Employees of Berry Aviation International donated more than \$4,900 in tuition funds to students at four Ebeye Schools Oct. 29.

The employees boarded an early ferry from Kwajalein to Ebeye. There they met with students, principals and teachers to deliver scholarship checks. The funds will go toward school tuition and education expenses for the students sponsored.

BAI'S Steve Simpson, Sandy Shi-maoka, Kembi Lucky and Hackney Jatio made the trip with Allen Loeak, who also provided transportation to each site on Ebeye, wrote Simpson in a note to the Kwajalein Hourglass.

"The public schools get filled quickly and the only other option is Christian schools with required tuition," wrote Simpson. "These are staffed by locals and others from various parts of the world. The staff work for almost nothing

for these kids. It is impressive what they do and the sacrifices they make."

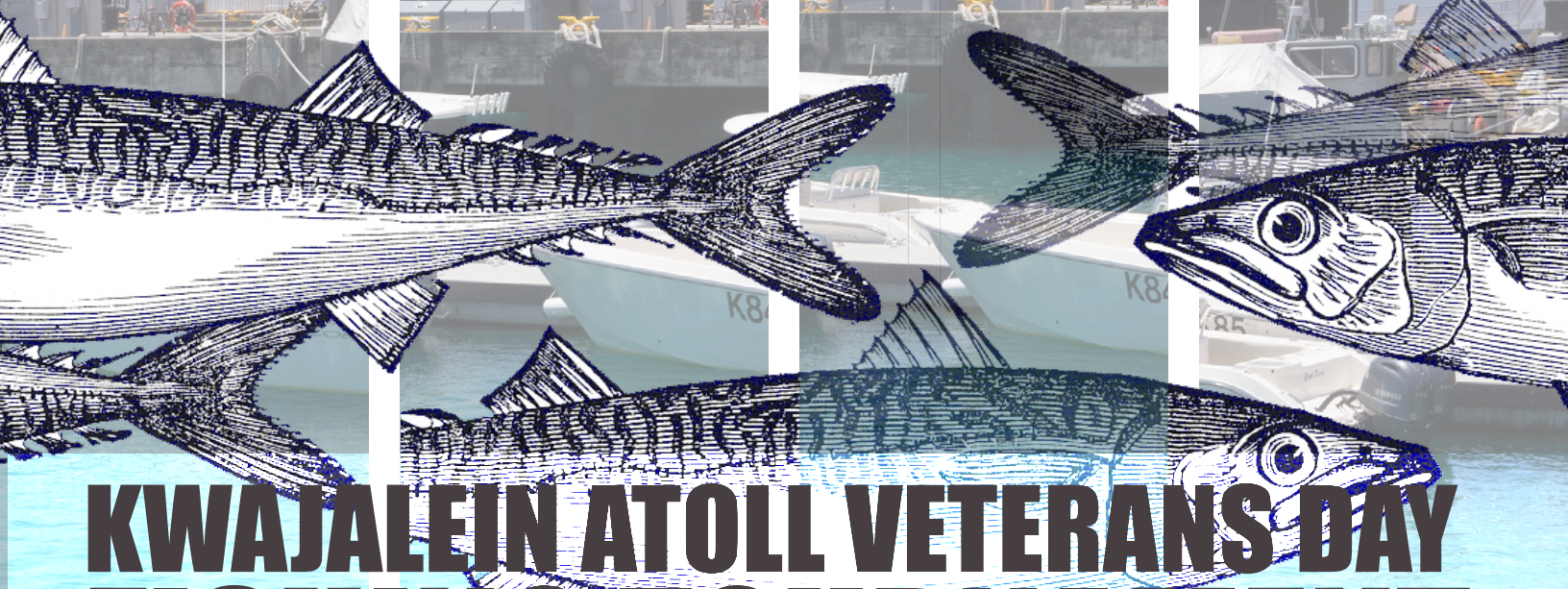


THE KWAJALEIN HOURLASS

KWAJALEIN ATOLL VETERANS DAY FISHING TOURNAMENT

The Kwajalein Atoll Veterans Day Fishing Tournament is nearly here! The only thing better than a big fish story is bragging rights for the big catch on a fishing trip to Roi-Namur and back. The Kwajalein Atoll Sportfishing Club and Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation (FMWR) invite Kwajalein and Roi-Namur residents to honor active duty service members and Veterans with a two-day tournament. Enter for the chance to catch big fish and win big prizes. If you and your crew are interested in joining the contest, read on to learn about tournament rules and regulations. REGISTRATION

Captains must register for the tournament and pay entry fees at the Kwajalein or Roi-Namur Small Boat Marina no later than 6 p.m. on Thursday, Nov. 8. Team captains will need to attend a short meeting Sunday, Nov. 11 at 6:30 p.m. to fill out float plans, collect safety gear and have a safety meeting.

QUALIFYING TEAMS

Crew size is limited to four people per team. The Small Boat Marina will contact all crews with boat assignments. All private boat owners are welcome to enter the tournament but must have minimum of two active duty service members or Veterans onboard. At least one crewmember in each team must have a valid B-Boat License. Due to limited B-boats available, priority reservation status is offered to crews with the highest number of active duty or Veteran status boaters per team.

THE TOURNAMENT

A captain's meeting will take place Monday, Nov. 12 at the Kwajalein Small Boat Marina at 6 a.m. Captains will discuss start times, routes, range, conditions and stop times. Crews can load gear and prep boats during this time.

All boats will leave the docks between 6:15 and 6:30 a.m., and continue to the pass designated for their start and flight time. Boats will be staggered started every 10 minutes from either SAR, South or Gea Pass to spread the contestants out. Lines up or stop time will be determined at the captain's meeting and is subject to change in inclement conditions.

All captains will proceed to Nell Pass and follow Safety Patrol and Tournament Committee boats to the Roi-Namur SBM to weigh catches, refuel and dock boats. All captains will have an overnight stay on Roi-Namur and dine at the Outrigger Club before making the return trip to Kwajalein.

The Tuesday morning captain's meeting will be at the Roi-Namur Small Boat Marina at 6:15 a.m. with boats leaving the docks at 6:30 p.m. The route and range, start and stop times for Monday will be determined at the captain's meeting. All boats will be returned to the Kwajalein Small Boat Marina at a designated time to weigh in and check in boats and safety equipment.

PRIZES

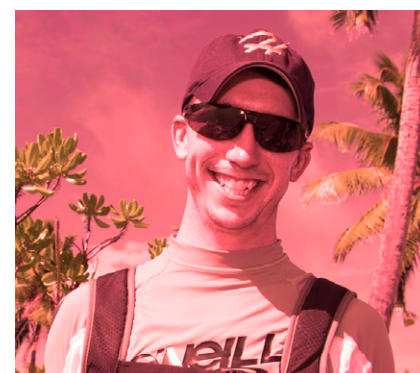
Less the cost of Sunday night dinner at the Outrigger for all captains, and hotel rooms for Roi captains, all tournament proceeds fund prize payouts for first, second and third place in the following categories: Biggest Fish and Aggregate (team combined total weight through tournament). Barracuda, needlefish and mutilated fish (to be determined by tournament committee) are not eligible to weigh towards aggregate total.

FEES

The tournament entry fee is \$50 per person. A four-person crew will total \$200. Dinner at the Outrigger Snack Bar (\$8 per person) is included in the tournament entry fee. Hotel Rooms at Roi-Namur and Kwajalein are \$15 per person for one night. The cost of fuel cost is the responsibility of the crews and separate from the entry fee.

If you're a pro at Kwaj life, and bike hatless, never fear: The sun knows exactly where you are. It will find you and bring the burn. The deep damage caused by fun in the sun may not appear for

years, but the daylight will take its toll on your skin, hair and eyes.

If you work for extended periods in the sun, have pale skin and a family history of skin cancer, you are at risk for skin cancer. Luckily, these cancers caused by overexposure to UV rays are among the most common and easily avoided. Be prepared: Wear protective clothing, polarized eyewear, SPF 30 sunscreen and, of course, a snazzy cool hat. If you're new to the island, this a friendly reminder

to love your lid. Get a broad brim and block out the direct daylight. Whenever you head out into your Kwaj-busy life, bring a buddy and a ballcap, and get into the spirit of sun protection. OPSEC AND SOCIAL NETWORKING SITES

Social Networking Sites (SNS) like Facebook and Twitter, are software applications that connect people and information in spontaneous, interactive ways. While SNS can be useful and fun, they can provide adversaries, such as terrorists, spies and criminals, with critical information needed to harm you or disrupt your mission. Practicing Operations Security (OPSEC) will help you recognize your critical information and protect it from an adversary. Here are a few safety tips to get you started.

SAFETY CHECKLIST

PERSONAL INFORMATION

- Do you keep sensitive, work-related information OFF your profile?
- Keep your plans, schedules and location data to yourself?
- Protect the names of coworkers, friends and family members?
- Tell friends to be careful when posting photos and information about you and your family?

POSTED DATA

- Before posting, did you check all photos for indicators in the background or reflective surfaces?
- Check filenames and file tags for sensitive data (your name, organization or other details?)

PASSWORDS

- Are your passwords sufficiently hard to guess?
- Unique from your other online passwords?
- Are your passwords adequately protected (not shared or given away)?

SETTINGS AND PRIVACY

- Did you carefully look for and set all your privacy and security options?
- Determine both profile and search visibility?
- Sort “friends” into groups and networks and set access permissions accordingly?
- Verify through other channels that a “friend” request was actually from your friend?
- Add “untrusted” people to the group with the lowest permissions and accesses?

SECURITY

- Remember to keep anti-virus software updated
- Beware of links, downloads and attachments just as you would in emails.
- Beware of “apps” or plugins, which are often written by unknown third parties who might use them to access your data and friends.
- Look for HTTPS and the lock icon that indicate active transmission security before logging in or entering sensitive data (especially when using wi-fi hotspots).

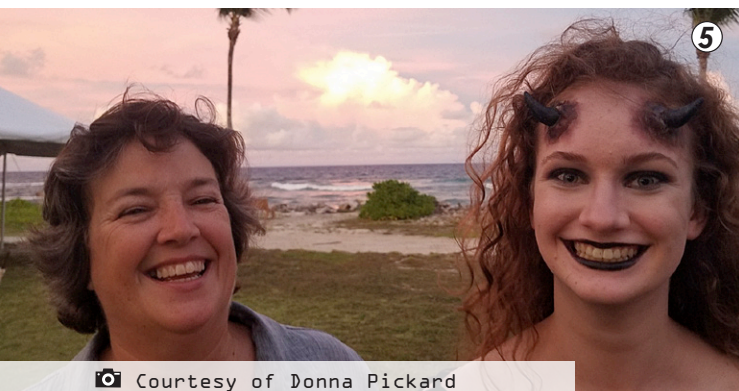

HATS OFF TO HISTORY

HOURLASS REPORT

It's amazing what a good scrub and a little electrolysis to knock off the rust will do to clean up a historical artifact. Remember that WWII-era helmet discovered near Echo Pier? These days, it's looking good.

A few weeks ago when Echo Pier

divers turned in this find to Kwajalein Archaeologists Grant Day and Caitlin Gilbertson, the M1-style helmet was barely recognizable.

The archaeology team's efforts to restore and preserve the artifact have paid off. They carefully removed corals and rust before applying a protective layer of microcrystalline wax to the

helmet. Though damaged, the original dimensions and curvature of the helmet are clearly visible.

ENVIRONMENTAL UPDATES

KWAJALEIN RECLAIMED WATER STANDARD VIOLATION

PUBLIC NOTICE

The Reclaimed Water System Document of Environmental Protection (DEP) requires public notification when reclaim water standards are violated. During the night on October 21 - 22, 2018 the chlorine residual at the Reclaimed Water System's Point of Entry (Facility 938) dropped below the required level of 1.0 parts per million (ppm).

Chlorine is used as a disinfectant in the reclaimed water system. Inadequate disinfection can leave the system vulnerable to bacteriological contamination. However, at least six monitoring locations within the distribution system are sampled daily for chlorine residual and bacteriological contamination.

All distribution samples were within compliance during the month of October. No health-based restrictions on the normal use (irrigation, vehicle washing, toilets etc) of reclaimed (non-potable) water are necessary. Additionally, there was no threat to public health or the environment as a result of this exceedance.

Dredging and Filling Operations will commence to stabilize the shoreline on the Kwajalein oceanside near the Kwaj Lodge on November 2 and continue for up to 30 days. U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command and the COARNG activated the nation's first ground-based Midcourse Defense Brigade Oct. 16, 2003. The brigade operates the first part of the integrated Ballistic Missile Defense System, which, in concert with sister services, is designed to protect the nation from accidental or intentional limited ballistic missile attacks. It is manned both by COARNG and active-component soldiers. Five crews comprised of five controllers monitor the skies over the United States 24 hours per day.

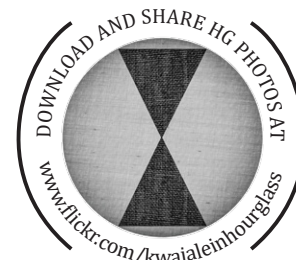

WEATHER DISCUSSION

The pattern across the Pacific this week looks like a dry season pattern for Kwajalein. Much of the heavier convective activity has been south of the equator along the Southern Pacific Convergence Zone (SPCZ) while the Inter Tropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) has been non-existent.

The sub-tropical high is building this weekend which will increase are trade winds into the mid-teens by early next week. However, November is still wet season with December being the typical transition month. We expect the ITCZ to redevelop, and numerical models support this for mid next week, with more local rainfall returning.

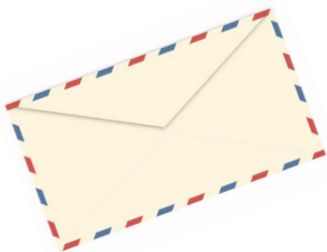
Partly sunny with isolated showers (10 percent coverage across the atoll). Winds E-ENE at 10-15 knots.

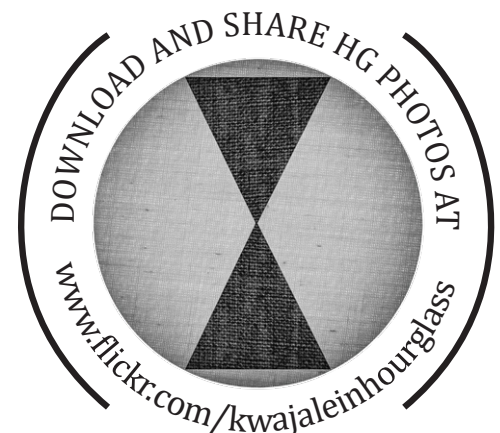
