SUNSET SCIENCE WITH RTS WEATHER

There is a famous saying about red skies. "Red sky at night, sailors' delight. Red sky in morning, sailors take warning." Can we use this ancient maxim to figure out what atmospheric conditions make an excellent sunset?

We know a good sunset when we see one. RTS Weather Station Meteorologist Sean Stelten says better sunsets occur over Kwajalein when moderate amounts of high-altitude, wispy cirrus clouds are visible in the skies overhead. These clouds form the sunset canvas. After the sun sinks below the horizon, it shines on the underside of these high-up clouds in warm hues. The thicker the cirrus, the more colorful the clouds.

Sunset quality can be increased by thick layers of mid-altitude altocumulus clouds if the edge of the cloud layer does not obscure the horizon. According to Stelten light shower activity scattered on the western horizon can also cast shadows onto other higher-elevation clouds for a dazzling effect.

All that being said, RTS Weather doesn't forecast clouds.

"Sometimes we do give an idea of what type of clouds we're expecting," Stelten said. "It's very hard to pinpoint expected cloud types in the tropics."

Instead, the forecast staff recommends a high-tech solution to the community: go outside—especially if you vacation in the U.S. this summer. Stelten believes the best fiery clear sky sunsets are found there.

"[Kwaj] atmosphere is relatively pollution-free, and clear skies at sun-

set won't actually give that impressive of a show, in my opinion," said Stelten. "[In the U.S.,] there's enough pollution, whether that be car exhaust, wildfire smoke or dust in the air to really refract the sun's rays and enhance the red and orange coloring."

Back to that saying about sailors and the red skies.

"I believe that saying comes from mid-latitude sailing (nearer to the U.S.), where storm systems usually move west to east," said Stelten.

We can appreciate the ancient saying but we can't depend on it to sail in the atoll. Kwajalein storm systems move from east to west, in the opposite direction of U.S. storms.


"If the sun sets to the west and a storm system is east of your location (thus leaving or dying), then the sun would cast a red and orange coloring from the west onto the clouds in the east," said Stelten. "The opposite is true for the morning. The sun rises in the east and casts color on storms to the west. Then the storm moves west to east over your location."

Want to learn more about the skies overhead? Sky-fanatics can consult the RTS website (rts-wx.com) and visible satellite imagery (rts-wx.com/satellite-latest-images-himawari-visible). Weather radar (rts-wx.com/index. php?radar-latest-images-reflectivity-150km) can register westerly light shower activity that could also produce a good sunset.

So hit Emon Beach and watch a few more sunsets. No matter how colorful the sky on a given evening, the very best sunset is the one you witness yourself.

THE ADVENTURE KIT

Grab these items to include in your kit for safe summer fun. Feel free to add your own supplies.

RESIDENTIAL INTERNET FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

DynCorp International, as your internet service provider for the past month, truly appreciates our valuable customers and would like to address some questions and issues that have been brought to our attention.

Q. Why has the price of internet service increased?

A. As the new service provider, we are responsible for all aspects of operational service and support expenses to include US based internet service, internet equipment repairs and replacement, technical support labor, materials, and spare parts which impacts the price of service. The price is based on the number of customers and the cost of internet service expenses.

Q. When and how do subscribers get their bill? Email? Postal mail?

A. We are implementing a system capable of sending monthly invoices via email and expect it to be operational for the July 2018 billing period. Internet invoices will be sent 7 days prior to the 1st of each month when this system is operational. Until then you need to pay your monthly bill in Building 702.

Q. The Internet Service Agreement states "You agree to allow us and our agents the right to enter your property at which the service will be provided at reasonable times...". What is the definition of reasonable times? Will there be prior coordination?"

A. Residential technical support is provided Tuesday thru Saturday between the hours of 08:00-16:30 hrs. All technical support requiring visits to a personal residence will be coordinated with the customer.

Q. How were the changes to the residential internet service announced to the community?

A. To provide advanced notice of the upcoming changes in residential internet service, we advertised in four issues of the Hourglass and on the Roller channel that customers would need to sign up and pay for the new internet service beginning 1 May 2018.

Q. What changed when DI took over internet service?

A. The network equipment and infrastructure supplying the

internet service to your residence did not change at the time the internet providers changed. Anyone having internet connectivity issues should call the Internet Help Desk at 5-9000 to submit a service ticket requesting technical support as their first course of action.

Q. After a week of testing my internet speeds to detect the advertised increase there was no change. Why is the internet speed not faster?

A. There was no advertised attempt or plan to increase the internet speed. We only increased the amount of total bandwidth provided, which does not impact the speed. The additional 200MB in bandwidth is being allocated to offset peak congestion times (typically between 7-10pm and on weekends) so that users will be able to experience a consistent throughput of input/output data and not notice any slowness or lag in their 4MB down and 1MB up on a per connection basis.

Q. I am seeing a lot more "spinning circles" the last couple of weeks. Why I am getting less up/down speed than I have ever gotten?

A. The bandwidth of the MINTA (residential internet) circuit was 500MB up/down for a user base of ~ 700 users, before we transitioned the service. The increase of the 200MB now equals 700MB up/down which is provided to ensure there is no degradation of speed on a per user basis during peak hours. Subscribers are setup to receive 4MB down and 1MB up to their residence.

Q. Does the modem I receive when I sign up for service belong to me? If not, may I purchase and install my own?

A. No, the modem you receive when you sign up for service must be turned in to the Internet Help Desk when you terminate or disconnect your service. You may purchase and install your own model of modem, but the personal modem will not be supported by the Internet Help Desk.

Q. Are there any additional fees I should know about?

A. Customers who elect to disconnect service or who are disconnected due to non-payment, will be assessed a reconnection fee of \$75.

WEEKLY WEATHER LOOKOUT

RTS WEATHER STATION STAF

WEATHER DISCUSSION: Someone asked if the first half of 2018 is the wettest ever. Yes, it is. Another record broken and June isn't over yet. From January to June we have received over 79 inches of rain. The next highest total for any Jan-June timeframe is a measly 69 inches back in 1951.

An active weather pattern was on top of Kwajalein Thursday-Saturday with abundant rain in the area and low level circulations causing some west winds. This remains so into next week as the InterTropical Convergence Zone will be moving north of our region over the weekend then meandering on top of us, then north, then on top again. For this upcoming week there will be periods of rain, then a break for one to two days before the rains continue. Expect moderate winds at 7-12 knots from NE-S, with exception of gusts from convective storms as experienced this past Thursday. Tune in to the daily forecast on channel 14-2 or rts-wx.com or call 5-3347 for more daily details.

SATURDAY/SUNDAY/MONDAY FORECAST: Scattered showers Saturday and Sunday, widely scattered showers Monday. Winds NE on Saturday becoming SE by Monday at 7-12 knots.

MID-WEEK FORECAST: Days with scattered rain (30-50 percent), days with isolated rain (10 percent coverage). Winds NE-S at 7-13 knots.

PLEASE NOTE:

- * There will be NO exception to policy allowing Contract personnel to travel on military ATI flights with pets. Commercial flight arrangements must be made.
- * United Airlines will NOT accept reservations for the listed brachycephalic (short- or snub-nosed) dogs and cats and strong-jawed dog breeds, out of concern for higher adverse health risks.
- * United Airlines will accept pre-reservations between 30 days in advance (maximum) and five (5) days (minimum) prior to travel for customers traveling with their pets and/or for pets traveling alone * United Airlines will require the customer to provide PetSafe with several pieces of information (e.g. documents, photos, crate information, etc.) before any reservation is confirmed.
- * United will not accept crates taller than 30 inches, including the 700 series crates.

U.S. Army Garrison Kwajalein Atoll understands that all pets are valued members of the family. Please plan accordingly and take responsibility for your animals to avoid any unfortunate situations. 
