MARSHALLESE TRADE FAIR BUILDS ATOLL FRIENDSHIPS

Residents of U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll welcomed Marshallese artisans, farmers and vendors to Kwajalein for the 15th Annual Marshallese Trade Fair in the CRC Oct. 21 and 22.

The event is coordinated through the RMI Ministry of Natural Resources and Commerce, and sponsored by USAG-KA Command. It encourages friendship and communication between residents of the garrison and other islands in Kwajalein Atoll.

Vendors traveled to Kwajalein from Majuro and Ebeye to present and promote their wares, products and crafts at the 2018 trade fair. USAG-KA shoppers

found items from locations throughout the Marshall Islands like Ebeye and Rongelap, Ebon and Majuro atolls. The variety of products reflects the ministry's initiative of "One Island, One Product," to demonstrate the individuality and unique character of each atoll.

For many new members of the Kwajalein community, the trade fair is the first occasion to meet someone from a faraway island.

"I loved every minute of this fair," said one shopper. "I came with my friends to get things for my family back home. I can't believe the talent all of these people who make the handicrafts."

A long line of shoppers at an outdoor tent indicated a popular point of sale

at the fair. Throughout the afternoon, a steady stream of residents visited to purchase fish jerky and fresh lobster, wahoo and tuna.

Inside the CRC, USAG-KA residents traveled from tables festooned in shell bead necklaces and colorful "wuut" flower crowns and bracelets, to displays laden with bright yellow and green organic pandanus, guava, papaya and bananas. Several residents left with arms full of woven flowers, baskets, and decorative home décor items such as baskets and wall hangings. Original T-shirts, jewelry, soaps, candles and oils manufactured from coconuts were among popular items purchased as gifts for off-island relatives.

The Kwajalein Hourglass is named for the insignia of the U.S. Army 7th Infantry Division, which liberated the island from the forces of Imperial Japan on Feb. 4, 1944. MANMADE MONSTERS WITH RYAN BROCKSMITH

Kwajalein resident Ryan Brocksmith says he didn't get into Halloween as a kid, but was enthralled by designs and illustrations he encountered in comic books. Through a lot of elbow grease, trial and error and training with some of the great makeup artists of the past two decades, the USAG-KA police officer learned to create manmade monsters.

On island, Brocksmith regularly contributes his talents to add to the realism of emergency services mass casualty drills. He also offers his services to friends who need a fantastic makeup job to get them through the spooky season. Head into his home on island during October, and you are likely to find a makeshift makeup shop set up in his living room with bottles of facial spray, makeup trays and an airbrush standing by.

The AFN crew invited Brocksmith into the studio for an afternoon to demonstrate his skills and ask some questions about how to make monsters.

Kwajalein Hourglass: Today you're making up a zombie for us. What do you think about zombie makeup and how it's changed over time?

Ryan Brocksmith: Movie makeup has changed as technology paves the way for better and faster computer-generated effects. The field of practical effects, though relevant, has thinned out. The best results are when CGI and practical effects integrate and work together. There are many ways to do a zombie style makeup. I can do gory zombies—but I don't really like to. Gore is all too often used as an easy cover-up for mistakes or the absence of quality details. I think you can be more creative with gore, bloods and fluids to

accent the piece rather than allow gore to become the main focal point. Some of my favorite zombies are from movies like in "28 Days Later," "Dawn of the Dead," and the work of the KNB EFX Group in "The Walking Dead" series.

KHG: What finishing touches do you add for realism?

RB: For zombie characters, it's in the details. A technique called spattering adds depth and color to a makeup. Deliberate imperfections add organic randomness. Vein work is a great way to bump effects up a notch. Contact lenses, teeth or teeth stains and dirty, bloodless nails add subtle realism that helps you accept that this is a real character—even if we know it is fantasy.

KHG: Has doing this work ruined movies for you?

RB: Not for me, but for my wife. I constantly point out poor makeup or horrible CGI especially if the story is a good one. It ruins it for me.

KHG: How do you come up with your makeup designs?

RB: I experiment. Like today, I walked in and wasn't sure if what I was trying was going to work, but now I really like it. I like some of the colors and techniques I tried. I'm going to try it again. I took a calculated risk and it worked out. I also enjoy learning new things from other artists that I look up to. Richard Redlfesen, the artists at KNB EFX Group: Rick Baker, Tim Gore and Steve Wang, to name a few, and we cannot forget Mr. Dick Smith.

KHG: Was it tough to get the hang of the zombie airbrush?

RB: It was tough, but like anything, you

get the hang of it. Learning to troubleshoot and keep the airbrush working was a challenge but with practice you gain experience which makes it much easier to work with.

KHG: How long do most makeup applications take?

RB: It depends on how detailed you want to go with something. I can easily slap on a prosthetic face and paint over it. If you want quality work, you blend in the edges so the application is seamless. The more detailed, the more time. My wife used to always be my makeup model. You can be in the chair for two to three hours. She won't model anymore!

KHG: What are you going to be for Halloween this year?

RB: A demon witch for our haunted house. It's going to be rough because I'll have to do the makeup myself, and it's a full-face application!

OPSEC AND SOCIAL NETWORKING SITES

Social Networking Sites (SNS) like Facebook and Twitter, are software applications that connect people and information in spontaneous, interactive ways. While SNS can be useful and fun, they can provide adversaries, such as terrorists, spies and criminals, with critical information needed to harm you or disrupt your mission. Practicing Operations Security (OPSEC) will help you recognize your critical information and protect it from an adversary. Here are a few safety tips to get you started.

SAFETY CHECKLIST

PERSONAL INFORMATION

- Do you keep sensitive, work-related information OFF your profile?
- Keep your plans, schedules and location data to yourself?
- Protect the names of coworkers, friends and family members?
- Tell friends to be careful when posting photos and information about you and your family?

POSTED DATA

- Before posting, did you check all photos for indicators in the background or reflective surfaces?
- Check filenames and file tags for sensitive data (your name, organization or other details?)

PASSWORDS

- Are your passwords sufficiently hard to guess?
- Unique from your other online passwords?
- Are your passwords adequately protected (not shared or given away)?

SETTINGS AND PRIVACY

- Did you carefully look for and set all your privacy and security options?
- Determine both profile and search visibility?
- Sort “friends” into groups and networks and set access permissions accordingly?
- Verify through other channels that a “friend” request was actually from your friend?
- Add “untrusted” people to the group with the lowest permissions and accesses?

SECURITY

- Remember to keep anti-virus software updated
- Beware of links, downloads and attachments just as you would in emails.
- Beware of “apps” or plugins, which are often written by unknown third parties who might use them to access your data and friends.
- Look for HTTPS and the lock icon that indicate active transmission security before logging in or entering sensitive data (especially when using wi-fi hotspots).

Think before you post! Remember, your information could become public at any time due to hacking, configuration errors, social engineering or the business practice of selling or sharing user data. For more information, visit the Interagency OPSEC Support Staff's website.

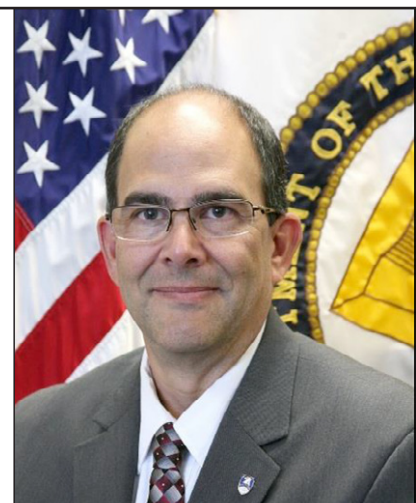

EARLY MISSILE WARNING UNIT PASSES EVALUATION WITH 99 PERCENT

Detachment C, 1st Space Company, the Joint Tactical Ground Station at Osan Air Base, one of four JTAGS units worldwide that provides early missile warning for the United States and its allies, proved their mission readiness with 99 percent proficiency during their recent Operational Readiness Evaluation.

According to Tom Jacobs, battalion standardization officer with 1st Space Battalion, the ORE, which was completed Sept. 16, is one of two external evaluations JTAGS detachments undergo each year and is planned, coordinated and executed by the 1st Space Battalion.

"We conduct OREs annually in (U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command/Army Forces Strategic Command) for each mission area. It is the commander's check on operational proficiency across the organization," Jacobs said. "They are extremely important to ensure our units are ready to perform their directed, strategic mission."

"The scenario presented to the unit was both complex and dynamic using current real world situations to drive the evaluation," Jacobs said. "OREs are designed to be challenging while enabling the unit to demonstrate proficiency in accomplishing their direct mission. Success depends on individual and collective tasks being performed to standard."

According to Sgt. 1st Class Kacee Love, detachment operations sergeant, the successful ORE validated the ability of the unit to perform its mission.

"The past year has been making sure all of our operators were certified at multiple levels, and making sure everyone understands not just what their job is within the shelter but what the person to the left or right is also responsible for and how their mission actually impacts the higher echelon units around the world - those tier-one sites and those who have a role in missile warning," Love said.

Commander Capt. Adam Mancini said his Soldiers did an outstanding job.

"I took command in June 2018, and we've been preparing and talking about the ORE since then," Mancini said. "It's been months and months leading up to this weeklong event. It's my first time doing an ORE and I didn't know what to expect. We did very well, and I'm very proud of my Soldiers."

Many of the Soldiers receive a one-year assignment to the unit, however, Jacobs said the turnover, particularly in leadership, did not affect their preparedness.

"Despite the turnover in leadership from last year, the detachment was able to maintain a very high level of proficiency, as demonstrated through the evaluation," Jacobs said. "They displayed a high level of motivation and morale, and they demonstrated a high level of training proficiency."

Love said the unit is unique and special and focuses on the Soldier's development.

"This detachment is unlike any other unit I've ever been in. Our Soldiers, our NCOs and our officers are all over here, 20 some odd people, by ourselves. This is more like a family than any place I've ever

been," Love said. "We run our training program a little differently. We focus on the SMDC mission, but we also focus on the Soldiers and their careers over a long period of time. We certify them to one step above their position because that grants flexibility to our unit and ensures that our Soldiers are able to make it to schools and are able to participate in career enhancement opportunities."

Mancini said the evaluation revealed a few areas for the detachment to work on, but overall, he was pleased.

"We are a very small detachment, and they do their job, their real-world mission, a strategic mission, every day," Mancini said. "These are very young Soldiers, but they take it very seriously. I've very proud of who they are, and I'm fortunate for being in command of such a great group of Soldiers."

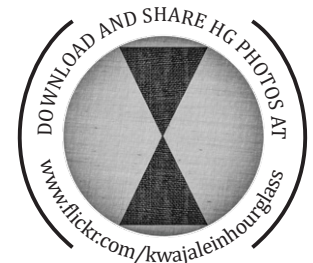

SCUBA DIVE SAFETY TIPS

Always dive with a buddy. Never dive alone.

Wait at least 12 hours before flying after doing a single dive.

Wait 18-24 hours after doing multiple dives.


Divers Alert Network (DAN) recommends refraining from strenuous work at least 24 hours before AND after diving.

Keep your gear up-to-date and serviced regularly. DAN recommends that regulators get overhauled at least once a year.

Each diver should have their own computer.

On any given dive, both divers in the buddy pair should follow the most conservative computer.

Do not ascend greater than 60 feet per minute.

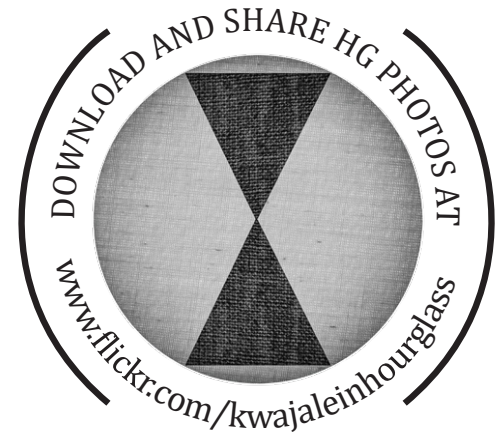
