



## **SMDC GENERAL VISITS USAG-KA**

### HOURGLASS REPORT

Lt. Gen. James Dickinson, Commanding General of U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command/Army Forces Strategic Command, visited sites on Kwajalein Atoll during a visit last week. On Ebeye, Dickinson met with Kwajalein Atoll Local Government leadership. He also met with U.S. employees on Roi-Namur. Dickinson hosted a town hall for Kwajalein residents Feb. 26 in the Kwajalein Jr.-Sr. High School Multi-Purpose Room.

At the town hall, Dickinson shared stories and successes from his tour of US-ASMDC/ARSTRAT sites, noting that in October 2018, the command celebrated the 15th anniversary of the 100th Missile Defense Brigade located in Colorado.

Dickinson recognized the success of the Technical Center's high energy laser demonstrations like the Mobile Expeditionary High Energy Laser (MEHEL), which is a high-energy laser mounted on an Army combat vehicle. He also described his teleconference with Army astronaut Lt. Col. Anne McClain as she completed her pre-launch training and certification in Kazakhstan in December.

As for Kwajalein Atoll, Dickinson said range contractor Range Generation Next

(RG Next) is now 100 percent mission capable, with more than 300 employees hired and several remaining acquisitions.

Col. James DeOre, Commander of US-AG-KA, presented an overview of Installation Management Command's tiered funding to the garrison for everything from infrastructure improvements to family programs. Next, USAG-KA Command staff and directors presented a summary of works completed and in progress throughout the garrison.

James Heidle, USAG-KA Director of Public Works, discussed the garrison's proposed schedule of construction and improvements through fiscal year 2032 to include "de-scoping" the runway, the construction of a new hospital, termed "ambulatory care clinic," the demolition of the north point Army housing area and construction and repair to sewers and water systems on Kwajalein and Roi-Namur.

Chief Warrant Officer 3 Jamey Norton, USAG-KA Transportation Marine Engineering Officer, presented the results of the Prinz Eugen oil salvage operation. The project ran from Sept. 7 through Oct. 21 of 2018, as salvage vessels and divers worked to test, drain and hot tap 159 of the 173 oil tanks that remained on the wrecked German cruiser. Approximately

14 tanks remain inside, as safety issues made them impossible to reach. Norton reminded the community not to touch the hot tap covers and advised that the site is safe for scuba divers.

Jeffrey Suis, USAG-KA Director of Family, Morale and Welfare (FMWR), had several updates to report. FMWR completed an interior renovation of Kwajalein's Adult Recreation Center in February to include painting, cleaning and the replacement of worn furniture. Electronic pinball and darts machines will be installed within the coming months. Future improvements will augment other facilities with new equipment in upcoming months, including the Sunrise Bakery, Ocean View Club and Country Club. A rentable flatbed vehicle and dunk tanks will be available for rent to the community for events. Suis encouraged the community to mark their calendars for the FMWR Easter Egg Hunt and Fun Fair April 21.

to the community and recommended vigilance. He asked the community to be careful about what they post on social media and had everyone watch a video pertaining to OPSEC.

DeOre presented the latest information about the USAG-KA residential 9-1-1 calling program. USAG-KA Command retains a waiver for 9-1-1 calling as the island has not moved to a voice over internet protocol (VOIP) system.

Residents who report difficulty in making 9-1-1 calls are directed to take steps to address this issue. Residents should call the Army Enterprise Service Desk for assistance at 1-866-335-2769

and provide their employee email and quarters or BQ building and room number. For help with 9-1-1 trouble for VOIP users, residents should dial 1-805-355-5911. DeOre encouraged the community to call the USAG-KA Department of Public works if it appeared there was a connectivity issue outside of the home.

A question and answer session followed in which Dickinson and DeOre addressed a variety of issues.

## **SEABEES CELEBRATE BIRTHDAY**

The U.S. Navy Seabees of Naval Mobile Construction Battalion 3 celebrated the 77th birthday of the Seabees at the March 2 Seabee Ball in the Kwajalein Jr.-Sr. High School MP Room. The informal potluck gathering brought together U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll Command staff, Navy Veterans and family members in honor of the U.S. Navy Seabees birthday.

Chaplain Brian Conner of the Island Memorial Chapel opened the evening with a benediction. BUC DeArmond Mahn, officer in charge of NMCB 3, welcomed everyone and directed their attention to the front of the room where a simple table was laid with a white tablecloth and a red rose. The chair remained empty.

"I want you all to understand why this is here," said Mahn. He explained the symbolism of the fallen comrade or "missing man" table. It is familiar sight in military dining facilities worldwide and a reminder to honor and remember those who cannot join a meal—the brave fallen, missing and prisoners of war. Mahn also provided a bit of history about the inception of the Navy Seabees and the prominent role they played in WWII as construction experts deployed to the Pacific to build bases.

Mahn acknowledged the longstanding, good-natured rivalry between branches of service: The Navy was on the atoll first, he said, drawing laughs from USAG-KA Command Staff.

Together, guests and Seabees visited and enjoyed a buffet of Italian cuisine, complete with salad and breadsticks. The main event of the evening was, of course, dessert: a large, red velvet birthday cake decorated with a fighting Navy Seabee.

"We have a tradition," Mahn said. "Our oldest Seabee and youngest Seabee cut the cake together. It's akin to how our

experienced Seabees share knowledge and training with new generations."

The dubious honor of this duty fell to UTCN Diego Vasquez, the youngest Seabee present, much to the delight of his battalion mates. Guests laughed as BU1 Eduardo Munoz, the most venerable Seabee, joined Vasquez to slice and serve the dessert.

"That's a good-looking cake," said US-AG-KA Commander Col. James DeOre, keeping up the rivalry. "I like the black and yellow Army colors for the bee."

The U.S. Navy Seabees are forward-deployed throughout the Pacific region to continue work on a variety of construction and public works projects in the Federated States of Micronesia and Republic of the Marshall Islands. Seabees also serve as career counselors and mentors to youth throughout the Pacific.

Past Seabee projects include water catchments on Enniburr island, fitness improvements on Kwajalein and school buildings on Ebeye, Kosrae, and the island of Pohnpei.

## STUDENTS STUDY CAREERS AT MILITARY FAIR

More than 25 volunteer military and former military personnel from each branch of the U.S. Armed Forces and Merchant Marine met with senior high students Feb. 21 at Kwajalein High School's first-ever Military Fair. The event introduced students to the different branches of military service, testing and perquisites that determine a career track in the U.S. military.

The fair was a success thanks to the assistance of U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll Commander Col. James DeOre, Command Sgt. Maj. Kenyatta Gaskins and the volunteers and representatives who participated.

"They volunteered their time to share their stories and personal journeys in the military with the students," wrote KHS Counselor Masina McCollum to the Kwajalein Hourglass. The event began with a presentation about the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) by Chief Warrant Officer 2 Jarell Smith, who explained that the test is a tool that can be used to identify possible career paths in the military or in the civilian world. ## PUBLIC NOTIFICATION: IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR DRINKING WATER MELELE KO RAUROK KIN DREN IN IDRAAK EO ILO KWAJALEIN

#### PUBLIC NOTICE

Kwajalein Drinking Water Total Trihalomethanes (TTHM) MCL Violation

The Kwajalein drinking water system recently exceeded a drinking water standard. This incident is not an emergency. However, public notification is required to meet the requirement in the USAKA Environmental Standards (UES). The information below is a summary of cause of non-compliance and actions taken to ensure drinking water quality.

Testing results from the third quarter of fiscal year 2018 (3QFY18; April – June 2018) show that the Kwajalein Island drinking water system exceeds the standard, or maximum contaminant level (MCL), for the TTHM locational running annual average (LRAA). The standard, or MCL, for the TTHM LRAA is 0.080 mg/L determined by averaging the results of samples collected at each sampling location for the past four quarters. The level of TTHM averaged at three locations for 3QFY18 was between 0.081 and 0.090 mg/L.

#### What should I do?

Nothing. You do not need to boil your water or take other corrective actions. If you have a severely compromised immune system, are pregnant, or are elderly, you may be at increased risk and should seek advice from your health care providers about drinking this water.

#### What does this mean?

This is not an emergency! TTHM are four volatile organic chemicals which form when disinfectants, such as chlorine, react with natural organic matter in the water. Long term consumption of water with levels of TTHM in excess of the MCL may result in issues with liver, kidney, or nervous system, and an increased risk of cancer.

Short term exposure has not been shown to lead to adverse health effects. Potential exposures to Kwajalein residents and personnel is considered short term due to the limited time the MCL has been exceeded.

#### What is being done?

Kwajalein Island's drinking water is now being processed through our reverse osmosis (RO) system prior to treatment and distribution through the potable water system.

RO removes most of the organic matter present in the water prior to chlorination reducing TTHMs.

A Granular Activated Carbon (GAC) filter system is planned for installation on Kwajalein in the near future to treat the entire Kwajalein drinking water supply to remove naturally occurring organic compounds before the water is disinfected with chlorine reducing the resulting TTHMs to minimal levels.

## U.S. DELEGATION MEETS WITH RMI PRESIDENT

**Doug Domenech**, U.S. Department of the Interior Assistant Secretary, Insular and International Affairs, met with Republic of the Marshall Islands President Dr. Hilda Heine while on travel in the Republic of Palau.

Assistant Secretary Domenech is part of a high-level U.S. delegation from Washington, D.C. and U.S. Indo-Pacific Command who visited Chuuk to commemorate the 75th anniversary of Operation Hailstone in the Pacific, visited President Tommy Remengesau in Palau, and concluded their trip to the Pacific on Kwajalein and Ebeye Atolls in the Republic of the Marshall Islands (RMI).

While meeting with President Heine, Assistant Secretary Domenech and other members of the U.S. delegation had the opportunity to discuss various issues of mutual importance. Assistant Secretary Domenech presented President Heine with \$1,178,148 in grant funding to support the Four Atoll Healthcare program. In December 2018, Domenech provided an initial amount of \$392,716 for fiscal year 2019. The current grant represents the remaining funds for FY 2019.

"We are proud of the history and cherish the relationships that Interior has had with the people of the Marshall Islands as part of the overall U.S.-RMI relationship," said Assistant Secretary Domenech of their trip. "Through the Compact of Free Association partnership, we have improved and built schools, hospitals, utilities, and numerous other programs throughout the Marshall Islands. We are strong partners through the U.S.-RMI Joint Economic Management and Fiscal Accountability Committee and we continue to have fruitful collaboration for the future through the Compact Trust Fund for the People of the Marshall Islands," he concluded.

The U.S. delegation concluded their trip to the three freely associated states, the three Pacific Island nations with whom the U.S. shares important relationships under the Compacts of Free Association, with a final stop to Kwajalein and Ebeye Atolls. The principals of the U.S. delegation were met in the Marshall Islands by U.S. Ambassador to the Marshall Islands Karen Stewart and Marshall Islands Ambassador to the U.S. Gerald Zackios:

## SECONDARY CONTAIMENT FOR HMWPP

### REPORT / DI ENVIRONMENTAL

**All facilities** that store HMWPP shall have appropriate containment for preventing a release. Secondary containment devices shall be:

capable of holding the content of the largest container or 10 percent of all non-gaseous HMWPP stored in the area, whichever is greater.

PCBs require secondary containment of twice the volume of the largest container or 25 percent of the total volume stored, whichever is greater.



**WEATHER DISCUSSION:** Trade winds continue from NE turning southward and crossing the equator, entering the Southern Pacific Convergence Zone. Low level speed convergence and cyclonic trajectories will support deep convection along 4-5N latitude. This will be source of high-level clouds over Kwajalein. The large-scale pattern will not change over next week, and heavier showers will remain to our south along 4-5N latitude. Trade winds speed will be 15-20 knots with a surge early next week bringing winds close to small craft advisory levels. Expecting small decrease in speeds Friday through Sunday to around 15-20 knots.

Drought levels on neighboring atolls is increasing. We were lucky enough to get some precipitation out of the disturbance that become Typhoon Wutip mid-February, ending with above average precipitation for the month. But Wotje to our east missed out, receiving only 0.30 inches of rainfall in February and about 1 inch in January. Other populated atolls across the northern RMI are in the same state. With no change in pattern expected, severe drought conditions will persist for those areas. On the other hand, being further South, Majuro will receive average to above average precipitation.

**SATURDAY:** Partly sunny with stray showers (less than 10 percent coverage across the atoll). Winds NE-ENE at 15-20 knots.

**SUNDAY:** Partly sunny with stray showers (less than 10 percent coverage across the atoll). Winds NE-ENE at 15-20 knots.

**MONDAY:** Partly to mostly sunny with stray showers (less than 10 percent coverage across the atoll). Winds NE-ENE at 17-23 knots.

**NEXT WEEK:** Partly to mostly sunny, shower coverage around 10 percent, trade wind speeds 17-23 knots decreasing to 15-20 knots near end of week.
