



Armed Forces Entertainment packed three venues with the sweet sounds of Hawaiian reggae rock in Kwajalein Atoll during the week of June 11. Headliners Rebel Souljahz performed at the Roi-Namur Outrigger, the KHS MP Room and the Richardson Theater. Accompanied by musical artists Shar Carillo and Eli-Mac, the island-inspired electronic R&B reggae had their audiences out of their chairs and dancing to their mellow harmonies and languid beats.

The Kwajalein Hourglass met with Carillo and Rebel Souljahz keyboard player Sherwin DeBrum, from Salt Lake, Hawaii, to talk about their recent AFE tour, their experience with the business of making music and DeBrum's return trip to the Marshall Islands where he was born.

Hourglass (HG): Which areas of Hawaii are you both from? **Shar:** I'm from Kauai.

Sherwin DeBrum: Salt Lake, Hawaii. My birth home is [on] Ebeye. It's so hard, living there. The last time I was there was 20 years ago.

HG: Who or what's responsible for turning you on to wonderful careers as world-travelers and musicians?

Shar: For me, it runs in my family [with] everybody on Kauai. We stick pretty close together as family. When we have parties

we have kanipakala sessions. We grew up listening to music, to our parents and grandparents, and we just learned from them, basically. My parents are one half of the group Leahi, from Hawaii. They were pretty big back in the early 1990s. They knew how to work the stage.

SD: Honestly, it was a good mistake. It was really good. I never did play music when I was a kid. Never played ukulele. All these other guys [bandmates] played music and I was into sports. One day my best friend started a band, and no one wanted to play keyboard. I just kind of picked it up fast. It's such a typical instrument for a Marshallese to play, you know? If you go to a Marshallese concert that's all you see onstage: keyboards.

HG: What kind of music did you enjoy growing up? What'd you throw on your mixtapes?

SD: What kind of music? Reggae. That's what we all grew up with.

Shar: The radio stations back home aren't like the ones on Oahu. They play a lot of country, old school Hawaiian music and of course a lot of Bob Marley. I grew up singing all kinds of music. I just love every type of music.

HG: How many more shows will you play in the atoll?

THE KWAJALEIN HOURGLASS

The Kwajalein Hourglass is named for the insignia of the U.S. Army 7th Infantry Division, which liberated the island from the forces of Imperial Japan on Feb. 4, 1944.

Shar: We've been to Roi, we went Wednesday night. We have the last show at the Richardson Theater.

SD: We tried to throw a show up on Majuro, but everything was booked already.

HG: Come on back and see us again in a few months. It's clear you really enjoy what you're doing. There's a lot of humor in all of your online promotional music videos. Talk a little about that.

SD: Well, you've got to keep it exciting. You've got to keep it fun.

Shar: You've got to make people smile. The only way to do that is to smile yourself. If you're a great singer or musician, that's great. But you have to be somewhat fun to entertain and make people love you. All of us as entertainers are good as a group because we all make fun of each other.

HG: Did you know each other before you began touring together?

Shar: At a distance. Everybody had their own thing [going].

SD: A couple times back home we talked.

Shar: By sheer luck we all kind of mesh together.

HG: That's good- because you have to put up with these guys all tour long.

SD: Yeah—we've got to put up with her!

HG: Speaking of the tour, you've traveled all around the Pacific. Which places did you enjoy visiting the most and what did you do when you weren't performing?

SD: Oh man, this is our second AFE gig. Japan was my favorite [location] so far.

Shar: This is my first AFE tour, and same here. I knew a couple of people in Japan. When we were there we had one free day to spend to see Tokyo, the temples, the Sky Tower. We forgot there's a rush hour in Japan on the trains! That experience of being in Japan and literally being pushed on the train and squeezing like sardines with no way to fall because everyone's so close together. That was my favorite. It was something we didn't expect.

SD: Japan is so safe, man. And so clean, and the food—**Shar:** The food is amazing!

SD: I mean, don't get me wrong. This trip to the motherland [Marshall Islands] for me is amazing. I love it. And we got to go to Bigei.

Shar: I've never seen water so turquoise [and] blue.

SD: If we weren't talking about the performance and venues, man, then this place, for me, is it. It was good for me to pass through Ebeye to see how it is [now].

HG: You all come from a very multicultural state. What's it like to be musical ambassadors on military bases as you travel?

SD: It feels great.

Shar: Just being from Hawaii, and knowing people who are serving, it's nice to be able to give them something to be happy

about. I have one song that hit it big back home—and for them [the audiences] to be singing the song was big, for me. These people are singing extremely loud, and it makes me tear up. One of my dreams is for people to sing something that I wrote. It makes me feel good. I'm super happy to be part of it.

HG: Do you have any family connected to the military?

SD: Oh yeah. I think everybody does. A handful of my cousins are in the Army, Navy and Air Force.

Shar: My stepfather served in the Army in the early 1990s.

HG: Okay, business question: So we all remember cassette and old media formats—

SD: Man, I'm not that old.

Shar: Yes you are!

HG: —and you are really active on social media. The Rebel Souljahz video about the Roi trip is great. How do you both feel about the business of marketing music?

SD: We're so blessed. We've been playing music for ten years. To do something that you love, and to get paid to do it, that's a blessing right there. Not a lot of people can say they do that.

Shar: Digital marketing is so much easier. Back in the day, you basically called up the radio station and said you wanted to hear a song. You got popular through word of mouth. We get popular through likes and shares. Stuff like that. It's totally dif-



ferent. Either way it shows that people are watching and listening [to you].

SD: And music in Hawaii is growing: island reggae music.

Shar: Especially in Hawaii. We're making our mark. We've always been there, but it was hard to get out. Now with the whole digital Internet thing, there are so many more musicians out there. My mom says we don't know what it was like—and I tell her, come on, we're gigging every weekend! She's like, yeah, but. It's easier, but there's more competition. It's easier for everybody to be a musician in this culture. [But] you've got to be really good [to get noticed].

SD: Or you've got to have the best connection in the world!

Shar: Sometimes it is who you know rather than what you know. That can be difficult for some musicians who work really hard but go unnoticed.

HG: I'm really glad you got connected to the folks who brought you here.

Shar: Yes! Armed Forces Entertainment!

HG: Since you mentioned working hard, what is it that inspires you and keeps you going?

SD: It's my kids, honestly. They love what I'm doing. I've sacrificed a lot to be where I'm at right now. They're the ones that keep me pumping and keep me going, 24-7.


Shar: I don't have kids but I have the legacy of a great family to keep me going. My grandfather is one of the composers of a really famous Hawaiian song. His daughters and sons, and my mom and dad, all did music. So I feel like I've got to carry on the legacy. This felt like something that I needed to do. Whenever I feel like I'm down or I can't do it, I stop and think, okay, my family did this. I can do this. That's what keeps me strong.

RAINY SEASON BRINGS INCREASED LIGHTNING RISK

Summer is in full swing on Kwajalein Atoll, and while its arrival may not necessarily bring hotter temperatures, it does historically mark the return of the rainy season. The increased shower activity also brings heightened chances for lightning, one of the biggest weather-related dangers for the USAG-KA community. In fact, earlier this month the atoll had its first official thunderstorm in 160 days. A thunderstorm is officially reported only if thunder can be heard on island. The storms that day produced a significant amount of lightning strikes, which can be seen as "*" markers on the map (see above). Kwajalein typically sees about 15 thunderstorm days per year, with 2016 being an above-average year of 20 thunderstorm days and 345 lightning strikes within 10 nautical miles of the island.

Lightning occurs when there is an imbalance in electrical charge between the clouds and the ground, two different clouds, or the cloud and the surrounding air. To get this imbalance, showers and storms need to be strong enough and long-lasting in order to build up enough charge. This is another reason why more lightning tends to happen during the wet season, when strong and long-lasting showers are fairly common.


On average, there are 47 lightning related fatalities and hundreds of injuries each year in the mainland United States. Nearly all of these are caused by people being unaware of the current weather conditions and not taking proper shelter. A surprising aspect of these fatalities is that most of them do not occur when the storm is directly overhead. They actually occur as the thunderstorm is approaching and moving away. The main contributor to this is that many people don't know that lightning can and often does travel up to 10 to 15 miles away from the parent thunderstorm. RTS Weather warns for storms with lightning potential that are within 15 miles of Kwajalein and Roi-Namur; however, the world record for the longest lightning bolt is actually 200 miles, over three quarters of the distance from Kwajalein to Majuro. This means that whether you're enjoying some time at the beach or refueling the Metro for a flight up to Roi-Namur, it is essential to keep an eye on the weather and take precautions before threatening weather arrives and not once it's overhead.

As stated, RTS Weather will issue lightning warnings if a lightning strike is recorded within 15 nautical miles of Kwajalein or Roi-Namur, or if a cell within 15 nautical miles shows potential for lightning. Data from the KPOL weather radar and the daily synoptic sounding (weather balloon) are used to determine

if individual showers show any potential for lightning. Actual strikes are detected using a network of four sensors located around the atoll. Along with light, heat, and electricity, lightning also emits a radio frequency signal. This signal is detected by each of the four sensors, which then triangulate the location of the strike. If either of these occurs, a notification crawler will be put up on the AFN weather channel (14.2) as well as the rts-wx. com website.

So what should you do if you get caught outside while a dangerous thunderstorm is approaching? If a lightning warning is issued, or especially if you hear thunder, move as quickly and safely as you can to an enclosed building. Do not take cover in open air shelters or pavilions like those at Emon Beach and near many of the BQs. Seeking shelter is your only option for protection during a lightning storm. Despite it often being regarded as common knowledge, crouching down should never be used as a "last resort." Crouching actually provides zero extra protection during a lightning storm, especially on flat and remote Pacific islands. Again, finding well-built and enclosed shelter is the only way to protect yourself. If you happen to be fishing or diving in the lagoon, try to return to land as quickly and safely as possible. Boaters should also contact the marina for advice on further required actions.

As the National Weather Service states, "When thunder roars, go indoors." Hearing thunder indicates it is time to seek shelter. Don't become just another statistic waiting for lightning to strike or a storm to gather overhead before taking cover. The first lightning strike can be your last.

WEATHER DISCUSSION: We are still running a small deficit in rainfall for June being down 0.72 inches from the four inches we would normally have received. But strong signs of tropical patterns switching to the wet season are in place. This upcoming seven day period we should catch up some with accumulation.

The Inter Tropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) is situated at our latitude. A series of waves in the ITCZ will pass across our region Saturday into Monday. The ITCZ will drift southward Tuesday/Wednesday but remains active, prior to drifting back into our region Thursday and Friday. So it looks like average to above average precipitation for the next seven days.
