt. 1st Class Akino Lippwe. Lippwe passed away May 20, 2016 from natural causes.

At the ceremony, Lippwe's friends joined the USAG-KA Command team, representatives from the Republic of the Marshall Islands, United States Ambassador to the Marshall Islands Karen Stewart, Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts of America and Alutiiq Pacific, LLC security personnel. Capt. Alex Lamb gave the opening address, while Naval Mobile Construction Battalion 1 Seabees performed the presentation of colors. Chaplain Steven Munson followed with an invocation, and USAG-KA Commander Col. Michael Larsen made a short speech about Lippwe's dedication to his country and community.

During the speech, Larsen said it was fitting that Lippwe Lane runs past Island Memorial Chapel, where Lippwe attended services. He described the newly named road as an expression of Lippwe's life.

"It goes from hard pavement, to gravel, to grass, and then ultimately back to asphalt," said Larsen. "I would submit that this lane is somewhat symbolic to Lippwe's life. One filled with very different phases and descriptions. Let us not forget as we cruise our bright bikes through Lippwe Lane, the positive impact that Akino had on this strategically important installation. ... I remind us all to look up and give a little shout out. Simply say, thank you for spending your final days with us on Kwajalein, protecting and securing this fine community."

The ceremony gave his former co-workers with Security and Access Control a chance to appreciate and remember Lippwe together, said Entry & Exit Supervisor Lt. Monica Perry. They fondly recall Lippwe for his good humor, unwavering friendly demeanor and his commitment to physical fitness.

Following the address, Larsen, Command Sgt. Maj. Angela Rawlings and Security Officer Hiram Airam lifted a red veil from one of the two new street signs that bear Lippwe's name. Gray and blue uniformed security personnel gathered at the base of the sign to share a photo together.

"It was an extremely touching and genuine gesture for the Command to honor Lt. Lippwe in such a way," said Michael Bucher, visiting vice president of Alutiiq Pacific, LLC, the company contracted to perform security and access control operations on the garrison.

Lippwe was born in Chuuk, in the Federated States of Micronesia in February 1952. He joined the United States Army on June 25, 1972. He served his country honorably as a military police officer for 22 years before retiring. Lippwe continued his service to the United States as a security contractor to support U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll. In this position he was eventually promoted to lieutenant. His awards and decorations include the Army Commendation Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters, the Army Achievement Medal with two Oak Clusters, and five Good Conduct Medals.

**Members of the Kwajalein MIA Project** took a few moments Friday, May 19, to acknowledge the support USAG-KA Commander Col. Michael Larsen and his staff have provided the group during Larsen's 18-month tenure at the helm of the garrison's command.

During a brief meeting at the Vets Hall on Kwaj, MIA Project leader Dan Farnham handed the colonel a limited edition photo print of an MIA-associated airplane wreck recently uncovered in the Kwajalein Atoll lagoon. The print, photographed by former Kwaj resident Brandi Mueller, was a symbol of the group's gratitude, Farnham said.

Larsen assured the crowd the sense of appreciation was mutual. "Your work is very much appreciated," he told the group. "I love what you all do and the fact that you do all this work on your time."

Set to move on to his next assignment in July, Larsen said he will stay tuned for news of more MIA-associated wreck sites to be located by the group. Meanwhile, the photo print will find itself in a prominent spot in his residence for years to come.

# THE TRUTH ABOUT SEAT BELTS

## COMMUNITY CONNECTION

HERE ARE SOME COMMON MYTHS ABOUT SEAT BELTS, FOLLOWED BY THE COLD, HARD FACTS.

**1. Because my car has air bags, I don't have to wear my seat belt.**

**ACTUALLY...**

- Air bags do not replace your seat belt; they are intended to work WITH your seat belt.
- Air bags deploy at approximately 200 mph. If you're not properly belted, it could kill you.

**2. I don't need to buckle up when I'm driving somewhere just a few minutes away or if I'm not driving very fast.**

**ACTUALLY...**

- 75 percent of all crashes occur within 25 miles of a person's home. (Sound like Kwajalein?)
- 80 percent of deaths and injuries occur in vehicles traveling 40 mph or less. (Sound like Kwajalein?)

• Everyone on Kwajalein lives within two miles of their workplace, and no vehicle on Kwajalein is authorized to travel faster than 25 mph (emergency equipment and police included). This puts all Kwajalein operators in the very highest risk category.

**3. My seat belt will trap me in the car if it catches on fire or goes under water.**

**ACTUALLY...**

- Less than 0.05 percent of crashes involve fire or submersion.
- Your seat belt will help prevent you from being knocked unconscious; if knocked out, you'll have slim chances of escaping water or fire.

**4. I'm a really good driver. I don't need to wear my seatbelt.**

**ACTUALLY...**

- This is one of the most dan-

gerous attitudes a driver can take. No one is invincible. No one is perfect and mistake free.

- You may be a good driver, but not everyone on the road is. Prepare for others' mistakes, and wear your seat belt.

**THE BOTTOM LINE:**

- All vehicles and equipment that come from the manufacturer with seat belts installed require the seatbelts to be operational and in use.
- It's an Army requirement to buckle up.
- Seat belts save over 11,000 lives each year and reduce your risk of dying in a crash by about 50 percent.
- It's all about safety and defensive driving. Take 5 for safety and awareness. It all ties in together.

No matter the myth, the truth is that seat belts save lives. Always buckle up, and spread the message.



## HOURLASS REPORT

**Some workplace distractions** and interruptions are unavoidable, but others, if not properly controlled or regulated, could lead to injuries, lost productivity and a decrease in worker morale. Work interruptions are a distraction that can result in work errors or accidents. Before addressing or responding to another person, workers should shut down or disengage any work tool, equipment or ongoing processes. Job training should include instructions not to interrupt others during a critical job phase or process.

External noise from tools, mobile equipment and processes can be distracting in industrial and construction

work environments. In work situations where loud or constant noise is unavoidable, hearing protection devices can eliminate or decrease unwanted and distracting noise. In other work environments, even not-so-loud sounds can be a distracting annoyance. Constantly ringing phones, conversations and loud faxes, copiers and printers can also distract workers from their job tasks.

Electronic devices, such as cell phones, mp3 players and PDAs, can be the source of serious distractions in some work environments. Use of these devices is strictly prohibited while operating motor vehicles, heavy equipment and other power tool equipment. In work environments where they are allowed and as a

courtesy to your coworkers, make sure you keep them on a low volume.

In some work environments, wearing headphones with low volume music can be relaxing to workers and help them to safely focus on their work. However, wearing headphones on a construction or industrial site or while operating a vehicle or power equipment can be dangerous as it may prevent workers from hearing warning signals, mobile equipment backup alarms and safety instructions. Walking around while talking on the phone or wearing headphones distracts your attention from safety and could result in a slip or fall or cause you to run into or be struck by something or someone.

# WEEKLY WEATHER OUTLOOK

**WEATHER DISCUSSION:** After receiving well above average precipitation in January-February and being below average since, this week the yearly precipitation amounts have dropped into the deficit region compared to normal. For the first three weeks of May we have received just 2.15 inches of rainfall or 42 percent of normal. The NOAA U.S. Drought Monitor is now listing Kwajalein and other atolls within the northern RMI within a short-term severe drought.

A wave passes Saturday evening into Sunday which should increase showers into widely scattered coverage. Going into the weekend, winds will be moderating to 10-15 knots. Expect shower coverage to become isolated again by Memorial Day festivities, which has only 20 percent chance of a shower. There are some indications of a weak disorganized ITCZ moving northward near Kwajalein next week.
