# REMOTE ISLAND BECAME 'VACATION' FOR SAILOR

**Emil Partak** of Venice, Fla. went to Kwajalein Atoll during his early years in the Navy. He signed up in 1956, immediately after graduating from dental college at Loyola University in Chicago.

Shortly after boot camp at Great Lakes Naval Station he received the word he was going to Kwajalein Atoll in the Pacific as a lieutenant junior grade.

"Kwajalein Atoll was the worst duty station in the Navy," according to what he'd been told. "It was a little island 2,100 miles from Honolulu. The Navy used it as a refueling station for its sea planes."

Partak, now a resident of Bellagio subdivision in Venice, said the place was so remote with such a bad reputation that he received a personal letter from the admiral in charge of all Navy dentists.

The admiral was trying to sell the island to the young dentist as a tropical paradise. Included with his letter were pictures of the palm trees on Kwajalein's gorgeous sugar-white sandy beach.

Partak received the word from a corpsman friend who told him, "Kwajalein is just fine if you go out there with the proper attitude."

Kwajalein wasn't very big. The atoll was staffed by naval personnel and their dependents.

"I couldn't take my wife or my car with me to Kwajalein," Partak said. "Even so, it was an exciting time for me because it was my first time on the West Coast. I grew up in Wisconsin. They sent me to San Francisco for a couple of days before I flew on to the Hawaiian Islands. Kwajalein was another full day's flight in a twin-engine prop-driven transport.

"I arrived there just at reveille," Partak recalled decades later. "They took me around to the various dental offices on the island then they showed me my quarters. I shared an apartment with another lieutenant.

"I quickly adopted to life on Kwajalein. My commanding officer was a good guy. He told me, 'I don't care how much work you do on a daily basis. I just want you to do a good job."

"We had a four and a half-day work week. One of my duties was to take the higher-ups who arrived on the island fishing. The Navy had a couple of 40-foot, twin-engine cabin cruisers we used for fishing.

"The fishing had its drawbacks," Partak said. "Sharks would eat most of our catch before we could get the fish aboard."

"The sharks in the lagoon at Kwajalein were small, six or seven feet compared to the ones at the dump at the end of the runway. They were huge.

"Most of the naval officers on the island were aviators. They had to fly around to get their pilot's time in," he said. "They would fly their twin-engine sea planes to an island inhabited by natives a couple of hundred miles away. Row ashore in rubber boats and sit around in a circle on the beach trading with the natives."

Hand woven rugs and little ship models made from bamboo were traded by the Marshallese. The Americans would swap soap and cigarettes with them.

Life for him improved considerably after two months on the island when his wife flew out to be with him on Kwajalein.

"When my wife arrived I met her at the plane. I took her to my new Navy house," Partak said. "We lived in a two-story brick duplex. They told me to go down to the Navy furniture warehouse and pick out anything I wanted to furnish my new house with."

It was 1956, and by this time some 2,800 Navy personnel worked on the island, he said. The island had a couple of bars and three movie theaters, a grocery store and a school for the sailors' kids.

During the time Partak spent on Kwajalein, the most outstanding part if his year-long billet was the weather.

"It's great because the temperature on the island was usually around 80°. It never got below 70 and never above 85. There was always a breeze and there was sunshine all the time.

"The time I spent on Kwajalein with my wife was a vacation for both of us," he said. "Then I was transferred to North (Island) Air Station on Coronado Island off San Diego which is just where I wanted to be because I planned to practice dentistry in California when I got out of

the Navy."

Coronado Island was where the UDT (Underwater Demolition Team) set up its base. It was also where the Navy's hottest jets were based. They were part of the carrier fleet whose home base was San Diego, too.

Partak and his wife spent their second and last year in the regular Navy at North Island Air Station. After discharge he served an additional seven years in the Naval Reserve. He was a lieutenant commander when he was finally discharged.

For 40 years, Emil practiced dentistry in the San Jose, California, area before retiring and moving to Venice in 1997. He has three children who live out of state: Terese, James, and David.

#### RV RILL REMICK

**The N-east wreck** is a sharp looking ship that has a raked bow and a counter stern. It is called N-east because it lies a couple hundred yards east of the N-buoy coral head in Kwajalein Atoll. It was discovered in 1965.

The ship has a lot of compartments on the main deck. Before being pressed into service with the Japanese navy, it may have been some kind of passenger vessel, possibly a private yacht. After it was pressed into service, it had a large gun mounted on the bow and an extension added to the forward cabin area.

The vessel may also have been used for mine sweeping as there is a small paravane lying in the entrance to the engine room.


Years ago, a clear bomb or shell hit was obvious on the port side near the stern. That impact was clearly the cause of its sinking. When I was last on the wreck in 2007, it looked like the whole of the stern area had collapsed. A xerox copy of

an aerial photo I have shows that it was still afloat on the afternoon of Jan. 30, 1944, so it was either sunk later that day or the next.

No identification of the N-east wreck has ever been made. It was diesel powered and is 163 feet in overall length and a 25-foot beam. The waterline length is probably 10-15 feet shorter. I did the measurements with a survey tape during a dive in 1995.

Comparing the dimensions to the Palawan Maru sunk at Bigej leaves me guessing that the gross rated tonnage would be about 400 GRT. I haven't been able to find any ship in the identification books from WWII or the post-war assessments of any ship sunk at or near Kwajalein that matches it.

While the N-east wreck is in shallow water compared to the rest of the nearby wrecks in the lagoon, it is not dived on much from boats as it lies in an active work-boat channel. Nowadays I suspect most people that do dive it use scooters from the shore to get there.

The sale, which is open to anyone on island, will offer discounts on discontinued and overstocked goods




November 1992, and the second half attached a vear later

# KING CAKE

#### HOURGLASS REPORT

**Picture** an iced cinnamon roll 14-inches in diameter. Now punch a hole in the center and sprinkle it with colored sugars, and voila: you have a King Cake.

The decadent treat is a mainstay of Mardis Gras celebrations in the United States; however, variations on the European dessert date back more than 300 years. Depending on your region, a King Cake might resemble an iced donut, a coconut confection, a fruit cake or winter sweet bread. The most important thing is to have your King Cake and eat it too.

This year as FMWR prepares for a community island parade, you're encouraged to bring the festive spirit to your kitchen table with this recipe.

The King Cake (makes 14-16 servings) Prep: 50-60 min.

#### King Cake

½ cup warm water
2 envelopes quick rise active dry yeast
5 cups all-purpose flour
½ cup sugar
½ tsp. freshly grated nutmeg
2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. grated lemon peel
1 tsp. grated orange peel
½ cup lukewarm milk
3 eggs, beaten slightly
4 egg yolks, beaten slightly
½ cup plus 2 TBS butter

#### King Glaze

½ cup powdered sugar 3 teaspoons milk ¼ tsp. vanilla extract Decorating sugar (purple, yellow and green)

Plastic baby figurine (\*optional)

#### Steps

1) Dissolve yeast in a small bowl of warm water. Set aside to rest.



- **2)** In a separate bowl, beat three eggs. Set aside.
- **3)** In (yet another) separate bowl, separate and beat four egg yolks. Set aside.
- 4) In a large bowl, blend sugar, nutmeg, salt and flour. Stir in orange and lemon peel. Make a well in the center of the mixture. Add yeast mixture, milk, beaten eggs and beaten egg yolks. Gradually fold mixture together. Add 1/2 cup of butter and mix until dough forms ball.
- **5)** Place dough on floured board. Knead until smooth and elastic (add flour as needed).
- **6)** Grease a large bowl with butter. Place dough in bowl. Turn to coat entire surface of dough with butter. Cover and let dough rest for 45 min., or until doubled in size.
- **7)** Heat oven to 375°F. With remaining butter, grease large baking sheet. Return dough to lightly floured surface, knead several times. Shape dough into a long roll. Pinch ends together to form a dough ring.
- **8)** Bake for 25 to 30 minutes, or until golden brown. Cool cake on a wire rack.
- **9)** For the glaze, in a small bowl, combine the milk, vanilla and powdered sugar. Stir until smooth. Once cake has cooled, drizzle icing on top. Decorate with sugars. If desired, place plastic baby beneath the cake.

Zulu King Cake Variation: Another tasty option is to swap out the candied fruit peel for chocolate chips. Glaze the King Cake with chocolate frosting and dust with sugars and toasted coconut.

# SMDC SUPPORTS DEVELOPMENT OF 12CEWS BATTALIONS FOR MULTI-DOMAIN OPERATIONS

**REDSTONE** ARSENAL—Future contingencies will be supported by Army units with capabilities designed by the U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense/Army Forces Strategic Command' Future Warfare Center for multi-domain operations.

USASMDC/ARSTRAT is working with the Army chief of staff's Multi-Domain Task Force in developing the establishment of newly organized Intelligence, Information, Cyber, Electronic Warfare and Space Capabilities, or I2CEWS battalions.

"I2CEWS is a comprehensive organization that provides space, cyber, information, intelligence, and electronic warfare capabilities that will allow U.S. forces to disrupt, deny and degrade enemy capabilities in combat operations," said Col. Timothy G. Dalton, SMDC U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command Capabilities Manager for Space and High Altitude, or TCM SHA. "The space element in the I2CEWS is similar to the organizational structure we have for the space control company that currently resides within the 1st Space Brigade. This company was the model used to help develop the force structure in this new organization.

"SMDC's role is working with the a wide range of U. S. Army organizations to assist in determining the right manning, training support, and equipment that will be needed to make sure the unit can accomplish the mission," he added.

Dalton said the command has been working closely with many organizations to provide space proponent support to ensure the U.S. Army has the right organizational structure and space capabilities to support the multi-domain operations mission sets.

He said that as the Army moves into the concept of multi-domain operations, the elements of I2CEWS are key components of what the Army saw going forward as areas of warfare they needed to address and where the enemy is looking to engage them in.

"As we move to the type of environment where the adversary is increasing capabilities on all these fronts, we know we have to develop capabilities to counter the adversary," Dalton said. He added that in the past the Army had not developed those in a concise, succinct unit to be able to deploy forward. They were placed in separate elements and organizations within the force structure, but now the Army has seen the importance of putting them together to leverage and provide the cross-domain support Army leadership wants.

Dalton said this is important to SMDC because the command is the proponent for space, high-altitude and navigation warfare for the Army.

As SMDC helps develop space capabilities to support the U.S. Army, the proponent role allows the command be involved with the life-cycle development of space capabilities so they are fully integrated into the Army's force structure and gives commanders the ability to not only protect their organizations from a space perspective, but also give them an increased ability to deliver effects on the battlefield.

As the TCM SHA, Dalton belongs to SMDC's Future Warfare Center but receives operational authority through TRADOC.

"The Army wants to stand up the Multi-Domain Task Force and the I2CEWS battalions are an important part of it," Dalton said. "They look to SMDC, as the space experts, to figure out what right looks like for the space organizational structure, similar to what the Cyber and Intelligence Centers of Excellence have done for the cyber and intel elements."

The Army's first I2CEWS battalion was activated at Joint Base Lewis McChord, Washington, Jan. 11, after two years of planning. The battalion is composed of four companies and will support units and joint task forces in the U.S. Indo-Pacific Command theater of operations.

Within the battalion, the space and signal company is designed to support freedom of action in space for friendly forces and deny it to adversaries. The cyber and electronic warfare company is expected to open windows of opportunity in the information environment. The long range sensing company will enable precision fires and support artillery, air and missile defense. The intelligence company will provide understanding of the operating environment and drive lethal and non-lethal operations.

"The I2CEWS battalion and the Multi-Domain Task Force give additional capa-

bilities to the warfighter on the ground," Dalton said. "We know that we have to plan on competing in a contested environment. Potential adversaries are increasing their capability in the cyber and space domains. And knowing that we rely on these same capabilities, they are going try and attack us in those venues as well."

"What the I2CEWS battalion does is allow the commander on the ground to have capabilities within his span of control so he can impact the enemy's ability to operate effectively. It provides the commander the capability to then open up windows of opportunity to engage and either disrupt, destroy or deny the enemy's capabilities to accomplish the mission," he added.

A second battalion has been approved for establishment in U.S. European Command in the near future.

"This is an exciting time for the command as we move forward because as technology and capabilities continue to emerge and develop, the Army has been able to focus resources on capabilities that allow warfighters to do their jobs better and increase their survivability on the battlefield," Dalton said. "Space capabilities are important to the U.S. Army as they provide commanders a decisive advantage when conducting operations. With the addition of the I2CEWS battalions, the U.S. Army is better postured to protect its assets and engage adversaries in the space domain.

"It is a great time at SMDC as we continue to move forward and provide space capabilities to the Army and the warfighter so it will enable them to better accomplish their missions," he added.



PUBLIC NOTICE

**Remember** the three Rs of UXO: Recognize an item as possible Unexploded Ordnance (UXO). Retreat from the area of the UXO. Report suspected UXO immediately by notifying EOD (5-1433) or CPS (5-4445).

Provide the following information: Location (building #, GPS, landmarks, etc); Size (compared to common items - football, scuba cylinder, etc). Treat UXO like you would treat dangerous sea creatures. Look but do not touch, For a detailed refresher, please attend the Island Orientation Briefing on the fourth Wednesday of every month.

WEATHER DISCUSSION: Kwajalein Atoll now returns to a dry pattern. The disturbance that passed through the southern RMI last weekend become Typhoon Wutip. The typhoon passes south and west of Guam now and may interrupt some of the transportation routes. Even though we received over 3.5 inches rain in southern Kwajalein atoll, northern RMI atolls like Utirik and Wotje are in severe drought territory with no short-term relief coming.

Locally pattern is back to the dry, consistent trade winds common this time of year. Winds should remain in the teens all week, below any advisory criteria. Any isolated showers will be brief.

**SATURDAY:** Partly sunny with stray showers (less than 10 percent coverage across the atoll). Winds NE-ENE at 12-17 knots.

**SUNDAY:** Partly to mostly sunny with stray showers (less than 10 percent coverage across the atoll). Winds NE-ENE at 14-18 knots.

MONDAY: Partly to mostly sunny with stray showers (less than 10 percent coverage across the atoll). Winds NE-ENE at 14-18 knots.

**NEXT WEEK:** Partly to mostly sunny, shower coverage around 10 percent, trade wind speeds decreasing to 13-18 knots.
