

PATIENCE APPRECIATED/WITH MAIL DELAYS

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Community Activities wants residents to know that verifying tracking numbers and checking names on boxes can help community members ensure their next visit to the Kwajalein Post Office is seamless and enjoyable.

Local mail delivery is typically uneventful. When packages are received by the Kwajalein Post Office, employees check postal tracking labels. They scan parcels into the Automated Military Postal System (AMPS) as deliveries are received. They then record recipients' names and box numbers on packages before entering them into temporary storage at the island's mail sorting facility. Employees then check the hand-written labels on the boxes and generate PO box delivery cards to affirm that customers have packages waiting. Upon visiting the delivery window to claim parcels, customers display badges and surrender PO box cards to the window attendant. The attendant checks the names on the badge, card and packages. Finally, before a delivery is completed, customers check to ensure that each package received at the window belongs to them.

"When we get slammed with anything more than four pallets, we lose [some of the] checks and balances that we have in place to prevent an incorrect delivery," says Community Activities and Retail Services Manager Kim Yarnes.

Kwajalein residents may find a neighbor's package or PO box card in their possession, or learn that anticipated deliveries have not yet arrived.

Tuesday, Sept. 20 was a light day for mail delivery. The Post Office crew received only three pallets: a total of 5,600 pounds of boxes, packages and bags containing more than 40 individual pieces of mail. Two days later, Thursday's Sept. 21 ATI would bring in 8.5 pallets, or eight pallets of mail, closer to 13,000 pounds of mail.

Some delivery issues arise before mail ever reaches Kwajalein. Mail pallets scanned as outgoing from Hawaii to Kwajalein can be bumped from a flight and arrive later than anticipated. When mail is not dispatched properly to the atoll from Hawaii, the local USPS submits a delivery report to document the errors. It's almost guaranteed that those packages will be on the next flight, says Yarnes.

A tracking serial number may not readily reveal at which APO a box has arrived; its status may read "delivered to APO" when the box transitions from the USPS system into the Automated Military Postal System (AMPS) tracking system in Hawaii. Boxes mislabeled through operator error at large sorting facilities often end up at APO addresses in Australia, Japan or Thailand, says Tony Ruiz, the garrison post master.

Even on days when there is a long line at the delivery window, customers should always verify the name on each package received, says Tony Ruiz, Kwajalein's post master. Customers who receive another resident's mail in error should always take the package back to the post office so that an error report may be filed.

"I want to know when we're making mistakes so we can fix them," says Ruiz. "On average, less than one percent of our boxes are incorrectly delivered on Kwaj. It happens when there's a [rush and a] large volume of mail. The customer is supposed to check their boxes also to ensure that the entire delivery [belongs to them]."

Ruiz encourages the community to visit the Post Office to receive a more detailed tracking profile of packages yet to be delivered with the Post Office's AMPS system.

Neither rain, nor snow nor APO will keep the mail from eventually getting to Kwajalein. Luckily, local customers can play an important civic duty on the front lines of Community Activities quality assurance to help packages successfully arrive at their destination.

eet Holynd Elliott, the manager of all Army and Air Force Exchange Service operations at U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll. In charge of the AAFES food court on Kwajalein and the Express Shoppettes and Pxtra shops on Kwaj and Roi, Elliot commands a suite of veritable lifelines that connect garrison residents to the commercial goods, over-the-counter

medicines and creature comforts they need in their daily lives. You need your stock of gummy bear multi-vitamins and Gatorade re-upped? You know where to go. How about a deep freezer to chill those sweet yellowfin tunas you've been catching? Get to the Pxtra.

Unlike the vast majority of Army and Air Force installations inside and outside of America, on USAG-KA, AAFES is the only major merchandising operation in town. That makes Elliott's job, and those of her employees, all the more crucial for our community.

Like other supply-dependent operations on base, it all comes down to logistics, she says. An employee of AAFES for more than 15 years, Elliott has spent the last two years of her career on Kwajalein and says USAG-KA is one of

AAFES' most far-flung and logistically difficult locations on the planet in which to operate. Apart from sites in Afghanistan and Iraq, of course. When you're so far away from any significant landmass, almost everything hinges on the coming and going of resupply ships out of Hawaii and Guam. And that can be problematic, she says.

"It's logistics," Elliot says. "If a barge doesn't come, or if maybe they don't load a product on a container, [there are shortages] ... I think that's the most frustrating challenge."

It's a challenge that comes with consequences. At mainland military installations—like Elliott's previous post at Edwards Air Force Base, California—a delayed truck from an AAFES supplier could impact a store's supply of canned soda or dogfood for a couple of days. And if that were to happen, Edwards residents could just as easily jump in the car and head off base to other stores.

Of course, on Kwajalein and Roi-Namur, there are no Ralph's or Circle K convenience stores. Late barge arrivals or missing shipping containers can easily mean no cat litter, Sudafed or tortilla chips for weeks. Those who enjoy six-packs of India pale ale know that feeling right now.

In the meantime, Elliott asks for residents to be patient during times when store shelves are a little more spartan than usual. And always remember: It's not AAFES who drives the barges.

While Elliott acknowledges the logistics of her operation as a major challenge, she says there are many rewards that come with the job. For one, she enjoys providing opportunities for employment and professional growth to local nationals and points to her support staff as the backbone of the AAFES operation on the atoll.

"Without them, our shelves wouldn't be stocked. We wouldn't have any merchandise," she says. "We wouldn't have cashiers to cash us out. It's very important. And it's a great way to [come] together with Ebeye. Most of my staff are local nationals. So it's great on both parts."

On a larger scale, the financial net positive impact AAF-ES has on the military goes a long way, Elliott says. Giving back to the garrison is a major objective, Elliot says—one that is easily overlooked by garrison residents.

"Most people don't know that the money that we get goes back to the garrison," she says. "So, last year we put \$348,000 back to the garrison that goes to MWR (Morale, Welfare and Recreation programs). That's what we do. I think a lot of people think we're in it for profit. It's not about that. It's about the military and giving back to the military."

"We're the only ones on island," Elliott adds. "So we've got to make sure we take care of you guys."



MATTIS: NORTH KOREA SANCTIONS ARE WORKING

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19, 2017—U.N. Security Council sanctions targeting North Korea's missile and nuclear tests are working, Defense Secretary Jim Mattis said yesterday during an informal briefing with members of the press.

The secretary said the sanctions, which began in 2006, have shown North Korean leader Kim Jong Un that there's a penalty to pay for ignoring international concerns and norms.

"We are putting the leader in North Korea in a position to be aware of— [with] the international community voting unanimously twice now in the United Nations Security Council— ... the increasing diplomatic isolation that comes with the economic sanctions," Mattis said.

Under Pressure

The secretary made a Sept. 15 trip to Mexico City to strengthen the bilateral defense relationship and participate in Mexican Independence Day activities, and to the reporters he said that Mexico had declared the North Korean ambassador a persona non grata.

On Sept.7, according to an official press release, Mexican President Enrique Peña Nieto issued an executive order instructing all government agencies to comply with new UNSC economic sanctions imposed on North Korea. The same day, the Mexican government gave North Korean Ambassador Kim Hyong Gil 72 hours to leave the country.

Spain, Peru and Kuwait, according to news reports, also have ordered North Korean ambassadors and envoys out of their countries.

"That's an example of what is working," Mattis said. "It's a pressurization effort to raise the cost" to Pyongyang of continued testing of missiles and nuclear weapons.

Responding to Provocations

Since January, North Korea has tested five ballistic missiles and a nuclear

weapon, and reporters asked Mattis why the United States doesn't shoot the missiles down.

"Those missiles are not directly threatening any of us," the secretary said.

Japan and U.S. missile defenses and radars are operating, he added, and North Korea is intentionally initiating provocations "that seem to press against the envelope for just how far can they push without going over some kind of a line in their minds that would make them vulnerable."

So they aim for the middle of the Pacific Ocean, Mattis said, "where at least we hope no ships are around."

The bottom line, he said, is that if the missiles were a threat to Guam or Japan, "that would elicit a different response from us." Mattis noted that there are military options that would not put South Korea at grave risk, but declined to explain further.

"We will defend ourselves, our interests [and] our allies," he said, "and we work together very transparently and



NOTICE OF AVAILABILITY, USAKA Flight Experiment 1 (FE-1) Final Environmental Assessment (EA)/Overseas Environmental Assessment (OEA) and Final Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI)

On behalf of the Office of the Under Secretary of Defense for Acquisition, Technology and Logistics, the US Department of the Navy (US Navy) Strategic Systems Programs announces the availability of the FE-1 Final EA/OEA and Final FONSI. The Final EA/OEA assesses the potential impacts associated with one experimental flight test from Kauai Test Facility (KTF), Pacific Missile Range Facility (PMRF), Kauai, Hawai'i, to the US Army Kwajalein Atoll (USAKA), Ronald Reagan Ballistic Missile Defense Test Site.

Pre-launch activities at KTF include final vehicle and experiment assembly, preflight checks, and demonstration of system performance. None of these activities will take place at night and lights will not be turned on at night for any FE-1 activities during the period of concern for Newell's shearwaters. If program activities are required to occur at night (outside the Newell's shearwater period of concern), the US Navy will coordinate these activities through PMRF to comply with the Dark Skies policy and avoid disorienting Newell's shearwaters with artificial lights.

The US Navy developmental payload would impact at USAKA with three possible impact zone scenarios. The first possible, and preferred, impact location would be a land impact on Illeginni Islet. The second possible impact location would be in the deep water region southwest of Illeginni Islet. The third possible impact location would be within the Kwajalein Missile Impact Scoring System area southeast of Gagan Islet. The proposed flight test would occur within a year after signing the Final FONSI.

Nesting and roosting seabirds at Illeginni Islet have the potential to be affected by elevated sound pressure levels, direct contact, and human disturbance. Mitigation measures will be employed to deter birds from nesting or roosting in the impact area. While Illeginni Islet has shoreline habitat suitable for sea turtle nesting, no sea turtle nests or nesting activity have been observed on Illeginni in over 20 years. Therefore, the US Navy concluded that the probability of sea turtle nesting in the area is so low as to be discountable and that FE-1 activities may but are not likely to adversely affect nesting sea turtles. The USFWS concurred with this determination.

Direct contact from payload impact as well as disturbance from human activity and equipment operation may adversely affect coral colonies, individual mollusks, and humphead wrasses at Illeginni Islet. The National Marine Fisheries Service issued a Biological Opinion including an Incidental Take Statement with Reasonable and Prudent Measures to minimize impacts and monitor levels of incidental take that are incorporated into the flight test and the EA/OEA.

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WEEKLY WEATHER OUTLOOK

WEATHER DISCUSSION: We continue to see high amounts of precipitation during the month of September. As of midnight Thursday, we measured 17.48 inches of rain on Kwajalein or 229 percent of normal. This is not counting the Friday morning rain falling at time of this writing. September is typically the peak of the wet season averaging the most amount of rain, and it's not disappointing us in 2017.

The Intertropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) is centered on Kwajalein along 8-9 N. Numerical weather prediction models show the ITCZ remaining at our latitude for the next 5-7 days. A wave in the ITCZ will pass across the area Monday/Tuesday. Thus, we expect average to above average amounts of precipitation through next Saturday.

Safely Speaking: Elevated Work Platforms. Never operate any mechanical elevated work platform without documented training. Never stand on the toe-board, mid-rail or top-rail of the basket. Never enter a basket without being tied off to the manufacturer's designated anchor point, even during ground positioning. Never exit the basket while the equipment is in operation or at height unless prior, documented, approval for the deviation has been obtained from the KRS ES&H Manager or ES&H representative through a Job Safety Analysis (JSA).
