

WEATHER DISCUSSION

As of midnight Wednesday, we have recorded 146.40 inches of rainfall for 2018. Will we break the record of 149.13 inches set in 1950? The Magic 8 ball says: "Not a chance." For those residents on-island for less than 20 months, you haven't yet experienced a real dry season. A dry season like pattern is now firmly in place across the tropical Pacific region. Expect persistent NE-ENE trade winds from 15-20 knots for extended periods. Even though it is firmly dry season, showers remain in forecast as they are still present but small, isolated, and

quick showers are the rule. Not even time to put on the rain jacket. No changes are expected in this pattern for next seven days. El Nino is expected to be in place from January to March 2019. El Nino typically results in a drier, dry season at our location.
