HOURGLASS REPORT

U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll Command staff, government officials from the U.S. and Republic of the Marshall Islands and Kwajalein residents welcomed Command Sgt. Maj. Kenyatta Gaskins at the Assumption of Responsibility Ceremony Oct. 5 at the Corlett Recreation Center.

Chaplain Steve Munson of the Island Memorial Chapel opened the official ceremony with an invocation. Cpt. David Deibler welcomed those gathered and presented the history of the position of command sergeant major in the U.S. Army. Together, USAG-KA Command staff and ceremony attendees recognized the national anthems of the U.S. and RMI.

USAG-KA Commander Col. James DeOre and Sgt. 1st Class Christina Barnes conducted the official presentation of the Garrison Colors to formally recognize Gaskins as the Command Sergeant Major of the garrison.

Following the ceremonial presentation, DeOre took the podium to welcome Gaskins and his family to Kwajalein. Gaskins followed with an address, and said it was a privilege to serve the garrison under the command of DeOre.

"I'm finally here and ready to serve as your assigned battle partner," said Gaskins to DeOre. "It really is a small world. Over the years, we've served in sister units. Your name precedes itself."

Gaskins said he was ready to serve the garrison community and its Marshallese partners.

"I look forward to meeting you all—just know that I'll dispense formality," he said. "Feel free to dispense your wisdom—whatever you think I need."

Gaskins admitted that four months ago, when he learned about the assignment, he had never heard of the Marshall Islands, but had learned much about the garrison and its host nation since then.

 "I've heard on more than one occasion that Kwajalein Atoll is one of the Army's best kept secrets," said Gaskins. "Tamika, Kennedi and I are excited for a new beginning and look forward to all the islands have to offer."

The community joined Gaskins and his family for a celebratory reception in the Community Activities Center following the ceremony.

Gaskins joined the United States Army in 1996 as a Personnel Services Specialist and attended Basic Combat Training at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri and Advanced Individual Training at Fort Jackson, South Carolina. Since then Gaskins has been assigned to duty stations including the 18th Personnel Group (Airborne), Fort Bragg, North Carolina; Headquarters and Headquarters Company, United States Army Garrison, Fort Clayton, Panama; United States Army Office of Military Support, Washington, DC and 1st Special Forces Operational Detachment - DELTA (Airborne), Fort Bragg, North Carolina. Gaskins most recently served as the command sergeant major of Headquarters and Headquarters Battalion, 82nd Airborne Division, Fort Bragg, North Carolina.

Gaskins has also served on numerous deployments in support of Operation Enduring Freedom, Operation Iraqi Freedom and overseas contingency operations. He has held the positions of awards specialist, personnel services specialist; personnel reassignments specialist, personnel actions NCO, personnel Services NCO, human resources NCO, Battalion S-1 NCOIC, first sergeant, G-1 senior human resources NCOIC and Special Operations Joint Task Force J-1 sergeant major.

SIAND BRAVO

This week's Island Bravo goes to Rena Alik. A DynCorp International employee of the garrison's busy custodial team, Alik, 31, likely saved the Teen Center on Kwajalein from burning down.

While cleaning a room in the facility Sept. 29 Alik noticed something out of the ordinary and reacted quickly.

"I was just cleaning and suddenly I hear a "pop," he said. "And so I just look and see a computer smoking. And I go and unplug the cords."

A component, likely a power supply, in the computer had gone belly up in a dangerous way, and the amount of smoke the computer was producing was alarming, Alik said. After cutting the power to the computer, he took off down the road to the high school to

report the incident, and the Kwajalein Fire Department was called. On the scene, KFD told management if Alik had not responded by unplugging the computer, the Teen Center could have likely burned down.

Because of his quick thinking and commendable response to the situation, Alik was recognized last week by DI management with a DI Safety Coin.

Alik has been an employee of the custodial team on Kwajalein for three months. Originally from Majuro, Alik moved with family to Ebeye in 2014. He has a wife, Eline, and a daughter, Natasha. When he's not working or preventing Army infrastructure from burning down, he spends his free time playing video games.

DOMESTIC ABUSE IS NEVER OKAY

Domestic violence includes behaviors that physically harm, arouse fear, prevent a partner from doing what they wish or force them to behave in ways they do not want. Domestic violence is about power and control.

Not just bruises and broken bones -The wounds from domestic violence are not always physical, and the silent scars sometimes take longest to fade. According to the US Dept. of Justice, 80 percent of victims do not present with physical scars. Despite this, we concentrate on the 20 percent because we are a visual people. If I don't see your pain, your pain does not exist. However, if you turn victims inside out, you will see all the hidden scars they carry. Unfortunately, we don't concentrate on the many other abuses happening every one to eight seconds, before the assault takes place because we do not see them as warranting intervention or attention. This is why it can be so difficult for victims without physical injuries from abuse to get the help they deserve. Abuse can come as emotional, psychological, financial or spiritual in addition to physical.

Common Traits of an Abuser

- An abuser often denies the existence or minimizes the seriousness of the violence and its effect on the victim and other family members.
- An abuser objectifies victims and may see them as property or objects.
- An abuser has low self-esteem and feels powerless and ineffective in the world. He or she may appear successful, but internally, they feel inadequate.
- An abuser externalizes the causes of their behavior. They blame their violence on circumstances such as stress, their partner's behavior, a "bad day," on alcohol, drugs, or other factors.
- An abuser may be pleasant between periods of violence and is often seen as a "nice person" to others outside the relationship.

What Are the "Warning Signs" of an Abuser?

- Extreme jealousy
- Possessiveness
- Unpredictability
- A bad temper
- Cruelty to animals
- Verbal abuse
- Extremely controlling behavior
- Controls all the finances
- Antiquated beliefs about roles of women and men in relationships
- Forced sex or disregard of their partner's unwillingness to have sex
- Sabotage of birth control methods or refusal to honor agreed upon methods
- Blaming the victim for anything bad that happens
- Sabotage or obstruction of the victim's ability to work or attend school
- Abuse of other family members, children or pets
- Accusations of the victim flirting with others or having an affair
- Control of what the victim wears and how they act
- Demeaning the victim either privately or publicly
- Embarrassment or humiliation of the victim in front of others
- Harassment of the victim at work

DEPLOYMENT OF MOSQUITO TRAPS

The DI Pest Control Department will be deploying commercial mosquito traps in the areas adjacent to several residential houses to evaluate and determine their effectiveness.



KESTREL EYE DEMONSTRATION COMES TO AN END

REDSTONE ARSENAL—If you are looking for a demonstration on exceeding expectations, you need look no further than Kestrel Eye.

The U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command/Army Forces Strategic Command Technical Center's Kestrel Eye reached end of life in late August. As a Science and Technology demonstration, Kestrel Eye provided USASMDC/ARSTRAT vital data and crucial lessons learned for supporting future Army small satellite programs.

"Kestrel Eye was deployed into lowearth orbit in October 2017 and remained on orbit for more than 10 months," said Wheeler "Chip" Hardy, Kestrel Eye program director. "The original estimate was six months. The Kestrel Eye team however, managed to prolong its life to nearly double this original expectation."

Hardy added that the Kestrel Eye demonstrator met the command's objectives and will be used to inform further Army small-satellite developments

"This science and technology program did exactly what an S&T program should, in that it has provided invaluable lessons learned for any future imaging small satellite program," he said.

Kestrel Eye lifted off from Cape Canaveral, Florida, Aug. 14, 2017, and de-

ployed Oct. 24.

It was a small, low-cost, visible-imagery satellite the size of a small refrigerator and weighed approximately 50 kg. SMDC engineers designed the satellite to provide electro-optical imagery at a tactically useful resolution and to give Warfighters on the ground the ability to directly task and receive data as it passed overhead.

The SMDC team made the Kestrel Eye platform entirely of commercial off-the-shelf and custom-produced components.

"A large part of the original concept was to investigate if a less expensive, small satellite could provide useful information," Hardy said. "From that viewpoint, Kestrel Eye performed well and provided rapid, reliable responses with tactically useful imagery.

"Kestrel Eye's cost is not the only factor to consider," he added. "Other equally important factors are timeliness of response and the classification of the image collected. Because the service 'owns' the satellite, the brigade commander would have confidence that an image would be provided when it was needed."


During its lifetime, the Kestrel Eye demonstrator provided SMDC's young engineers and Soldiers who operated the satellite with hands-on satellite experience. They designed and built much of the ground system, operated the ground-station antennas, commanded the imaging microsatellite, and manned the associated operations center.

"My experience working on Kestrel Eye was great," said Dr. Matthew Hitt, SMDC Technical Center general engineer. "It was a good team to work with, and the opportunities and learning potential were beneficial. I learned a lot about satellite orbits, modeling and satellite operations. I also learned about all the subsystems that compose a satellite and the technical challenges associated with them."

Kestrel Eye recently participated in the Joint Capability Technology Demonstration, or JCTD, with U.S. Indo-Pacific Command. The demonstration results were evaluated by joint and combatant command Warfighters to determine how well Kestrel Eye could satisfy their needs. Images taken by Kestrel Eye served as the JCTD operational demonstration to enable the Warfighters to comment on future possibilities.

"The chief item we learned from Kestrel Eye is that the concept to provide the Warfighter with rapid situational awareness at a reasonable cost has validity," Hardy said. "Heeding lessons learned from the Kestrel Eye demonstrator will enable other SMDC small-satellite science and technology efforts to have an increased chance of success.

"The demonstrator has been a trailblazer for Army imaging from a microsatellite," he added. "It has shown beneficial tactical capabilities from space, which could represent a new tool for the tactical commander."

Madden Julian Oscillation is in a phase to suppress convection in our area. With weak trade winds, very little convergence of winds along the surface exists to initiate convective showers. Expect lots of sun and dry conditions for the upcoming week.
