### HOURLASS REPORT

**This orbicular batfish** (*platyfish orbicularis*) was photographed by Kwaj resident Jordan Vinson off Emon Beach. Spotted at a depth of only about 10 meters, this batfish was very friendly, allowing the photographer to come within only about three feet with a camera.

Orbicular batfish are not a rare sight in the waters in and around Kwajalein Atoll. Apart from the Pacific, they are also found in the Red Sea and the Indian Ocean; there have also been reported sightings in the west-central Atlantic near Florida.

The hallmark trait of the orbicular batfish, much like other batfish and spadefish, is the species' particularly long fan-shaped fins, coupled with a comparatively thin width.

According to writers at [www.fishbase.org](http://www.fishbase.org), they feed on small fish, algae and invertebrates.

The health of the species, in terms of population size, has not yet been evaluated by the International Union for the Conservation of Nature.

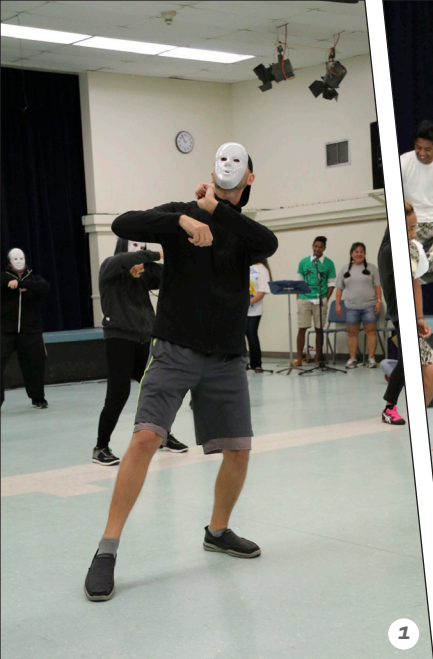

# HOLIDAY TRAVEL TIPS

## HOURLASS REPORT

The holiday season is in full swing, and many island residents are gearing up to fly northeast for winter. Here are a few travel tips compiled from community members to help ensure your health and safety.

### Before Departure

- Ensure that your passport is current and will not expire during your travel period.
- Prior to leaving island, make sure to put your mail on hold and pay your phone bill.
- Take screen snap shots of reservation confirmations and itineraries so they will be available even if your device isn't online.
- Ensure you have the necessary travel documents. This includes your passport, identification cards and travel. Consider registering with the State Department if you are traveling to a foreign country.

### While In Transit

- Flights change—be ready. Check the status of your flight before heading to the airport.
- Take extra precautions against spills and pack your carry on liquids in a large plastic zip bag.
- Make sure to stay hydrated and avoid salty foods.
- Periodically move about and stretch your legs to improve circulation.
- Stay sanitary. Wash your hands often and keep sanitizer and tissues on hand.

### When traveling with kids:

- Bring the items your child needs to be comfortable and possibly sleep during the flight.
- Bring something to help the child clear her ears on the airplane. This could be a bottle, pacifier or lollipop.
- Sometimes loud or unfamiliar noises can frighten children. If your child prefers quiet, consider purchasing a pair of soundproof earmuffs for her to wear on the plane. Note: always ensure that the hearing protection you have on hand does not create a choke or health hazard for your child. Most disposable foam earplugs are not suitable.
- Have your child dress in layers so that she will not be too warm or too cold during the flight.
- Have a stash of lightweight toys and diversions that are not opened until you are on the plane. Pull them out one at a time as rewards for good behavior. These could be surprise stickers, small cars, plastic dinosaurs, small stuffed animals). One island mother suggests handing your little one wet wipes when first seated to "clean" the area—this might be good advice for everyone.
- Pack a variety of snacks—especially those low on sugar and salt. Individual serving sizes or portions in snack sized zip locks will help reduce the potential for messes and reduce carry-on clutter.
- Load a device with shows, apps and music for your child to use on the plane with child sized headphones.
- Make An Adventure Journal. Bring a simple spiral binder, crayons and markers for your child to save keepsakes and record observations about their journey. This is a great invitation for your child to be an active participant on an exciting trip.

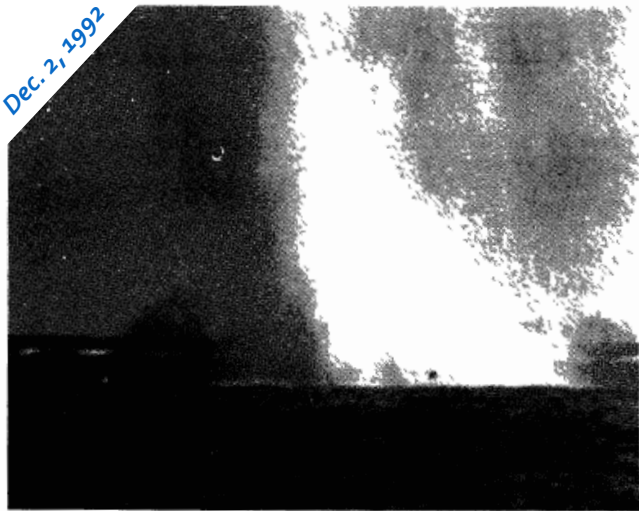

## Navy EOD team destroys warhead

When residents on Roi-Namur came to work on October 27, they found warning notices posted on entrance ways to offices, the dining room, gym, and Gunbels. The warning issued by the USAKA Safety Office stated that EOD operations would be conducted on October 27, 1992.

Origin of the warhead is still somewhat of a mystery. Over the years many speculated that the item was a torpedo warhead because there was a torpedo warhead storage facility on Roi-Namur that was destroyed during the war.

U S Navy and USAKA EOD specialists researched technical manuals designed to positively identify known military ordnance. They collected information from the warhead including its general shape, diameter, presence or lack of distinguishing features like bomb rack lugs, fins, fuses or rotating bands.

An exhaustive review concluded that this item was not a bomb, rocket, missile, or mine. It was too big for a projectile and too small to be a tor-

pedo warhead. The only item which matched known identification features to the item on Roi was the Japanese 32 centimeter Spigot-type mortar warhead. Mortars of this type were used during World War II to destroy landing craft before they could land on the beach.

Navy and USAKA EOD specialists worked together and successfully detonated the warhead at 5 p.m. on October 27 during high tide. A counter charge was prepared and connected with an explosive communication link called detonating cord which explodes at 25,000 feet per second. The charge was initiated using a time fuse. AM-PRO security ensured all unauthorized personnel remained outside the declared exclusion area while the EOD members stayed under cover after initiating the demolition shot.

Outside the exclusion area those who viewed the underwater detonation were awed at the ground shock wave and the water plume over 100 feet high. The blast carved out a crater 12 feet in diameter and six feet deep into the sand and coral bottom.

# THE SIGNAL CORPS AND METEOROLOGICAL HISTORY

**In another year** in which the weather has dominated the news around the world, it is fitting to pause and recognize the early advances in meteorological exploration.

One such initiative was the TIROS or Television Infrared Observation Satellite Program, the first weather satellite that dates back to 1960. The first of 10 TIROS launches occurred in April, followed soon thereafter by the launch of TIROS II on Nov. 23 from Cape Canaveral, Florida.

These first TIROS launches were a joint venture that included NASA, the Radio Corporation of America, the U.S. Weather Bureau, now known as the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, the U.S. Naval Photographic Interpretation Center and the U.S. Army Signal Research and Development Lab. The Army Ordnance Corps, had previously assigned the Signal Corps "that portion of this problem that involves meteorological instrumentation, including television systems for meteorological purposes...."

With each launch, the TIROS program continued to evolve. TIROS I, which was operational for only 78 days, sought to test television techniques to develop a "worldwide meteorological satellite information system." To achieve this goal, the 270-pound space craft constructed of an aluminum alloy and stainless steel and powered by more than 9,000 solar cells, contained two 35-mm cameras—one low-resolution and the other a high-

resolution.

The wide-angle lens camera was able to photograph 800-square miles while the other camera focused upon 30-square miles. The two cameras were connected to magnetic video tape recorders equipped with timing mechanisms that stored the images until the satellite was within range of one of the two ground stations, located at the Army Signal Corps Labs at Fort Monmouth, New Jersey, and an Air Force facility at Kaena Point, Hawaii.

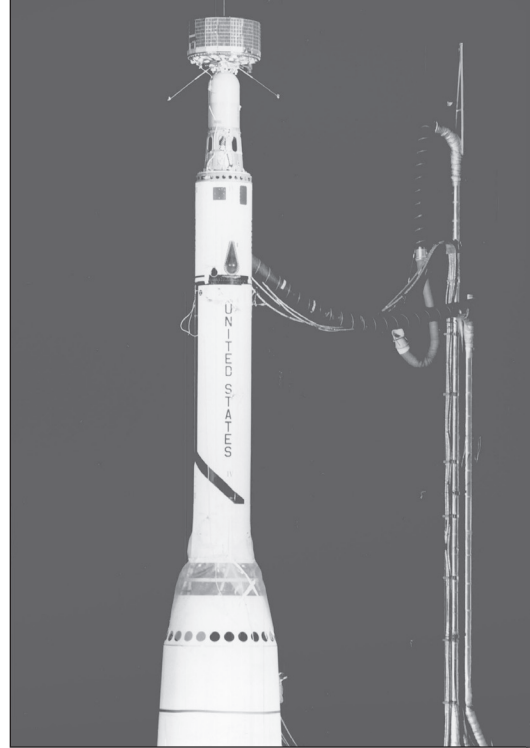
Over the course of the 78 days, orbiting the earth once every 98 minutes, the TIROS I cameras captured nearly 23,000 images and clearly showed the cloud cover views of the Earth and demonstrated that satellites were a beneficial tool in "surveying global weather conditions."

With a similar construction design, the TIROS II added new equipment to improve upon the quality of the data collected. In addition to the two cameras and recorders, TIROS II adopted noise suppressor circuits and a miniaturized radio frequency diplexer. Other innovations included an infrared horizon sensor for attitude control, a direction indicator for picture orientation, a magnetic orientation control experiment, and two infrared radiation experiments.

The TIROS II flight suffered some setbacks with the television camera system. Debris on the lens of the wide-angle camera affected the quality of many of these images. The narrow angle camera remained fully functioning until Feb. 1, 1961, but after that produced only sporadic images until Sept. 27, 1961. Nevertheless the experiment collected more than 25,000 usable pictures, which are housed in the National Climatic Center, in Ashville, North Carolina.

The two radiation experiments included a five-channel scanning radiometer and a low-resolution, non-scanning, two-channel radiometer. The widefield radiometer meanwhile consisted of two detectors -- a black and a white thermistor bolometers.

The black detector "responded equally to reflected solar radiation and long-wave terrestrial radiation." The white detector meanwhile reflected solar and visible radiation but measured only long-wave thermal radiation." Unfortunately, the sensors were not as sensitive as anticipated, so the data from this ex-

periment has been described as "too ambiguous for reduction or analysis."

The scanning radiometer, meanwhile, scanned the Earth and space, measuring the emitted and reflected radiation of the Earth and its atmosphere. Each channel focused upon a specific facet to be studied -- water vapor absorption, atmospheric window, reflected solar radiation, terrestrial radiation and reflected solar radiation.

Scientists collected five months of data before the motor for the radiometer failed in April 1961. Analysis of the data found that "radiation data may be useful not only for determining the location, motion and development of frontal systems but also for obtaining information on the structure of frontal zones."

Each launch of the TIROS series, which began with the Army and NASA, improved weather forecasting capabilities. TIROS-3 for example, made an extensive study of the 1961 hurricane season and is credited with discovering Hurricane Esther.

TIROS-4 allowed the U.S. Weather Bureau to share cloud images with other nations. TIROS-6 expanded the study to the detection of snow cover. TIROS-9 is credited with creating a complete view of the world's weather. And finally TIROS-10 produced more than 400 images a day covering 640,000 square miles each, with a 2-mile resolution at the center.

# WEEKLY WEATHER OUTLOOK

RTS WEATHER STATION STAFF

**WEATHER DISCUSSION:** A wave in the trade winds will pass over Kwajalein Saturday night and Sunday morning bringing some shower activity. Then a broad area of drier ENE trades will establish itself and push the Intercontinental Convergence Zone (ITCZ) southward to around 5 degrees N. Thus not much shower activity is expected from Monday into mid-next week. There will be moderate trade winds from 13-18 knots. Towards the end of next week, a surge in the trades will build up and bring winds near 20 knots by Friday with shower activity on the front end of this surge. Small craft advisories may be needed late next week.

**SATURDAY/SUNDAY/MONDAY FORECAST:** Scattered showers Saturday night into Sunday morning. Widely scattered showers Sunday and isolated showers Monday. Winds ENE 15-20 knots on Saturday and E-ESE at 12-17 knots Sunday and Monday.

**MID-WEEK FORECAST:** Isolated showers Tuesday through Thursday. An increase in showers by Friday. Winds will be ENE 13-18 knots for most of the week but increase to 20 knots by Friday.

## SIMPLY SAFE



**According to** all SPI 1425 all electrical cords, receptacles that are not part of the permanent electrical wiring system of a building or structure must be inspected before each use and marked quarterly by a specific color code. This policy excludes all power strips only for official use.

Whether you're stringing Christmas lights around your patio or operating equipment at work, here are a few reminders about how to inspect electrical cords and power strips.

- Ensure the cords have a third prong, or grounding conductor.
- Visually inspect and run your hand over the entire cord to confirm that it is not frayed, nicked or deteriorated.
- Ensure all male and female caps are securely fastened to the cords and are not burned or cut.
- Perform a circuitry test on all your cords and power strips using a testing device.
- Note: The directions for testers may be different. Always read the instructions first).
