\$70K RAISED AT YYWC BASKET AUCTION

A charitable gala awaited more than 200 guests at the March 10 Yokwe Yuk Women's Club Basket Auction and Fundraiser at the Kwajalein Jr.-Sr. High School Multi-Purpose Room.

The YYWC makes annual education grant awards to schools in the Federated States of Micronesia and the Republic of the Marshall Islands. The grants are funded with monies raised throughout the year. The basket auction is an island favorite; Kwaj residents have the chance to support education and enjoy a formal evening out on the town. The event sold out weeks in advance.

To produce the event, YYWC Event Chair Salma Taylor led a team of volunteers that handled everything from food to floral arrangements. Taylor specially designed several of the evening's elements. Upon entering the MP Room, guests received a printed auction catalogue and numbered paddle bearing Taylor's graphic design work before locating seats at one of the many candlelit tables arranged under a ceiling of twinkling lights. Taylor also designed the intricate, jewel-colored floral arrangements on each table. With the help of high school student volunteers, she transformed the walls with a feathery-white décor.

In between making bids for silent auction items arranged in a tiered display, guests enjoyed a savory buffet, desserts and snacks, as well as a cash bar. Friends and couples commemorated the evening with portrait photography for a donation, courtesy of visiting photographers Mike and Love Diaz.

Master of Ceremonies Tim Roberge handled the microphone for most of the evening. He welcomed traditional RMI leaders who came to Kwaj for the fundraiser and led auction attendees into a bidding frenzy. Throughout the night, Kwajalein showed its generosity—and its competitive side—as longtime residents and friends outbid each other by thousands of dollars.

An array of items awaited guests. Baskets of gifts, handmade items and cutlery, jewelry, chocolates, spices, wines, snacks and beauty treatments were available for bid. A few lucky residents went home with bicycles, sport fishing equipment and reservations for sailboat cruises. Residents took home Wilson the volleyball, signed by Tom Hank (a Tom and Hank each signed, respectively) and a set of hand-carved masks from the Kwajalein Mic Shop.

Many items were donated by local residents, but good will travels a long way: Former residents as far away as the United Kingdom and Italy donated specialty gifts for the evening.

Some of the island's talented cooks also auctioned culinary experiences. The DeOre family auctioned a barbecue dinner. Song Banducci tempted Kwaj food lovers with a homecooked meal of Thai cuisine. Veronica Moos and Chris Heins offered a gourmet beef wellington dinner at Heins' home, complete with dessert, wine and a choice of sides.

"So people can come eat this dinner any time?" Roberge joked at the podium.

The spirit of generosity prevailed well into the night. Just as proceedings were winding down, Dan Eggers sparked a fierce bidding war for Roberge's Patriots blazer and tie.

Taylor thanked everyone who attended to support education with the YYWC. In the days to come, Kwaj residents discovered how much good they can do when they work together for a good cause: The 2019 YYWC Basket Auction raised a grand total of \$70,000 in donations for education in the Micronesian region.

For a limited time only, Kwajalein had two dentists on island, as the International SOS medical team welcomed a new teammate. Dr. Scott Berry, Kwajalein's new dentist, recently arrived and is ready to keep Kwajalein's smiles bright and healthy.

Here is a little-known fact: For many years, Berry was an avid surfer. When the tide is right, you might catch him heading for the waves, board in hand, to work on perfecting moves like his favorite surfer pros, Kelly Slater and Jack Johnson. Berry also enjoys diving and looks forward to getting to know the community. He originally hails from Santa Barbara and is glad to live near the ocean again.

Berry and Dr. Jon Sok, Kwajalein's dentist for the past five years, spent a few weeks preparing Berry for dental duty and the nuances of island life. Berry said he enjoys the friendly, small town atmosphere of the garrison, and Sok agrees: In the past five years he's worked on the atoll, it's the community that makes Kwaj a great place to live.





BACKGROUND

The U.S. Army finds itself at a historical inflection point, where disparate, yet related elements of an increasingly complex Operational Environment (OE) are converging, creating a situation where fast moving trends are rapidly transforming the nature of all aspects of society and human life—including the character of warfare.

It is important to take a creative approach to projecting and anticipating both transformational and enduring trends that will lend themselves to the depiction of the future. In this vein, the Army Mad Scientist Initiative is seeking your creativity and unique ideas to describe a battlefield that does not yet exist.

THE WRITING TASK

Write about the following scenario:

On March 17, 2030, the country of Donovia, after months of strained relations and covert hostilities, invades neighboring country Otso.

Donovia is a wealthy nation that is a near-peer competitor to the United States. Like the United States, Donovia has invested heavily in disruptive technologies such as robotics, AI, autonomy, quantum information sciences, bioenhancements and gene editing, spacebased weapons and communications, drones, nanotechnology, and directed energy weapons.

The United States is a close ally of Otso and is compelled to intervene due to treaty obligations and historical ties. The United States is about to engage Donovia in its first battle with a near-peer competitor in over 80 years.

1) Forecasting—Description of the timeline and events leading up to the battle.

2) Describing—Account of the battle while it's happening.

3) Backcasting—Retrospective look after the battle has ended (i.e., After Action Review or lessons learned).

1) What will forces and Soldiers look like in 2030?

2) What technologies will enable them or be prevalent on the battlefield?

3) What do Multi-Domain Operations look like in 2030?

Each diver should have their own computer.

On any given dive, both divers in the buddy pair should follow the most conservative dive computer.

Do not ascend greater than 60 feet per minute.

THINK BEFORE YOU DRINK

Arrival on U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll is filled with various emotions: excitement, apprehension and anticipation. UXO REMINDER

PUBLIC NOTICE

Remember the three Rs of UXO: Recognize an item as possible Unexploded Ordnance (UXO). Retreat from the area of the UXO. Report suspected UXO immediately by notifying EOD (5-1433) or CPS (5-4445).

Provide the following information: Location (building #, GPS, landmarks, etc); Size (compared to common items - football, scuba cylinder, etc). Treat UXO like you would treat dangerous sea creatures. 
